# **Sheriff's Department Account Audit Presented To County Commissioners**

Three representatives from Love, Havs and Reeger accounting firm in Tahoka presented an audit report of the Lynn County Sheriff's Department Operating Account to commissioners Monday morning, although the audit report was not listed on the meeting's agenda.

The audit, requested by Sheriff Jake Diggs following his appointment as interim sheriff after the resignation of Jack Miller, was for January through October, 1993.

Joe Hays, representing the auditing firm, read a "confidential" management letter to the court which listed transactions in the Sheriff's Dept. which auditors felt should be brought to the attention of commissioners. The auditing firm provided District Attorney Ricky Smith, at his request, a copy of the audit and letter.

According to County Judge J.F. Brandon, there was no discussion following the presentation of the audit and nothing was mentioned in the presence of the court about any unaccounted funds. Because the audit was not on the agenda, commissioners took no official action, noting that the audit would be considered at the next meeting.


In other action, commissioners approved a contract with O'Donnell Fire Department and approved a payment of \$10,184.50 to the Lynn County Appraisal District, which is one-half of the annual fee for contracting with the tax-collecting en-

Numbers 1 and 2 were brought to my attention this week when I attended the funeral of my great aunt, who died at the age of 93-plus, living the last years at Newport, TX, where I also lived until I was 8. I drove around this little town and the only thing I recognized was the old community church building where I remember standing around on first one foot and then the other, wishing the preacher would hurry up and finish his really long prayers. (I remember thinking how dumb the preacher was not to understand when people kept saying "Amen!", obviously wanting him to end his prayer, only he just kept on praying).

The house we lived in is completely gone. The few business buildings there when I was a kid were gone. My great-grandfather's big two-story house with the balcony he wouldn't let us kids play on was gone. The minister at my aunt's funeral referred to my great-grandfather as "David Wall." I never knew his name was David. I thought his name was Grandpa.

A few years ago we visited Newburgh, Ind., where I, operated my first weekly newspaper. But the newspaper building, basement and all, was gone, leveled after it got too dilapidated for use.

I sure am glad they don't do that to humans.

# **Icy Roads Are Factor** In Wrecks On U.S. 87

Icy roads last Thursday evening He remained in jail this week. and on Friday were a contributing factor in three accidents on U.S. 87, according to investigating Dept. of Public Safety officers.

About 7:15 p.m. Thursday a northbound 1988 Chevrolet pickup driven by Roosevelt Moore, 58, of Tahoka, overturned once 4.9 miles north of Tahoka on U.S. 87. Moore was not injured.

At exactly the same spot, but on the other side of the highway Friday morning, a southbound 1994 Freight Liner truck-tractor pulling a semitrailer jacknifed into the median. Again there were no injuries. Driver of the truck was Mario Alaniz, 44, of San Angelo.

About 7:50 p.m. Thursday a 1993 Ford pickup pulling an 18-foot trailer, struck the median of U.S. 87 about 10 miles south of Tahoka, causing the trailer to turn on its side. Driver of the pickup, which did not overturn, was Franklin McNabb, 26, of Canton.

A minor accident on Tahoka High School gym parking lot Friday evening involved a parked 1994 Ford pickup owned by Valton Stephens of Tahoka and a 1992 Chevrolet Blazer driven by George Jeffrey Young, 37, of Levelland.

A Tahoka woman treated at Lynn County Hospital emergency room for bruises and a slight concussion Sunday told Tahoka Police Dept. that her husband had knocked her unconscious and that she would file charges.

Sheriff's officers were advised by Donald Patterson, an auctioneer from Wolfforth, that a utility trailer owned by his firm apparently had been stolen during an auction sale 11 miles northwest of Tahoka, probably on Dec. 30. It had not been reported earlier because it had been assumed that someone at the sale had borrowed to transport items purchased.

(NAPS)-Here are some surprising statistics that could help you save time and money: It may now cost less, in many cases, to send a document by fax machine than by mail.

As postal rates have gone up over the past ten years, the cost of sending a letter via fax machine has gone down.

According to fax experts Hewlett-Packard, this appears to be leading to the increasing use of faxes instead of the mail. In fact, AT&T says 32 percent of business calls today are actually facsimile transmissions.

During regular business hours, it now costs 25 cents or less to send a two-page letter from coast to coast. The time to transmit is generally under a minute. If a fax is sent at an hour when phone costs are reduced or if discount services are applied, it costs even less. With many newer fax machines it is possible to store several documents in memory for transmission when rates are lowest for even greater savings.

Electronic mail is also vying with the postal service, but the fax market is actually ten times

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A WEEKLY SUMMARY OF COTTON MARKETING NEWS

For The Week Ending January 20

ized by serious uncertainty this past week as a near-critical world supply situation seemed to draw a tighter noose around some segments of the industry. As a result, activity was disorderly at best during the five-day trading period.

The most serious development during the week came from Pakistan where the Ministry of Commerce announced the temporary suspension of cotton exports in an effort to relieve pressure on domestic prices resulting from a production shortfall. USDA, on January 12, estimated the Pakistani crop at 6.5 million bales, down from 7.3 million estimated in December.

The suspension, which took effect January 18, apparently means export contracts for the 1993-94 crop will not be loaded for shipment. According to trade sources in Japan quoted by Knight-Ridder Financial News (KRFN), only 120,000 to 130,000 bales of the original 500,000 bale quota, have been shipped to various destinations, leaving merchants around the world holding the bag for as much as 380,000 bales of commitments to mills.

Obviously, merchants counting on Pakistani cotton to fill sales orders will be forced to look elsewhere in the world for cotton that is becoming more scarce by the day. Compounding the situation is India where a similar production shortfall and rising domestic cotton prices has forced the government to cease further export sales. One trade source estimates approximately 133,000 bales of Indian cotton will not enter world commerce this year. Some reports also indicate India is considering authorizing imports to placate domestic textile mills that are complaining about rising cotton prices.

Cotton prices have continued to react as expected in a tight-supply/ strong-demand situation. The weekly Adjusted World Price (AWP) has increased from 40.55 cents per pound to

The cotton market was character- 55.33 during a 10-consecutive-week run. Cotton futures have tried to keep pace with the rise in world prices as contract highs were set during six consecutive trading sessions ending January 19, despite occasional technical setbacks on the closes.

> One positive technical development occured January 17, when the March contract pierced a psychological barrier of 70 cents per pound, Heavy trade buying, probably a result of mill fixations, helped offset declining speculative positions in March, and the contract seemed willing to not look back at the 70-cent barrier. Also noted during the week was strong options-trading activity.

> Perhaps even more notable is the fact that all three "old-crop" months (March, May and July) have exceeded the 70-cent level for the first time since early August, 1991. One trade analyst notes that "prices have an uncanny habit of remaining strong all through the Spring," adding this could be a market "that runs from a Summer low to a late Spring high," a scenario that has occured twice in the past four years.

In 1991, the July contract ran up to 94.45 cents per pound, and May went from 74.50 to 87.45 during a 17-week period. A similar run occured in 1990 when prices reached 93,90. Just how far prices will go in 1994 is anyone's guess, yet there is little doubt the market will be forced to come to grips with how cheap cotton prices have been for the past couple of years.

The rising prices have cast a cloud of uncertainty on U.S. farm program payments on the 1994 cotton crop, especially the target price deficiency payment. Based on the current trend, the payment could fall as much as 10 to 12 cents per pound this year. The maximum possible deficiency payment rate for the 1993 crop was 20.55 cents per pound. However, heavy marketing activity and significant increases

in weighted average prices received by producers during November and December undoubtedly will drive down the final payment rate for 1993. USDA will announce the 1994 payment rate prior to sign-up for this year's program.

Supplies of Texas/Oklahoma cotton available for sale continued their inevitable slide this past week, however, producers holding remaining bales took advantage of escalating prices. A total of 29,315 bales were sold on the TELCOT electronic marketing system during the five-day trading period, compared to 27,175 the previous week.

Early Friday morning, USDA announced the AWP for the week ending January 27, is 55.33 cents per pound, up from 52.38 the previous week. The department's export reports were scheduled for release later Friday afternoon due to me devastating cold weather gripping the Eastern U.S.

According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) the CI program was set up to provide 5 percent of CI's annual operating budget to producers in cotton belt states to fund cotton related research and promotion activities.

Projects presented for review during the day-long meeting received funding in 1993 through the TSSC. A total of 25 projects were reviewed that seek to find answers to a number of important questions facing the cotton industry. Reports were presented on projects

ranging from efforts to remove gossypol from cottonseed to developing improved pest management and cultural strategies for cotton production.

TSSC Vice Chairman Larry Nelson, a cotton producer and ginner from Edmonson, Texas, notes that several of these projects were also approved by the committee for

further funding in 1994 and are therefore only partially complete. He adds that TSSC members will be meeting in the near future to select projects for funding in 1995.

Funding requests totaling close to \$600,000 were approved for 1994. Of that total, \$160,000 will fund projects specific to the High Plains and \$340,000 will go to projects of interest statewide. The remaining funds will be divided among other cotton production regions to fund additional regional projects.

A number of outstanding opportunities to hear about what is going on in agriculture and the cotton industry on the High Plains will present themselves January 25-26 during the Caprock Cotton Conference. The conference will be held at the Pioneer Memorial Museum in Crosbyton.

Plains Cotton Growers officials note that producers and other interested parties who attend the conference will have a chance to hear Texas Commissioner of Agriculture Rick Perry, Congressman Charles Stenholm and others discuss issues facing agriculture on the first day of the conference. Extension Cotton Specialist Kater Hake and a number of other researchers from the Texas Agricultural Extension Service will speak on the second day and discuss a variety of production and insect management issues.

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


