Early Voting Starts Feb. 16 In County

Early voting in the Democratic and Republican primaries in Lynn County will start next Wednesday, Feb. 16 and continue through March 4, four days before the regular primary voting.

Voters in all precincts in the county may vote by going to the county clerk's office in the Lynn County courthouse starting Wednesday. Primary ballots for either party will be available.

Interest is high in county races on the Democratic ballot, including two races for commissioner and the race for the remaining unexpired term of

sheriff. Seeking the sheriff's job are the current appointee, Jake Diggs, current deputy Elton Childress and former sheriff Clifford Laws.

The Republican primary ballot has just one candidate for a county office, Larry Hagood, who is unopposed seeking the nomination to oppose the present county judge, J.F. Brandon, who is unopposed on the Democratic ballot.

Both ballots have the usual state and national candidates of their parties, including Kay Bailey Hutchinson on the GOP ballot for U.S. Senate.

Five Wrecks Investigated During Week

Five traffic accidents were investigated during the last week, including two in O'Donnell and two in Tahoka. The most recent accident involved a 1993 Freightliner which jackknifed 8.5 miles north of Tahoka on U.S. 87 around 4 a.m. Wednesday. Driver of the truck was Richard Vincent Taff, 34, of Rising Star, who apparently suffered only minor injuries.

Last Saturday a 1985 Chevrolet driven by Ruben Sistos, 20, of Lamesa and a 1983 Ford pickup driven by David Hernandez, 17, of Tahoka, collided at 3rd and Doak streets in O'Donnell. There were no injuries.

On Sunday a 1984 Chevrolet pickup driven by Armando Benavides Narro, 23, of O'Donnell crossed the road and struck a tree near Allsup's in O'Donnell. O'Donnell EMS ambulance took Narro to Lynn County Hospital, where he was treated for a broken arm and facial injuries.

Anne M. O'Brien, 31, of Albuquerque, was driver of a GMC pickup with a U-Haul box bed which struck the lights under an awning at Tahoka Dairy Queen on Feb. 2.

An unknown vehicle which left the scene struck a parked 1994 Chevrolet pickup owned by Gabriel Saldana of Tahoka on S. 1st St. last Wednesday.

A 20-year-old Lamesa man was arrested after a tire tool was thrown through the window of a 1986 Dodge van in O'Donnell last Saturday.

A suspect was named after a .20 gauge Ithaca brand shotgun, chain

City Delays Action On Fire Dept. Addition, Water Plan

Tahoka City Council Monday night decided to delay action on a proposed addition to the fire department quarters, after receiving just one bid on the project.

City Manager Barry Pittman explained that the council's action did not necessarily mean that the city won't eventually accept the bid of Braddock Construction and Welding to build the addition for \$32,450, but that the council wanted to look further into the costs of possibly building a separate structure to hold the fire trucks and equipment.

The council also delayed action on taking part in a Canadian River water project which would cost the city an additional 20 cents per 1,000 gallons of water received from the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority, and would eventually cost the city's water customers more than they now are paying.

John Williams, general manager of CRMWA, and Vernon Jones, the city's representative to the authority, also were present Monday night.

The water authority is considering an "alternate water" project which would blend well water from Roberts County, north of Panipa, with the water from Lake Meredith so that the water sent into the system to cities south of the lake will meet government standards for health and purity. All cities on the system would pay pro rata portions of the cost, and for Tahoka, this would mean the cost of water delivered here would rise from 48 cents per 1,000 gallons to 68 cents.

It would mean purer water in the system here, but one reason the council delayed action is that the city, although paying for more water than it now receives, can not be delivered the amount of water it would be paying for. In other words, the city would

be paying for water it can't get. One possible option would be to sell the excess water to Lubbock or some city on the system north of here, and the city wants to look at this alternative.

When asked if the city could not just purify the water supply here by using more well water, Pittman said the city's well water is not as pure as the Canadian River water, so far as meeting government standards is concerned.

One advantage to accepting the alternate water plan is that the costs would include the city's share of paying for a desalinization project already underway to get some of the salt out of the Canadian River water.

Councilmen did approve seeking bids on seal coating some of the city's streets, with \$30,000 budgeted for the program. Also approved were an 8-year financing plan for new fire trucks and equipment through First National Bank of Tahoka, and changing a block of N. 2nd St. to one-way going west, between Avenues O and P during school hours, effective Feb. 21.

Police Chief Jerry Webster reported on his department's activities in January.

All council members and Mayor Jim Solomon were present, plus city attorney Cal Huffaker, Williams, Webster and Jones.

NOT LONG AGO somebody mailed me a brochure from which I could have ordered any of about 90 different catalogs, mostly from \$1 to \$3 each, with some costing as much as \$10.

These are in a wide range of topics, such as How To Do Magic Tricks, Free Stuff from Uncle Sam, Craft Discounts, USA Coin Guide, Collector's Armory (where to get replicas of fire-arms used from Revolutionary War days to present-day school grounds), a catalog to tell you where to get other catalogs, and a catalog on fashions for big and tall men.

I have never seen anyone offer either a catalog or a sale on fashions for short, fat men. And I'll bet there are a lot more of us than there are of them.

Most of these catalogs don't really offer anything other than a listing of where you can get other catalogs or brochures from those selling the project.

One of the more interesting catalogs offered in that brochure was one called "Brew Your Own Beer at Home". Wouldn't that be illegal? Certainly it would be yukky. Maybe it wouldn't be illegal if you drank all the product instead of selling it.

KNOTHOLES in the Woodwork: Television is mostly unrealistic. For example, nearly all of the cars driven by characters in TV movies and cop shows are spotlessly clean. I remember Columbo's car as the exception; it was always dirty and beat-up. Also, the people who run around the big cities in the movies always find a parking place right in front of where they are going. Of course, to make it realistic, they'd use up 30 minutes of the show driving around looking for a space. . . . Another thing about TV movies is the maddening number of ads when they break into the story. Sometimes there are as many as 12 or 13 ads in a row. Except they break in, once, saying, "The ABC Sunday Night Movie will resume in just a moment," meaning you still have time for a trip to the bathroom and refrigerator before the story continues. Someone named Ellen DeGeneres is credited with saying this: "My grandmother started walking five miles a day when she was 60. She's 95 now and we don't know where the heck she is."

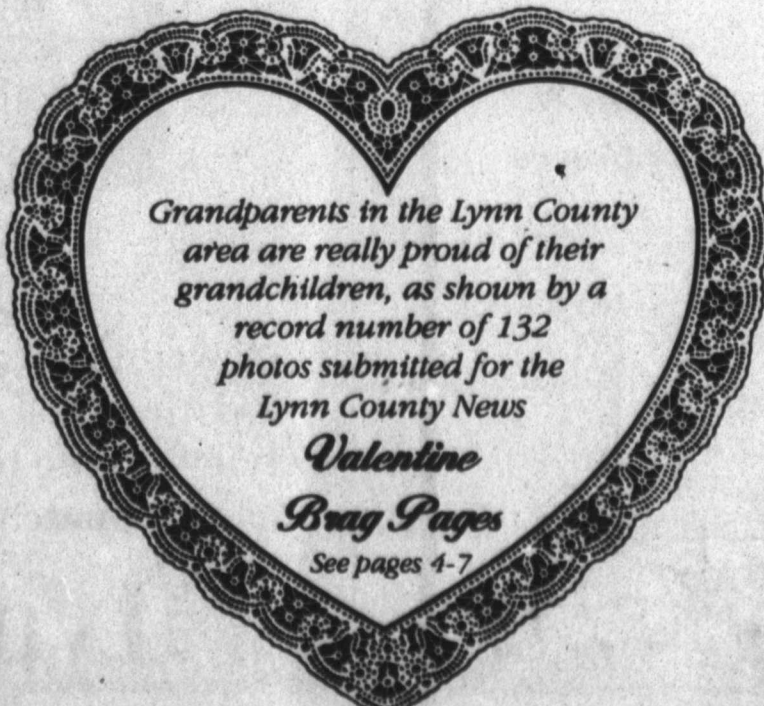
O'Donnell Clinic To Open Monday

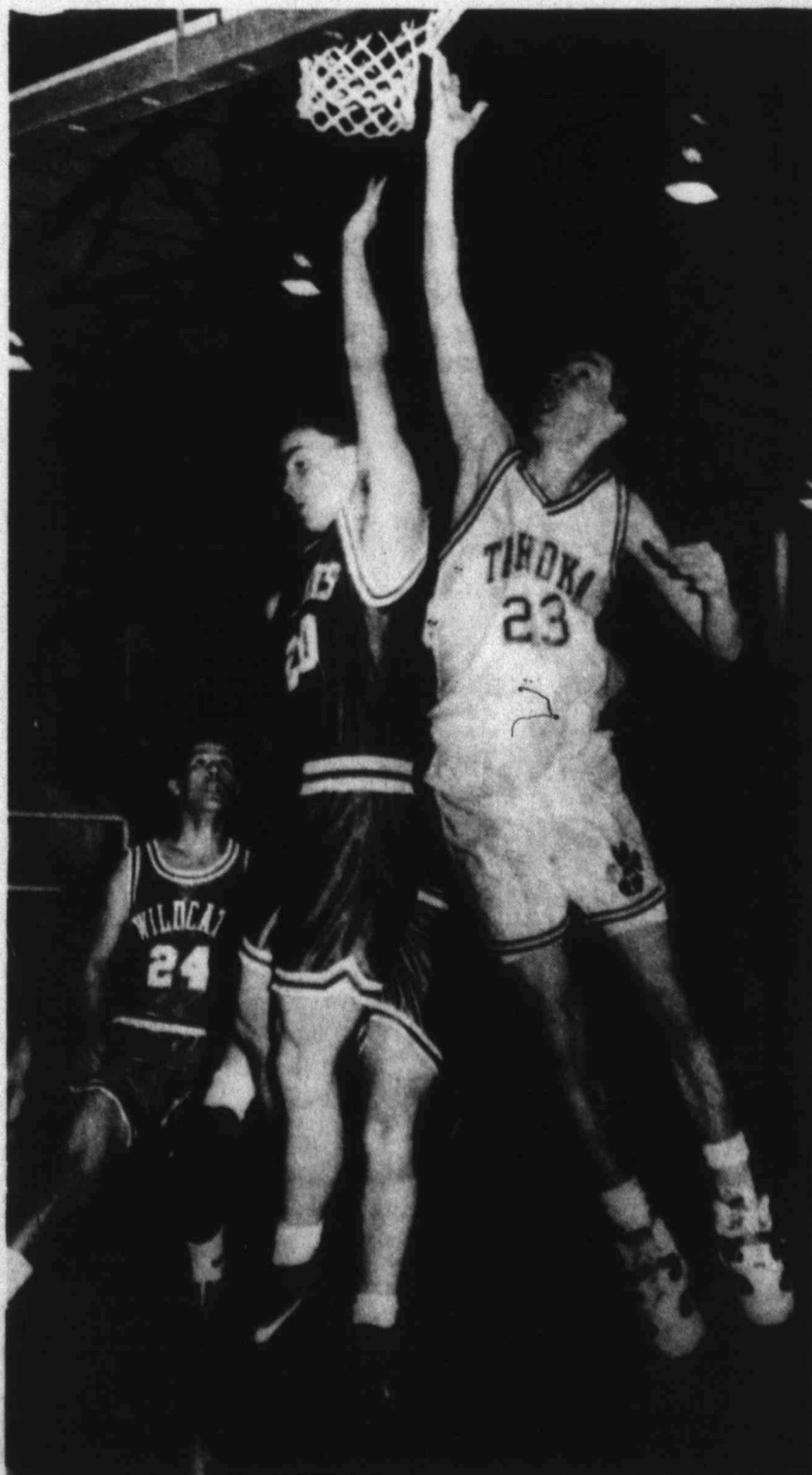
An official Open House for the new clinic will be held in the near future, with more information available at a later date.

Clinic hours are 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Mondays and Wednesdays, 9 a.m.-7 p.m. Tuesdays and Thursdays, and 9 a.m.-12 noon Fridays.

The clinic has two examining rooms, a trauma room, office and waiting areas, and is equipped to handle minor medical emergencies as well as other healthcare needs, inoculations, and allergy shots.

BPA Students Capture 52 Awards; 22 THS Students Headed For State

The 1994 Regional Business Professionals of America Leadership Conference was a huge success for both Tahoka High School chapters, with a combined total of 32 students bringing home 52 awards, and 22 students qualifying for state competition.

Mrs. Barbara Jaquess, sponsor for one of the chapters, entered 19 students in competition and had 100% winners. Each competitor won at least one award and one student, Ginger Malone, won 6 awards. This regional competition was held in Pampa on Saturday, Feb. 5, with 24 schools competing. Mrs. Jaquess' chapter brought home 37 awards from the 19 students.

Five 3rd place awards went to: Jill Jaquess, Data Specialist; Katy Huffaker, Employment Skills A; Felicia Davis, Business Law; Conner Krey, Business Math; Shannon Garvin, Personal Finance.

Seven 4th place awards were received by: Kelly Wells, Information Processing Specialist; Alice Pena, Document Formatting; Angel Knox, Computer-Aided Graphics; Katy Huffaker, Business Knowledge Skills; Miranda Martin, Business

Students receiving sixth place awards were Conner Krey in Business Knowledge Skills, Ginger Malone in Business Law and Jill Jaquess in Proofreading/Editing.

Twelve of these 19 students will be competing in state competition March 3-5 in Dallas.

"It was very exciting during the awards assembly as they kept calling Tahoka as a winner. The students set two records at this regional competition. First, this is the only year we have had 100% winners and second, the students won more awards than ever before. Until this year, the most awards we had won was 27, so we increased that by 10. It was a great feeling of accomplishment as these students worked hard as individuals and supported each other as a team. I am extremely proud of them," said Mrs. Jaquess.

The BPA Chapter 2 sponsored by Angela Ehlers and Valli Fell received eight individual awards and two team awards by 13 students. Ten students will be advancing to State competition in Dallas March 3-5.

Wesley Solomon placed 5th in Parliamentary Procedure Individual.

Placing 6th were Wesley Solomon, Desktop Publishing; Darla Willis, Employment Skills B; and Drew Stone, Parliamentary Procedure Individual.

Other BPA members competed in the following events: Marisa Martin, Keyboarding; Drew Stone, Computer Aided Graphics; Justin Pena, Document Formatting; and Martin Gill, Employment Skills A.

BPA is a co-curricular club for high school students who are enrolled in business or office education classes. Mrs. Angela Ehlers is currently in her third year and Mrs. Valli Fell is in her first year of sponsoring students in BPA competition.

All students receiving 1st or 2nd place will go to State Competition along with Lee Rash, International Business and Justin Whitley, Computer Assistant.

Mrs. Ehlers stated, "I am extremely proud of what our students accomplished at area competition. The BPA competition provides opportunities for our students to find success through skills acquired in a classroom setting."

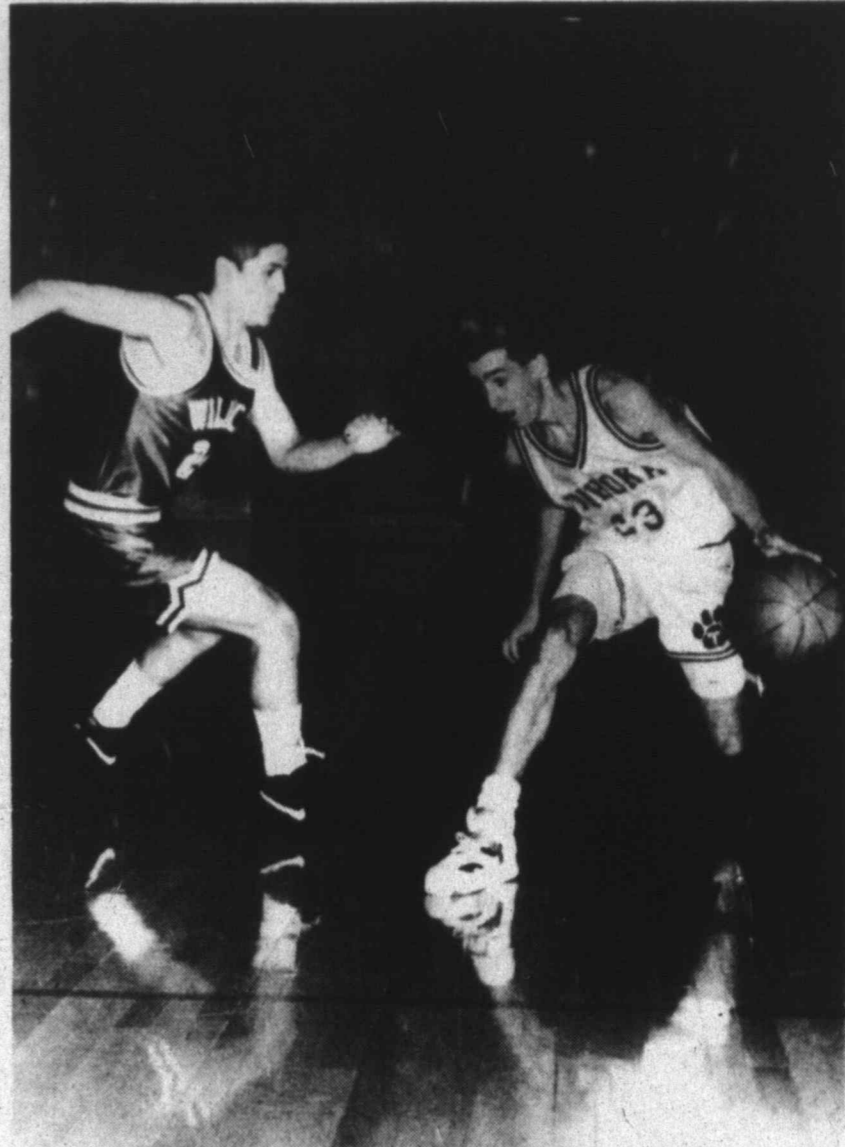

A questionable firm may require an upfront fee of as much as \$10,000 and a percentage of the royalties the invention may earn. A reputable company typically does not rely on large upfront fees. Instead, it will rely on the royalties from the successful licensing of client inventions, and therefore, will be very selective about which ideas and inventions it pursues. 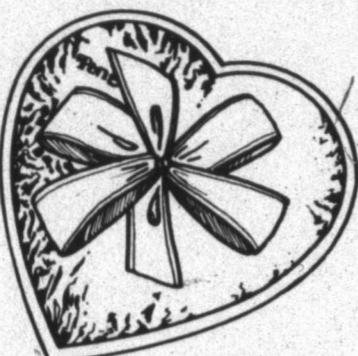

One of my favorite humor columnists, Lewis Grizzard, wrote a nostalgic column recently about the loss of his dog named Catfish, and how sorely he missed his dog even two months after the dog's death. This made me think of my own dog, named Suzie (it's a dumb girl's name, I know, and not anywhere near as unique as "Catfish"), and various other dogs with equally dumb names we have had throughout the years.

When I was a kid, we had dogs named Shorty, Wags, Blackie, Fido, Nosy, Heidi, Spot, and Baron Von Hindenburg (a little blitty dachshund who was stolen out of our back yard after we'd had him only a few days). We also had some rabbits named Floppy and Hoppy and two baby pink ducks which our neighbor gave us for Easter, which we eventually called Salt and Pepper and gave away to a farmer with a pond.

That same neighbor gave us pink baby chicks another time for Easter, too, and probably would have continued to give us some form of pastel-colored baby animals except for that fact that Mom threatened to "pluck his feathers" if he didn't stop giving us farm animals (we lived in town).

And what are some of my fond memories of these animals?

• Floppy was the biggest, meanest, ornery old bunny ever to chew on a carrot, and he dominated that back yard when we let him out of his cage. We came out in the yard one evening and found him sitting placidly on top of the dog, Wags, who was about as wide as she was tall and too lazy to mind if a fat rabbit sat on her back.

• Wags had a litter of puppies when we were on a car trip once. She didn't actually have them in the car, thank goodness. The way I remember it, we were moving to another town and had brought the dog on our last trip, hoping that she would hold off until we got to our new home. She didn't. We stopped at a farm house on the way, and just barely managed to grab her before she found an opening underneath their house to dash into, and waited around until all the puppies were born. The friendly farmer and his wife gave us a cardboard box to carry the litter of newborns with us on our way.

• Nosy was a hound dog who liked to jump on top of his doghouse and look over the fence to see what was going on in the neighborhood. One evening, our neighbor (the same one who gave us the chickens and ducks, so he probably deserved it) was mowing his lawn and happened to pass by the fence where Nosy was watching and waiting. Nosy reached out his tongue and licked the unsuspecting neighbor in his face as he passed by, causing what is known as a "conniption fit" and sending the lawn mower into panic mode speed.

Trouble. That'd be a good name for a dog, wouldn't it? I may change Suzie's name to Trouble ... it has such a nice ring to it.



6,433 Center Pivot Sprinkler Systems Operating Within 15-County Area

An additional 1,507 center pivot irrigation systems have been put into operation between 1990 and 1993 within the 15-county High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 service area, according to a recent pivot inventory update by the District. This brings the total number of center pivot sprinklers in use in the District to 6,433.

The current tally shows Parmer County with 1,258 center pivots; Lamb County, 1,250; Castro County, 786; Bailey County, 671; and Hale County, 604.

The total in other counties in the District is Deaf Smith, 433; Haskell, 349; Cochran, 347; Lubbock, 304; Lynn, 170; Crosby, 141; Floyd, 78; Randall, 39; Potter, 3; and Armstrong, 0.

The largest increase in center pivot use from 1990-1993 was found in Castro County where 230 new pivots were installed. This is followed by Hale County with 216; Parmer County, 197; Lamb County, 185; Lubbock County, 135; Deaf Smith, 109; Cochran County, 104; and Lynn County, 60.

"Given an average price of \$45 million dollar water conservation investment by irrigators within the Water District service area during the past three years," says A. Wayne Wyatt, High Plains Water District Manager.

Many producers have upgraded their irrigation systems to Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) center pivot systems, which can achieve an irrigation application efficiency of up to 95 percent. Since the water is applied at low pressure directly into the furrow, water losses associated with wind drift and evaporation are virtually eliminated.

In addition, use of a LEPA system can reduce labor costs, reduce fuel costs from 35 to 50 percent, and save from 20 to 40 percent of the water previously pumped for irrigation when compared to conventional furrow irrigation.

High Plains Water District Engineer Technicians Glenn Blackmon and Arnold Husky used county aerial photographs to locate each center pivot for the 1993 update.

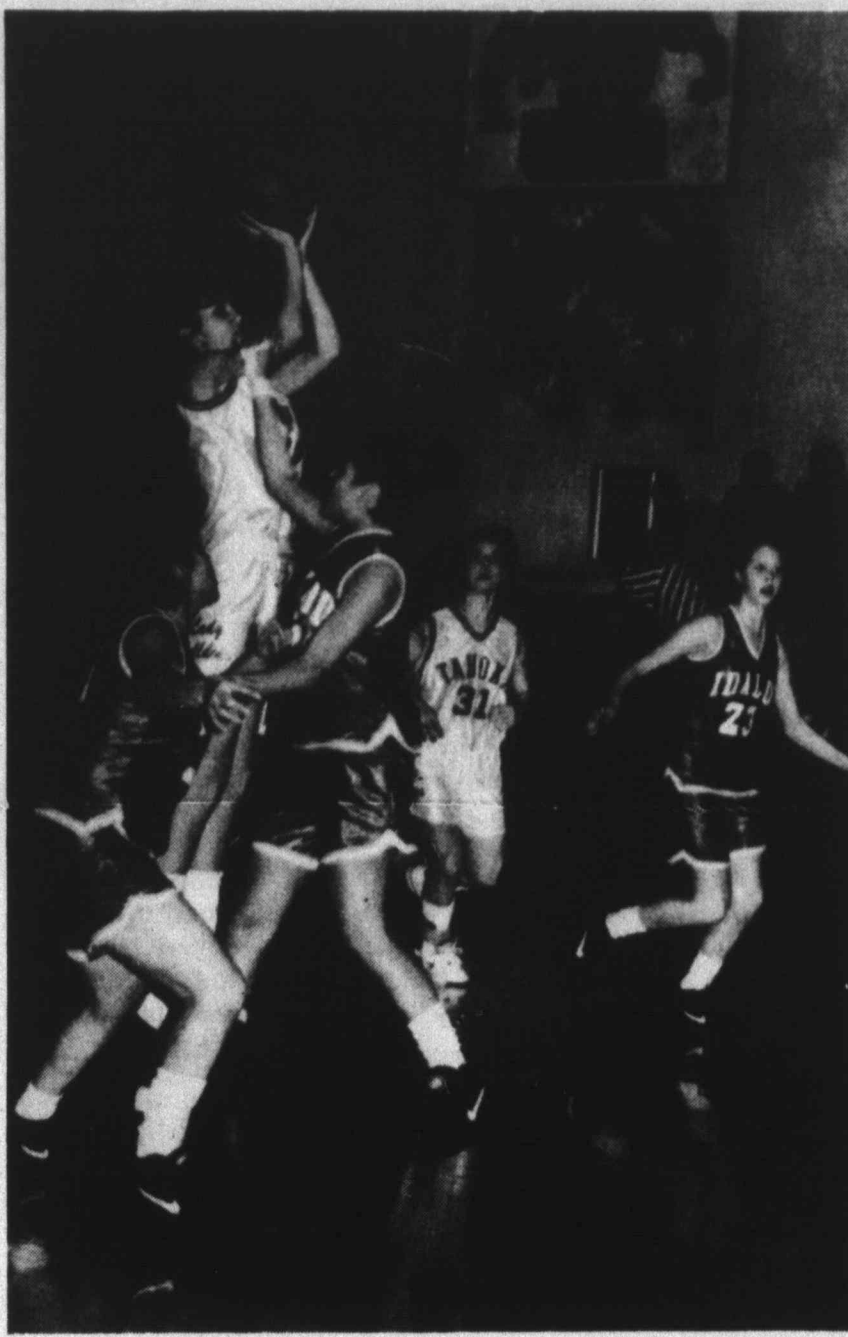

LUBBOCK, Friday, February 4, 1994

Following the announcement of final marketing figures for calendar year 1993 Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers says the final 1993 Upland Cotton Deficiency Payment rate will be 18.6 cents per pound.

USDA has not officially announced the final payment rate, however, county ASCS offices have received the information and are in the process of printing checks to be mailed the week of February 7. It is expected that official word of the payment rate will come in the next few days.

"Based on an 18.6 cent final payment rate producers who asked for, and received, the 10.275 cent advance payment will receive a final payment of 8.3 cents per pound," notes Donald Johnson, PCG Executive Vice President. "Coming on the heels of an excellent 1993 crop, the final payment should really help producers establish a firm financial basis for the 1994 crop."

Upland cotton deficiency payments are calculated as the lesser of the difference between either the 52.35 cent 1993 cotton loan rate or the weighted average price received by producers from January through December and the 72.9 cent target price set by the Secretary of Agriculture. The maximum possible deficiency payment rate for 1993 is 20.55 cents per pound.

PCG's calculations are based on final upland cotton marketing statistics released January 31 by the National Agricultural Statistics Service. The figures showed December marketings totaled 3.063 million bales. The weighted average price received by farmers in December totaled 57.1 cents.

Final marketings for 1993 totaled 14.509 million bales. The weighted average price received by farmers settled at 54.3 cents per pound for the year.

PCG officials also note that USDA has not announced all of the provisions that will make up the 1994 cotton program. Final word is expected in the next week to ten days.

Advertising in the South Plains will come under the scrutiny of the Better Business Bureau (BBB) and its Local Advertising Review Committee (LARC) which is made up of equal numbers of advertisers, advertising agencies and consumers who volunteer their time. The committee will be divided into three panels who will review cases brought to them by the BBB as well as offers opinions about advertising practices. The BBB receives complaints not only from consumers, but from business competitors who have questions or problems with advertising.

The Local Advertising Review Program (LARP) is co-sponsored by the Lubbock Advertising Federation which is the trade organization for advertisers, advertising agencies and educators whose mission is to uphold the integrity of and maintain ethical advertising practices in the marketplace.

Social Security Services Are Free

Do you know that all Social Security services are free? Do you know that there are organizations that attempt to charge individuals for Social Security-related services? Social Security headquarters in Baltimore, Maryland receives hundreds of letters weekly from individuals across the country expressing confusion over such mailings.

If you are a senior citizen, you may be a target for special interest groups who ask for money because they claim the Social Security system is in serious financial trouble or that Social Security's trust funds are being mishandled. These groups are entitled to their opinions and can solicit contributions in order to pay lobbyists to voice those opinions to Congress. But you do not have to respond if you find their requests for donations misleading and troublesome.

If you have recently been married, you may be the target of another deceptive mailing practice. There are direct mail advertisers who offer to change your name on Social Security records for a fee. If you ask us to change your name on your Social Security records, we will do it for free.

If you are the parent of a newborn,

there are businesses that offer to get a Social Security number for your children for a fee when all they generally do is send you the form and ask you to return it to Social Security. If you get the form directly from us, the services are free.

Should a direct mail advertiser imply that they are in any way connected with or working for the government or the Social Security Administration, that organization is breaking the law and you should refer the advertiser to the authorities.

If you think you are being harassed by direct mail solicitations, or if you receive an offer from a private organization that implies a connection to the government, you should refer the complete mailing, including the envelope to: Social Security Administration, Office of Public Affairs, Misleading Information, PO Box 17740, Baltimore, MD 21235.

If it's more convenient, you can take the entire package to your local postmaster, or send a complaint that includes the package to the: Chief Postal Inspector, United States Postal Service, 475 L'Enfant Plaza SW, Washington, D.C. 20260-2100.

You also should advise the Texas Attorney General's office or the Consumer Affairs Office and the local Better Business Bureau.
