New Home Cage Teams To Start Playoff Drive

New Home boys and girls basketball teams have earned the right to get into the bi-district playoffs, with the boys team coached by Curry Blackwell winning first place in District 11-A. They will take on Klondike for bi-district next Friday, Feb. 25, with the time and place not determined by press time.

The Lady Leopards, coached by Nyle Field, placed second in district, and will play Sands this Friday, Feb. 18 for bi-district. The time and place for this game was not determined by press time Wednesday morning.

The final regular season game for the Leopards, against Meadow, was the only loss of the district season for the boys. Meadow won the game Feb. 8 despite 18 points by New Home's Channing Crisler. On Feb. 4

the Leopards had clinched district by beating Wellman.

On the same night, the junior varsity boys, coached by Dickie Turner, wound up a 7-0 district record by beating Meadow 59-28. Nick Tyler had 22 points and Dustin Ward 18, each hitting four 3-pointers. Mike Peck had 8 points.

The Lady Leopards beat Wellman Feb. 4, but took a 98-24 walloping from Meadow in the final regular season game. Kara Askew and Trish Rodriguez each had 8 points.

Junior high teams played Meadow Feb. 7, with the girls winning district after beating Meadow in overtime, 30-29. Kriston Durham was high scorer with 22 points. The boys lost their game.

Tahoka Girl Is Injured In Wreck

A 16-year-old Lynn County girl was injured Tuesday night as the car she was driving overturned twice on a county dirt road 7.7 miles northeast of Tahoka.

Heather Marie Metcalf of Rt. 4, Tahoka, was taken to Lynn County Hospital where she was kept overnight for treatment of a hip injury. She was headed for her home when the 1990 Plymouth Acclaim went out of control and rolled over.

Mary Ellen Walker of Wolforth reported that someone had stolen 540 feet of 4-inch aluminum pipe from a location in Lynn County about 6 miles northwest of the intersection of FM 179 and Fm 211 in January.

Carla Moore of Lubbock reported that a residence on N. 4th St. in Tahoka had been burglarized over the weekend. A telephone, GE 19-inch color TV and a toaster were missing. They were valued at \$335. Tahoka Police Dept. investigated that report.

Sheriff's officers took a report of criminal mischief from the owner of a 1985 Chevrolet Blazer which had been damaged Friday night or Saturday after it developed mechanical trouble and had been left by the road on FM 400 north of Wilson. Someone apparently used some object to break windows, lights and dent the vehicle which was owned by Frederick Derome Robinson of Lubbock. Damage was estimated at \$1,883.

In jail during the week were four persons for public intoxication, plus one each on the following charges: Driving while intoxicated subsequent offense plus driving while license suspended, no drivers license, delivery of a controlled substance (for Lubbock County), assault on a family member, judgement and sentencing of possession of marijuana, judgement and sentencing on DWI subsequent, DWI first offense plus driving while license suspended, traffic offense plus failure to appear, no liability insurance plus failure to appear, and failure to identify to a peace officer.

Trustees Eye Classroom Additions, T.I.S.D. Administrative Contracts

Administrative contracts for Tahoka Independent School District were discussed Thursday night, as well as a construction project for the elementary campus, district health insurance, and the upcoming school board election.

In regular session, TISD trustees voted 7-0 to table action on High School Principal Charles Cate's contract, which expires this school year. Superintendent Dr. Duane Carter recommended to the board that Cate's contract be renewed for the 1994-95 school year. The action by the board means that the principal's contract will be tabled until a later date.

Trustees took no action on contracts for Middle School Principal Ronald Roberts and Elementary Principal Molly Helmlinger, because both have a year remaining on their contracts through the end of the 1994-95 school year. A "no action" by the board is an automatic renewal of their contracts.

The board unanimously approved renewing two other contracts for a year, one for Minnie Lou Ash, Assistant to the Superintendent, and one for Sherri McCord, the district's counselor.

The superintendent's contract was not an agenda item, since Dr. Carter had notified the board earlier in the year of his intent to resign at the end of this school year. Trustees are currently in the process of a superintendent search, and plan to begin interviewing applicants for that position at the end of March.

In other business, trustees voted unanimously to seek bids on a construction project for the elementary campus which would add two new classrooms adjacent to the elementary library. The estimated cost of the project is approximately \$100,000. The decision was made following months of discussion on how to alleviate overcrowding on the elementary campus. If the board approves a bid for construction, funds for this project will come from the district's

capital improvement fund and will not require a bond election. Trustees voted to continue the district's health insurance plan with Blue Cross/Blue Shield, approved monthly bills, and ordered the school board election for May 7, naming Dean Bartley as election judge, Donna Brooks as alternate judge, and City Manager Barry Pitman as early

Signups For School, City Elections Begin Monday

City and school elections for Tahoka, Wilson, O'Donnell and New Home are scheduled for May 7, 1994, with a signup time period being February 21-March 3. Candidates interested in filing should contact the respective city and school officials.

In Tahoka, city councilmen Dayton Parker, Wayne Tekell, and Joe Calvillo have terms up for election. All are two year terms.

According to City Manager Barry Pitman, the length of the terms for Tahoka city councilmen may not be the full two years due to a civil law suit against the city. The suit states that Tahoka must be divided up among voting districts, with a representative on the council from each district.

However, since the redistricting process is not yet complete, the city must continue with a regular election. That means that by March 23 the city must determine if those elected on May 7 will serve the full term, or just serve until the city is divided into

single-member districts and another vote can take place.

Tahoka I.S.D. trustees Greg Henley and Mike Huffaker are ending their three-year terms on the school board.

On the New Home City Council, Louis Rodriguez, Dale Clem and Stony Gill all have two-year terms expiring this year.

New Home I.S.D. trustees whose terms expire this year are Stacy Gill and David Foerster.

Mayor David M. Smith and city councilpersons Bill Clopton and Stella Arguello all have two-year terms up this year in O'Donnell.

Also, O'Donnell trustees Sharron Gass and Renn Dorman have three-year terms expiring on the school board.

Wilson's mayor, Jackie Bishop, and city councilmen, Oscar Follis and David Cook all have two-year terms expiring this year.

Finally, the three-year terms of trustees Dan Cook and Keith Wied of Wilson I.S.D. are expiring this year.

Couple To Celebrate 60th Anniversary

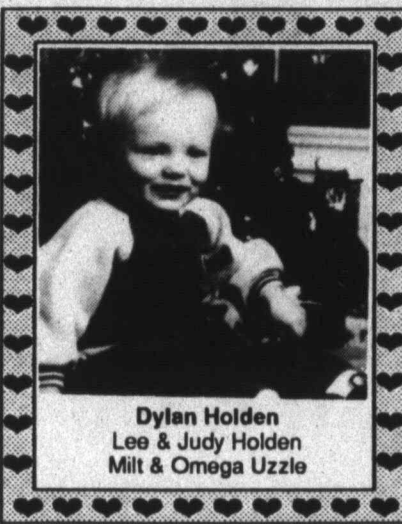

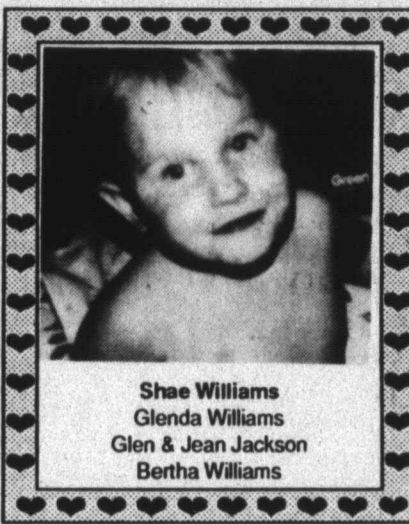

voting judge. The terms of two trustees, Greg Henley and Mike Huffaker, are up for election this year. Signup period for the election is Feb. 21-March 23.

Redistricting Process

Tied Up In Courts

Although school trustees had planned for the May 7, 1994 school election to fall under the new redistricting plan, Dr. Carter informed the board Thursday night that the 5-2 single member district plan is still tied up in the judicial system and will not be approved in time for this year's election. This means that the May 7 election of two trustees for the Tahoka school board will be conducted the same as in years past, with the two candidates who receive the most number of votes being named to the board.

T.I.S.D. submitted a 5-2 single member district plan to the United States Department of Justice in early December, 1993, with hopes of implementing the new process in this year's trustee election.

The plan carves up the area within the Tahoka Independent School District into five separate precincts, with two of those precincts containing a majority of minority populations. Five single-member district trustees would be elected (one from each precinct) and two trustees would be elected at-large. Only voters residing within the precincts would be able to vote in that precinct's trustee election, but all registered voters in the school district's area would be eligible to vote for at-large trustees.

If the redistricting plan is approved by the Justice Department, it will be implemented in the 1995 school trustee election.

The next regularly scheduled school board meeting will be Thursday, March 3. All seven trustees were present at last Thursday night's meeting, which adjourned at 10:30 p.m. Also present were several visitors for the open forum session.

Mrs. Barbara Jaquess, sponsor for the Business Professionals of America organization at THS, spoke about her students' accomplishments at the regional BPA Leadership Conference and had several students relate their experiences. Board President Greg Henley commended the students for their accomplishments, many of whom qualified for state competition.

Also speaking during open forum were high school students Greg Smith and John Quintanilla, who made short statements in support of the high school principal.

Commissioners Approve Audit, Two Copiers For County Offices

Lynn County Commissioners in regular session Monday morning approved the audit report on the Lynn County Sheriff's Department Operating Account, okayed the purchase of two new copiers, and conducted other routine business.

The special audit, at a cost of about \$1,000 to the county, was requested by Sheriff Jake Diggs for the period from January through October, 1993. Representatives from Love, Hays & Reeger presented the audit to the court two weeks ago, and in Monday's meeting commissioners unanimously approved the audit report.

The court approved the purchase of two new copiers for the county, one for use in the courthouse and one for the county extension office, and said the copier currently in use in the courthouse would be placed in the sheriff's department.

Commissioners approved deputa-

tion for temporary help in the District Clerk's office, and examined and approved county officials reports.

Sheriff Jake Diggs asked commissioners to consider allowing the Sheriff's Department to trade in two 1986 Ford cars for one new vehicle with some of the funds raised from housing prisoners from Dawson County.

Treasurer Janet Porterfield reported that over \$7,000 in one month was added to county coffers according to last month's figures from housing prisoners from Dawson County at the Lynn County Jail, and that although the funds went into the general account they were not budgeted for any special purpose. Commissioners agreed to put an agenda item concerning his request on the next regular meeting.

All four commissioners were present, as well as other county officials.

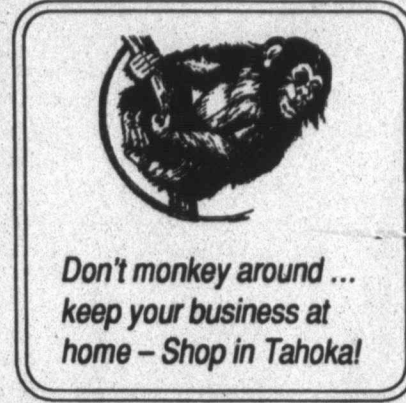

February Sales Tax Rebates Sent

State Comptroller John Sharp delivered \$220 million in monthly sales tax rebates to 1,075 Texas cities and 111 counties.

Lynn County received \$12,122,48 for this period. This was a 40.80% decrease from last year's comparable payment of \$20,479.28.

O'Donnell received \$2,595,80, a 59.15% decrease from last year's payment of \$6,354.60. Tahoka received \$8,432.25, a 12.65% decrease from last year's payment of \$9,654.21. Wilson received \$1,094.43, a 75.51% decrease from last year's payment of \$4,470.47.

4"-10" Of Moisture Needed To Bring Lynn County Soils To Field Capacity

Lynn County producers within the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 need four to ten inches of water from precipitation and/or irrigation to bring the five foot root zone soil profile to field capacity before the 1994 spring plant-

ing, according to pre-plant soil moisture survey data released by the Water District and the USDA-Soil Conservation Service (USDA-SCS).

Soil moisture readings are taken by lowering a neutron probe into a permanently-installed aluminum access tube at each monitoring site in the Water District. These sites are chosen based upon the soil type, the variations in the saturated thickness of the Ogallala Aquifer which indicates possible well yields, and typical farming operations in the area.

Soil moisture sites were also analyzed by crop type. For cotton, soil moisture readings indicate an average of 0.20 inches per foot in the top three feet, increasing to 0.70 inches at the five foot depth.

Sorghum shows an average of 0.35 inches of available soil moisture per foot in the top three feet, increasing to 0.75 in the next two feet. Wheat shows 0.70 inches available in the top foot of the soil, 0.40 inches at the three foot level, and 0.70 inches at the five foot layer.

Corn has the highest available soil moisture due to irrigation. The top foot of the soil shows 0.90 inches of available soil moisture, 0.60 at the three foot level, and 1.10 inches at the four and five foot levels.

Generally, each food of soil holds two inches of soil moisture or a total of about 10 inches in the five foot root zone soil profile.

Data was collected at the Lynn County soil moisture sites in early-December. Since then, very little precipitation has fallen to replenish the soil moisture. Recent snows have added small amounts of moisture, but farmers are encouraged to check moisture conditions at the two and three foot levels.

Historical data shows that above-average crop yields are more likely when the five foot root zone soil profile is at or near field capacity at planting. Any precipitation received between now and the start of planting will improve soil moisture conditions and influence prospective crop yields.

Furrow diking will help maximize the benefits of any rainfall that occurs prior to spring planting. Maintaining furrow dikes during the growing season will continue to benefit crops by keeping rainfall on the field to be soaked into the soil.

The annual pre-plant soil moisture survey data informs irrigators about general plant-available soil moisture conditions across the 15-county Water District service area.

"Irrigators can use this information to estimate the amount of water needed to bring their soil to field capacity without over-irrigation. Producers should remember that this information reflects general soil moisture trends and should not be used in place of individual testing on their farms," says Wilfred E. "Willie" Crenwelge, USDA-SCS Soil Scientist.

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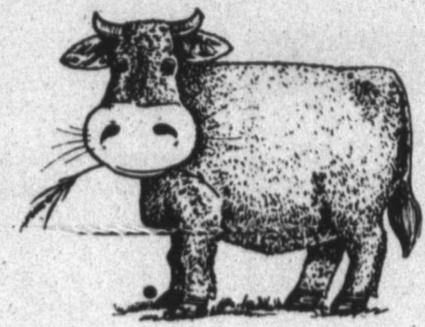
