

# Lynn County Hospital To Open Clinic In O'Donnell

 Lynn County Hospital District will undertake a new challenge in 1994, with plans to open a branch clinic for O'Donnell residents sometime near the first of February. This achievement follows two years of planning and deliberation by Hospital Administrator Louise Landers and the Hospital Board of Directors.

The new O'Donnell Clinic is located at 501 Fifth Street, in the O'Donnell I.S.D. superintendent's building near the tax office, with its own entrance marked with a sign reading "O'Donnell Clinic". A disabled entrance ramp is located in the back of the building.

Family Nurse Practitioner Dixie Bruce will see patients Monday through Friday, with the clinic open late on Tuesdays and Thursdays, until 7 p.m. Also on staff will be one receptionist and an LVN, whom the hospital district has yet to name.

The clinic houses two examination rooms; one trauma room, an office and a waiting area. All operating expenses of the clinic will be paid by Lynn County Hospital, including staff salaries. Patient insurance information and accounts receivables will

be filed at Lynn County Hospital in Tahoka.

Ms. Bruce, who is a Registered Nurse and has her Bachelor of Science in Nursing, has been a Family Nurse Practitioner for 22 years. She will see patients at the O'Donnell Clinic under the medical supervision of Dr. Donald Freitag, who has a clinic at the Tahoka hospital. Dr. Freitag will visit the O'Donnell Clinic on a weekly basis and will be available for consultation with Ms. Bruce during clinic hours if needed.

Mrs. Landers said that the hospital has been aware of the need for a clinic in O'Donnell for quite some time, and that the Texas Department of Health allows hospitals in medical underserved areas, or health professional shortage areas, to extend their hospital license to establish rural health clinics in these areas. The clinics, however, must be supervised by a physician.

"I feel that it is a real benefit to the people of this community to know the hospital and physician care enough to make this commitment," said Ms. Bruce. "Dr. Freitag and I have developed a good working relationship in the two months that I have been in

Tahoka, and I am looking forward to opening the clinic in O'Donnell," she added.

Ms. Bruce came to Tahoka in mid-November, hired by the hospital district for the sole purpose of running

the new O'Donnell clinic. She has been working with Dr. Freitag at his office since that time, developing a working relationship with the physician who will supervise her patient caseload in O'Donnell.

She moved to Tahoka from Amarillo, where she was a Family Nurse Practitioner (FNP) in private practice, working with four physicians there. She grew up in Midland, and has been a FNP for 22 years. "I was the first Family Nurse Practitioner in the state of New Mexico," said Ms. Bruce, explaining that FNPs only came into being about 28 years ago.

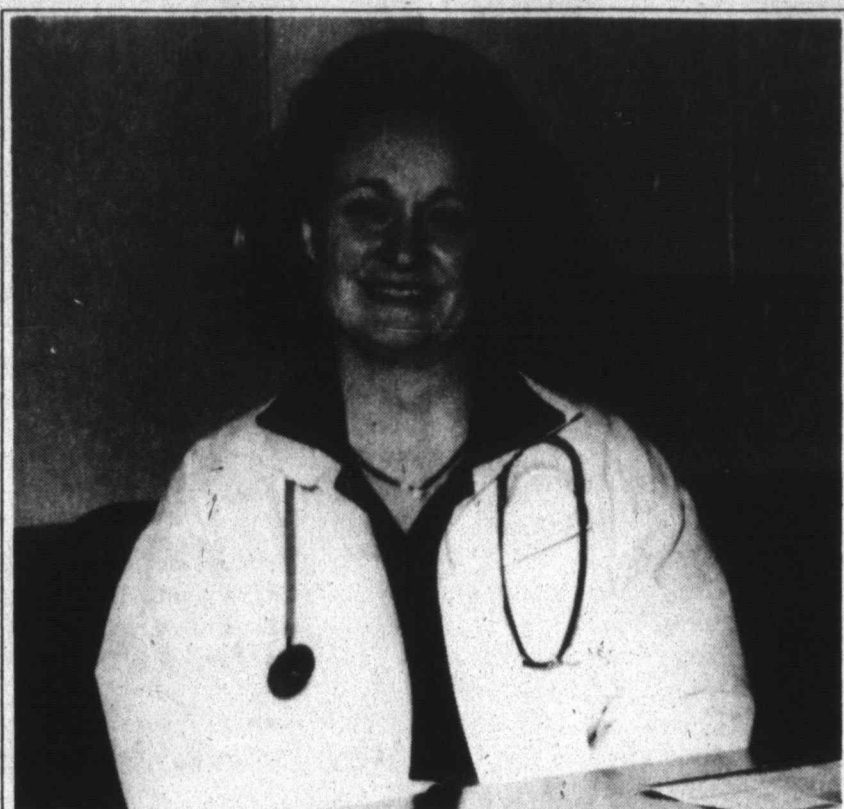
"FNPs may diagnose and prescribe medicine, but must have physician supervision," she said. "The physician must sign at least 10 percent of the patient charts, and be on site once a week, and available by phone at all times," said Ms. Bruce.

She has two sons, both grown, and 3-year-old twin granddaughters. Ms. Bruce is also an ordained Methodist minister, and has pastored two churches in the Central Texas Conference. She was also chaplain at Lubbock Methodist Hospital for a period of time, but is not at present a practicing minister.

"I feel I can do my ministry as well or better in this role (as a FNP) as from a pulpit," said Ms. Bruce. "I let people know that God cares and loves us unconditionally. That doesn't mean I don't expect people to be responsible for the commitments they make or the actions they take," she added.

She is excited about working with the people of O'Donnell, and said she has met many welcoming and congenial people there. She expects to work closely with the O'Donnell EMS, and remarked that the O'Donnell ambulance crew was exceptional for such a small community, with ten qualified crew members including two paramedics, one trained in special skills, one in intermediate skills, and six Emergency Medical Technicians. "That's a good crew for a town the size of O'Donnell," she added.

The O'Donnell Clinic will have an Open House as soon as all the details have been finalized, according to Mrs. Landers. "We're aiming for the first of February to open the clinic, and are very excited about this new opportunity," she said. "I think this will be a good working relationship and a good investment of the taxpayers' money," she concluded.

## Shooting, Thefts Are Investigated

A shooting at O'Donnell, burglaries and thefts in the county and in Tahoka, and one traffic accident in Tahoka were investigated by law enforcement officers during the last week.

Benito Narro of O'Donnell was treated at Medical Arts Center in Lamesa for a .22 gunshot wound to the face and chin early Sunday morning. He reportedly was shot by an acquaintance while sitting in a pickup at a residence on 9th St. in O'Donnell.

Deputies questioned a 22-year-old Tahoka man and recovered the pistol reportedly used in the shooting.

A cutting torch and welding helmet were reported stolen in a burglary of a trailer owned by David Ehlers of Tahoka on Jan. 8 about a mile northwest of FM 179 and U.S. 380 west of Tahoka. The missing items were valued at \$353.

A quantity of copper wire was stolen from the Lyntegar substation southwest of Wilson after a hole was cut in the fence. The thieves apparently used bolt cutters to obtain lengths of ground wire, sometime in the last few weeks.

In the 1700-block of S. 3rd in Tahoka last Thursday a 1990 Chevrolet S-10 pickup driven by R.V. Long of Tahoka, 69, and a 1990 Chevrolet pickup driven by Jesus Carmona Ramirez, 51, of Tahoka were involved in a collision. Neither driver was treated for injuries.

Felix Calvillo of Tahoka reported his wallet containing drivers license and credit cards was stolen from his pickup parked at Thriftway Saturday.

An ice vending machine at Allsup's reportedly was damaged when struck by an unknown vehicle Saturday.

In jail during the week were one person each for public intoxication, driving while intoxicated, first offense, and DWI third offense.

## Darrell "Tooter" Draper Named Head Coach, Athletic Director

Darrell "Tooter" Draper, interim head football coach for the Tahoka High School varsity football program, was named Thursday night as head football coach and Athletic Director by the TISD Board of Trustees. Draper was assistant football coach to Chris Wigington at the beginning of the season, and was later named interim head coach after Wigington's reassignment in late September, 1993.

Coach Draper came to Tahoka from Van Horn, and has had experience as a head coach at Grandfalls. He has a wife, Sheila, and a 14-month-old son, Ryan. "I'm excited and we've got a lot of work to do - and that's what we're going to do - work hard and try to improve in all areas," Draper told The News.

In other action at Thursday night's board meeting, trustees approved an elementary teaching assistant, discussed building two additional classrooms on the elementary campus, approved a list of substitute teachers, and heard a report from Dr.

E.C. Leslie concerning the superintendent search for the district.

Laura Smith of New Home was approved as elementary teaching assistant in the Josten's computer lab, to fill a vacancy left by the resignation of Andrew Chapa. Trustees approved a list of 13 substitute teachers for the district, and amended the budget to reflect an increase of \$500 from the state for the Chapter 1 program.

After several months of discussion on the need for additional classrooms on the elementary campus, trustees directed Dr. Duane Carter, Superintendent, to contact E. C. Associates for plans, specifications and cost estimates on two classrooms to adjoin the central section of the elementary campus, next to the library.

Dr. E. C. Leslie, with TASB Superintendent Search Services, met briefly with trustees to report on the superintendent profile meetings held in the community last October, and reminded the board that applications for a new TISD Superintendent are being accepted until Feb. 26. Trustees will review applications in March.

ees will review applications in March.

In other action, trustees approved monthly bills and bookkeeper Loretta Tekell reported an account balance in all funds of \$1,548,859.24. Dr. Carter informed the board that the district had received a \$27,500 grant from Texas Education Agency for energy management assistance.

During open forum, several THS students spoke to the board on their experiences during Jammin' January when they visited Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. The students were able to observe several doctors and other professional medical staff at the hospital, including surgical procedures. They said the experience was very educational and that they appreciated the opportunity to learn more about the medical field, expressing gratitude to school nurse Joan Knox for arranging the trip.

Six trustees were present for the four-hour meeting, adjourning to executive session for two hours. Trustee Myrtle White was absent.

## Juvenile Probationers Pay The Fine, Or Work The Time, Says Jeri Akard

Mrs. Akard is Probation Officer in Lynn County, for both adults and juveniles, and has been working with juvenile probationers here for 11 years. She came to this area from Lincoln, Nebraska, where she had worked in a similar job field for 17 years. She and her husband, Lonnie, raised four adopted children while there.

When she and her husband, a railroad worker, decided to retire, they moved to Arizona. "I promised God I'd never ask Him for anything else if He would just get me out of that Godforsaken area," she recalls with a laugh. "Basically I'm an Okie, and Arizona was a place where even the

**Not 2, But 3 Courthouses Built Like Lynn's**

In a recent article, the *Lynn County News* reported that Freestone County's Courthouse in Fairfield was a replica of the Lynn County Courthouse. This week it was brought to our attention that another courthouse in Texas is also built on that same plan, with Lynn County's courthouse the first to be constructed, in 1916.

A photograph in "The Texas Courthouse" by June Rayfield Welch and J. Larry Nance shows that the courthouse in Dallam County, situated in Dalhart, is also a replica of the Lynn County Courthouse.

According to the book, the Dallam County Courthouse was built at a cost of \$200,000 in 1922. The photo shows a slight variation in the brick column supports on the front of the courthouses.

Dallam County is located at the northwest top corner of the panhandle and Freestone County is in east Texas, about 100 miles south of Dallas and 70 miles east of Waco.

**State Comptroller Sends Tax Rebates**

"Consumer confidence proved itself when Texans set out on some early Christmas shopping in November," Comptroller John Sharp said, as he delivered more than \$123 million in January sales tax rebates sent to 985 Texas cities and 111 counties.

Lynn County received \$7,176.16 for this period, a 46.28% decrease from 1993's payment of this period. O'Donnell received a payment of \$999.04, an 8.54% decrease from last year's payment of \$1,092.41. Tahoka received \$5,252.01, a 49.54% decrease from last year's payment of \$10,408.75. Wilson received \$825.11, a 50.19% decrease from last year's payment of \$1,857.55.

**December Weather Drier, Warmer Than Normal**

The weather across the Texas South Plains during the month of December 1993 turned out to be both drier and warmer than normal.

Temperatures averaged 1.4 degrees above normal and ranged from 3.8 degrees above normal at Olton to 0.1 degree above normal at both Tahoka and Tulia.

Maximum temperatures averaged 2.5 degrees above normal and ranged from 6.0 degrees above normal at Olton to 0.5 degree above normal at Seminole. The highest temperature reported during the month was 79 at Spur on Dec. 10.

Minimum temperatures averaged 0.3 degree above normal and ranged from 2.3 degrees above normal at Matador to 2.3 degrees below normal at Tulia. The lowest temperature reported was 9 degrees on December 25 at Muleshoe.

Precipitation averaged 0.23 inches below normal.

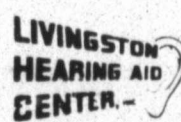

cactus had a hard time growing. I was ready to move anywhere," she said. "I told Lonnie to get me to a place where I could at least sit and watch my lawn grow."

With her husband's family living in the O'Donnell area, the couple moved to O'Donnell where they did much more than just "watch their lawn grow." They owned and operated a cafe there for a time, and when someone told Mrs. Akard she should involve herself with a hobby, she answered with, "Work is my hobby — that's what I know."

Mrs. Akard became the Juvenile Probation Officer for Lynn County 11 years ago, working on a part-time basis while still running the cafe. In 1988, the couple sold the cafe in May, and in June she became the Adult Probation Officer as well.

Mrs. Akard takes her job very seriously, and wants juvenile and adult probationers alike to know that they will pay the fine, or work the time through community service. "When I can make them pay restitution, I do it," said Mrs. Akard, who noted that over \$300 in restitution was paid in December to those who

were the victims of crimes committed by juveniles. Those amounts were \$85 for tractor damage, \$70 for theft, another \$85 for tractor damage, \$30 for breakage of street lights, and \$103 for window breakage at a residence.

"I want people to know that when they turn it over to the police, it isn't just dropped," said Mrs. Akard, who works closely with law enforcement agencies, school officials, and Children's Protective Services. "I demand restitution or else they work in community service, doing odd jobs for the county, mowing yards for elderly, shining cars for the police department, mopping floors, whatever needs done," she said.

Probationers put up Christmas decorations at the Lynn County Courthouse and in O'Donnell, and were also responsible for taking them down. They have mopped floors and set up chairs for the Tahoka Gospel Opry, and recently chopped up and removed a large tree which had been uprooted by strong winds at one elderly woman's home. "Anytime the elderly need help, check with me to see if my probationers can do the job," said Mrs. Akard.

She has had probationers paint over the graffiti on the highway overpasses in Tahoka, and says with a chuckle that "that's no deranged painter trying to make checkerboards on the overpasses (referring to the white squares of paint), that's just me and my probationers covering up what needs to be covered." There has been a recent problem of graffiti in town, including red spray paint on the brick walls of the Masonic Lodge, and Mrs. Akard says she will have her probationers paint over that, as well.

She also works with school officials to handle truancy problems, and said a new law is now in effect in which parents of truants can be fined up to \$500 per day, and each day is a new offense. In the past, the fine was \$50 per day, and Mrs. Akard says that she takes the truancy charges very seriously. "If the child won't go to school, and the parents can't pay, I put the mother in jail — that gets their attention pretty fast," she said.

"If I can make the parents responsible, then that's what I'm out to do, whether it's payment, jail time or whatever," said Mrs. Akard. "I want the parents to say, 'Do you think our kids are out doing something we're going to have to pay for?'"

And, her reputation for "telling it like it is" is well-known in Tahoka. School officials tell Mrs. Akard that her name is known in the hallways, and that "the kids know that they can do what needs done, or they can go see Jeri — and that helps them make up their minds pretty quick."

And what does Mrs. Akard want the young people of Lynn County to know? "That if you get into trouble with the law, you're mine ... and I will make you pay restitution or work through community service — that you can count on," she said.

Her record for doing that stands for itself — in the 11 years since she began seeing juvenile probationers,

### Health Department Offering Immunizations

The Texas Department of Health is looking for adults and children in this region who are past due on their immunizations.

Children's shots are scheduled at 2 months, 4 months, 6 months, 12 months and 4 years of age and then every 10 years. Adults need tetanus shots every 10 years.

The Health Department also offers tuberculosis testing as needed. Anyone who suspects they have been exposed are urged to call the local office for further information or an appointment. The local office number is 998-4604 and office hours are 8-noon and 1-5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

A late immunization clinic is held once a month for those who can not attend during the regular office hours. The next late clinic will be offered Jan. 26 from 4-7 p.m.

### Better Business Bureau Report

Every year the Better Business Bureau reminds consumers that in order to prevent confusion and frustration when returning to overcrowded stores after the holidays, they should shop carefully and understand refund and exchange policies before making gift purchases. The most important point for shoppers to know is that a store is not obligated to accept items for refund, exchange or credit unless the item is defective or was misrepresented. Consumers should not assume that merchandise can be returned unless specifically stated by the store. Refund and exchange privileges vary from store to store, so, before making a purchase, the BBB advises shoppers to inquire about the store's policy. Consumers should keep all receipts and tags on gifts where they are not sure if they will fit or be right for the recipient. Remember, you are responsible for asking the store's policy.

Solicitation for listings in "who's who" publications is nothing new to the BBB. A solicitation may be accompanied by a request for a "membership" fee or for an order of one or more copies of the directory. Some publishers charge nothing for the listing but require purchase of the book by those listed for a substantial amount. At any rate, publication of "who's who" books is booming. Those invited to join a "who's who" are advised to beware if a solicitor asks you to pay for your listing — even as a donation; don't be swayed by testimonials from prominent politicians or celebrities; ask to see a past volume of the book; see if the directory is stocked in your local library; and if you are suspicious, ask the company how they got your name. Finally, give us a call at 763-0459 and check them out first.

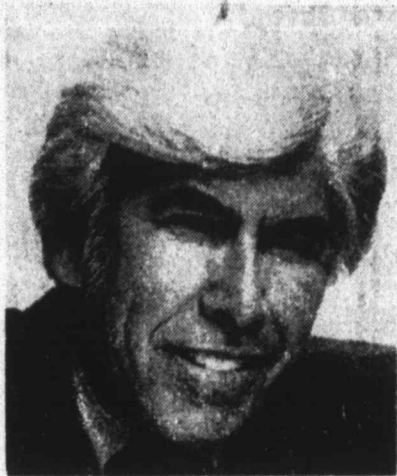

The proposed disposal well is located three miles northwest of Wilson in the Wilson, West (Strawn) Field, in Lynn County. The waste water will be injected into strata in the subsurface depth interval from 9048 to 9075 feet.

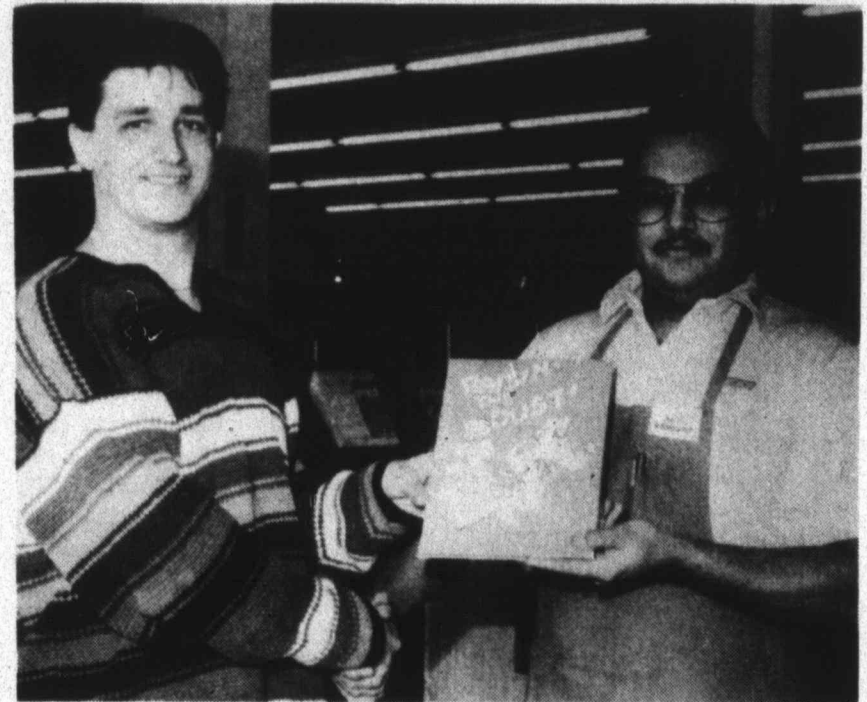
Earning alternate positions were John Delgado, Jr., 1st Alternate Baritone Saxophone; and Lora Yowell, 1st Alternate Baritone.
