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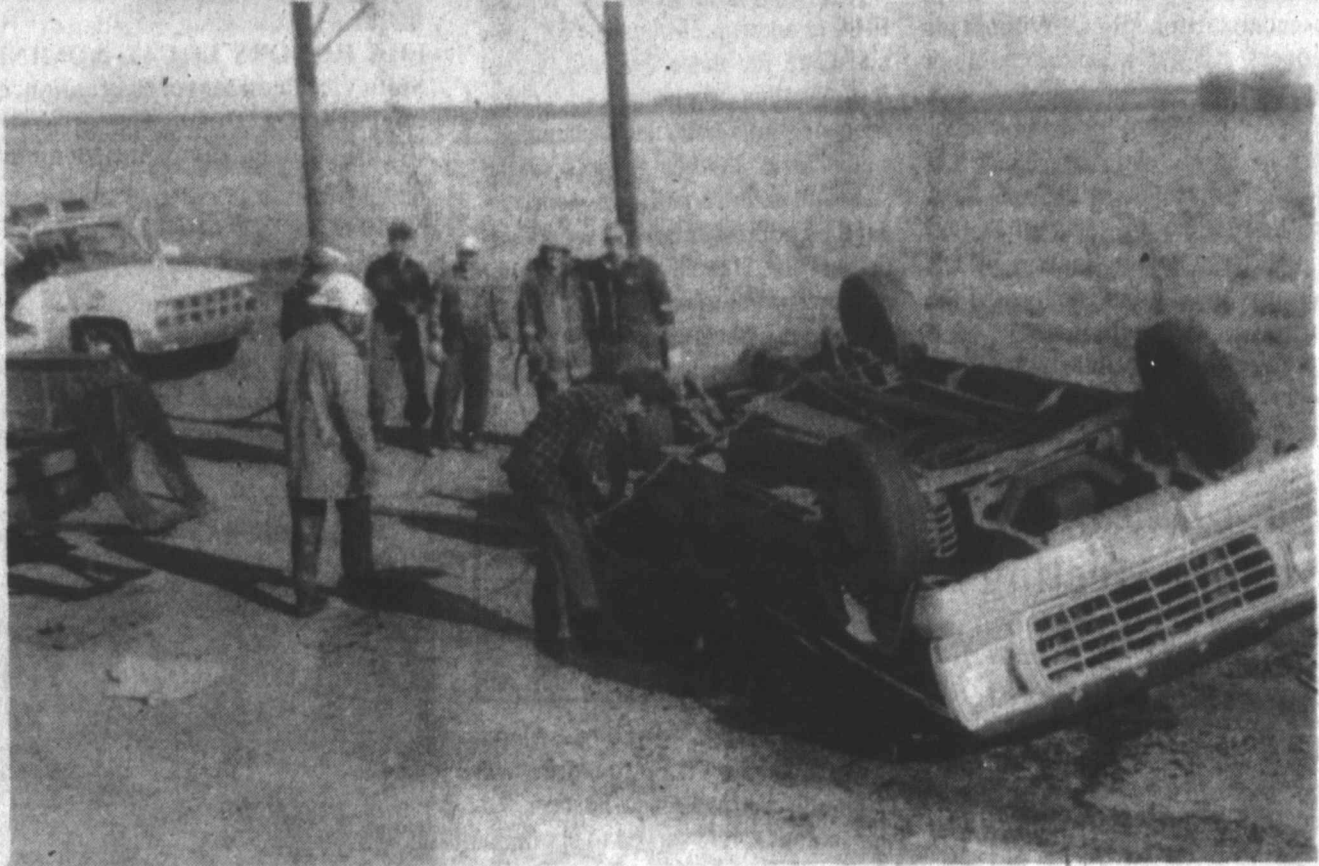
Coaches Contracts Renewed

Tahoka High School coaches Hulgn Kirkland and Chris Wigington both had their contracts renewed during a special meeting of the T.I.S.D. Board of Trustees Tuesday evening. Trustees voted 4-3 to renew Kirkland, who is head basketball coach. Wigington, who is head football coach, was renewed by a vote of 5-2.

School nurse Joan Knox's contract was also renewed by a unanimous vote of trustees.

One other item on the agenda concerned whether to continue the volleyball program at T.I.S.D., as the Tahoka girls volleyball team is the only volleyball team in this district. The board heard statements from Susan Tipton and Joella Rash during an Open Forum, both of whom voiced support of the girls volleyball program. Several other guests were present as well. After some review, the board took no official action on the issue, stating that they recommended continuation of the volleyball program.

All board members were present at the meeting.

Two Men Killed, One Injured In Rollover

Two O'Donnell men were killed and a third was injured Tuesday when the pickup truck they occupied overturned on FM 213 in Terry County, according to the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Waylon Gibbs Marshall, 40, and Alberto Ybarra, 30, both farm laborers from O'Donnell, were pronounced dead at the scene by Terry County Justice of the Peace Frances Hansard.

The driver of the 1979 Ford pickup, Keith J. Sanders, 19, of O'Donnell was taken to Brownfield Regional Medical Center. A hospital representative declined to disclose Sanders' condition late Tuesday.

The pickup was westbound on FM 213 about 14 miles southeast of Brownfield at 7:45 a.m. when the driver lost control, ran off the road and overcorrected, causing the vehicle to overturn 1 1/2 times, according to DPS trooper Mike Bennett's report.

All three men were thrown from the pickup during the accident, the DPS stated.

Funeral services for Marshall and Ybarra were pending at press time.

Another wreck about a half mile east of Wilson was investigated early Wednesday. The driver of a 1992 Pontiac, Brandy Shannon Criswell, 16, apparently was not injured when the car overturned on a curve on FM 211 about 7:30 a.m.

During the last week sheriff's deputies investigated several burglary reports, including a report on March 7 that Wilson school ag building and home economics building had been burglarized. Two typewriters and a Sharp cassette tape recorder were stolen from the home ec building, and many hand tools, McCullough chain saw, an RCA VCR and a 19-inch Magnavox TV were taken from the ag building. School officials estimated the loss would total about \$2500.

The mobile home of Kevin Pounds, just inside the north Lynn County line, was burglarized March 10, and stolen were a microwave, RCA 13-inch TV, Smith-Corona typewriter and jewelry, including wedding and engagement rings valued at \$3500.

The home of Ronald Howard, 45 miles northeast of Wilson, was reported burglarized on March 17, when a large coffee table and a Panasonic VCR were stolen. The front door was

damaged when the intruders gained entry.

Between March 14-15 someone broke into a Lubbock Avalanche-Journal news stand rack in front of the Cotton Boll in Wilson, taking an estimated \$30-\$40 in change.

About five miles northeast of New Home the residence of Patsy Barnett was burglarized March 15 and items valued at a total of \$1653 were stolen, including Winchester and Marlin .22 rifles, an RCA VCR, 25-inch Zenith TV, jewelry boxes and a table lamp.

The residence of Bryan Kieth, about four miles northwest of New Home, was burglarized Tuesday, and missing were a Toshiba VCR Midland black and white TV, a radio and a microwave. Total loss was estimated at \$560.

Tahoka Police Dept. during the last week investigated several domestic disturbances and picked up two boys for fighting at Tahoka High School. Juvenile authorities recommended that one of the boys be suspended at school.

Police also investigated an injury to a 7-year-old girl, who was treated at Lynn County Hospital for bites and scratches from a stray cat on S. 2nd St. The cat was picked up for observation.

In jail during the week were four persons, all on charges on driving while intoxicated. Two were first offenses and two were for felony (subsequent) DWI cases, including one who was recently indicted by the grand jury.

His artwork will be reproduced on Poka-Lambro's new telephone directories which will be released this August.

Brooks is a freshman at Tahoka High School and is a first year art student in Mrs. Lou Ashcraft's class. He is the son of Leonard Brooks and Mary Lou Keith.

Four other students of Mrs. Ashcraft received Honorable Mention awards for their artwork in the Poka-Lambro contest. They are Lee Elder, Ty Stark, Marisa Martin, and Amy Draper.

Pre-Registration For Kindergarten Set March 31 At Tahoka Elementary

Pre-registration for children who will be kindergarten students for the 1993-94 school year will be held Wednesday, March 31, at 1:30 p.m. in the Tahoka School Cafeteria.

"It is very, very important that parents pre-register their incoming kindergarten student on this date," stated Miss Molly Helmlinger, elementary principal.

"Last year we had 60 students pre-register. When school opened in the fall, we had approximately that number. This was wonderful because it helped us prepare staffing and facilities. We determine the number of teachers for each grade level based on the pre-registration and current enrollments," said the principal.

"Parents or a legal guardian must enroll their child at pre-registration. We must have an accurate figure this year," explained Miss Helmlinger.

A parent or legal guardian must

pre-register the child. It is not necessary for the child to attend pre-registration. Registration by a friend or relative is not permissible.

The child's original birth certificate or baptismal certificate, current immunization shot/health record and social security card must be present at this time. State law requires that school districts validate proof of all this information.

There will be an important meeting at the time of pre-registration. Parents will receive a "Kindergarten Handbook", supply list, and general information on what will be required of the child in kindergarten.

A child must be at least five years old as of Sept. 1 to be eligible to be enrolled in kindergarten for the 1993-94 school year.

Soil Conservation Service Says Pipe Outlets Control Erosion

When most people in this area think of erosion, wind erosion comes to mind. However, many farmers in Lynn County must deal with water erosion as well. Usually parallel and/or basin terraces are used to control water erosion, but sometimes terraces are used in conjunction with other practices, according to the USDA Soil Conservation Service in Tahoka. One such practice is pipe outlets. Pipe, or underground outlets, are pipes that are installed below the ground to collect surface water and convey it to a suitable outlet. A suitable outlet can be a waterway or an emergency spill area.

A pipe outlet consists of a riser (intake), a mainline, which is usually made of PVC pipe, and an outlet pipe, usually made of steel pipe. A rodent guard is placed on the outlet pipe, to prevent rodents from nesting in the pipe.

The purpose of pipe outlets is to drain excess water from terrace channels at a faster rate, so these areas don't stand water for an extended period of time and drown out crops. This also helps the producer to get back in the field sooner after heavy rains.

One local producer installed a system of basin terraces with pipe outlets last spring. Joe Brooks installed these practices on some land he farms north of Redwine. The terraces and outlets were cost-shared by the USDA - Soil Conservation Service, through the Great Plains Conservation Program.

Less than a month after the outlets were completed, they received approximately five inches of rain in just a few hours. While many surrounding fields stood in water for several days, Brooks' outlets drained the ex-

cess water from his terrace channels in about two days. This allowed him to be back in his field much sooner than usual. Brooks is very pleased with this new system, according to the SCS.

Other benefits can be seen as a result of the new outlet system. When the water runs through the pipes and down the spill area, the water is slowed down, allowing the silt and sediment to 'fall out' of the runoff water before it reaches the highway. This keeps the highway from being covered with mud after a hard rain.

Using a system of terraces and underground outlets is just one way Lynn County farmers are controlling erosion and complying with their FSA Conservation Compliance plans.

Immunization Task Force To Meet March 29

The Lynn and Garza County "All Kids Count" immunization initiative task force will hold its second monthly meeting March 29, at 5 p.m. at the County Courthouse in Tahoka.

The purpose of this meeting is to discuss the process of distributing and collecting questionnaires within the two-county area. The task force will distribute Needs Assessment questionnaires to parents of young children. Provider questionnaires will be given to administrators of health care facilities and physicians in private or group practice.

The needs assessment will enable the task force to determine where gaps exist in children's health care services. The providers survey will tell them what primary health care services are available for children. The information provided by the health care community will be used to develop a directory of children's health care services.

This two-county "All Kids Count" task force is one of 14 in the South Plains and Panhandle region of Texas. The "All Kids Count" project is a grant-funded program to develop a plan to link health care facilities and physicians with a regional computerized database network to monitor the immunization status of preschool children.

The average rate of immunization for communities in this region is 58%. The goal is to increase the rate to 98% and lower the incidence of vaccine preventable disease.

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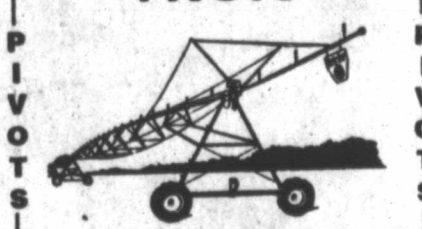
