## City To File Actions Against **Three Property Owners Here**

City authorities Monday night voted to file civil suits in district court against three property owners in Tahoka who have not complied with a strict city ordinance concerning dilapidated buildings. In action following several months of notification to owners of dilapidated buildings in Tahoka, City Council members moved to file charges against owners of property located at 1023 and 1025 Ave. J. 1801 South 7th, and 1609 South 8th Street, who have not complied by repairing, removing or demolishing dilapidated buildings at these locations.

Initially, 15 locations were targeted throughout the city for compliance with a strict new ordinance on dilapidated buildings, and all but these locations have either already complied with city guidelines or are in contract for such repair, removal or demolition, according to City Manager Barry Pittman.

Also at the meeting, City officials approved a new list of ten dilapidated buildings to target with the ordinance, and will send letters of notification to property owners. A public hearing for these owners will be held at the next regular council meeting.

Council members voted to move the next Council meeting to July 12. instead of the regularly-scheduled date of July 5, due to the July Fourth holiday weekend.

## **New Dry Hydrants Working Well** For Firefighters In Lynn County

Lynn County officials recently accepted a check for \$1,140.51 in cost-sharing aid from the Texas Forest Service for four dry hydrants within the county. The dry hydrants will serve as water sources that firefighters can tap into to get additional water supplies when needed for rural firefighting efforts.

Funding aid for the hydrants came from the Rural Community Fire the state forest resource and rural firefighting agency. Volunteer fire departments targeted to benefit from the dry hydrants include Tahoka, O'Donnell, Wilson, and New Home.

The request for funding came from the Lynn County Committee of the Wes-Tex RC&D (Resource Conservation and Development) who was approached with the project by the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department.

Four dry hydrants were attached to irrigation wells throughout Lynn County, adapted to pump water into fire trucks through a new design pro-

vided through the ingenuity of Tahoka Fire Dept. members and John Edwards of New Home who made the equipment.

The Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept. has made use of the dry hydrants on several occasions, and report that the design works very well for their purposes, adding that the pumps fill the fire trucks with water as fast as the city water source. "This is going to make a tremendous difference in emergency situations in the remote areas of the county," said a representative of the department.

The Wes-Tex RC&D plans to seek funding for additional dry fire hydrants in the county, and is currently working with the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Dept. to determine areas of need in the county, as well as availability of irrigation wells and property owner's consent.

Texas Forest Service and county officials hope that the installation of dry hydrants throughout rural counties might favorably influence insurance companies to reduce property insurance key rates, thereby lowering property insurance premiums for county residents as well.

The white male who threw the bottle ran north toward the cemetery; he was not located.



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
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

#### **ORDINANCE NO. 6-93**

An Ordinance amending sections 11-22. through 11-25. of the Code of Ordinances; City of Tahoka, Texas, Prohibiting Public Nuisance

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TAHOKA, TEXAS: Section 1. Section 11-22 through 11-25 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended in its entirety, and after such amendment shall read as is set forth in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and

incorporated for all intents and purposes. Section 2. The penalty for violation of any provision of this subchapter shall be those that set forth in Section 434.012 of the Health and Safety Code as it exists or as it may be amended

Section 3. Should any section or portion of any section hereof by decreed to be invalid, the invalidity of any such section of such portion thereof shall not affect the validity of the remaining pertions of this ordinance, and each section and each portion thereof not decreed to be invalid shall remain valid and enforceable

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect upon its approval and passage by the City Council and publication in the Lynn County News.

SECTION 11.22

(a) A person may not cause, permit, or allow a public nuisance under this section on any premises.

(1) keeping, storing, or accumulating refuse on premises in a neighborhood unless the refuse is entirely contained in a closed receptacle:

(2) keeping, storing, or accumulating rubbish, including newspapers, abandoned vehicles, refrigerators, stoves, furniture, tires, and cans, on premises in a neighborhood for 10 days or more, unless the rubbish or object is completely enclosed in a building or is not visible from a public

(4) maintaining on abandoned and unoccupied property a swimming pool that is not

(A) a fence that is at least four feet high and that has a latched gate that cannot be opened by a child; or

(B) a cover over the entire swimming pool that cannot be removed by a child; or (5) maintaining a flea market in a manner that constitutes a fire hazard. (c) This section does not apply to a site or facility that is permitted and regulated by a state agency

#### SECTION 11.23

Whenever a person causes, permits or allows a public nuisance under Section 11.22 to exist on any premises in the city as prohibited by said section and make a determination whether or not such is sufficient to constitute a public nuisance as herein defined, and if is to finds, it shall cause the City Manager to give the responsible party notice in accordance with the require set forth in Section 11.24 A of this ordinance

Whenever the City Manager or the City Council determines that any premises are a public nuisance as defined herein, the City Manager shall give written notice to the owner, leeses, occupant, agent or person in charge of the premises. The notice must state: (1) The specific condition that constitutes a nuisance;

(2) That the person receiving notice shall abate the nuisance before the 31st day after the date on which the notice is served; (3) The failure to abate the nuisance may result in abatement by the City, assessment of cost

and a lien against the property on which the nuisance exists; and (4) That the owner, lessee, occupant, agent or person in charge of the premises is entitled to submit, before the 31st day after the date on which the notice is served, a written request for

(5) The notice must be given:

(a) by service in person or by registered or certified mail, return receipt requested; or (b) if personal service cannot be obtained or the address of the owner, lessee, agent or person in charge of the property is unknown, by posting a copy of the notice on the premises to whi the nuisance exists and by publishing the notice in the newspaper with general circulation in the county two (2) times within ten (10) consecutive days.

B. Public Hearing

(a) The responsible party may request a Public Hearing. The purpose of the same shall be to determine whether or not the premises is a public nuisance in accordance with the standards as set forth and Section 11.22 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of Tahoka.

(b) The matter shall be set for hearing before the City Council at the earliest practical date and notice of said hearing shall be served on the Responsible Party by the City Secretary not less than (10) days prior to the date of said hearing. All interested persons shall have the opportunity to be heard and may introduce evidence to the City Council for its members' consideration.

(c) After the public hearing, the City Council shall-make such findings and orders as it shall deem appropriate.

(d) After the public hearing, if the premises are found in violation of the standards as set forth in Section 11.22, the Code of Ordinances of the City of Tahoka, Texas, the City Council may order that the property be vacated, secured, repaired, removed, demolished, mowed, or abated within a reasonable time. If the Responsible Party does not take the ordered action within the allotted time, the City Council shall make a diligent effort to discover each mortgagee and lienholder having an interest in said premises or in the property located on said premises. The City Secretary shall send each identified mortgagee and lienholder a notice containing: (1) an identification and address of the premises of the property on which it is located;

(2) a description of the violation of the Code of Ordinances that is present at the premise

(c) As an alternative to the procedure prescribed by subsection (d) described above, the City Council shall make a diligent effort to discover each mortgagee and lienholder before condu the public hearing and shall give them not less than ten (10) days prior to the date of said hearing, notice of and an opportunity to comment at the hearing. If the City proceeds under this subsection the order issued by the City Council shall specify a reasonable time for the public nuisance to be vacated, secured, repaired, removed, demolished, mowed or abated and an additional reasonable time for the ordered action to be taken by any of the mortgagees or lienholders in the event th Responsible Party fails to comply with the order within the time provided for action by the responsible party. Under this subsection, the City is not required to furnish any notice to a mortgagee or lienholder other than a copy of the order in the event the responsible party fails to timely take the ordered action.

(f) If the premises are not vacated, secured, repaired, removed, demolished, mowed or abated within the allotted time, the City may vacate, secure, remove, demolish, mow or abate the

(g) If the City incurs expenses under subsection (f), the City may assess the expenses on and the City has a lien against, unless it is a homestead as protected by the Texas Constitution, the property on which the building was or is located. The lien is extinguished if the property owner or another person having an interest in the legal title to the property reimburses the City in full for said expenses. The lien arises and attaches to the property at the time the notice of the lien is recorded and indexed in the office of the Lynn County Clerk. The notice must contain the name and address of the owner if that information can be determined with reasonable effort, a legal description of the real property on which the nuisance was located, the amount of expenses incurred by the City, and the balance due.

(h) If the notice is given and the opportunity to vacate, secure, repair, remove, demolish, mow or abate said nuisance is afforded to each mortgagee and lienholder as authorized by Subsection (d), or (e), the lien is a privileged lien subordinate only to tax liens and all previously recorded bona fide mortgage liens attached to the real property to which the City's lien attaches.

#### SECTION 11.25

Assessment of Costs (a) The City may:

1, assess the cost of abating the nuisance, the cost of legal notification by publication, and administrative fee of not more than \$100.00 on the owner, lessee or occupant of the premises on

2. by Resolution or Order assess the cost of abating the nuisance, the cost of legal notification by publication and administrative fee of not more than \$100.00 against the property on which the

(b) The City is entitled to accrue interest beginning on the 31st day after the date of assessment against the property at the rate of ten per cent (10%) a year.

(c) The statement of cost or a certified copy of the statement of cost is prima facie proof of the costs incurred to abate the nuisance and is all that will be required of the City concerning costs.

(d) In any judicial proceeding regarding enforcement of this ordinance, the City is entitled to recover a reasonable attorney fee.

#### SECTION 11.26

A. Posting of Warnings (a) In the event the City Council makes a determination after the public hearing that the premises are a public nuisance, the City Manager shall cause to be posted to such premises a notice reading

> DO NOT ENTER THIS PROPERTY HAS BEEN DECLARD A PUBLIC NUISANCE BY THE CITY OF TAHOKA

(b) Such notice shall remain posted until required repairs, removal, demolition, moving or abatement is completed and such premises have been rendered no longer a public nuisance.

B. Additional Powers of the City

(a) In addition to the above powers and authorities, the city shall have all of the rights granted by Section 342.003 through Section 342.004 of the Health and Safety Code, The State of Texas, as it exists as of this date or as it may be amended from time to time

C. Authority to Enter Premises

(a) A city official, agent or employee charged with the enforcement of health, environ safety or fire laws may enter any premises in the incorporated area of the City at any reasonal time to inspect, investigate, or abate a nuisance or to enforce this chapter

(b) Before entering the premises, the official, agent or employee must exhibit proper identif tion to the occupant, manager or other appropriate person.

(a) A person commits an offense if:

(1) the person violates Section 11.22 (a); and (2) the nuisance remains unabated after the expiration of the time ordered by the City Coun

(b) An offense under this section is a misdemeanor punishable by a fine of not less than \$50.00 or more than \$200.00.

(c) If it is shown on the trial of the defendant that the defendant has been previously convicted of an offense under this section, the defendant is punishable by a fine of not less than \$200.00 or more than \$1,000.00, confinement in jail for not more than six months, or both.

(d) Each day a violation occurs is a separate offense.

(e) The court shall order abatement of the nuisance if the defendant is convicted of an offerse

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
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


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
