

Odd Collision Involves Two Driverless Cars



Two driverless cars were involved slipped into reverse gear, backing across the street, knocking in the garage door at the home of Grace Prohl, and damaging her 1989 Buick. Heaviest damage was to the garage door, police said.

Tahoka Police also investigated a shoplifting incident at Thriftway Supermarket last Thursday, after store employes detained two persons. Dallas News Story Gives

News Sunday implying that Lynn County and the City of Tahoka form a cesspool of poverty and may be one

of the worst places in the world to live has county and city officials and many citizens upset, and in some cases, outraged. The story, started

on page one of The News, ostensibly was about rural poverty in Texas, and comparing poverty in rural areas to urban areas, and "a look at the state's poorest counties and poverty rates in Texas." It and an accompanying story on the inside of the edition were written by Victoria Loe, staff writer for the Dallas newspaper. Staff writers David McLemore and Bruce Tomaso also contributed to the story.

Ms. Loe apparently got all her information for the story from John Austin, a Tahoka resident who says

he is unable to get a job, and Berta Tyson, a representative of the **Community Action** Agency in Tahoka, Community leaders and city officials said they were not contacted by the newspa-

per regarding Tahoka's economic situation prior to the article.

The story was mostly about Austin's not having a steady job since returning to Tahoka last fall upon separation from the Air Force. It said "... he found himself competing for jobs that paid minimum wage, \$4.25 an hour. One person working full time for minimum wage earns \$8,840 a year. That would leave Mr. Austin's family of four \$3,835 below the federal poverty line of \$12,675."

However, later in the story by Ms. Loe is the statement, "In Lynn County... the average weekly wage is \$323. In Dallas County it's \$516." The story does not point out that the average person who is working in Lynn County would be making \$16,744 a year (at the rate of \$323 per week), nowhere near poverty level, even in a family of four with one person working.

It was the overall tone of the story, however, not the statistics, which irritates the community's leaders. "We do have problems - some people don't

have any money, and some can't find A story in The Dallas Morning a job - but this is not a situation unique to this city or county," said Tahoka Mayor Jim Solomon. "But the basic format of the story is poor, is the 136th poorest county in the

> > and the writing is irresponsible, in my opinion, because the story fails to describe adequately the whole situation in the county, nor does it properly identify the problems. Since there was a picture of the Austins with the story, I would assume that someone on the staff of the Dallas News came to Tahoka. If so, and he or she didn't bother to contact any city or county officials to get another view of the eonomy and lifestyle here, this is a good example of a big city reporter doing half a job."

One of the comments by the writer of the story gave a picture of Tahoka as a squalid pigsty of poverty: "At least the (Austin) family's house is snug and warm, vastly better than the rickety clapboard shacks that straggle along dirt roads on the other side of the highway. There, in the shadows of the cotton gins that are Lynn County's meager economic lifeblood, Tahoka's poverty is wretchedly evident."

"The writer of that asinine statement obviously didn't look at any of the attractive homes and successful businesses in the city," said Dalton Wood, former publisher of The Lynn County News.

"I think it's a slam on Tahoka and the county," said County Judge J.F. Brandon. "Certainly we have a lot of unemployment, but we're not in as bad a shape as the story indicates."

The Dallas News story was accompanied by a chart showing the counties in Texas which are rated as poverty-level, based on some kind of federal government formula (which

apparently does not take into account income for families of fewer than four persons or persons living alone), and, according to that chart, Tahoka United States. But the county's leaders

good indication to me that our community is not on its last legs as the Dallas article would have us believe. Also, how do you put a value on quality of life? Many people living in Lynn County have lived in other places and are here now out of choice, not necessity. They have found, as I have, that there is no better place to live than Lynn County for people, weather, churches, schools and convenience to the 'big city' without all the associated problems of living there."

Vondell Wood, who moved to Tahoka from Dallas just over a year ago to become co-owner of The Lynn County News, said she would much rather live in Tahoka than Dallas. "I lived in the Dallas area for more than 12 years, and there is no comparisón to the quality of life here. Tahoka gives much more in things that matter-a low crime rate, no traffic hassles, an emphasis on spiritual wealth, and, above all, lots of caring, friendly people that greet you by name and are truly interested in your well-being."

ort of the Woods The wayward thoughts of Juanell (Wood) Jones

I hate being sick. You can't even enjoy being off from work because you feel so lousy that nothing short of an instant cure or winning the million-dollar lottery will give you any pleasure.

I've just come off a four-day sick binge, when I had an uncommon cold, which is much worse than the common garden variety cold. This is the kind of cold that began with a few spiffles last Friday afternoon, then progressed rapidly through sneezing, sniffling, coughing, hacking, and feverish sinus pressure to the point where I felt sure my brain was frying and steam was spewing forth from my ears. It was the kind of cold that stops just short of death, bringing the hardiest of victims to their knees.

So I put on my ugliest and most comfortable gown, and crawled into bed with a box of kleenex and jar of Vicks to settle in for the weekend, which promised to be miserable. It was. Even the air molecules around my bed formed rank and viciously attacked me – I could feel the air atoms hammering on my cycballs as I lay helplessly. It was a pitiful sight.

My family checked on me occasionally, and on Saturday I received a pretty high quotient of sympathy. That sympathy quotient, however, dwindled in direct proportion to the number of times I whined at the kids to "bring me a Coke" and wore down quickly on my husband who spent all day Sunday doing a week's worth of laundry and who, by Monday, had visited the grocery store on a daily basis for three days and was sick to death of cooking supper.

Even my mother had had enough by Monday evening and called to tell me to either get up and go to the hospital or get to work. At this point, I do believe my husband was considering laying out a sleeping bag for me on the kitchen bar so that I could prepare the next meal.

Actually, Monday afternoon as I wandered through the house, all alone, wondering what to eat and feeling sorry for myself I decided I had had enough of this sick business too. After opening the refrigerator door 15 times in a two-hour period, during which time nothing new popped up on the shelves for me to eat, I opted to drive over to a local drive-in and get a take-out meal.

This is a place which I call occasionally, but not so much that they know me when I drive up. Or at least, I didn't think so. Actually, I hoped they wouldn't recognize me, as at this point I looked like something even the cat wouldn't drag up. Try to picture this: scraggly hair, no makeup, bags under my eyes, red nose, and a scroungy sweatshirt. They knew me instantly when I drove up to the window ... I didn't even have to tell them my name.




State Comptroller John Sharp recently delivered a total of \$212.5 million in February sales tax rebates to 1,071 Texas cities and 109 counties, a 17.3% increase over their payments of one year ago.

Texas cities received \$192.1 million, up 17.5 percent over the \$163.4 million they received last February. Counties received a total of \$20.3 million for their February rebates, a 15.3-percent increase over the February 1992 rebates of \$17.6 million.

This month's payments include taxes collected on December's Christmas sales and reported in January by businesses filing monthly returns. February's rebates also reflect taxes reported by business filing quarterly returns for sales made in October, November, and December.

Lynn County received \$20,479.28 for this period, a 74.26% increase from last year's payment of \$11,752.32. The 1993 payment to date is \$33,837.99.

O'Donnell received a payment of \$6,354.60, a 114% increase from last year's \$2,969.40. Payment to date is \$7,447.01. Tahoka received \$9,654.21, a 13.82% increase from last year's payment of \$8,482.29. Payment to date is \$20,062.96. Wilson had a 1387.03% increase from last year's payment of \$300.63 to this year's of \$4,470.47. Wilson's payment to date is \$6,328.02.

Better Intervention Can Reduce Risk Of Deadly Strokes, Says AHA

sudden and devestating occurrence --a blood vessel rupture or blockage that prevents blood from flowing to the brain, killing brain cells, causing disability or death.

The fact is that not all strokes are "sudden" occurrences. Early intervention can minimize damage and preventive care may reduce the risk of strokes, according to the American Heart Association, (AHA).

There are several major types of strokes. The two most common types are caused by clots or other materials that plug an artery that supplies blood to a part of the brain. Ruptured blood vessels cause the other two. Much progress has been made in treating and preventing conditions that can lead to a stroke.

"Three kinds of treatments are proving very successful in preventing stroke," said Shannon Percell, President of the Lynn County Chapter of the American Heart Assn. "There are two groups of new drugs that can successfully slow or prevent the formation of blood clots. Another treatment, this one surgical, can relieve severe blockage in the neck arteries restoring blood supply to the brain. "Stroke needs to be treated with the same sense of urgency as a heart attack," said Percell. "And in order to get immediate treatment, people must be able to recognize the warning signs of stroke."

Many people consider a stroke a America is increasing. That's why the American Heart Association advocates that individuals take action to reduce their risk of stroke. The estimated 500,000 people who suffer from a stroke each year in the United States usually have one or more of the following risk

I hate being sick. You can't even enjoy being off from work because you feel so lousy that nothing short of an instant cure or winning the million-dollar lottery will give you any pleasure. I've just come off a four-day sick binge, when I had an uncommon cold, which is much worse than the common garden variety cold. This is the kind of cold that began with a few spiffles last Friday afternoon, then progressed rapidly through sneezing, sniffling, coughing, hacking, and feverish sinus pressure to the point where I felt sure my brain was frying and steam was spewing forth from my ears. It was the kind of cold that stops just short of death, bringing the hardiest of victims to their knees.

Try to picture this: scraggly hair, no makeup, bags under my eyes, red nose, and a scroungy sweatshirt. They knew me instantly when I drove up to the window ... I didn't even have to tell them my name.

Now the point to this is: do I look this awful all the time? or are my best efforts at hairstyling and makeup not all that drastic an improvement on the basic me? and did the person at the drive-up window scream when she saw me? and did I scare off all the other customers?

Proper Management Practices Hold Soil, Nutrients In Place

"Erosion can carry away soil resources and produce large quantities of sediment that degrade the water," said Rodney Duus, soil conservationist for the United States Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service in Tahoka. "Soil can be both a pollutant and a carrier of other pollutants."

Erosion and sediment can be reduced for much less than the cost of repairing the damage. Proper management practices hold soil and nutrients in place and keep sediment, nutrients and pesticides out of water supplies. Some of these practices are:

Conservation tillage: A tillage system used for managing crop residues suited to specific soils, climate and farming operations.

Terraces: Earthen embankments built across a slope to control runoff. Contour farming: Sloping and terraced land farmed nearly level across

the slope to reduce erosion. Crop rotation: Different crops planted in successive seasons in the same field.

Grassed waterway: Sod cover maintained in natural runoff watercourses in fields and in constructed outlets for diversions and terraces.

Planned grazing systems: A system in which two or more grazing units are alternately grazed and rested in a planned sequence to improve and maintain forage production, reduce erosion and protect water from animal waste.

SCS has a new publication on the subject entitled "Keeping Sediment Under Control, a water quality checklist for farmers." Single free copies are available from the SCS office.

For information and help in planning water quality improvement measurers, contact the Soil Conservation Service or the Texas Agricultural Extension Service in Tahoka. Financial assistance may be available from USDA's Soil Conservation Service and Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Lynn County Fields Need 2-8" Water **To Bring Soil Profile To Field Capacity**

Lynn County producers within the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 need two to eight inches of water from precipitation and/or irrigation to bring the five-foot root zone soil profile to field capacity before 1993 spring planting, according to soil moisture survey data released by the Water District and the USDA-Soil Conservation Service (USDA-SCS).

Temporary sites were established . in the portions of Lynn County annexed into the Water District in 1992. Permanent sites will be in place for the 1994 pre-plant soil moisture survey, says Wilfred E. "Willie" Crenwelge, USDA-SCS Soil Scientist.

Crenwelge says there are several factors accounting for the moisture

tion to estimate the amount of water needed during pre-plant irrigation to bring their soil to field capacity without over-irrigating or under-irrigating. However, producers should remember that these are guidelines which should not be used in place of individual testing on their farms. It will be very important for them to check moisture conditions in the three and four foot levels of the soil this year," says Crenwelge.

Oil And Gas Investment **Scheme Indicted**

A federal grand jury in the Northern District of Texas returned a 24-Count Indictment charging 12 individuals with mail fraud, wire fraud, conspiracy, money laundering, criminal contempt and interstate transportation for illicit sexual purposes, in connection with an oil and gas investment scheme formerly headquartered in Bedford, Texas, known as Hartford Oil and Gas, Inc. and "Hartford." The scheme allegedly defrauded over 200 investors nationwide of approximately \$5 million.

The allegations are that the scheme operated from telephone sales boiler rooms located in Bedford, Austin, Addison, and Dallas and that individuals offered and solicited the sale of interests in several Texas oil and gas horizontal drilling programs to investors located hroughout the United States, Canada,



Lots of Rain, Cooler Weather Noted In South Plains In 1992

The weather across the Texas South Plains during 1992 turned out to be slightly cooler than normal with wellabove normal precipitation, according to the Lubbock office of the National Weather Service.

Temperatures averaged 0.3 degree below normal and ranged from 1.2 degrees above the long term average at Lubbock to 1.3 degrees below normal

In Tahoka the average maximum temperature for the year was 72.5 degrees, and an average minimum temperature of 46.2 degrees. The monthly average temperature was 59.4 degrees. Maximum temperatures averaged 1.2 degrees below normal and ranged from 0.6 degree above normal at Lubbock to 2.5 degrees below normal at Plainview. Summer maximum temperatures often soar above 100 degrees, but this year only three days in July were hot enough to see the mercury surpass the century mark. July 2, 7, and 15 were those days, topped by the 7th when many South Plains cities recorded the annual highest. Levelland reported the area highest that day with 108. Minimum temperatures averaged



The crop roots extracted moisture from the three and four-foot soil layers as they normally would. The annual soil moisture survey data helps inform irrigators about general soil moisture and availability conditions across the 15-county Water District service area.
