THERE'S THIS GUY in New Jersey who has established a business called PooPets, which makes and sells a variety of animal figurines molded out of cow manure.

He hires mostly Pennsylvania Dutch Country Amish who also provide the raw materials. His employes-sculptors mold the manure into a variety of products—with names like Turdles, Stool Toads, T-Burds and Dung Bunnies—for which customers in 42 states pay from \$2.95 to \$12. There's a picture of the owner, John Rothman, in a story on the business in a recent issue of *Independent Business*.

The figurines sell to people who put them in gardens and flower beds, and the figurines serve as fertilizer. "One PooPet will fertilize an indoor plant or an outdoor garden for several years," Rothman said.

The story didn't say if the products smell.

Commencement exercises this week in three Lynn County school districts and at O'Donnell last week spotlight 83 seniors from classes in the four county schools, with O'Donnell having the largest class, a total of 33 seniors.

O'Donnell's commencement was in the high school auditorium last Thursday, when the featured honor graduates were Joe Sanchez Jr., valedictorian, and Jon Hogg, salutatorian. Sanchez, son of Mr. and Mrs. Joe Sanchez, had a 94.1 average, Hogg, son of Mr. and Mrs. Nelson Hogg, had a 93.5 average.

New Home's commencement will be tonight (Thursday) at 8 p.m. in the high school gymnasium, with 8 candidates for graduation. Maria Rudd, daughter of Marlow and Barbara Rudd, is valedictorian with a grade point average of 93.96, and Kaury Turner, daughter of Dickie and Gerry Turner, is salutatorian with an average of 93.75.

New Home's baccalaureate ser-

vice was held Sunday, as was the baccalaureate for Tahoka seniors.

Commencement for Wilson High School's 12 seniors will begin at 7 p.m. Friday, May 28 in the high school auditorium. Valedictorian is Michael Buxkemper, son of Don and Sara Buxkemper, and salutatorian is Ramon Valdez, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ramon Valdez of Tahoka.

Tahoka High School is scheduled to graduate 30 seniors at commencement exercises starting at 8 p.m. this Friday in the high school gymnasium.

The determination of the top two honor students at Tahoka was a very close race and was not disclosed until late Wednesday afternoon following final exams, with Seth Prince, Cory Whitley, and Jason Belew vying for the honors of Valedictorian and Salutatorian.

Valedictorian is Jason Belew. Salutatorian is Seth Prince.

Seth is the son of Gene Prince and Sue and Jake Diggs; Jason is the son of Denny and Mary Belew; and Cory is the son of Curtis and Glenda Whitley. Grade point averages were not available at press time.

Lynn County Commissioners Hear Reports

Lynn County Commissioners in regular session Monday heard reports from Lynn County Extension Agent Rebecca Dimak and from Mike Braddock on the Lynn County Roping Club, and conducted routine business.

Mrs. Dimak reported on her activities during the month as home economics agent in the county, informing commissioners about many 4-H activities, and Braddock told commissioners that the Lynn County Roping Club is seeking tax-exempt status for the horse arena property near the county showbarn.

In other business, commissioners approved paying bills and discussed the sale of caliche when the purchaser does his own hauling, arriving at a general consensus of keeping the gates to the caliche pit locked when possible. Also, commissioners discussed at some length the Sheriff's Office budget in regard to some recent purchases of carpet and other items.

County Judge J.F. Brandon informed commissioners of a letter he received from the Texas Association of Counties seeking representatives from each county to serve on a Loss Control Committee which will address safety issues for county employees. No action was taken on this item.

Commissioners briefly discussed the adoption of an employee handbook for employees and elected officials, but no action was taken and the item was tabled for another meeting.

Present at the meeting were three commissioners, Sandy Cox, T.A. Stone and Jacky Henry; Judge Brandon and county employees Janet Porterfield and Ina Robinson; and guests Mrs. Dimak, Braddock and Juanel Jones. Commissioner J.T. Miller was absent.

Band Director's Pickup Vandalized

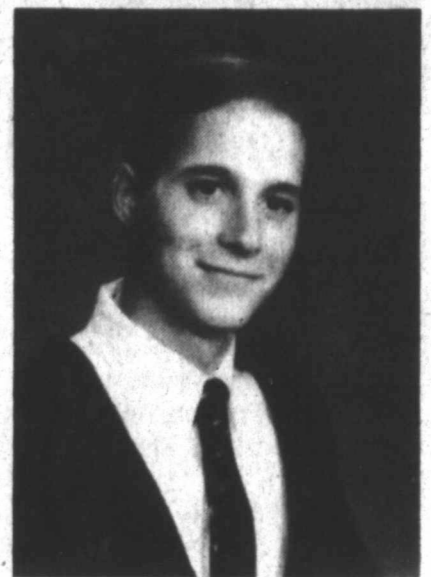

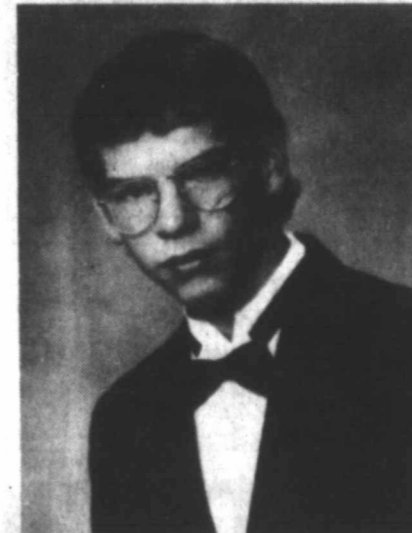

"Call 9-1-1" Sign Decals Placed Throughout State

While travelling throughout the state, you may see a sign identifying 9-1-1 availability for summoning police, fire or medical services for emergency help. Advisory Commission on State Emergency Communications, in conjunction with the Texas Department of Transportation, will be placing 9-1-1 decals on highway signs all around Texas.

"This program will benefit everyone," said Mary A. Boyd, ACSEC Executive Director. "For example, if someone is travelling on a highway and experiences a collision, they will recall the signage and dial 9-1-1, which in turn, results in quicker access to emergency services."

The Texas Department of Transportation will post the decals on 30,000 "Watch for Ice on Bridge" signs as they are folded up in the spring.

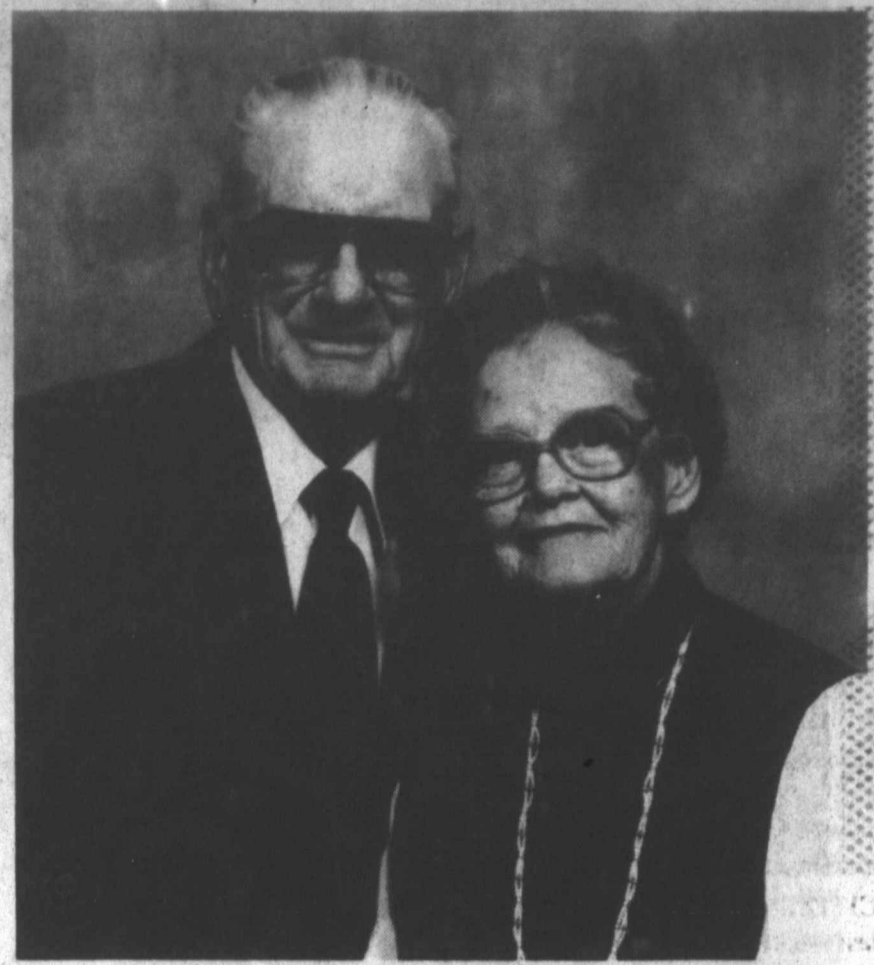

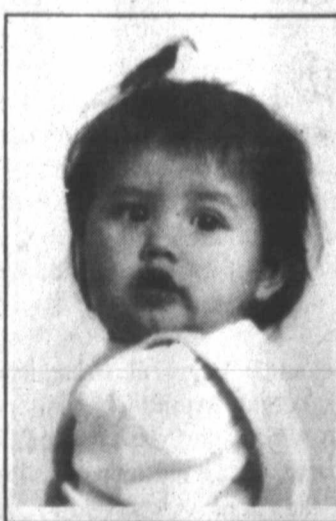

SPS Reminds Customers To "Watch Up" For Safety During Outdoor Activities

Ball fields are filling up; yard work is in full force; the skies are full of severe weather. All are signs of spring.

With the increase of outdoor activities that comes with spring, Southwestern Public Service Company reminds its customers to "watch up for safety."

One of the places where many electrical accidents occur is the farm, according to Bill Mullins, SPS Southern Division Safety and Claims Specialist. "What happens quite often is that people forget to look up when they're lifting irrigation pipes or other metal pieces," he said. "It's important to always 'watch up' and know where the electric lines are."

Mullins said that same warning applies to others who are on the job, particularly those who are working above street level.

"Roofers need to be extra careful as they move equipment," he said. "Those trimming trees also have to be careful; that extra height could be just enough to get them entangled in lines."

Customers also need to be careful during severe weather that often occurs in spring.

"If an outage occurs at your home during a storm," said Mullins, "call your local SPS 'repair' or 'service' number listed in the phone book." SPS area control centers have extra employees on hand to answer the calls and to quickly dispatch SPS crews to correct the problem and restore service.

If you see a fallen power line on the ground, call SPS and keep people away from the line. Do not touch the line or anything it is touching, such as a car or fence, Mullins said.

Many of the service problems that occur during a storm can be blamed on fallen tree limbs or on lightning. Besides causing outages, lightning can also be dangerous to people involved in outdoor activities. If you are outdoors as a lightning storm approaches, remember that trees do not protect you from lightning, and in fact, attract it. Your best bet is to seek a location that is flat and barren.

Parents should take the time to caution their children to avoid electrical facilities when playing outdoors. Fly kites and model airplanes in open areas, far from power lines. If a ball is hit over a neighborhood

substation fence, don't try to retrieve the ball yourself; call the electric company, Mullins said.

Ads show children new products and help illustrate how those products perform. Some children, particularly younger ones, may have trouble discerning in an ad how a toy works outside its imaginary setting or whether toy parts are sold separately. To prevent disappointments, you parents may want to help children better understand what they see in television ads. As with all products, toys advertised on tv are made to appear as appealing as possible. You should point out that the purpose of advertising is to sell products, not all information about a toy may be contained in an ad. Friday, May 21 was a busy day for those in the high school building. Three members of EMS from the University Medical Center came and presented a slide presentation on the importance of not drinking and driving.

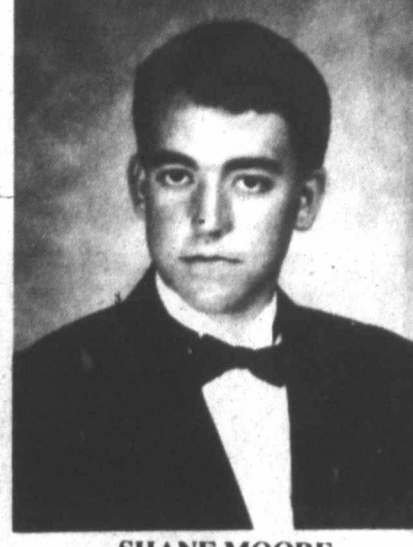

SPC Classes To Be Offered In Wilson

Tahoka Man In On Technological Breakthrough For Cotton-Gin Trash

Drs. Wayne LePori and Calvin Parnell knew there might be treasure in cotton trash, but had no idea their hunt would end up as it did.

Almost two decades after Texas A&M University agricultural engineers began searching for alternative energy sources, LePori and Parnell think they may have an unintended but commercially viable byproduct. In their quest to use cotton-gin trash—sticks, burrs, leaves and motes—for fuel, they have found an inexpensive source of low-grade activated carbon, which can be used in filtering wastewater.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station researchers have signed a licensing agreement with Cratech, Inc., of Tahoka for the technology, and Texas A&M regents approved the agreement during their March meeting.

Joe Craig, president of Cratech, said he's been actively trying to build a business based on the technology since 1984. But he's been working on the concept even longer, because he was a graduate student under LePori in the late 1970s.

"It turns out the byproduct may be more valuable than the fuel," said LePori, a Texas A&M professor of agricultural engineering who started developing a gasification process for cotton-gin trash in the mid-1970s, during the midst of the world energy crisis.

"Everybody was concerned about energy available, and we began looking at sources for and from agriculture," he said. "Cotton residue just popped out, because there was a lot of it already available, centrally located at the gins."

They envisioned a source of energy to power cotton gins, as well as a way to help solve the expensive problem of cotton-gin trash disposal.

But LePori and others quickly found that burning the trash left too much slag and fouled the conventional boiler used for small-scale steam production.

LePori and Parnell, also professor of agricultural engineering, later began looking at a process called fluidized bed technology, which involves a container of heated inert material such as sand. Air blown through the bottom of the container bubbles through the bed of sand, which is heated to approximately 1,400 degrees Fahrenheit and becomes almost suspended within the container.

Cotton-gin trash is then fed into the fluid sand, where it percolates through the sand with the air bubbles. Controlling the fuel-to-air ratio causes the heated trash to give off a combustible gas and leave a char of activated carbon.

The A&M researchers adapted existing fluidized bed technology by developing three new elements to add to the gasifier. Those were a special feeder to move cotton-gin trash into the gasifier, a cyclone system that separates the char from gases, and a two-stage combustion system that destroys nitric oxide while converting the combustible gas into energy.

Their changes led to a system that gives off less nitric oxide (a harmful gas) and particulates while producing a char and a combustible gas that could be used for energy.

The researchers proved the effectiveness of the technology and in the mid-1980s patented it as an alternative energy source. However, when energy prices fell, private companies lost interest in their Biomass Thermal Conversion System, or BTCS.

Still, a graduate student working with the researchers did a dissertation on the char. The char is a lower grade of activated carbon that used in many applications, but was found effective in filtering heavy metals out of wastewater, Parnell said.

"That nasty black stuff, it turns out, is useful. It's just one of those quirks of research," he said. "Not only are we reducing the emissions, but we have a product that can actually clean up water in a very economical manner."

The char could be a commercially viable byproduct, particularly for use in smaller business or municipal wastewater treatment facilities in rural areas where cotton-gin trash is located, LePori said.

"We are planning to put in a facility to see how it would work in an actual system," he said. "The ideal situation is to locate it where we can use both the electricity and waste heat year-round as we produce the char - perhaps a cotton oil mill."

"Commercial-grade activated carbon sells for anywhere between \$1,000 and \$3,000 per ton. If we could get \$200 a ton for this char, it would make this thing go."

The researchers originally published a paper saying a \$2.5 million investment in a 2 megawatt power plant using cotton trash would generate \$1.2 million per year in revenue

from energy sales on operating cost of \$1 million.

That would make the venture marginal in terms of its profitability, they said. However, they later calculated the same plant potentially could earn more through activated carbon sales - perhaps up to \$2 million per year.

Cratech estimated profits of \$3.5 million over the first years of using the technology, with sales of char and energy expected to begin in 1995. The Texas A&M University System will receive 5 percent of all royalties.

Potential consumers of energy and activated carbon from Cratech include agricultural processing plants, municipalities and industrial parks, said Craig.

Craig has obtained funding support from the US Department of Energy's Western Region Biomass Energy Program and hopes to receive support from a State of Texas alternative-energy program.

LePori said it's gratifying to see the project approaching commercialization after almost two decades. He also foresees a trend toward more use of biomass for fuel and other applications.

"Some of the people who ignored this before have gone broke trying to iron out the problems of slag and impurities when using biomass fuels in conventional direct combustion systems. They still haven't learned that biomass fuels are different than fossil fuels," he said.

"I suspect that people are going to take another look at many of these alternate energy sources, depending on how the energy-tax situation evolves."

Parnell said, "One thing about research is that when you get involved, you don't expect quick responses. But good research and good results eventually bring feedback, and I am convinced this technology will be used in the real world, whether it's 10 years down the road or 50."

"There's a limited supply of oil, and this is a viable means of taking biomass waste and converting it to a usable form of energy, compatible environmentally with the air and water. We're excited about it."

USDA Announces Loan Differentials For Cotton Crops

The U.S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation announced that schedules of Differentials are available for the 1993 crops of upland and extra long staple (ELS) cotton. The schedules are used in making CCC price support loans to producers.

The 1993 crop of upland cotton is the first to receive grade classification based on color and leaf content as separate grading factors. The 1993 loan differentials reflect this separation of grading factors and will provide premiums or discounts for seven different leaf classes within each of the color grades. The loan value for the base quality of upland cotton is not affected by the new schedule and will remain at 52.35 cents per pound.

The schedule of differentials for ELS cotton is applicable to CCC price support loans for the base grade of ELS of 88.12 cents per pound.

Loan rates for the base grade of upland cotton at each warehouse location will also be issued.

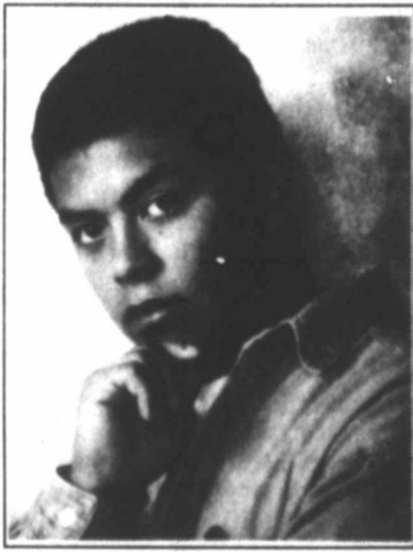

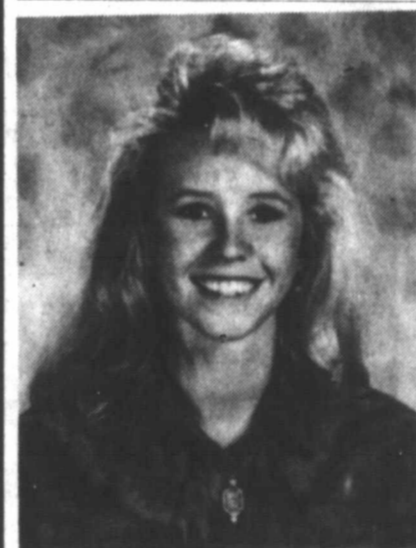
Basketball Summer Camp Slated Here

The camp will be limited to the first 40 campers to register. Contact Hulon Kirkland for any further information at 998-4538 or 998-4170.



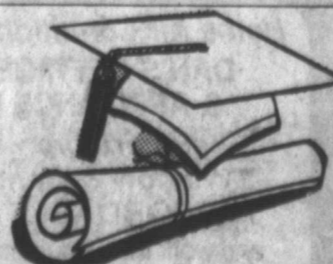
Darla Willis Is Award Winner
