Burglars Busy In County

Thefts, burglaries of residences and three vehicle burglaries were reported in Lynn County during the last week, keeping sheriff's officers busy with investigations, and thefts and a minor collision were reported in the city of Tahoka.

Two burglaries which occurred during daylight hours Tuesday may have been related, as entry was gained in each instance by pounding a door with what appears to have been a sledge hammer. The home of Ted Castillo, on FM 2956 about four miles southeast of Tahoka, was burglar-

ized between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m. Stolen were items valued at \$1952, including two Emerson stereos, Fisher VCR, Amana microwave, Magnavox TV and car phones.

Also Tuesday, the residence of Tom Hamman, about seven miles northwest of New Home, was burglarized, with articles valued at more than \$1000 stolen, including an RCA VCR, speakers, three rifles and a Colt .357 pistol, Casio keyboard and other items.

Glenn Moore of Wilson reported a Smith and Wesson .357 pistol sto-

len from his pickup between March 18-22.

A Slaton dentist, Dr. Michael Evans reported his 1992 Isuzu Rodeo was burglarized around midnight Saturday while parked at a residence three miles north of Wilson. Stolen were a garage door opener and two cassette tapes. Loss, including damage to a vent window, was estimated at \$130.

Tools, a pair of binoculars, weather radio and other items were stolen from a 1988 GMC pickup parked early Monday at the residence of the owner, Fred Pionka, 4.2 miles northeast of Wilson.

About a mile northwest of New Home, the residence of Tracy and Tasha Smith was burglarized last weekend, with this home also entered by someone striking the door with a heavy instrument, possibly a sledge hammer. Remington and Marlin rifles, an Akai VCR, Pioneer stereo system, 50 albums and VCR tapes were among items stolen, valued at a total of \$3441.

* Six cases of Treflan were stolen off a farm trailer parked about five miles northwest of Wells Friday night. Owner Glenn Phipps of Lamesa said the loss totaled \$966.

Six knit pant suits were stolen Saturday afternoon at Parker Pharmacy. Suspects were listed as three Hispanic females who may have put the suits under their clothing and walked out, leaving in a dark colored Oldsmobile. Crime Line, 998-5145, is offering a \$100 reward for information clearing the case. The suits were valued at \$150.

Run Your Clock Up Half An Hour

Tahoka City Council this week passed an ordinance requiring all residents of the city to run their clocks forward half an hour when most of the nation will go on daylight time at 2 a.m. Sunday, April 4.

"We still have people complaining about daylight time, so the council thought we'd compromise and move the clocks up half an hour, and maybe that will please everybody," said City Manager Barclay Pitiful. He added that anyone who does not set his clock up 30 minutes Saturday night will be subject to a \$50,000 fine plus one year confinement in the former city dump.

The announcement of the new ordinance was made today, April Fool's Day, so most folks probably will do like the rest of the nation and run their clocks forward one hour Saturday night.

Six File For Places On Hospital Board

Six candidates, including three incumbents, have filed for four places on the Lynn County Hospital Board of Directors. Deadline for filing is 5 p.m. April 5.

Incumbents seeking re-election are Leland White, Ann Wyatt and Jackie Stidham. They are joined in the race by candidates Bill Sawyer, Norman Ledbetter and Harold Barrett. Incumbent Joy Brookshire, whose term also expires this year, is not seeking re-election.

Directors serve two-year terms on the hospital board, which consists of seven directors. The three directors who will continue serving until next year are Billy Tomlinson, Peggy Morton and Bettye Green.

The election will be held May 1.

WHENEVER YOU'RE driving a car (or RV, or motorcycle, or whatever) on a cross-country trip and you come into a new state, you frequently will find an information center for tourists soon after you get into the new state. And, if you're like our family, you may stop there for a free map and information about things to see, or maybe the fastest way to get out of that place.

However, we don't always stop, and almost never do we stop at tourist information centers in states which border our home state of Texas. Still, the information reported in the Texas Auto Visitor Survey this week is interesting, although it is gathered from visitor centers which only record those who stopped there, and the data on the current survey is only for the winter months of December through February.

More people from the adjacent state of Louisiana stopped at those centers than from any other state. Of the other adjacent states, New Mexico ranked 16th, Arkansas was 9th and Oklahoma was fourth. California sent the second highest number of people into Texas both in the winter months and in the fall and summer of 1992. And California was first in the spring of 1992.

Florida residents generally rank second or third among the numbers of visitors to Texas and Arizona usually is about 5th.

I noticed that the District of Columbia was last on the list in the winter, with fewer than one per cent of all Texas visitors coming from DC. That's encouraging news. We don't need any of those Washington types down here messing around.

More people from out of state visit San Antonio than any other city, with an estimated 21 per cent going there, mainly to see the Alamo. Dallas was second, followed by Austin, Houston, El Paso and Fort Worth. Neither Lubbock nor Tahoka made the list of 29.

Canada led the number of foreign visitors, followed by England, Australia and West Germany. Mexico is not included in the survey, since it borders on Texas.

Nobody from outer space was listed, although we have seen some really strange creatures right around here close.

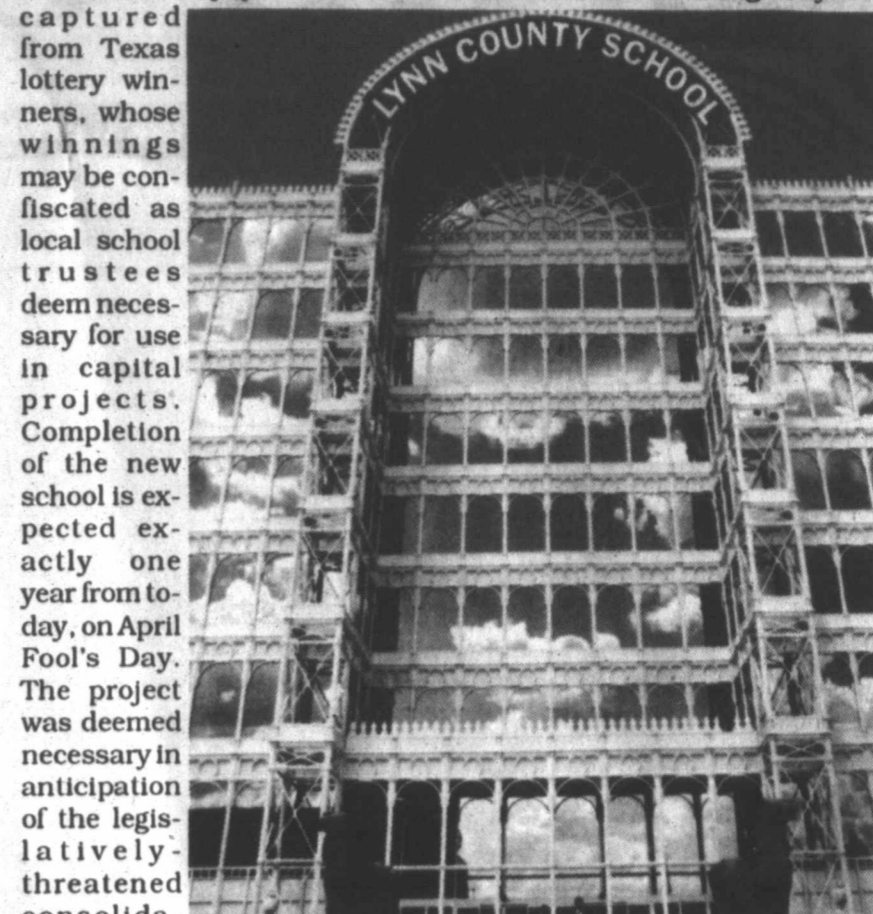

Completion of the new school is expected exactly one year from today, on April Fool's Day. The project was deemed necessary in anticipation of the legislatively-threatened consolidation of schools, an idea which most residents in these parts greet with about as much enthusiasm as a trip to the dentist. School students, however, are excited about attending classes in the new building, which, although it looks really large and expensive, actually ... is. In order to help keep maintenance expenses down, however, a new class will be offered to seniors: Window Washing 101. Life insurance is a prerequisite. Other classes which may be offered include:

- **Rappelling**, which will replace football as the number one sport of macho-type teenagers;
- **Rooftop Hang Gliding**, for those who are really serious about enjoying life to its fullest;
- **Rescue 9-1-1**, which will be a requirement for all students, so as to enlist their assistance for those who "flunk" rappelling and hang gliding;
- **High Anxiety**, a psychology class offered to students who have stress problems associated with being in high places - this class will be conducted atop the center dome, the highest point of the eight-story building.
- **Weather Watching**, a class which will be offered in the spring through the assistance of the National Weather Service. This class will be conducted on the rooftop. The top ten percent of the class will advance to "Tornadoes: How to Spot Them & When Do You Run?" and will have the honor of ringing the tornado siren for drills (a daily event during the months of April and May);

These are but a few of the new classes which will enable the students of today to become outstanding citizens of the community.

By now, the average taxpayer is probably wondering exactly how much this new endeavor is going to cost them. I estimate our taxes shouldn't escalate to more than a mere \$99 per \$100 valuation. I'm not going to worry about it, however, because I intend to pressure the state legislators into passing a new law that exempts school trustees from paying school taxes ... ever.

One last bit of information: Where will the new school be located? To be fair, it should be located in the direct center of the county which is just about ... where the Lynn County News office now stands. I'll consider selling for a cool billion. For those who live further than a mile from the site and are worried they may have to ride a school bus every day - not to worry. We're going to install one of those superfast monorail systems throughout the county, and students will be able to travel to school in just 4 seconds from any point in the county.

That about covers it. "The Lynn County High School" ... well ... it was just a (foolish) dream. Have a nice April Fool's Day.

Three From TISD Named Tandy Technology Scholars

Tandy Technology Scholars, a program to recognize academic excellence especially in the areas of mathematics, science and computer science, announced awards this week, including certificates to one teacher and two seniors at Tahoka Independent School District.

Betty Stennett was named Outstanding Math/Science/Computer Science teacher at Tahoka High School, while Seth Prince was named Outstanding Math/Science/Computer Science student and Cory D. Whitley was awarded a certificate for being in the top two percent of academic nominees.

This is the fourth year that the Tandy Technology Scholars program has made awards to teachers and graduating seniors at American high schools. The academic top two percent of graduating seniors in certified schools are eligible to receive certificates recognizing their academic achievement. This year the Tandy Technology Scholars program will honor 23,259 meritorious seniors.

Each certified school may nominate a senior who is outstanding in mathematics, science or computer science. These students receive a certificate recognizing them as a Tandy Technology Scholar.

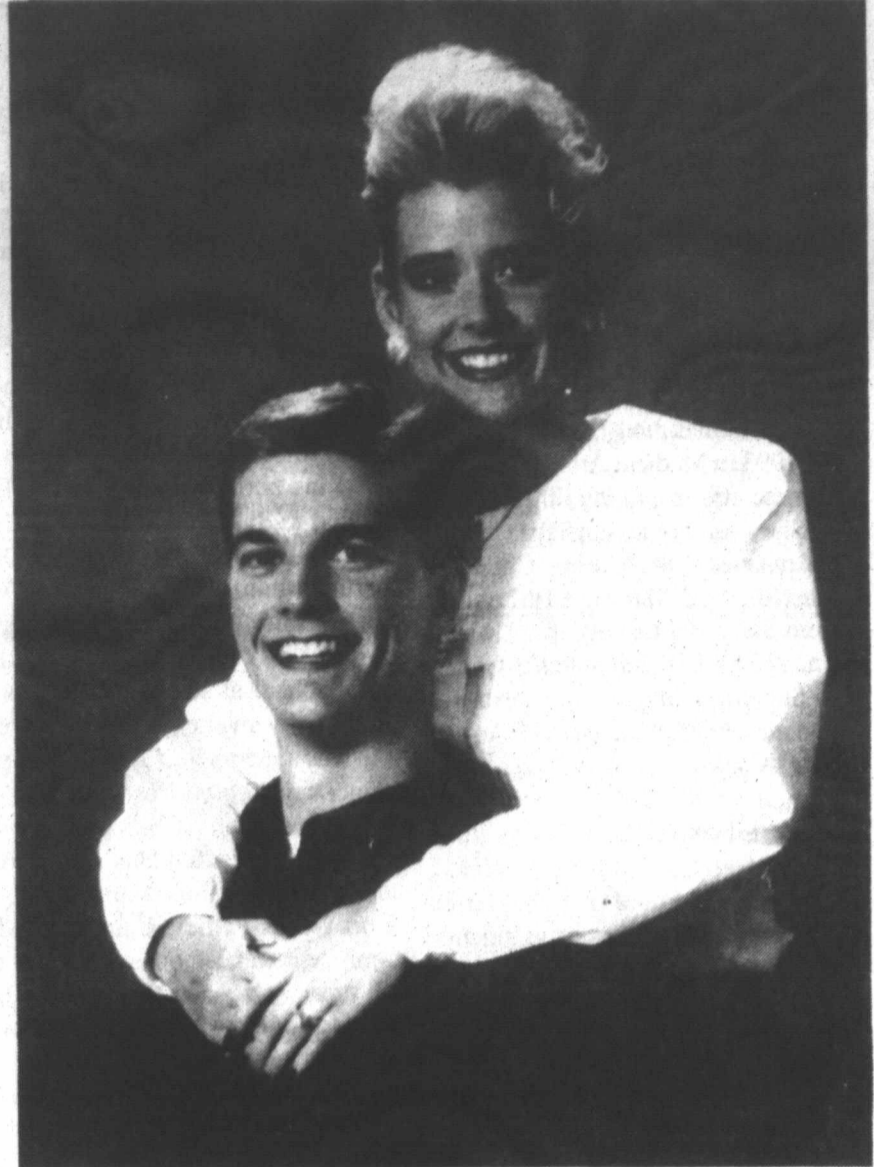

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Texas Senate: Week In Review

The Texas Senate met Monday morning, March 22, and passed SB 145 by Sen. Royce West of Dallas which would impose a Class B misdemeanor offense for recklessly discharging a firearm in any municipality. The bill will attempt to help combat instances where people indiscriminately fire weapons, such as on New Year's Eve or the 4th of July. Also Monday, the Senate passed CSSB 424 by Sen. Chris Harris of Arlington which establishes spousal support (alimony) after the dissolution of marriages that have lasted at least ten years. The bill limits the amount of support to \$1500 per month or 25 percent of the spouse's average monthly net resources, whichever is less. Both bills now go to the House for further consideration.

The Senate met Tuesday and passed SB 323 by Sen. Frank Madla of San Antonio which repeals provisions for the performance of a marriage ceremony within 72 hours of the issuance of a marriage license. Currently, state law prohibits a marriage ceremony for at least 72 hours immediately following the issuance of a marriage license.

On Wednesday, the Senate met and passed SB 377 by Sen. Bill Haley of Center which would end regulation of AT&T as a long distance carrier by the Public Utility Commission. Currently, AT&T is the only long distance carrier — out of 195 in Texas — that falls under P.U.C. regulations for the approval of all major price changes and new service proposals. The Senate also passed SB 40 by Sen. David Sibley of Waco which will strengthen laws concerning "outcry testimony" in child abuse cases. "Outcry testimony", which is testimony from the first adult a child told of an assault, is currently only allowed if the child also testifies.

On Thursday morning, the Senate met and passed a package of eight mental health reform bills designed to end alleged abuses in private psychiatric hospitals and make the facilities more accountable for their actions. The bills are the result of a special committee Lt. Gov. Bob Bullock appointed last year to study allegations of patient abuse and insurance fraud by psychiatric facilities. Sen. Chris Harris of Arlington, Sen. Mike Moncrief of Ft. Worth, and Sen. Judith Zaffirini of Laredo were named to the original committee and were later joined by Sen. David Sibley of Waco and former Sen. Chet Brooks. The bills passed; set guidelines for patient admission; create a patient's bill of rights; restrict the use of controversial treatments such as shock therapy; establish whistleblower laws that require health care workers to report incidents of patient abuse; enhance the state penal code, making it a felony for hospitals, individuals, or companies to offer a bounty for patient referrals; require insurance companies to monitor billing for fraud; and establish a mandate that psychiatric hospitals examine a patient 24 hours after the patient requests a discharge. Also, Thursday, Senators drew numbers to determine the length of their current terms as required by the Texas Constitution every ten years after the redistricting process. The process is used to stagger the terms of the membership.

Sixteen senators received four-year terms, and fifteen received two-year terms. In the event the Senate redistricting map changes dramatically, all members will face reelection in 1994.

The Senate adjourned until Monday, March 29 at 11:00.

Your HEALTH TIP

Milk from Contented Moms

The Journal of Pediatrics reported that babies are turned off by breast milk from mothers who have just exercised. Babies preferred milk taken when mothers were at rest. The cause may be that post-exercise milk has higher levels of sour tasting lactic acid. Researchers from Indiana University suggested that mothers should consider collecting milk before exercise for later feedings.

Study Shows SPS Rate Hikes Justified

As part of a rate review ordered by the Public Utility Commission of Texas in October 1992, Southwestern Public Service Company has completed a current cost-of-service study and this week filed a response to the PUCT order. The study indicates that residential customers will see a rate increase of 5.1 percent.

Although SPS's overall rates are among the lowest in the state, the PUCT ordered SPS to demonstrate that its earnings level is appropriate and its rates are "just and reasonable."

SPS President Coyt Webb said the SPS filing demonstrates that SPS efficiencies have saved customers \$84 million a year, compared with the average operating expenses of all other electric utilities in Texas. That has helped keep SPS rates among the lowest in the state.

SPS's operating costs and production expenses per kilowatt-hour generated are among the lowest in the nation, Webb said. "That's one reason — along with lower fuel costs — why our customers' overall price for electricity has declined almost every year for the past ten years," he said.

"Just and reasonable rates are designed to allow a utility to recover its investment and operating costs, and to provide to investors a return that is related to its efficiency," Webb said. "And we believe SPS has demonstrated in this filing that overlap, it is one of the most efficient electric utilities in Texas."

However, even with these efficiencies, some costs have increased, said Gerald Diller, SPS group manager of rates and regulation.

"Higher property taxes, expected higher federal corporate income taxes, new accounting rules, and gradually increased employee expenses have been identified as primary factors contributing to increased company costs," Diller said.

"As required, the SPS response includes new tariff sheets for all classes of customers. These new tariff sheets correct the revenue deficiency and reallocate, on a fair-share basis, costs among all classes of customers," Diller said. "It is important to note that SPS had no intention of making a filing at this time and we are only responding to the PUCT order."

The overall increase in rates indicated by the cost-of-service study is 1.25%, or \$5.6 million. However, because of the reallocation, adjustments would vary among classes, Diller said. Under the new tariff sheets, some customers — including many small businesses, cotton gins, and grain elevators — would receive a small decrease, Diller said. However, for residential customers, the average bill would increase 5.1%.

An SPS residential customer on the "lighting rate" who uses 700 kilowatt hours each month, would see a monthly bill increase of \$2.05 — from \$46.71 to \$48.76.

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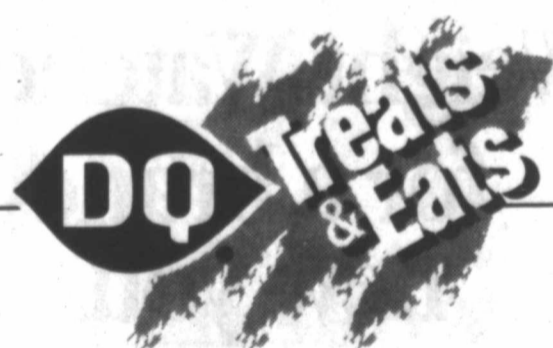
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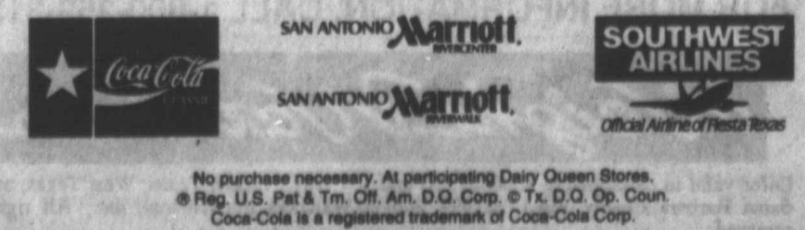

Although the defendants claimed to be an advertising promotional company, the awards

represented were of far lesser value than the products the consumers were asked to purchase. Consumers may receive refunds if they have not used the product. If you have been a victim of this company and wish to get a refund, you must send a restitution claim letter to Office of the Attorney General, 1275 West Washington, Phoenix, AZ 85007. Include proof of purchase with your letter.

Their stated purpose "is to promote the Biblical ethic of decency in American Society with primary emphasis on TV and other media." Dr. Donald Wildmon serves as president and heads a paid staff of 60 employees. American Family Association does not meet all 22 voluntary standards for charitable organizations. Among the standards not met is the standard calling for the organization to provide, on request, an annual report containing purposes, achievements, tax-exempt status, governance and finances. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration has published the final regulations for the 1990 Nutrition Labeling and Education Act, which changes food labels so consumers can better compare food products and plan healthy diets. Some key changes are: nutrition labeling for almost all foods; information on the amount per serving of saturated fat, cholesterol, dietary fiber and other nutrients; uniform definitions for terms that describe a food's nutrient content, such as 'light', 'low-fat', and 'high-fiber' as well as claims about relationships between a nutrient and a disease; and standardized serving sizes that make nutritional comparisons of similar products easier.
