



## Tahoka Still Looking For First Real Win

The Tahoka Bulldogs continued to play pretty well, especially on defense, but couldn't get enough good things to happen to beat Whiteface last week, going down 20-0, thanks mainly to two long touchdown bombs by the Antelopes, who were playing before a homecoming crowd.

Tahoka did win a game last week, though, bringing their season record to 1-4, as Coahoma notified Tahoka that they had used an ineligible player against Tahoka and therefore forfeited the game, which now goes into the record book as a 1-0 victory instead of a 55-2 loss.

Whiteface scored first when QB Cedric Chambers threw a long pass to Brandon Trull for 60 yards, and Oran Peden kicked the extra point. This score at 4:46 left in the first period was one of only two passes completed by the Antelopes in the game. The second one was almost an instant replay, when Chambers hit Roger Chavez for 53 yards in the third quarter.

Tahoka threatened to score several times, and made some good defensive stands, but for the most part, the Bulldogs couldn't generate much offense, having just six first downs in the game.

Twice in the game Tahoka attempted to make a first down on fourth and long, failing both times. Once was an incomplete pass on 4th and 7 at the Whiteface 42 and once a

running try gained 6, but was fourth and 12 at Tahoka's own 43 in the third quarter. Tahoka was down 13-0 at halftime and 20-0 at the end of three.

Tahoka's Jesse Perez blocked a field goal attempt, and Jason McMillan blocked a punt. In the fourth period End Martin Gill caught a 13-yard pass to the Antelopes 1, but a penalty rubbed out the play.

Tahoka running backs gained a total of 90 yards rushing, with Edward Ramirez getting 54 yards on 14 carries. But losses from sacks of the quarterback brought the net rushing yardage down to 57 for the game. QB Wes Solomon did hit on 7 of 20 passes for a total of 76 yards.

For Tahoka on defense, Cody Hale played an excellent game, getting in on at least 12 tackles. John Quintanilla, Perez and McMillanalso did good work on defense, and Juan Luna intercepted two Whiteface passes. Tahoka's longest gain of the game was a 27-yard pass caught by Greg Smith after the ball was first knocked up into the air by a defender.

## SPS Electric Utility Rates To Decrease 2.9 Percent

Doyle Webb from Southwestern Public Service Company presented a proposal Monday night to the Tahoka City Countil for a 2.9% decrease in electric utilities for Tahoka and the surrounding area. The decrease, mandated by the Public Utility Commission of Texas, goes into effect Oct. 15. "Those with about a 1000 kilowatt bill will see a decrease of approximately \$1.15 per month," said Webb, who is manager of the Tahoka SPS office.

In other action Monday night, city officials discussed agenda items including a volleyball court, possible gang activity, and other city matters.

Chris Trevino represented Tahoka High School's DECA club and their proposal for a sand-pit volleyball court in Tahoka's Mini-Park. Councilman Huffaker motioned to appoint a committee to review and approve the plans. The council voted 3-1 for the construction of the court and Mayor Jim Solomon appointed himself, Wayne Tekell, Joe Calvillo and Barry Pittman to serve as an ad-hock committee for the construction of the court.

Vivian McAfee from the First Bap-

tist Young Women's Association discussed possible gang activity in Tahoka and offered service on behalf of the organization to curtail any such happenings. Currently no gang-related activities have been reported.

Other agenda discussed included

Other agenda discussed included the pursual of a flow chart recorder for the sewer plant, which was approved as well as the adoption of Resolution 10-93 for Tahoka, which involves the impact of federal mandates on city finances.

Police Chief Jerry Webster gave the Tahoka Police Department's list of activities for the month of September which involved 280 calls, four arrests, 23 tickets, three accidents, and three thefts, one of which was cleared.






