Signups Slow For School, City Elections

With the signup deadline still a few weeks away for candidates seeking spots in area school and city elections, signups continue slowly this week. Deadline to file is March 23.

In Wilson, incumbent Dan Cook has filed for one of the two three-year terms on the Wilson I.S.D. Board of Trustees, and incumbent Jackie Bishop has filed for re-election in the city election for another two-year term as mayor. No candidates have filed yet for the two positions open on the Wilson City Council, both two-year terms.

Lloyd Bell has filed his candidacy for a position on the New Home City Council, seeking one of the three two-year terms up for election this year. Incumbent Stacy Gill has filed for another three-year term on the New Home school board, which has two positions open in the upcoming election.

In O'Donnell, no candidates have filed to date for either city or school elections. The mayor's position and two council seats are up for election for the City of O'Donnell, all two-year terms. Two positions, both three-year terms, are opening on the O'Donnell I.S.D. Board of Trustees.

Incumbent Greg Henley has signed for re-election to the Tahoka I.S.D. Board of Trustees, and Gary McCord has filed for a spot on the board. Two places, both three-year terms, are up for election this year.

Three two-year terms are available on the Tahoka City Council, with no candidates filing as yet.

Candidates interested in filing should contact the respective city and school officials.

Leopards Beat Anton, Head For Regional

The New Home Leopards are headed for the regional basketball tournament, where the winner will go to the state tournament. The Leopards will play in the first round of the tournament at Levelland against Buena Vista at 3 p.m. Friday.

Coach Curry Blackwell's team qualified for the regionals by winning the second straight playoff game, beating Anton 62-57 at Wolfforth Tuesday night in the area playoff.

Channing Crisler had 26 points and Greg Armes 23 to account for

most of the Leopards' points against Anton. Anton led 27-26 at halftime, but New Home came back with 21 points in the last quarter. New Home had ten 3-point goals, with 7 of these by Crisler.

New Home will take a record of 23-7 into the first round game at South Plains College's Texan Dome against Buena Vista, winner of district 15-A with a record of 21-4.

The winner of that game will play the winner between Vega and Nazareth Saturday morning. The finals are Saturday night between the winner of that half of the bracket against the winner between Sudan, Valley, Plains and Rankin.

The Leopards outlasted Klondike 72-67 in the bi-district playoff game at Gail last week, with Jason Gandy scoring 23 points, Armes 16, Zant 13 and Crisler 11 points.

Crisler had three 3-point goals and Armes two 3-pointers. New Home led 35-33 at halftime.

Reward Offered In Defacing Of Buildings, Van

A reward totaling \$450 is being offered for information leading to the arrest and conviction of persons responsible for spray-painting words on the sides of several downtown Tahoka buildings and on a Grassland church van on Christmas Eve.

Among the buildings sprayed with red and/or gold paint were the Masonic Lodge, Fina, Lyntegar and the city warehouse. Victims of the vandalism have made up the \$450 reward fund, and anyone with information on the incidents is asked to call Tahoka Police Dept. at 998-5255.

A wreck at N. 7th St. and Ave. N intersection in Tahoka Wednesday morning resulted in no injuries, according to the police department report. Nicki Lynn Durham, 27, of Tahoka, was driving a 1993 Ford Ranger which collided with a 1990 Oldsmobile driven by Delia DeLeon, 27, also of Tahoka.

In Lynn County jail during the week were two persons for driving while intoxicated, first offense, and one each for public intoxication and disorderly conduct.

Sheriff's Race Draws Interest In Primary

Lynn County voters will join others throughout the state in voting in the first Democratic and Republican primaries next Tuesday, with interest in the primary apparently highest in the three-man race for the Democratic nomination for sheriff of Lynn County.

Seeking the nomination for two years remaining on the unexpired term of former Sheriff Jack Miller are two deputies and a former Lynn County sheriff now serving in Garza County as a deputy, Jake Diggs, who had been chief deputy, was appointed as interim sheriff, and is seeking the nomination, as are Deputy Elton Childress and former sheriff Cliff Laws.

Whoever wins the nomination of the Democratic Party for county sheriff will be assured of winning the election in November, since the Republican Party has no candidates for the nomination. The only county office candidate on the Republican ballot is Larry Hagood of Tahoka, seeking the GOP nomination for Lynn County judge. Also unopposed in the Democratic Primary is County Judge J.F. Brandon, who will face the chal-

lenge of Hagood in the November election.

In Lynn County, the only contested races are for nominations for sheriff, commissioner of Precinct 4, and commissioner of Precinct 2. In Precinct 2, incumbent T.A. Stone is being challenged by Wally Castillon and Marvin Pierce. Precinct 4 Commissioner J.T. Miller faces two other candidates, Jimmy McCullough of Tahoka and Jerry McNeely of New Home.

Gov. Ann Richards has only taken opposition on the ballot for the Democratic nomination for governor, but likely will face George W. Bush in November. Bush is running for the Republican nomination, opposed by Ray Hollis.

Four Democratic candidates and six Republican candidates are running for nomination as U.S. Senator from Texas, with the favorites being the current senator, Kay Bailey Hutchinson on the GOP ballot, and Jim Maddox on the Democratic ballot.

Registered voters in Lynn County may still cast their ballots in early voting by presenting their voter reg-

istration certificates in the County Clerk's office in the Lynn County Courthouse. Early voting continues until 5 p.m. Friday, March 4.

Voting boxes for both primaries will be open Tuesday, March 8 from 7 a.m. until 7 p.m. at the following locations: Southwestern Public Service Reddy Room for all voting boxes in the Republican Primary; and in the Democratic Primary, Pct. 1 voting box (south Tahoka) in the courthouse basement; Pct. 2 (Wilson) in the Green Building in Wilson; Pct. 3 (O'Donnell) at O'Donnell High School; Pct. 4 (New Home) at New Home High School; Pct. 5 (Draw) at Paymaster Gin office; Pct. 6 (north Tahoka) at the Tahoka Elementary School annex; Pct. 7 (Grassland) at Grassland Community Center; Pct. 8 (Hackberry) at Hackberry Gin office; Pct. 9 (west Tahoka) at Tahoka High School; Pct. 10 (New Moore) at New Moore Community Building; Pct. 11 (Lakeview) at Lakeview Gin; Pct. 12 (southwest Tahoka) at Chancy Exxon Station; Pct. 13 (north Lynn County) at Poka-Lambro building; and Pct. 14 (east Tahoka) in the district courtroom at Lynn County Courthouse.

Kirklands Reassigned From Coaching Duties

Tahoka High School coaches Hulon and Nancy Kirkland were reassigned from their coaching duties this week, according to TISD Superintendent Duane Carter.

Hulon, who is head boys basketball coach, and Nancy, who coaches girls volleyball and assists with other coaching duties, were reassigned at their request, said Dr. Carter.

The superintendent said that both coaches would be relieved of any after-school coaching assignments, but would continue off-season duties during the school day, as well as daily classroom assignments.

Four THS Cagers Make All-District

Two Tahoka varsity girls and two members of the varsity boys basketball teams were named to the District 4-AA All-District team following the end of the regular season. Two other players from each team were given honorable mention.

None of the four first team selections is a senior, indicative of the rise in Tahoka basketball fortunes.

Making the boys' team were Wes Solomon, 5-11 junior who scored 251 points this season, and Curtis Erickson, 6-0 sophomore who scored 296 points.

Honorable mention went to Drew Stone and Chris Rodriguez. Coach of the boys team is Hulon Kirkland.

Lady Bulldogs, coached by Cindy Gardner, had two players named to the all-district team: junior Katy Huffaker and junior Stephanie Stennett. Honorable mention went to seniors Kelly Wells and Jill DeLeon.

Katy averaged 10.4 rebounds per game, which was second in the Area Class AA standings on rebounds. She also averaged 12.4 points per game which was 9th in Area standings. Stephanie average 4.2 rebounds and 7.5 points per game.

High School Principal Warned Contract May Not Be Renewed

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees voted in a special meeting last Thursday night to propose nonrenewal of High School Principal Charles Cate's contract for the 1994-95 school year.

In a unanimous 7-0 decision, trustees voted to propose nonrenewal for reasons discussed in executive session and, as required by law, sent a confidential letter to the principal notifying him of the proposed nonrenewal which listed reasons for the action.

According to policy, the principal has ten days following receipt of the letter to request a hearing with the school board. Following the ten-day time period, if no hearing is requested, trustees will take official action on the principal's contract.

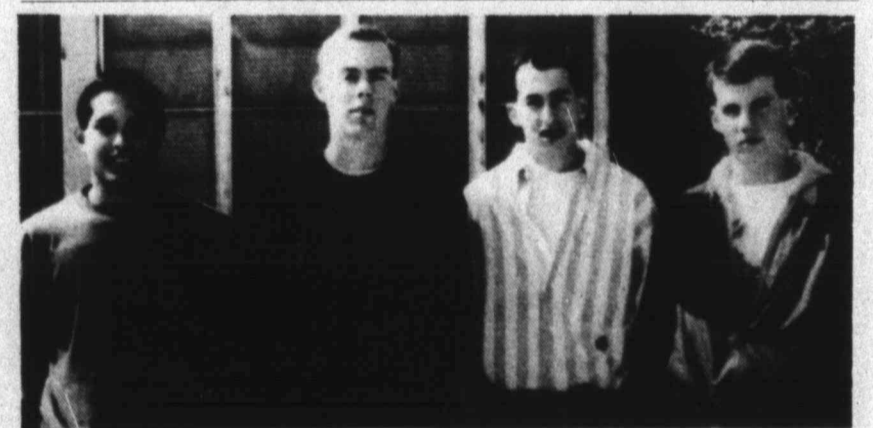
In other action, trustees unanimously approved a motion to submit a compromise settlement agreement in a civil suit brought against the

district by Manuel Moya regarding election procedures. The agreement notes that TISD has already submitted to the United States Justice Department a plan for single member redistricting, with five single-member districts and two at-large positions on the seven-member board of trustees.

Upon approval by the Justice Department, the phase-in of the redistricting plan will occur as the present elected board members end their terms of office, and the minority districts will be elected first, with the two at-large positions being filled in the same year.

The agreement included a \$1 settlement fee paid by the school district to the plaintiff.

All trustees were present for the one-and-a-half hour meeting, which adjourned at 8:05 p.m. The board was in closed session for almost an hour.

McClintock and the former Mary Lucille Gilson were married Feb. 28, 1929 in Lubbock. They have five grandchildren and nine great grandchildren.

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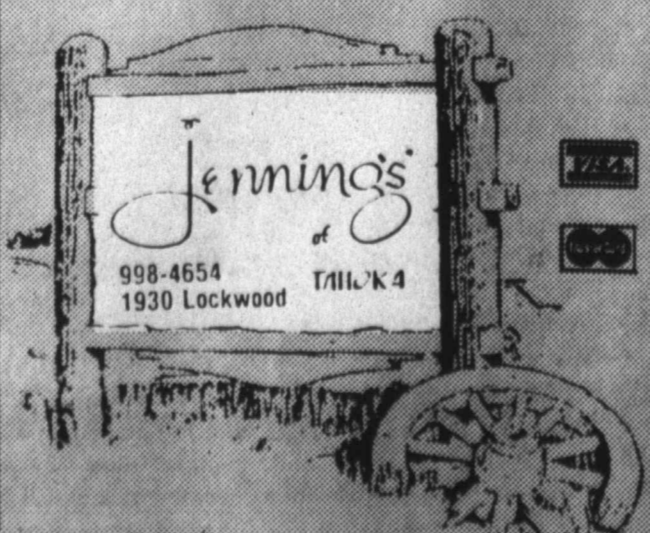

Commissioners Okay Sales Of Equipment

Lynn County commissioners court Monday approved several motions related to sale of used county equipment, including vehicles, and purchase of one new car for the sheriff's department.

Sheriff Jake Diggs had asked the court to consider using funds generated by housing Dawson County prisoners in the county jail for purchase of a car at a cost of less than \$15,000. This request was unanimously approved, along with a plan to seek bids for sale of county equipment including two 1986 cars, a pickup and trailer and other items to be named in the bid specifications.

The county also will seek bids on trading a loader for a new or used loader for Precinct 1.

Transfer of \$8,170 from general funds to pay for copier lease-purchases was approved. Also approved were repair of a breath test machine used by the Dept. of Public Safety at

a cost of \$100, a purchase order for a sewing machine to be used by the county home demonstration agent in working with 4-H youth, but to be paid for and eventually owned by the agent, and fire hydrants on three county farms, at a cost of \$1,271 to be paid out of the road and bridge fund. The cost of the fire hydrants will be reimbursed to the county with grant funds through the Wes-Tex R&D.

A representative of South Plains Assn. of Governments (SPAG) presented a resolution to number rural county roads for 911 emergency, and this resolution was approved.

Commissioners discussed with County Atty. Jimmy Wright a federal court lawsuit in which former Sheriff Jack Miller has been sued by a former jail inmate, Ricky Graves, in regard to alleged violation of the inmate's rights.

All commissioners and County Judge J.F. Brandon were present.

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**Hospice Of Lubbock Now Recruiting
Volunteers For Training Classes**

Hospice of Lubbock, a non-profit agency that provides care for the terminally ill, affirms life. It exists to provide care and support for patients and their families during the last phases of incurable disease so that they might live as fully and comfortably as possible. Volunteers are a vital part of this care and support system and Hospice of Lubbock is currently recruiting volunteers for its spring volunteer training classes.

The training classes will begin March 2 and will meet each Wednesday morning for 10 consecutive weeks from 9 a.m.-noon. The training consists of 30 hours of basic training and six hours of bereavement training. There is a \$20 fee for the classes and scholarships are available.

Volunteers may work in direct patient care or assist in the Hospice office. The main role of direct patient care volunteers is to provide an atmosphere of warmth, understanding, sensitivity and support to patients and families who are experiencing the difficulties associated with life threatening illness.

"Volunteers are encouraged to do all the things they would do for a friend or family members if they were in the same situation," said Mary Ann White, director of volunteers.

"In offering their support, volunteers are a vital part of the hospice team of care."

Typically, volunteers give two to four hours per week working directly with the patients and their families. Each volunteer works with one patient at a time.

Hospice volunteers are asked to provide one year of service to the organization. Men and women of all ages are encouraged to become involved. For more information or to register for classes, contact Mary Ann White at Hospice of Lubbock, 795-2751, before the new training session begins on March 2.

Hospice of Lubbock provides care through an interdisciplinary team that includes the patient's physician, hospice medical director, nurses, social workers, pastoral counselors, certified home health aides, trained volunteers and others.

The organization serves Crosby, Floyd, Garza, Lynn, Terry, Hockley, Lamb, south Hale and Lubbock counties.

Anyone may refer a patient to Hospice of Lubbock by calling the office at 795-2751. The staff will contact the patient's physician and determine if the patient meets the admission criteria.

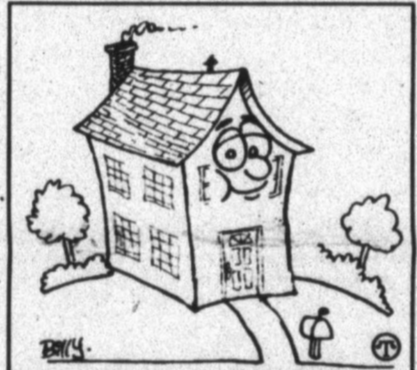
According to Board President Jerry Kolander, Hospice of Lubbock provides a service to the community that is a real ministry to the terminally ill and their families.

Referrals to Hospice of Lubbock may be made by anyone, but most often come from physicians, families or friends. The only criteria for admission is the consent of the patient's primary physician, a limited life expectancy and an informed family willing to participate. **Wes-Tex RC&D Receives Federal Funds
To Aid In Overseeing Grant Searches**

Sixteen South Plains counties, including Lynn, which comprise the Wes-Tex Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) area, will receive federal seed money to aid in administrative costs in overseeing grant searches for rural development projects.

The Wes-Tex RC&D will receive \$110,000 a year in federal money, according to an announcement made recently by U.S. Reps. Larry Combest, R-Lubbock, and Bill Sarpalius, D-Amarillo. According to H.G. Franklin, President of the Lynn County RC&D (a member of Wes-Tex RC&D), the funds will be used to pay administrative costs in overseeing the 16-county RC&D area. Dan Henson, District Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service in Morton, is the District Coordinator of the Wes-Tex RC&D.

"This funding means that Dan (Henson) will now be employed full-time to work with the 16-member counties of the Wes-Tex RC&D," explained Franklin. "Previously, although he was named District Coordinator and worked with us as much as he could during his spare time, he also had to fulfill his obligations as a conservationist with the SCS," he said.

The funding also means that the Lynn County RC&D can now send their grant searches through the Wes-Tex RC&D, instead of routing the paperwork through Big Country RC&D, which was already federally-funded.

The Lynn County RC&D has already received grant funding for several projects, including eight dry hydrants in the county for rural fire departments, and EMS communications equipment. Several other projects are being considered.

RC&Ds throughout the nation receive assistance through the administration of the U.S. Soil Conservation Service. Other members of the Wes-Tex RC&D other than Lynn County are Andrews, Bailey, Cochran, Gaines, Hockley, Lub-

and efficient federal, state, and local partnerships.

"Those involved in this program look for ways to improve the well-being of people in RC&D areas," Sarpalius said.

"The program is supported by over 5,000 council members who work without pay because they believe they can make a difference. I'm sure they have many ideas in the areas of land conservation, water management, and community development that will result in positive changes for this area of Texas," he added.

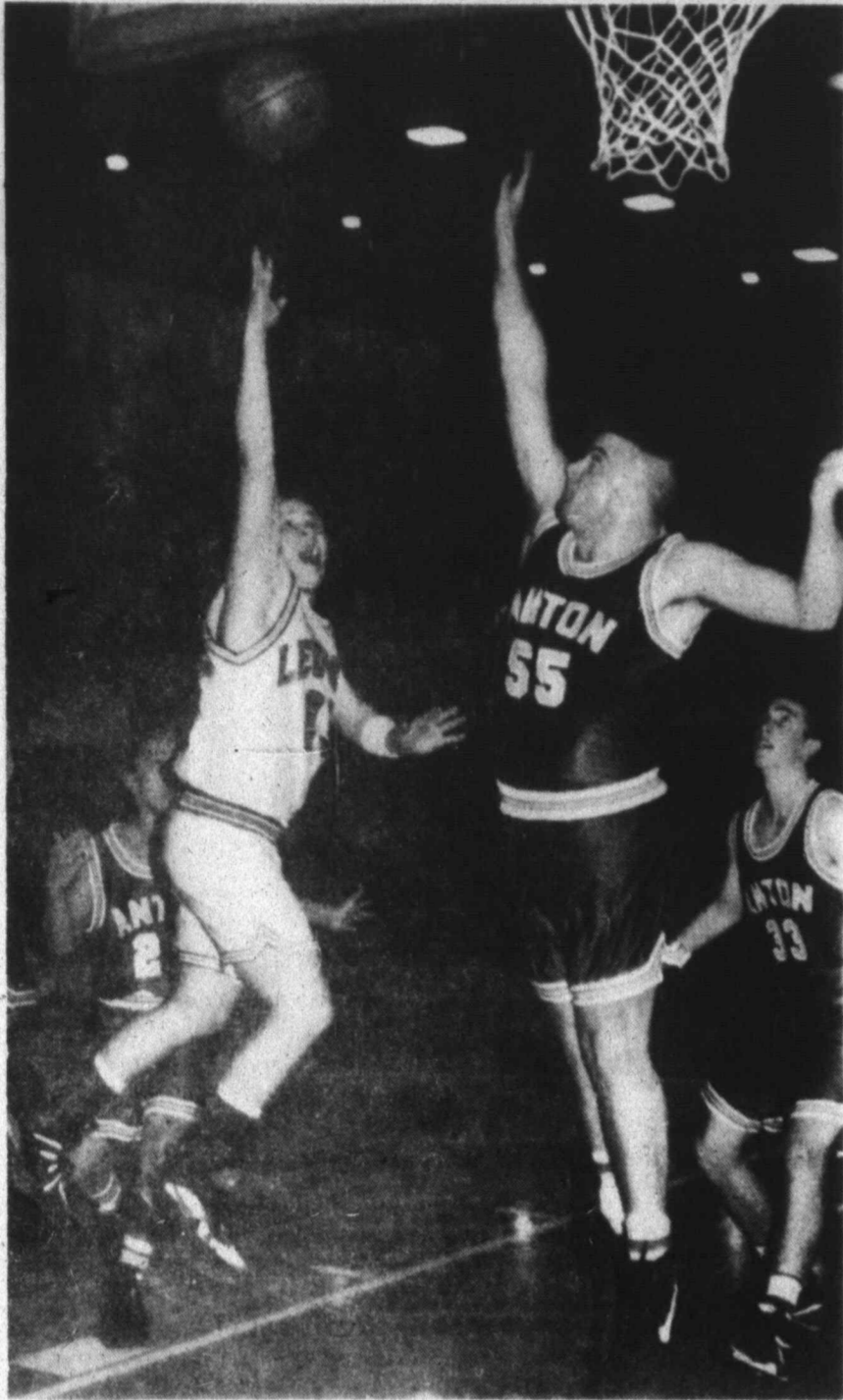

Former Tahokan Featured In Brazos Valley 'Insite' Magazine

Editor's Note: Mrs. Reba Ragsdale (formerly Reba Jean Cook of Tahoka) was featured in the February issue of the Brazos Valley "Insite" magazine, in an article about her accomplishments in the Bryan area, which included being named Citizen of the Year of the Bryan/College Station area.

The article, by Spec Gammon, is reprinted, in part, as follows:

It may not be visible to the naked eye, but Reba Ragsdale has undergone a complete metamorphosis since her days as a farm girl in the West Texas town of Tahoka. She has been in our community (Bryan) for 16 years, and, if you don't recognize the name, you haven't been paying attention. Ragsdale has been, and still is, active in many organizations. Currently she is president of the Bryan Rotary Club, the first woman to hold that office; the Chamber of Commerce's Citizen of the Year, and the first recipient of the Service to Community Award presented by the Leadership Brazos Alumni Association.

Her involvement in chamber work includes Legislative Committee, Junior Leadership Brazos, Convention & Visitor Bureau, Community Relations, Agriculture, Public Relations, Leadership Brazos and Small Business Council. Also, she was the Chamber's first recipient of the Volunteer of the Year award in 1988 and was the Chamber's treasurer in 1984. She currently serves on the Board of Directors of the Rehabilitation Center after two terms as president and co-chair of the Life Builders Campaign. She spent six years on the Board of Directors of United Way and one year as Brazos County Campaign Chair.

So, what about that metamorphosis? Well, it started back in 1977 when Bob Ragsdale of the Texas A&M Extension Service paid a visit to the Swenson Land and Cattle Company in Stamford where Reba worked. When he identified himself, she asked if he knew her friend, Marihelen Kamp, at A&M. "We office in the same building," he said.

"That fall, I went down to A&M

for a football game," Reba recalls. "Marihelen invited me to a pre-game luncheon and guess who else she had invited?" As fate would have it, they were married Feb. 9, 1978, in Bob's hometown of Junction.

"I came from a long line of Baptists, was a rabid Texas Tech Red Raider and my family had always been Democrats," she laughs. "Today I'm a strong Methodist, a loyal Texas Aggie, and a staunch Republican. I became a Methodist when I married Bob. I fell in love with the Texas Aggies after moving here, and my conservative views led me into the Republican party. I guess I've made a complete turnaround."

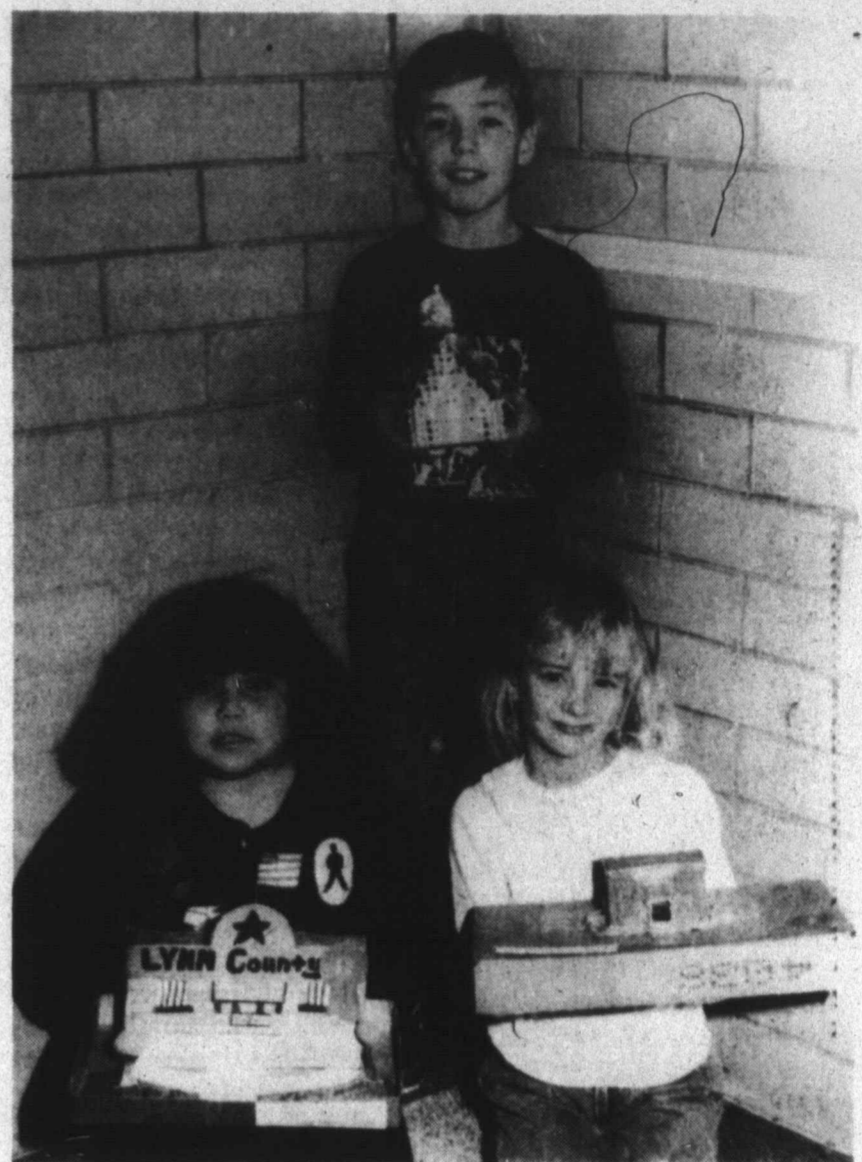
The changes evidently haven't been detrimental. Those who know her well are lavish with compliments.

She was born Reba Jean Cook on Jan. 31, 1940, in a Lubbock hospital. Her parents, Buck and Audine Cook, had a farm in nearby Tahoka. She has three brothers, Bobby and Lynn who still reside in Tahoka and A.G. of Santa Fe, New Mexico.

At Tahoka High School she played basketball and volleyball, was secretary of her sophomore class and vice-president as a junior. She was a staff member of the school newspaper and annual and served on the student council.

She graduated in the spring of 1956 and joined the work force. She was in Tahoka, Lubbock and Washington D.C. before going to the cattle company in Stamford. In a previous marriage she had a daughter, Brenda, a Texas Tech grad who is now Mrs. Jewel Pierce of Lubbock. She has blessed Reba with two grandchildren, Jandi, 14 and Cade, 10.

Shortly after arriving here, Reba went to work for the A&M Research Foundation. She opened her own business, an automated clerical company that provided accounting and word processing services. She sold it in 1987 and did some part-time work writing grants to help expand the Brazos Valley Museum and did office consulting work. She joined the 12th Man Foundation in 1989 where she currently is a director of fund and donor relations.

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Emergency Farm Loan Applications Now Being Accepted At FmHA

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought and high winds, which occurred on March 1, 1993, through Nov. 23, 1993, are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Tahoka. FmHA County Supervisor Curtis Barlow said recently.

Garza County is one of seven in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought and high winds.

Barlow said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000 whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," Barlow

said. Farmers participating in the ASCS Disaster program or Federal Crop Insurance program will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until Oct. 3, 1994, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," Barlow said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the US Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended individual farmers who are US citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or co-operatives in which US citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Tahoka is open from 8 a.m.-5 p.m. Monday through Friday.

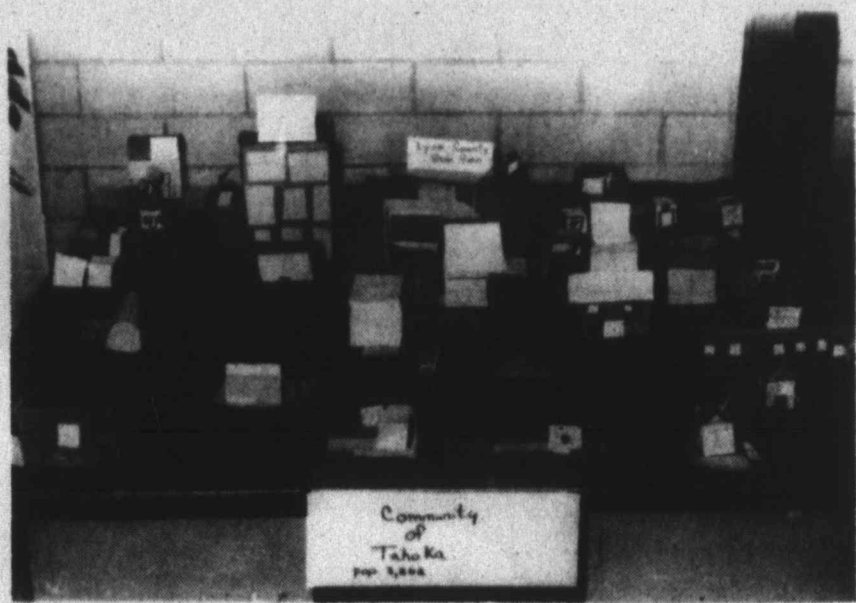

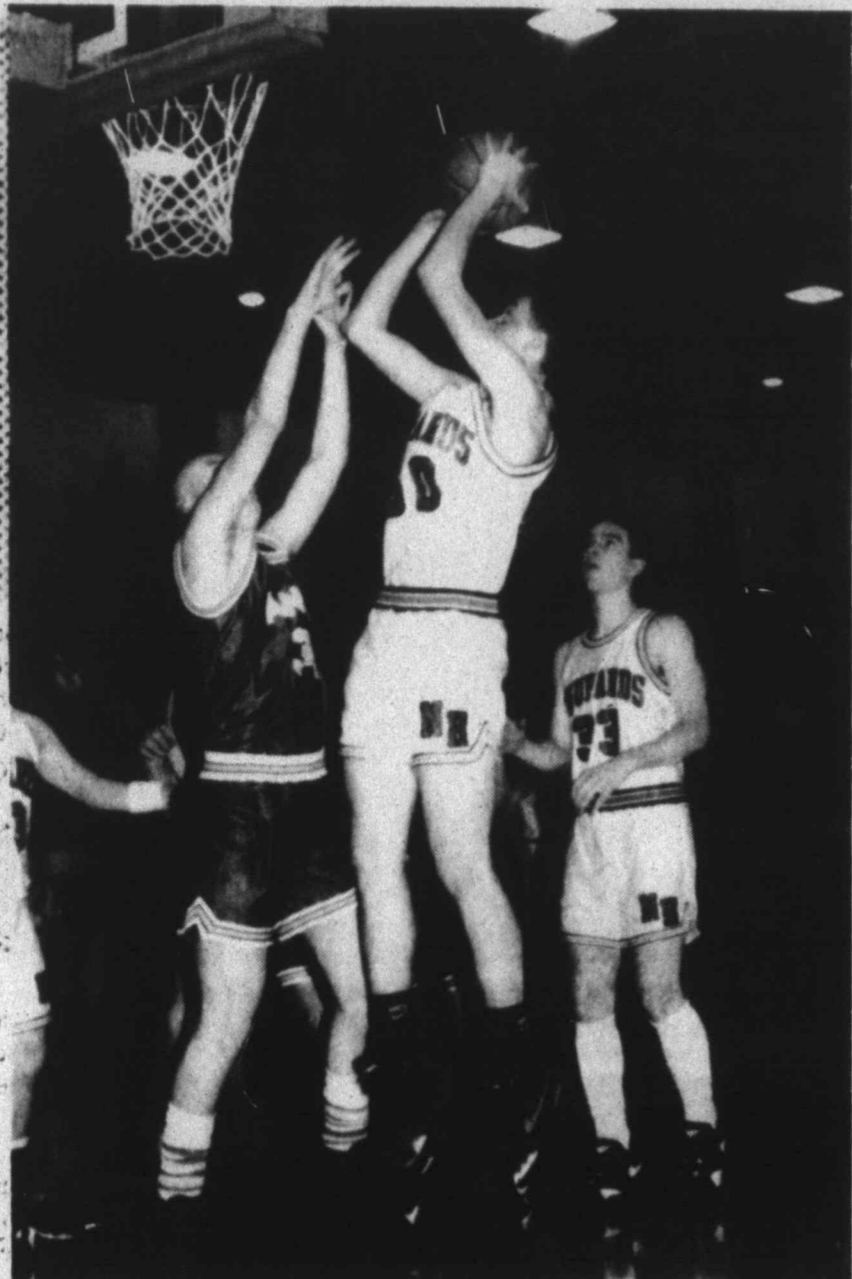

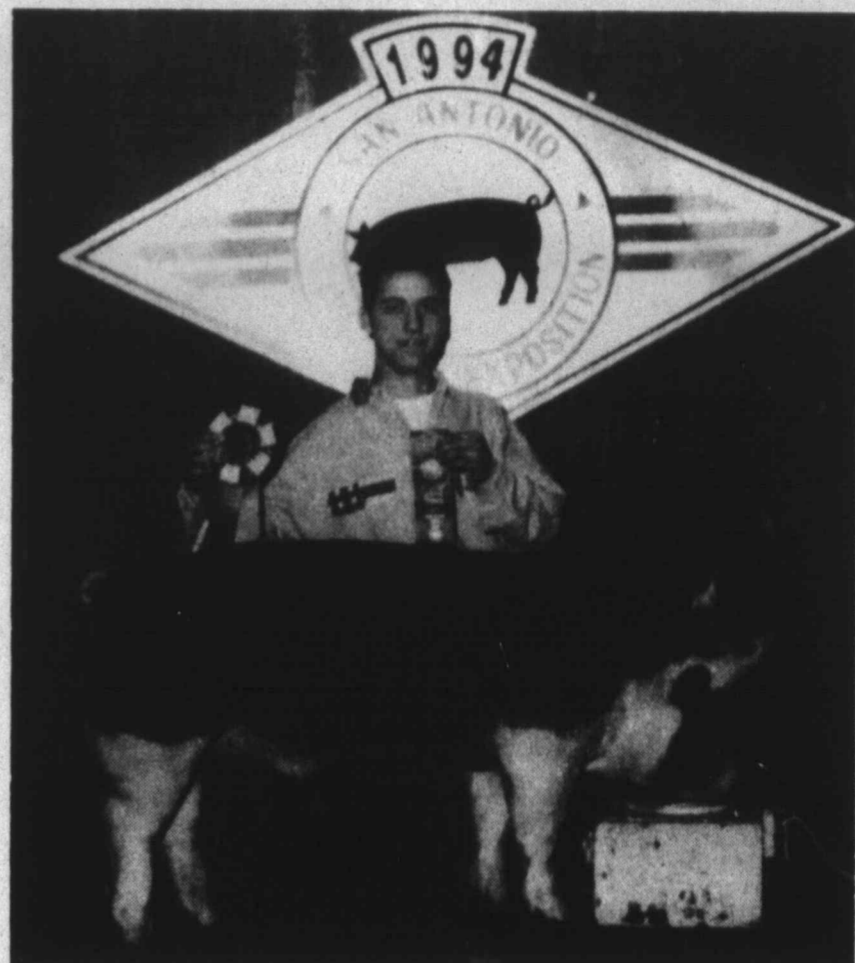

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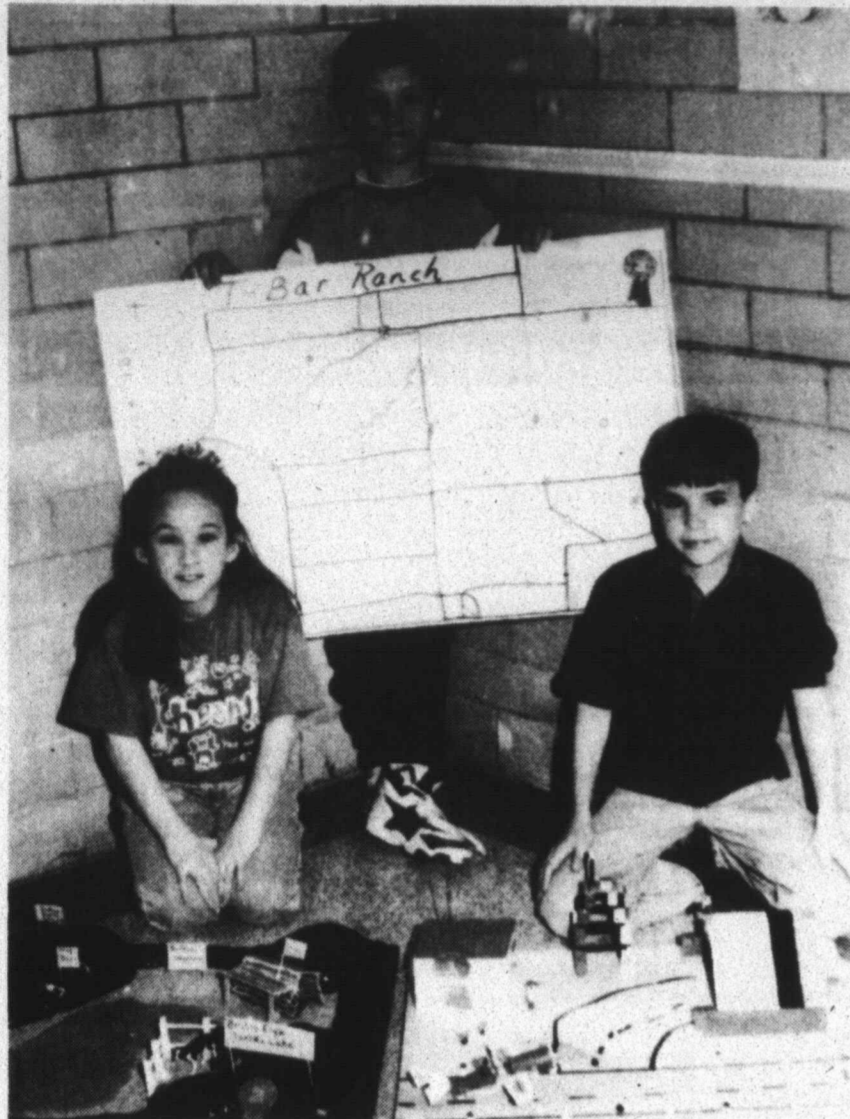
