## Trash Cleanup Ordinance Considered

Tahoka City Council Monday evening discussed implementing new ordinances related to forcing property owners to remove rubbish and trash, and also gave approval to a lease-purchase of a brush chipper so that tree limbs can be chopped up for disposal.

A canvass of votes of the recent

election was made, and Councilman Wayne Tekell administered the oath of office to Mayor Jim Solomon and councilmen Mike Mensch and Wayne Huffaker. Councilmen Dayton Parker and Carl Reynolds also were present, plus City Manager Barry Pittman and Cal Huffaker, attorney, present to advise the council on the proposed

new city ordinances.

A committee of Huffaker, Tekell and Pittman was named to work on a proposed ordinance governing weeds, trash and rubbish on property in the city. The council also voted to charge \$45 an hour when it is necessary for the city to go onto private property to remove trash because the owner has not complied with the cleanup ordinance.

Police Chief Jerry Webster reported on the month's activities by his department.

## TISD Trustees Canvass Election

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees met in a noon session Monday to canvass the May 1 trustee election results, officially declaring Clint Gardner and incumbent Brad Hammonds as winners of the election with 311 and 302 votes, respectively.

Both trustees will be sworn in at the next regular board meeting, on Monday, May 10.

It was reported that 661 votes were cast in the school election, which is considered a large turnout of voters. The other two candidates in the election were Delia Luna, with 272 votes, and Jim Solomon, with 202 votes.

Trustees Greg Henley, Mike Huffaker, Juanell Jones, Dan Stone, Brad Hammonds and Clint Gardner were present, as well as outgoing trustee, Board President Delbert McCleskey. Trustee Myrtle White was absent from the meeting.

## Third Graders Participate In Mock Trial

Tahoka Third graders gained first hand experience of the court system here last Friday. The students participated in a "mock trial."

The case was Mom A. Bear, Pop A. Bear, and Babe E. Bear vs. Gold E. Locks. "Goldilocks was on trial for using bad manners.

Everything was run like a real trial with a judge, jury, attorneys, bailiffs, a court reporter, and witnesses. The children with speaking parts worked together during recess and after school with Mrs. Steffens.

The trial began at 8:30 a.m. April 30, when Judge Nina Follis called the court to order. Evidence and witnesses were presented by Clayton Chancy, attorney for the Bears, and Tanner Thomas, attorney for the Locks.

After all the evidence was presented, the jury was taken to the jury room to deliberate. The jury was out for some time before returning to the District Courtroom with their verdict. "Goldilocks," Keely Boone, was found guilty, but her attorney is already working on an appeal.

## County Voters Make Choices

Voters in Lynn County wound up their balloting Saturday, electing school board and city council members and mayors, hospital board members and following the statewide trend in voting on a new U.S. senator from Texas and in rejecting three proposed amendments on school financing.

County voters rejected Proposition 1, the "Robin Hood" amendment, by 795 to 283. Proposition 2 was a close loser, 544-516, and Proposition 3 lost 643 to 382. Total vote in the county balloting was 1210, county clerk Ima Robinson reported.

Democrat Bob Krueger received 280 votes to lead the Senate balloting in the county. Republican Kay Bailey Hutchinson was close with 274 votes, leading Jack Fields with 207 and Joe Barton with 190. Krueger and Hutchinson will be in a runoff for the Senate seat.

County voters also elected four directors for the Lynn County Hospital board, Norman Ledbetter with 666 votes, Leland White with 653, Harold Barrett with 614 and Jackie Stidham with 532. Others on the ballot were Ann Wyatt with 505, Bill Sawyer with 426 and Lonette Smith with 362.

In Tahoka, Mayor Jim Solomon was unopposed for re-election, get-

ting 325 votes, while Wayne Huffaker, 359 votes, and Mike Mensch with 333 were elected to the council. Candidate Maurio Marez received 227 votes.

Elected to the Tahoka school board were Clint Gardner with 311 votes and Brad Hammonds with 302. Other candidates were Delia Luna with 272 and Jim Solomon with 202.

New Home elected LeRoy Nettles and Jimmie Keith to the school board with 38 and 41 votes and gave J.A. Evans the mayor's job with 42 votes. The New Home school board election also put two unopposed candidates in office, Russel Barnett with 95 and Andy Fillingim with 105.

Wilson city council seats went to three of four candidates running: Victor Steinhauer had 89 votes, Donald Klaus 76 and Oscar Ortega 74. Teresa Parish received 48 votes.

Wilson school board seats went to David Wied with 155 and John Fields with 138. Write-in candidate Clyde Wilke had 42 votes.

O'Donnell elected three alderpersons, unopposed: Joylene Roye with 85, Tommy Woolam with 102 and Bill Edwards with 106. Bobby Joe Furlow, with 181, and Jackie Stidham, 167, were re-elected to the school board.

### Rev. Lloyd Hamilton

Funeral services for Rev. Lloyd Valton Hamilton, 80, of Wilson, will be held at 2 p.m. today (Thursday) at First United Methodist Church of Tahoka with Rev. Newton Starnes and Rev. Franklin Weir, both retired Methodist ministers of Lubbock, and Rev. Marvin Gregory, pastor, officiating.

Burial will be in Resthaven Memorial Park in Lubbock under direction of White Funeral Home.

Rev. Hamilton died at 2 p.m. Tuesday, May 4, 1993 at Lynn County Hospital.

He was a retired Methodist minister, born April 26, 1913 in Stephenville, Tx. He came to Lynn County in 1921 from Stephenville,

and lived in Wilson for 15 years. He was a graduate of Wilson High School and attended McMurry University in Abilene and Perkins School of Theology at Southern Methodist University.

He married Anna Kilpatrick on June 17, 1939 in Abilene.

Rev. Hamilton served 39 years as a Methodist minister in the Northwest Texas Conference of the United Methodist Church, pastoring churches in Sagerton, O'Brien, Knox City, Rule, Crosbyton, Memphis, Borger, Pampa, and St. Luke's UMC in Lubbock. He was District Superintendent of the Big Spring district. He retired in 1978.

He was preceded in death by one son, Pat Hamilton, who died Nov. 8, 1991.

He is survived by his wife, Anne; two sisters, Maureen Galloway of

Odessa and Nina Copeland of Chandler; one brother, Clifton Hamilton of Tahoka; and a granddaughter, Jennifer Hamilton of San Carlos, Calif.

Pallbearers are James Brookshire, Mike Cotter, Charles Cate, Albert Williams, Jim Solomon, Clint Walker, Maurice Huffaker and Binie White.

The family suggests memorials to the First United Methodist Church or McMurry University in Abilene.

### Kirk Burkett

Services for Kirk Burkett, 33, of South Padre Island were held at 2 p.m. Wednesday, May 5, in First United Methodist Church of Slaton with the Rev. George Price Jr., pastor, officiating.

Entombment was in Resthaven Mausoleum in Lubbock.

Burkett died at 12:30 a.m. Sunday, May 2, 1993 at his residence.

He was born in Lubbock and moved to South Padre Island in 1983. He graduated from Slaton High School and attended Western Texas College and Sul Ross University. He was a member of the National Junior Rodeo Association and a U.S. Navy veteran.

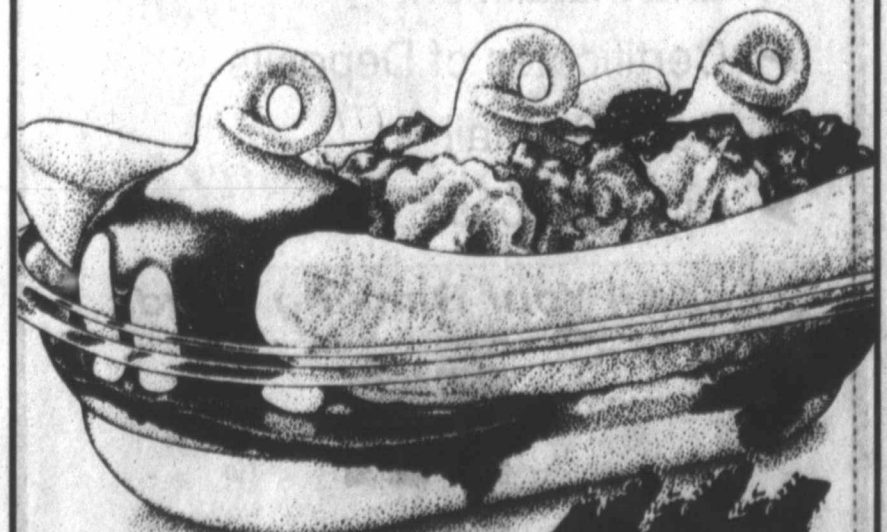

## CHIEF'S COMMENTS

The Texas Commission on Law Enforcement Standards and Education oversees the training of police officers. There are three levels of certification for all police officers, and they are:

1. Basic Certificate,
2. Intermediate Certificate, and
3. Advanced Certificate.

The Basic Certificate is awarded after completion of a police academy such as the one offered at the South Plains Association of Governments. The Intermediate Certificate and the Advanced Certificate take years of experience and training points to acquire. Each training point requires 20 hours of actual training, or one college hour.

I said all that to let you know that two Tahoka Police Officers have qualified for these special certifications. Officer Steve McKay has been awarded the Intermediate Certificate. To qualify, Officer McKay accumulated five years of experience and over 60 training points. And, Officer Hipolito Zuniga has been awarded the Advanced Certificate. Officer Zuniga accumulated six years of experience and over 120 training points.

I doubt if another police department the size of ours has the level of trained officers that the City of Tahoka has. I am very proud of these officers for taking the initiative to obtain the training, and I am grateful that we have a city government supportive of the training needs of the police department.

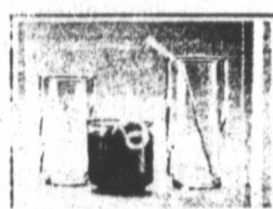

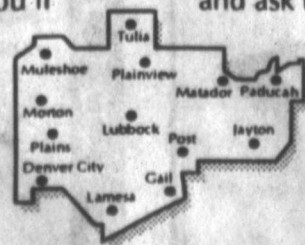

**Spray Trees Now To Get Rid Of Pine Tip Moths**

The pine tip moth can be a serious pest of young pine trees planted by homeowners on the South Plains. And right now is one of the few times homeowners can effectively fight back, says Tommy Dowderlein, Extension agent Entomologist for Lynn and Dawson counties.

The larvae of this moth bore into the growing tips of pine trees, causing them to turn brown. Severely

infested trees develop a bushy appearance over time.

The tip moth passes the winter as a pupa within the injured terminals and twigs of the tree. Moths emerge in March and April and begin the first of several generations which will occur during the summer.

Female moths lay eggs on the needles and stems. After hatching, the young larvae bore into the tip and begin feeding. After several weeks of feeding and constructing a tunnel in the tip of the stem, the larvae pupate. The adult moths then emerge from their pupal cases, and a new cycle of generation begins.

Properly timed application of an insecticide is the best way to reduce pine tip moth populations and damage, the Extension agent said. "Since this pest spends most of its life cycle protected inside the pine tip, foliar sprays are most effective when the young larvae are just hatching from the egg," he said.

To properly time these applications, pheromone traps are used to detect the presence of adult moths and determine when eggs are being laid by the first cycle of moths. Traps being monitored on the South Plains this spring indicate that now is the time to spray trees for this pest.

Foliar-applied insecticides recommended for homeowners include:

Orthene, Dursban and dimethoate. Adding a small amount of liquid soap or surfactant to the spray solution will improve control because it helps the insecticide adhere to the treated trees, the Extension agent said.

"Always read and follow label instructions when applying insecticides," he stressed.

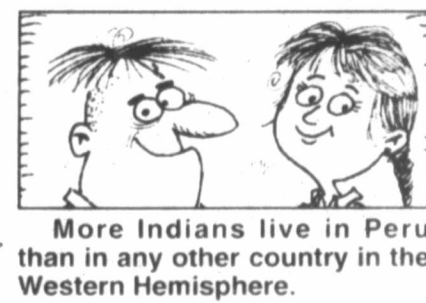
