### **City Delays Action On Fire** Dept. Addition, Water Plan

Tahoka City Council Monday night decided to delay action on a ment quarters, after receiving just one bid on the project.

City Manager Barry Pittman explained that the council's action did not necessarily mean that the city won't eventually accept the bid of Braddock Construction and Welding to build the addition for \$32,450, but that the council wanted to look further into the costs of possibly building a separate structure to hold the fire trucks and equipment.

The council also delayed action on taking part in a Canadian River water project which would cost the city an additional 20 cents per 1,000 gallons of water received from the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority, and would eventually cost the city's water customers more than they now are paying.

John Williams, general manager of CRMWA, and Vernon Jones, the proposed addition to the fire depart- city's representative to the authority, also were present Monday night.

> The water authority is considering an "alternate water" project which would blend well water from Roberts County, north of Pampa, with the water from Lake Mcredith so that the water sent into the system to cities south of the lake will meet government standards for health and purity. All cities on the system would pay pro rata portions of the cost, and for Tahoka, this would mean the cost of water delivered here would rise from 48 cents per 1,000 gallons to 68 cents.

It would mean purer water in the system here, but one reason the council delayed action is that the city, although paying for more water than it now receives, can not be delivered the amount of water it would be paying for. In other words, the city would

be paying for water it can't get. One possible option would be to sell the excess water to Lubbock or some city on the system north of here, and the city wants to look at this alternative.


When asked if the city could not just purify the water supply here by using more well water, Pittman said the city's well water is not as pure as the Canadian River water, so far as meeting government standards is con-

One advantage to accepting the alternate water plan is that the costs would include the city's share of paying for a desalinization project already underway to get some of the salt out of the Canadian River water.

Councilmen did approve seeking bids on seal coating some of the city's streets, with \$30,000 budgeted for the program. Also approved were an 8-year financing plan for new fire trucks and equipment through First National Bank of Tahoka, and changing a block of N. 2nd St. to one-way going west, between Avenues O and P during school hours, effective Feb.

Police Chief Jerry Webster reported on his department's activities in January.

All council members and Mayor Jim Solomon were present, plus city attorney Cal Huffaker, Williams, Webster and Jones.


#### O'Donnell Clinic **To Open Monday**


An official Open House for the new clinic will be held in the near future, with more information available at a later date.

Clinic hours are 9 a.m.-5 p.m. Mondays and Wednesdays, 9 a.m.-7 p.m. Teesdays and Thursdays, and 9 a.m.-12 noon Fridays.

The clinic has two examining rooms, a trauma room, office and waiting areas, and is equipped to handle minor medical emergencies as well as other healthcare needs, inoculations, and allergy shots.


grounds), a catalog to tell you where to get other catalogs, and a catalog on fashions for big and tall men.



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One of my favorite humor columnists, Lewis Grizzard, wrote a nostalgic column recently about the loss of his dog named Catfish, and how sorely he missed his dog even two months after the dog's death.

This made me think of my own dog, named Suzie (it's a dumb girl's name, I know, and not anywhere near as unique as "Catfish"), and various other dogs with equally dumb names we have had throughout

When I was a kid, we had dogs named Shorty, Wags, Blackie, Fido, Nosy, Heidi, Spot, and Baron Von Hindenburg (a little bitty dachshund who was stolen out of our back yard after we'd had him only a few days). And what are some of my fond memories of these animals? Floppy was the biggest, meanest, orneriest old bunny ever to

chew on a carrot, and he dominated that back yard when we let him out of his cage. We came out in the yard one evening and found him sitting placidly on top of the dog, Wags, who was about as wide as she was tall and too lazy to mind if a fat rabbit sat on her back.

• Wags had a litter of puppies when we were on a car trip once. She didn't actually have them in the car, thank goodness. The way I remember it, we were moving to another town and had brought the dog on our last trip, hoping that she would hold off until we got to our new home. She didn't. We stopped at a farm house on the way, and just barely managed to grab her before she found an opening underneath their house to dash into, and waited around until all the puppies were born. The friendly farmer and his wife gave us a cardboard box to carry the litter of newborns with us on our way.

 Nosy was a hound dog who liked to jump on top of his doghouse and look over the fence to see what was going on in the neighborhood. One evening, our neighbor (the same one who gave us the chickens and ducks, so he probably deserved it) was moving his lawn and happened to pass by the fence where Nosy was watching and waiting. Nosy reached out his tongue and licked the unsuspecting neighbor in his face as he passed by, causing what is known as a "conniption fit" and sending the lawn mower into panic mode speed.

Nosy was a pretty dumb dog, who would look surprised when the lily pads at the pond we visited regularly turned out to have, amazingly, water underneath them every time he jumped in. He would jump to those lily pads, thinking there was ground underneath, and have the most idiotic expression on his face when he came up sputtering water and looking at us as if to say, "Who did that?"

· Heidi was a dachshund who used to run like crazy and jump anto our dining room chairs, only the chairs were polished wood and she'd just slide ride across and onto the floor, no matter how frantically she tried to put on the brakes. She used to sleep on top of the heater vents in the floor which radiated heat at temperatures upwards of 2000 degrees, it seemed, but she never once burned herself.

All of these dogs were a vital part of my childhood days, and were my companions, my friends, my defenders, and at times, the best of listeners who never revealed all the whispered secrets of a little girl's dreams. I can remember only a few years since then when we haven't had a family dog, even though every time one dies we say we're not getting another one because they're so much trouble.

Trouble. That'd be a good name for a dog, wouldn't it? I may change Suzie's name to Trouble ... it has such a nice ring to it.



#### 6,433 Center Pivot Sprinkler Systems Operating Within 15-County Area

An additional 1,507 center pivot irrigation systems have been put into operation between 1990 and 1993 within the 15-county High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 service area, according to a recent pivot inventory update by the District. This brings the total number of center pivot sprinklers in use in the District to 6,433.

The current tally shows Parmer County with 1,258 center pivots; Lamb County, 1,250; Castro County, 786; Bailey County, 671; and Hale County, 604.

The total in other counties in the District is Deaf Smith, 433; Hockley, 349; Cochran, 347; Lubbock, 304; Lynn, 170; Crosby, 141; Floyd, 78; Randall, 39; Potter, 3; and Armstrong,

The largest increase in center pivot use from 1990-1993 was found in Castro County where 230 new pivots were installed. This is followed by Hale County with 216; Parmer County, 197; Lamb County, 185; Lubbock County, 135; Deaf Smith, 109; Cochran County, 104; and Lynn County, 60.

"Given an average price of \$45 million dollar water conservation investment by irrigators within the Water District service area during the past three years," says A. Wayne Wyatt, High Plains Water District Manager.

Many producers have upgraded their irrigation systems to Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) center pivot systems, which can achieve an irrigation application efficiency of up to 95 percent. Since the water is applied at low pressure directly into the furrow, water losses associated with wind drift and evaporation are virtually eliminated.

In addition, use of a LEPA system can reduce labor costs, reduce fuel costs from 35 to 50 percent, and save. from 20 to 40 percent of the water previously pumped for irrigationwhen compared to conventional furrow irrigation.

High Plains Water District Engineer Technicians Glenn Blackmon and Arnold Husky used county aerial photographs to locate each center pivot for the 1993 update.



Following the announcement of final marketing figures for calendar year 1993 Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers says the final 1993 Upland Cotton Deficiency Payment rate will be 18.6 cents per pound.

USDA has not officially announced the final payment rate, however, county ASCS offices have received the information and are in the process of printing checks to be mailed the week of February 7. It is expected that official word of the payment rate will come in the next few days.

"Based on an 18.6 cent final payment rate producers who asked for, and received, the 10.275 cent advance payment will receive a final payment of 8.3 cents per pound," notes Donald Johnson, PCG Executive Vice President. "Coming on the heels of an excellent 1993 crop, the final payment should really help producers establish a firm financial basis for the 1994 crop."

Upland cotton deficiency payments are calculated as the lesser of the difference between either the 52.35 cent 1993 cotton loan rate or the weighted average price received by producers from January through December and the 72.9 cent target price set by the Secretary of Agriculture. The maximum possible deficiency payment rate for 1993 is 20.55 cents per pound.

PCG's calculations are based on final upland cotton marketing statistics released January 31 by the National Agricultural Statistics Service. The figures showed December marketings totaled 3.063 million bales. The weighted average price received by farmers in December totaled 57.1 cents.

Final marketings for 1993 totaled 14.509 million bales. The weighted average price received by farmers settled at 54.3 cents per pound for the year.

PCG officials also note that USDA has not announced all of the provisions that will make up the 1994 cotton program. Final word is expected in the next week to ten days.

Advertising in the South Plains will come under the scrutiny of the Better Business Bureau (BBB) and its Local Advertising Review Committee (LARC) which is made up of equal numbers of advertisers, advertising agencies and consumers who volunteer their time. The committee will be divided into three panels who will review cases brought to them by the BBB as well as offers opinions about advertising practices. The BBB receives complains not only from consumers, but from business competitors who have questions or problems with advertising.

The Local Advertising Review Program (LARP) is co-sponsored by the Lubbock Advertising Federation which is the trade organization for advertisers, advertising agencies and educators whose mission is to uphold the integrity of and maintain ethical advertising practices in the marketplace. #### Social Security Services Are Free

Social Security Manager, Lubbock Do you know that all Social Security services are free? Do you know that there are organizations that attempt to charge individuals for Social Security-related services? Social Security headquarters in Baltimore, Maryland receives hundreds of letters weekly from individuals across the country expressing confusion over such mailings.

If you are a senior citizen, you may be a target for special interest groups who ask for money because they claim the Social Security system is in serious financial trouble or that Social Security's trust funds are being mishandled. These groups are entitled to their opinions and can solicit contributions in order to pay lobbyists to voice those opinions to Congress. But you do not have to respond if you find their requests for donations misleading and trouble-

If you have recently been married, you may be the target of another deceptive mailing practice. There are direct mail advertisers who offer to change your name on Social Security records for a fee. If you ask us to change your name on your Social Security records, we will do it for

If you are the parent of a newborn,

there are businesses that offer to get a Social Security number for your children for a fee when all they generally do is send you the form and ask you to return it to Social Security. If you get the form directly from us, the services are free.

Should a direct mail advertiser imply that they are in any way connected with or working for the government or the Social Security Administration, that organization is breaking the law and you should refer the advertiser to the authorities.

If you think you are being harassed by direct mail solicitations, or if you receive an offer from a private organization that implies a connection to the government, you should refer the complete mailing, including the envelope to: Social Security Administration, Office of Public Affairs, Misleading Information, PO Box 17740, Baltimore, MD 21235.

If it's more convenient, you can take the entire package to your local postmaster, or send a complaint that includes the package to the: Chief Postal Inspector, United States Postal Service, 475 L'Enfant Plaza SW, Washington, D.C. 20260-2100.

You also should advise the Texas Attorney General's office or the Consumer Affairs Office and the local Better Business Bureau.
