Wreck, Thefts **Are Reported During Week**

Cindy Gardner Named THS Head Girls Basketball Coach

Tahoka High School Coach Cindy Gardner was named head girls basketball coach by T.I.S.D. trustees last week, assuming the position left vacated by the resignation of Coach Steve Qualls. The board also hired Kathy Box of Tahoka to teach high school science, filling a position vaated by the resignation of Robert Tidwell, as well as two assistants for the elementary school.

Trustees also voted to fully fund the career ladder from local funds, approved the purchase of four science lab computer stations, and discussed a new local graduation policy.

Six trustees were present for the Thursday night meeting, with five voting in favor of reassigning Mrs. Gardner to the position of head girls basketball coach, and trustee Clint Gardner abstaining from voting. Mrs. Gardner coached junior high girls volleyball and basketball and junior/ senior high track teams at TISD this year. The board voted unanimously to hire Mrs. Box to fill the science teaching position.

Two new elementary school assistants were approved, with trustees voting unanimously to hire Dorothy Draper and Rochelle Ford. Elementary assistant Judy Sanders' resigna-

One other resignation was noted by the board, that of Mrs. Nan Adams, who is retiring after teaching for 27 years at Tahoka I.S.D. A retirement party in her honor will be held today (Thursday), from 7-8:30 p.m. in the fellowship hall of the First Baptist Church of Tahoka.

In other action, trustees voted to spend \$12,000 from local funds to fully fund career ladder bonuses for the additional eight qualifying teachers, as state funds would not fully fund all the qualifying teachers from

Four new science lab computers will be purchased for the next school year, as trustees voted unanimously to fund the project after much discussion with Superintendent Dr. Duane Carter and science teacher Betty

The board discussed policy EIED (Local) concerning commencement exercise policies for seniors who have not completed all local credit requirements or passed the state-required exit level test, Among other issues addressed, the policy will state what level of participation these students may take in commencement exercises. No action was taken at this time, as it was the first reading of the

policy. The board will address this policy at the next regular board meet-

THS Counselor Sherri McCord gave a report on the 1992-93 AEIS and TAAS test results. Bookkeeper Loretta Tekell reported that as of May 31, 1993 the 1992 tax roll collection is 93.9 percent complete. She reported an account balance in all funds of \$1,531,100.39.

In the superintendent's report, Dr. Carter presented the 1993-94 teaching assignments and said he was working on a recommendation to form a Middle School for 7th and 8th grade students. He noted that the football stadium press box is in need of repair and that the district will look into either repairing the existing structure or building a new one. He also told the board that Dr. Turnbough is sending two options for single member district realignment for the board's consideration.

The meeting adjourned at 12:11 a.m., with trustees meeting in executive session for approximately one hour during the meeting. Trustees Greg Henley, Clint Gardner, Brad Hammonds, Mike Huffaker, Dan Stone and Myrtle White were present, and trustee Juanell Jones was absent from the meeting.


Four Local Youth Place Third In State 4-H Contest

Lynn County Commissioners met in regular session Monday morning to conduct routine business, including paying bills, approving county officials' reports, and discussing a budget for 1994.



The court also discussed some changes suggested by County Attorney Jimmy Wright in a proposed County Employees Handbook, but no action was taken to adopt the handbook.

Commissioners voted unanimously to pay 25-cents per mile mileage rates, effective Jan. 1, 1994, an increase from the current rate of 18cents per mile.

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

Windstrips Can Control Erosion On Cultivated Land, Says SCS

native producers in Lynn County can use to control wind erosion on their cultivated land, according to sources at the Soil Conservation Service in Tahoka. Wind stripcropping is an inexpensive way to meet the conservation requirements of the Food Security Act and also stay eligible for USDA benefits.

Windstrips are narrow strips of grass or high residue crops that are properly spaced throughout a cropland field to reduce wind erosion. WW Spar Bluestem, Kleingrass or Ermelo Lovegrass work good as strips, depending on the soil type.

Sorghums can either be planted in rows or drilled. Drilling small grains has proven more successful than overseeding. The spacing of the strips varies with the soil types; for

Wind stripcropping is one alter- example, the sandier the soil the closer the strips are placed together.

> Windstrips should be planted perpendicular to the most erosive winds and should be maintained throughout the critical erosion sea-

> Studies in West Texas have shown that windstrips are an effective way to protect bare cropland fields from excessive wind erosion after crops are harvested. Windstrips can also offer valuable wind protection for emerging crops in the spring; therefore, the need for "sandfighting" tillage operations is greatly reduced.
