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Superintendent Search:

Tahoka School District Seeks Input From Local Residents

 During the last week of October, a series of meetings will be conducted in Tahoka for area residents to voice their opinions on the type of qualifications and characteristics they would prefer in a new superintendent.

In the first-ever officially conducted superintendent search by Tahoka Independent School District in conjunction with the Texas Association of School Boards Superintendent Search Services, TISD trustees are asking for local input in determining a "profile" of a superintendent for the district who will assume duties for the 1994-95 school year.

Earlier this year, Superintendent Dr. Duane Carter submitted his intent to resign at the end of this school

year, and trustees voted to hire the TASB Superintendent Search Services to assist in the recruitment and selection process of a new superintendent.

Dr. E.C. Leslie, a consultant with the service and a former Lubbock ISD Superintendent, will be conducting the Tahoka series of meetings, beginning on Monday, Oct. 25 and concluding on Thursday, Oct. 28.

Following is a schedule of meetings with various factions and organizations of the school and community. For those who are not included in specific groups, a general public meeting will be held on Monday, Oct. 25 at 6:30 p.m. in the school cafeteria at which time any interested person is encouraged to attend and

voice their opinion.

"We hope everyone will take advantage of these meetings to let us know your feelings and give us your input as we develop a profile for the superintendent position," said Greg Henley, President of the Board of Trustees. "The selection of a successful administrative leader is the most important responsibility of a school board, and we take this responsibility very seriously. It is important that the selection procedure involve the entire community as well as the district personnel. We have an obligation to find the very best person available to serve as our next superintendent, and we feel this process will assist us in making that selection," he added.

TISD Board Of Trustees Vote To Join 'Suitable Provision' Litigation Effort

 Trustees of the Tahoka Independent School District voted 5-0 in favor of joining in the "Suitable Provision" challenge of the *Edgewood v. Menq* litigation, an issue which is currently being heard during the trial on the constitutionality of Senate Bill 7 in Austin. The Tahoka school district joins others across the state, including Lubbock ISD, in challenging the state's constitutionality in its obligation to make suitable provision for the support of public schools.

TISD trustees met in open session last Wednesday night, and after some discussion approved a resolution that incorporates factors such as coordinated representation by the Texas Association of School Boards Legal Assistance Fund; a \$250 initial contribution to litigation costs; and a statement (in part) that the Tahoka Independent School District has determined that "the failure of the state to make suitable provisions for support of public schools has sorely compromised the public interest and resulted in hardship and disappointment for this school district, its patrons and its students."

Trustees Greg Henley, Dan Stone, Clint Gardner, Myrtle White and Juanell Jones voted unanimously in favor of the resolution, noting that should costs above \$250 be required during further litigation then the district has the option to participate or withdraw from the suit. Trustees Mike Huffaker and Brad Hammonds were not present.

An appendix to the resolution states (in part) as follows:
 "The public education system of finance has been altered radically in the past decade, changing from a system funded predominantly by state revenues to one funded primarily from local taxes. Local funding provided a

majority of school revenues after the passage of House Bill 72 (1984), reached 53 percent in 1989-90, and is as high as 55 percent today. Under Senate Bill 7 passed in the 1993 session, the state share likely will fall to 43 percent, with 57 percent local financing.

"The constitutional issues in a 'suitable provision' case would maintain at least, but not exclusively, the following:

- "The 'suitable provision' clause is older than and operates separately from the "efficient system" clause, and state actions with regard to financing public education must meet additional tests beyond the Edgewood standards.
- "The Texas Constitution makes a clear distinction between state taxes and local taxes, and the state may not characterize local taxes as state taxes.
- "Since local property taxes for schools are subject to local voter authorization and are therefore optional, the state cannot require local taxation except by indirect means, such as incentives.
- "The Texas Constitution requires a system funded substantially by the state, with local taxation being supplemental.
- "The state has a constitutional obligation to provide appropriate funding for statutory and regulatory mandates arising at the state level, whether imposed by the legislature or by officers and agencies of the state."

A 1983 Ford pickup driven by Wesley Edward Owens, 68, of Tahoka, and a 1986 Pontiac driven by Buelah Young Hubbard, 77, also of Tahoka, were involved in a collision at the intersection of Ave. L and N. 1st St. last Thursday. No injuries were listed.

Abel Garza of Lamesa told police he was traveling south on U.S. 87 about 8 p.m. Monday when someone threw a rock off the U.S. 380 overpass, damaging the windshield of his

van. Later a Midland resident reported his pickup damaged by something thrown from the Cemetery overpass about 8:20 p.m.

Headlights and signal lights on six Tahoka school buses were reported broken by vandals in the last week. And corner posts on an awning at Tahoka Mini Park were damaged by vandals.

A.C. Fillingim reported that his barn about 10 miles northwest of New Home on FM 179 had been burned, apparently by arsonists, and that 150 bags of cottonseed valued at \$1800 also had been destroyed. Fillingim told officers that about six weeks ago someone had burned down the grainery located near the barn.

In jail during the week were one person each on charges of aggravated sexual assault, DWI first offense, no drivers license, application to revoke probation on DWI charges, theft under \$200 and public intoxication.

Early voting began Wednesday, Oct. 13 for the Nov. 2 Constitutional Amendment Election. Registered voters may vote early by personal appearance in the County Clerk's Office in the Lynn County Courthouse between the hours of 8:30 a.m. and 5 p.m. Monday through Friday, Oct. 13 through Oct. 29.

The Nov. 2 election will allow voters to decide on 16 proposed constitutional amendments submitted by the 73rd Texas Legislature.

Four polling places will be open for Lynn County registered voters on election day, Tuesday, Nov. 2. In Tahoka, voting will be held for Precincts 1, 6, 7, 9, 12 and 14 at the Lynn County Courthouse. In Wilson, voters in Precincts 2 and 8 will vote in the Green Building, and in New Home, voters in Precincts 4, 11 and 13 will vote at New Home High School. In O'Donnell, voters in Precincts 3, 5 and 10 will vote at O'Donnell High School.

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





"The constitutional amendment prohibiting a personal income tax without voter approval and, if an income tax is enacted, dedicating the revenue to education and limiting the rate of local school taxes."
- Proposition Number 5:
"The constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to prescribe the qualifications of sheriffs."
- Proposition Number 6:
"The constitutional amendment abolishing the office of county surveyor in Jackson County."
- Proposition Number 7:
"The constitutional amendment repealing certain restrictions on the ability of corporations to raise capital."
- Proposition Number 8:
"The constitutional amendment to abolish the office of county surveyor in McLennan County."
- Proposition Number 9:
"The constitutional amendment to modify the provisions for the redemption of real property sold at a tax sale."
- Proposition Number 10:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing issuance of \$750 million in general obligation bonds to augment the Veterans' Land Fund and the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund and to fund the Veterans' Housing Assistance Fund II."

"The constitutional amendment authorizing the issuance of up to \$1 billion in general obligation bonds payable from the general revenues of the state for projects relating to facilities of corrections and mental health and mental retardation institutions."
- Proposition Number 15:
"The constitutional amendment to permit the voters of a county to decide, at an election called by the commissioners court, whether to abolish the office of county surveyor in the county."
- Proposition Number 16:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing up to a total of \$100 million in bonds and notes to be issued or sold to finance the Texas agricultural fund for providing financial assistance to develop, increase, improve, or expand the production, processing, marketing, or export of crops or products grown or produced primarily in this state by agricultural businesses domiciled in the state."

A copy of this order shall be mailed immediately to all County Judges of this state and all appropriate writs will be issued and all proper proceedings will be followed to the end that said election may be held and its result proclaimed in accordance with law.
