O'Donnell Youth's Steer Wins Ft. Worth Show

O'Donnell High School senior Jon Hogg showed the grand champion of the junior steer show at the annual Southwestern Exposition and Livestock Show in Fort Worth last Friday. The 1,236-pound steer named Fuzzy brought Hogg, 17, a show record \$53,000 in the Sale of Champions. It was purchased by Winn-Dixie food store chain.

More than 2,000 people were in the John Justice Arena of the Will Rogers Complex when the steer was

judged by John Schaake as the grand champion. Hogg, son of Mr. and Mrs. Nelson Hogg of O'Donnell, said the event was a dream come true.

The steer is not the same one which Hogg showed to win grand champion honors in the Lynn County Livestock Show recently.

Fuzzy reportedly is now on display at the Texas Pavilion in the Fort Worth Zoo, and should be there for at least a year.

County Helps Fund Polysonic Flow Meter

Lynn County Commissioners Monday voted to pay \$1800 out of county coffers to help fund a polysonic flow meter, a new piece of equipment which will measure water flow through irrigation wells, measuring gallons per minute. Commissioners were approached last month by representatives of the Soil and Water Conservation District to help pay for the equipment, which will be utilized by the Soil Conservation Service and available free of charge for area farmers.

SWCD representatives told commissioners that the Texas Water Development Board would fund 75 percent of the cost of the equipment, and asked commissioners to pay the remaining 25 percent of the cost, at \$1800. Commissioners voted unanimously Monday to fund that amount.

The SCS office expects to have the polysonic flow meter within a week or two.

In other business, the court named First National Bank of Tahoka as the

county depository for 1993-94, and approved county officials reports.

All commissioners were present at the meeting.

New Home Fire Department Still Functioning

New Home Mayor Adrian Evans said this week that contrary to an erroneous report that the New Home Fire Department is non-functioning, the volunteer fire department is in operation and will answer all fire calls in that area.

To report a fire anytime in the New Home area, 9-1-1 may be called, which will in turn be routed to the fire department. Also, to report a daytime fire, dial New Home City Hall at 924-7514, John Edwards Shop at 924-7281 or any business in New Home, according to the mayor.

A night time fire may be reported to either Freddie Kieth, 924-7592 or Louis Rodriguez, 924-7704.

"We regret the misunderstanding but wish to inform our area residents that the New Home Volunteer Fire Department is functioning," said Evans.

Nina Follis, Brian Alvarado Win School Spelling Bee

Tahoka third grader Nina Follis and fifth grader Brian Alvarado were first place finishers in their divisions in the Tahoka Elementary School Spelling Bee held last Thursday, Feb. 4.

Brian correctly spelled "bracelet" to win first place in the Intermediate Division after competing in 16 rounds of competition with 17 other students in grades 4-6. Second place winner was sixth grader Olivia Cantu, who was the only other competitor with Brian for the top honor in the last ten rounds of competition.

Other top finalists in the Intermediate Division were fourth grader Klyssa Kelln, 3rd place; fourth grader Stephen Brown, 4th; fourth grader Kyle Bueermann, 5th; and fifth grader Myra Martinez, 6th

place. These top six finalists advance to the Lynn County Spelling Bee, scheduled for Tuesday, March 9.

Woodwork...

MARK, SUCKER, Victim, or whatever label goes on a person who is always getting taken by somebody, certainly applies to me. As old as I am and as many times as I have been cheated, I should be more wary than I am. But still I do dumb things, the latest of which was to pay \$38 for two of us to eat at a place north of Lubbock which I won't name here.

No, the food wasn't bad, and the service was good, but for a party of 14, including four children, the bill for dinner was \$217.33, including taxes and an automatic tip of more than \$30 for the waiter. The price per person was about three times what it should have been, but the worse thing was that the buffet price per person does not include bread. Bread is about \$4 per loaf.

At those prices, no matter how good the food is, once you've paid the bill, you leave with a bad taste in your mouth.

They keep the lights very dim in that place; that's so you can't identify the robbers, if they ever get hauled into court.

SOMEBODY out there no doubt will sneer at my geographical ignorance, which I freely admit, because I'm about to talk about the north pole and the south pole without really knowing anything about them. I never seem to want to know things at times when reference books are available, so I have to just guess at them.

What brought my attention to the poles was a statement I read somewhere that "if you are at the north pole, every direction is south." I did go home and look at a small globe, and I decided that's probably right.

I asked someone at the office if it would be possible to go exactly to the north or south pole. We guessed that it might be, if you could stand the cold (both poles are cold, but I don't know why; it probably has something to do with the rotation of the earth in relation to the sun).

The globe indicates to me that there is land at the south pole, which is Antarctica, and very close to where my globe turns on a little spindle at the bottom are words like "King Edward VII Land" (where cigars are made?), "Ronne Land", the "Ross Ice Shelf" and "Byrd Land."

There must be a couple of places near the south pole where humans can go, because there are a couple of little dots designated "Little America" and "Shackleton Base." If that's a military base, it might be a good place to send all the new weird servicemen, as soon as they find out who they are.

Best I could tell from my globe, the north pole is in the water, or probably ice. The top of Greenland does go pretty close. There may be a place there for some humans to land, but not me. I get cold in Amarillo; any further north than that is too far. I don't see how Santa Claus can be so good-natured after staying up there most of the year.

The equator is a band around the center of the earth, and areas along it are mostly very hot. I twirled the globe to see what countries are right on it. The line goes through Singapore, slices off the bottom third of Africa, the very top part of South America, and out in the ocean apparently goes through a place called "LeRoy Tolman, cartographer, Replogle Globe, Inc."

At least that's what it says on my map. LeRoy probably charted the north and south poles and then died of heatstroke at the equator and they just buried him there, naming that spot after him.

Actually, I think the equator line on my map is wrong. We were in Presidio last year, and I'm almost sure the equator takes a sharp bend up to catch that border town before going back down to South America.

FB Praises Espy's Decision To Cut Costs From Top

New Agriculture Secretary Mike Espy's decision to first look for ways to cut USDA costs in Washington before closing and combining field offices where services are delivered is being hailed by farmers and ranchers, according to H.G. Franklin of Tahoka, president of Lynn County Farm Bureau.

"Mr. Espy has pledged to examine the federal bureaucracy for cost savings before curtailing services to farmers and ranchers who rely on them. Trimming the fat from the top down is the right approach," Franklin said.

Espy has put former Agriculture Secretary Edward Madigan's reorganization plan for USDA which called for 1,200 of the 14,000 USDA field offices nationwide to be closed and others to be combined on hold. The streamlining plan, which would also require legislation by Congress, targeted the Soil Conservation Service, the Farmers Home Administration, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service and federal crop insurance program offices. Seventy-eight of those offices were in Texas.

"We realize all federal agencies need to become more efficient, including the Agriculture Department. And it is quite possible some offices in urban areas may no longer be needed. But some of the proposed office closings would work hardships on farm families who would no longer have access to services without driving many miles," Franklin stated.

The county Farm Bureau president said it will be easier for producers to accept field office closures in the future, should they still be necessary, knowing that Secretary Espy has done his best to be fair.

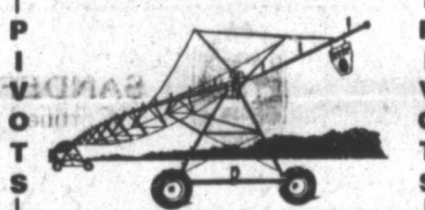
