## City Tax Rate Same; Fees To Go Up \$4.50 Month

The City of Tahoka adopted a tion services. budget and tax rate at a meeting Monday night, with all council members voting for a budget calling for spending about \$100,000 more than the current year, which ends Sept. 30.

More than half the increase is in expenses due next year related to the Canadian River Municipal Water Assn., which has a desalination project underway and member cities must pay part of the costs.

City residents will pay no more in taxes, but will face increases totaling \$4.50 a month for most residents in the form of higher minimum rates for water, sewer and sanitation collec-

Starting in October, residents will pay a minimum of \$9.75 for water. compared to the present minimum of \$8; sewer rate will go up to \$8.25 from the current \$7; sanitation collection rate will go to \$11.50 for residential, from the \$10 charged now, and commercial accounts also will be increased by \$1.50 per month.

City Manager Barry Pittman said prices charged by a company hired to collect garbage will increase, as trash is hauled to Lubbock.

#### **TISD Budget Approved**

Following a 6 p.m. public hearing at which no citizens appeared Monday night, Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees approved the 1993-94 budget by a 6-0 vote. Total budget for expenditures for 1993-94 school year is \$3,963,845, of which \$3,674,107 is Maintenance and Operating funds.

The M&O budget is an increase of \$83,586 from last year's budget figures, of which \$64,174 is due to payroll increases. Dr. Duane Carter, TISD Superintendent, told trustees that 71.9 percent of the budget was payroll expenditures.

In order to fund the 1993-94 budget, school trustees are discussing a tax hike of up to 13.239 cents, which would raise the tax rate from the current \$1.01.761 to \$1.15. TISD can set a tax rate of up to \$1.15.624 before a rollback election is called

Six trustees were present at the meeting, with trustee Brad Hammonds absent due to his representing TISD at a CED meeting held in Brownfield at the same time.

#### Tire Slashing, Vandalism Reported

Authorities from the Lynn County Sheriff's Dept. investigated reports of tire slashings and vandalism of a county road grader this week, while Tahoka Police investigated and cleared a theft of a hedge trimmer in

No arrests or charges had been filed this week in a sexual assault case reported last week by a young woman in Tahoka, who said a man entered her home early Aug. 23 and attacked her at knifepoint.

Police said a suspect has been questioned, and that further questioning of the man is scheduled.

Clifford Laws of O'Donnell reported to Sheriff's deputies that tires had been slashed sometime during the night of Aug. 26 on his water trailer located east of Grassland. A few miles further east, two tires were slashed on each of two tractors owned. by Ralph Dean of Post.

A Caterpillar road grader, owned by Lynn County Precinct 3, was vandalized sometime last Thursday or Friday, southwest of Wells Gin on Hwy. 211. Damage to the road grader was estimated at \$483, including damage to the door lock, broken window, and ignition system damage, and the interior had been sprayed with a fire extinguisher.

Sheriff's officials also reported that a Lubbock man was in custody in Lubbock County Jail on a warrant from Tahoka on charges of auto theft, in connection with a case last week of the theft of a 1981 Chevrolet Suburban owned by Geneva Miller of Tahoka. The Suburban was later recovered in Midland.

Tahoka Police officers investigated a report of a Black & Decker hedge trimmer stolen from a garage at a home on North 2nd Street last Tuesday, and cleared the case three days later. A Tahoka juvenile admitted to the theft, the property was returned to the owner, and the juvenile was turned over to juvenile probation authorities.

In jail during the week were nine persons; two for public intoxication, one for application to revoke probation (ARP) and DWI; four for DWI; one for DWI second offense; and one for ARP and burglary of a habitation.

#### **SPS Updates City Officials On Texas Rate** Review; Remains Open To Settlement

Southwestern Public Service Company said it continues visits with city officials throughout its Texas service area to update them on a rate hearing scheduled to begin Aug. 31

review was initiated by the Public Utility Commission of Texas in October 1992.

"The company has provided answers to more than 2,100 questions submitted by regulators and interveners," Webb said, "so we are not guessing at costs. SPS has examined every dollar. Based on this most recent cost-of-service study, if all of SPS's true costs to provide electric service were fully recognized, its average retail rate would increase by about 1%. But we did not initiate a filing to increase rates."

"We have acknowledged that some reduction in electric rates may result as a reflection of today's lower interest rates," Webb said. "But we disagree with the level proposed by other parties. First, the return on equity proposed is much less than what has been recommended for other utilities with much higher rates. And second, we believe it just makes good sense to reward outstanding performance, rather than impose a penalty. SPS's electric rates already are the lowest among all investor-owned utilities in the state."


In addition, the remaining amount of the recommended reduction is based on expense disallowances which SPS believes are not justified. One proposal is to disallow \$3 million of SPS's marketing program, such as the promotion of energy efficient heat pumps and presentations by home economics representatives, who demonstrate electric safety and other topics to adults and school children throughout the service area.

"Our efforts to market are directed to providing customers with energy choices and to efficiently utilize our existing generating equipment," Webb said. "These efficiencies help make our unit cost less expensive for all users."

The level of rate decreases being recommended by some participants in this case is completely unjustified, Webb said.

"Our company wants to remain active in the development and wellbeing of the communities we serve," he said. "But this will be very difficult to do if some are successful in driving SPS revenues down to the unreasonable levels they propose."

"Hopefully, we can sit down and develop a resolution of this case that can be acceptable to all parties, as we have for the past 15 years," Webb said, "The alternative is a fully litigated rate case lasting for months, together with all the adversity that develops from such a process."

During its recent session, the Texas Legislature enacted the Texas Fire Mobilization Act. This legislation established a statewide fire contingency account to provide funds to help volunteer fire departments meet expenses associated with cooperative wildland firefighting operations across Texas. No funds were appropriated for the account. The Act directs that funding should come from gifts and grants.

Elizabeth Chadwell, an absentee landowner living in California, accepted the challenge and has made the first donation to the fund. Her \$190 donation will hopefully encourage others to join in toward financing cooperative firefighting efforts now in progress across the Texas landscape.

Extreme fire danger exists across much of Central Texas. Hundreds of personnel, including firefighters from municipal and volunteer fire departments and state agencies, have already spent countless hours on the fire line protecting homes and other rural property. With little or no relief from drought conditions expected in the Central Texas area in the near future, extensive firefighting resources will likely remain committed to wildfire control efforts for some

"It is estimated that annually the volunteer firefighters of Texas contribute over \$31 million of their time - if they were just paid minimum wage," stated Bruce Miles, Texas Forest Service director. "It is incumbent upon the rest of us to support their operating expenses, especially when they leave their communities to help others on large fires," pleaded Miles. He asked that corporations, ranchers and other individuals show their support for these volunteers and the protection of Texas' natural resources with contributions to the Texas Fire Mobilization Fund. Funds from the account may only be used for wildfire control operations.

Contributions to the firefighting contingency fund should be made payable to the Texas Fire Mobilization Fund, c/o Texas Forest Service, College Station, Texas 77843-2136.

#### State Takes Drought **Precautions**

If you are buying an advertised prodet that is not brand new, are you familiar enough with terms such as "used", "Reconditioned" or "As is" to know what you are getting? The BBB and its members have a long-established Code of Advertising which they believe retailers should follow to avoid misleading consumers, whether they are buying new products, a second-hand computer, irregular towels, or a rebuilt car engine. According to the Code, any product that previously was used should be clearly and conspicuously described as such, or in similar terms-for example, "secondhand," "pre-owned" or "repossessed." In addition, "rebuilt" only should be used to describe a product that has been completely disassembled, reconstructed, repaired and refinished, including the replacement of parts. All consumers are interested in getting the most value for their money, and understanding these terms may help ensure that a "great bargain" is really a good deal.

A Personal Emergency Response System (PERS) is an electronic device designed to let you summon help in an emergency. If you are a disabled or an older person living alone, you may be thinking about buying a PERS for yourself. Here are some tips to consider: check out several systems before buying; can you use the system with other response centers?; ask about the pricing, features and servicing of your system and compare costs; make sure the system is easy for you to use; test it to make sure it works from every point in and around your home; and finally, read and understand your purchase, rental or lease agreement carefully before signing. Some other things to consider are whether or not the monitoring center is available 24 hours, average response time, training of the staff, and procedures the center uses to test the system. ## **Public Notice**

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
