Council members also voted to seek criminal charges against two owners of property who have failed to act on notification of violations of a city ordinance on cleaning up trash



A WEEKLY SUMMARY OF COTTON MARKETING NEWS

For The Week Ending December 2

Technical factors were in the bears' cotton marketing corner in the past week amid an absence of strong fundamental news. This left cotton futures vulnerable to a downward technical correction that slightly tempered sales of Texas/Oklahoma cotton on the TELCOT electronic marketing system

The New York Cotton Exchange Weekly Speculative/Hedging report released the morning of Nov. 30 sparked a weak tone for cotton futures, as it indicated a sharp buildup in the net speculative long position. The figure increased 8.8 percent to 24.7 percent net long, reflecting quite a shift from a 13.7 percent net short position just three weeks ago. "That's the biggest net long position since our top in March, when we were at 29.7 percent," commented Herman S. Kohlmeyer, Jr., Prudential Securities senior vice president-investments.

The development signaled to many that it was time for a correction in cotton futures. In sessions prior to the report, technical gains propelled prices to four- decrease in the agency's forecast for U.S. month highs, and sources said a lack of near-term fundamentally bullish factors weigh on USDA's final Acreage Reducopened a gate for speculative longs to exit at profitable positions,

on spot trading of Texas/Oklahoma cotton Jan. 1. The trade also will closely be in the past week. Sales on the TELCOT

electronic marketing system totaled 107,277 bales for the five-day trading period, behind the previous week's TEL-COT sales.

Supplies of Texas/Oklahoma cotton continued to be harvested ahead of schedule, with 83 percent of the crop off the stalk early in the week, according to the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service. The figure is ahead of just 67 percent at the same time last year and 66 percent on average. Other sources said the Texas harvest was closer to 90 or 95 percent complete. Meanwhile, the Oklahoma harvest was 85 percent complete, ahead of just 49 percent a year ago and 54 percent

The USDA Cotton Classing Office in Lubbock reported 61 percent of its anticipated samples had been classed early in the week, with the Abilene office at 79 percent complete and classings at the Altus, Oklahoma, office at 67 percent complete.

Market watchers had an eye toward upcoming USDA crop estimates to be released Dec. 9. Most see another slight production which in turn is expected to tion Program set-aside rate. A preliminary rate of 17.5 percent was set Nov. 1, and These technical losses slightly weighed USDA is required to issue a final rate by watching USDA's estimates for production in Pakistan, China and India.

> Debate continued in the past week over whether Rostekstil, a firm representing Russian mills, would have its request granted for U.S. cotton to be sent to Russia under the PL480 credit program. On Nov. 30, a spokesman for the International Cotton Advisory Committee (ICAC) said it was unlikely that cotton would be added to the list of goods to be sent to Russia under PL480. He cited several reasons, such as a history of the Russian government denying such requests and the possibility that Russia could strategically make such a request in order to gain more com-

petitive footing with its traditional suppliers such as Uzbekistan. The ICAC spokesman also pointed out that Russia still had to make two back payments to the U.S. on export credits to restore its eligibility for further credit extensions.

But, after ICAC's report was released, newswire reports said Russia had managed to make its \$148 million farm credit payment for November to the U.S. Payments of \$138 million in January, \$190 million in February, and \$228 million in March continue to face Russia. Sources say that as long as timely payments can be made, Russia's efforts to import U.S. cotton should not be discounted. Knight-Ridder Financial News (KRF) in the past week was told by industry sources that the Russian textile industry is appealing for inclusion of cotton under PL480 as a way to improve employment opportunities there. Two months ago, Russian textile mills worked at 50 percent of capacity because of difficulties in getting cotton from its traditional suppliers in the former Soviet Union.

Overseas sales of U.S. cotton continued to look bleak in the past week. On Dec. 2, USDA reported export sales of U.S. cotton in the week ended Nov. 25 decreased anet 1,500 bales. Sales to Taiwan, Mexico, Brazil, Thailand, Japan and Indonesia were more than offset by significant cancellations to unknown destinations.

The AWP through the week ending Dec. 9 is 42.86 cents per pound, up 70 points from the previous week and resulting in a producer option payment (POP) of

Harvesting Farmers' Opinions

Today's farmer is into technology, concerned about the environment, expecting tighter credit and skeptical of free trade with Mexico and Canada.

That's the picture emerging from a survey of Midwestern farmers conducted at farm shows in Nebraska, Iowa and Ohio this fall. ICI Seeds, the nation's third-largest seed corn company, questioned more than 950 farmers about topics ranging from tillage practices to technology uses to governmental policy

The American farmer, like his urban counterpart, has readily adopted the information age. More than one-half of those surveyed use a computer in their farming operations, and 42 percent stay in touch via a mobile phone. And the days of selling at current market price are fading - 57 percent of farmers surveyed say they use commodity futures markets to gain the best price for their grain.

While the rains of 1993 dampened practices adopted in recent years provided a bright spot in an otherwise dreary season. Conservation tillage - a tillage and planting system that leaves residue on the soil surface to reduce erosion - is credited with saving soil in 1993. That's the opinion of 84 percent of farmers surveyed by ICI Seeds.

In order to save the soil and comply with conservation plans specified in the 1990 Farm Bill, farmers expect to further reduce tillage in 1994. Of those surveyed by ICI Seeds, 65 percent intend to increase their conservation-tillage acreage next season.

In looking to 1994, planting intentions are edging upward. Eighty-six percent of farmers say they'll plant the same number or more acres of corn in 1994, while 81 percent intend to increase or keep their soybean acreage steady next season. New equipment, however, isn't a priority. Only 40 percent of those surveyed expect to purchase equipment or machinery in 1994.

Fiscal Squeeze -Following the weather woes of 1993, U.S. farmers expect money to flow less freely next spring: 65% of farmers believe credit will be tighter in 1994; 68% believe credit will be more important in 1994 . . .

Midwestern farmers also are keep; ing an eye on Capitol Hill. While the North American Free Trade Agreement has gained the approval of both houses of Congress, as well as the endorsement of agricultural commodity groups, U.S. farmers aren't completely sold on the notion of free trade with their southern and northern neighbors. Only 43 percent of the farmers surveyed voiced support for NAFTA.

And finally, concerning an issue near to their hearts - and pocketbooks - 65 percent of farmers believe government should take many a farmer's outlook, farming the initiative to rebuild the levees washed away by last summer's rains.




