Audit, Insurance Approved By **County Court**

A county audit report and an insurance bid were approved by Lynn County Commissioners Court Monday during regular session. Keith Reeger of Love, Hays & Co. presented an auditor's report for the county for the year ending Dec. 31, 1992, saying "You're in good shape as far as your financial statements go," and noting that the county had collected about 97 percent of taxes, which was a good rate. Commissioners approved the audit as presented.

In other business, commissioners opened insurance bids, accepting the only bid submitted, from Walker-Solomon Insurance Agency for liability and heavy equipment. The court also opened two bids submitted for purchasing a 1986 Ford from the Sheriff's Dept., and rejected both

The court approved paying bills, including a \$25 annual membership fee to Wes-Tex RC&D.

At the close of the session, Lynn County Home Demonstration Agent Rebecca Dimak gave a short report on current activities to commission-

All commissioners were present at the meeting.

Woodwork... by Dalton

AN ANNUAL REPORT from the Texas Dept. of Health's Bureau of Vital Statistics received at this office recently confirms what I have believed for years: Among males, nearly everybody is named Michael, especially famous athletes and entertainers.

The list, based on 1991 birth certificate entries in Texas, shows the most popular name for boys born in 1991 was Michael, followed in order by Christopher, Joshua, José, Matthew, David, John, Justin, Daniel and James. It was noted that John and James are always in the top 10 somewhere.

The 10 most popular names for girls born in the same period in Texas were, in order, Ashley, Jessica, Amanda, Sarah, Stephanie, Brittany, Elizabeth, Samantha, Lauren and Jennifer.

Michael was the leader for boys born to white parents, and third on the list for both black and Hispanic male children.

This obviously follows a national trend which must have started 25-50 years ago, since most sports and entertainment males (and some females) are named Michael, including:

Michael Jackson, Michael Jordan, Michael Keaton, Michael J. Fox, Michael Douglas, Michael Learned, Michael O'Keefe, Michael Bolton, Michael Landon, Michael Irvin, Michael Dean Perry, Michael Martin Murphy, Michael Caine, Michael Wilding, Paul Michael Glaser. And a couple of "Mikes", Ditka and Tyson, who probably are named Michael.

And maybe Michael Mouse, Michael Rowyerboatashore, Michael Angelo and Michael Ob Beer?

vote before the early voting deadline Tuesday will have their chance at the regular election day Saturday. Four ballots will be available, including a special general election ballot which offers three controversial proposed amendments to the State Constitution related to school financing plus a list of 24 candidates for the unexpired

Senate term of Lloyd Bentsen. In the Senate race, Democrat Bob Krueger, who was appointed interim senator by Gov. Ann Richards, is the favorite, but the top two vote-getters on the list which includes Democrats, Republicans, Independents and some with other labels, are expected to be in a runoff for the job. Voters should mark only one.

Proposition 1, which would legalize a County Education District system already ruled unconstitutional by the courts, and which has been called the "Robin Hood" method of taking tax money from the wealthier school districts and giving it to the poorer districts, is the most controversial of the amendment proposals.

Voters in O'Donnell, Tahoka, Wilson and New Home will get ballots on city council and school board elections, and a county-wide ballot

County Voters To Mark Choices

For Saturday's election, many of the county's regular voting precincts have been combined. In Tahoka, all voters (Precincts 1,6,7, 9, 12 and 14) will vote on all four ballots at the high school business office. At Wilson, all voting (Precincts 2, 8) will be at Wilson Mercantile (Green Bldg.)

At New Home, the school library will be the voting place for all four elections, and Lakeview Gin will have hospital board election ballots and New Home school board ballots. Lakeview voters (Prec. 11) who want to vote on the senate race and amendments will have to go into New Home

O'Donnell High School commons area is the voting place for precincts 3, 5 and 10, where ballots will be available on all four elections.

Tahoka School board has four candidates for two places: Delia Luna, Jim Solomon, Clint Gardner and Brad Hammonds. The City of Tahoka council election includes Solomon unopposed for re-election as mayor and three persons running for two places on the council, Maurio Marez, Mike Mensch and Wayne Huffaker.

Wilson city voters will elect three

persons to the council from a list of four: Teresa Parish, Donald Klaus, Oscar Ortega and Victor Steinhauser. Wilson ISD ballot lists John Fields and David Wied as unopposed for two seats, but Clyde Wilke announced he is a write-in candidate for school board.

At New Home, school board candidates Andy Fillingim and Russel Barnett are unopposed, as is Mayor J. A. Evans, seeking re-election. Three persons, Leroy Nettles, Leon Harmonson and Jimmie Kieth, are seeking two spots on the city council.

Bobby Joe Furlow and Jackie Stidham are unopposed seeking reelection to the O'Donnell School board. Four persons are running for three places on the O'Donnell city council, including Joylene Roye, Tommy Woolam, Billy Edwards and Rex Little.

Seven persons are on the ballot for four places on the Lynn County Hospital Board. Candidates Lonette Smith, William (Bill) Sawyer, Norman Ledbetter and Harold Barrett join incumbents Ann Wyatt, Leland White and Jackie Stidham on the ballot.

BBB Report

Now that spring is here, the home improvement gypsies will blow into town. These gypsies drive beautiful pickup trucks, travel all over the United States and take thousands of dollars out of our community right into their own pockets. The gypsies prey on our senior citizen population - relying on their trusting

nature. Your Better Business Bureau would like to offer this warning: If someone knocks on your door to sell you siding, roofing, paving, or a fence job, you should be extremely cautious, in fact, you should be cautious about anyone knocking on your door. If they tell you that you have a bad roof or your home needs repairs, tell them you will check them out with the BBB. Always be cautious if they want up-front monies. If you are not sure of who the peddler is, keep your door locked and call the police to report them in your neighborhood.

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If you have filed for bankruptcy, you may be the target of a new credit repair scam, often called "file segregation." In this scheme, you are promised a chance to hide unfavorable credit information by establishing a new credit identity. This sounds great, but file segregation is illegal. If you use it, the FTC says you could face fines or even prison. If you have filed for bankruptcy, you may be told by a credit repair company that you won't be able to get any type of credit for ten years. This is not always true. Sometimes, you will be told that file segregation program is affiliated with the federal government. This is not true. And, you may be told that file segregation is legal. It is a federal crime to make any false statements on a loan or credit application, which the credit repair company may advise you to do.

SPS Survey Shows Continued Growth In Area Feedlot Industry

Southwestern Public Service Company's annual Fed Cattle Survey indicates another record-breaking year in the area's cattle industry.

The survey shows a six percent increase in fed cattle from 1991 to 1992 — the fourth consecutive year of growth. Feedlots in the SPS service area fed 5,988,196 head of cattle in 1992, compared with 5,644,133 in

Another trend that indicates steady growth is the total number of feedyards in the area — from 122 in 1991 to 124 in 1992.

"The six percent increase in fed cattle is three times higher than last year's percentage," said Dave Krupnick, SPS manager of agricultural and wholesale marketing. "I think this reflects a positive trend for the area's entire economy."

SPS annually prepares a Fed Cattle Survey including feedlots in its service area, which covers 52,000 square miles. The region includes the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles, the Texas South Plains, eastern and southeastern New Mexico and southwestern Kansas.

Other good indicators from the survey are the increases in one-time total capacity, from 2,904,585 to 2,944,575, and the increase in the number of cattle slaughtered at the 12 beef-packing plants in the SPS service area.

Krupnick pointed out that several packing plants are located just outside the service area. "That accounts for the difference between the number of cattle slaughtered and the number fed," he said.

The Fed Cattle Survey includes a chart on the ten-year history of fed cattle, the one-time capacity of surveyed feed lots, as well as information on the number of feedlots with 5,000 head capacity or more. It also has a country breakdown of lot capacity and numbers fed.

Krupnick said information from the survey is used across the country by ag-related industries. "It lets others know how vital agriculture and food-

processing are to this area," he said. "As long as there is cattle on the ranches, they're going to have to have cowboys," said Guin. "There's always going to be someone foolish

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
