Tahoka DECA Students Win State; Set Sights On Detroit

Thirteen Tahoka High School DECA students traveled to Houston on March 10 to compete in a chapter project and two individual series events, returning victoriously to Tahoka with a first place state award in the chapter project and looking forward to the national contest in Detroit, Mich.

Doug Smith, Clayton Laws, and Will Hudgens were the designated spokesmen for DECA's 1993-94 Civic Consciousness Project. They made an oral presentation and answered questions before a team of judges who had already read and evaluated the submitted 50 page project manuscript. Saturday, March 12, the chapter project was designated First Place State Finalist. The project involved DECA stu-

dents working together with city officials last fall to construct a beach volleyball court in Tahoka's Mini-Park. Barry Pitman, Jim Solomon, City Council members, Doyle Webb, Mitch Raindl, Harvey Craig, Dan Taylor, Steve Braddock, Jack Jaques, Wesley Boone, and other community members assisted DECA members with the project.

The project will advance to competition at DECA's National Career Development Conference from April 22-27 in Detroit, Michigan. Representing the chapter project at that competition will be Doug Smith, Will Hudgens, Trent Scott, and Juan Luna.

"We're planning on bringing home the gold from Detroit," said Hudgens. "If we can communicate to the judges how so many people in

Tahoka helped us with the project, they'll understand how much we've learned about our civic duty. I just hope we can get that across to them," he added.

Juan Luna competed in the Finance and Credit Services individual series event. David Garvin was an alternate in Hospitality and Tourism Services individual series event.

"These students worked diligently to represent THS DECA.

"We're very pleased with their endeavors," said Glo Hays, local DECA Advisor. "It's so much fun to watch students learn as they work together, travel together, socialize together, and compete together. It's also a lot of fun to pass Ty Stark in a go-cart race!"

During the upcoming competition in Detroit, THS DECA students will attend a luncheon sponsored by 7-Up Bottling Company, will travel into Canada for some sightseeing, and will present the project three times.

More Candidates Sign For Elections

Several more candidates filed this week in city and school elections in the county, with the deadline to file at 5 p.m. Wednesday. A list of candidates follows, as of press time Wednesday morning:

In Tahoka, the list is one candidate short in the city council election, with only two candidates filing as of Wednesday morning for three seats

on the council, all two-year terms. J.D. House announced his candidacy this week, joining incumbent Joe Calvillo in the election. It is expected, however, that another candidate will file before the 5 p.m. deadline. Councilmen Dayton Parker, Wayne Tekell and Calvillo all have terms expiring.

Four candidates have filed in the

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees election, where two seats, both three-year terms, are opening. Incumbent Greg Henley has filed for re-election, as well as candidates Gary McCord, Rex Rash and Ginger Henry. Henley and Mike Huffaker both have terms expiring on the board.

As of Wednesday morning, there are no contests in either of Wilson's elections, with the number of candidates equal to the number of positions opening. Wilson's mayor, Jackie Bishop, has filed for re-election for another two-year term, and city councilman Oscar Follis announced his bid for re-election for another term. Linda Williams filed for election this week for the city council, seeking the other seat on the council. Follis and David Cook both have terms expiring.

Both incumbents whose terms are expiring in the Wilson I.S.D. election are seeking re-election. Keith Wied and Dan Cook have filed for the three-year terms.

Five candidates have filed in the New Home City Council election, where three seats are opening, all two-year terms. Filing this week was Don Sharp, who joins Loyd Bell and the three incumbents, Stony Gill, Dale Clem and Louis Rodriguez, in the race.

The New Home School Board election is an uncontested race, with the two incumbents seeking re-election. Stacy Gill and David Foerster have both filed for the three-year terms.

In O'Donnell, filing was slow until this week, when both elections became contested races with several candidates filing. Four candidates have filed in the school election, with Gonzalo Amaro, Danny Willis and Manuel Gutierrez Jr. joining incumbent Renn Dorman in the bid for two seats on the board, both three-year terms. Dorman and Sharron Gass have terms expiring this year.

Dean Smith has filed for mayor in the O'Donnell City election, where Mayor David M. Smith's term is expiring. The position is a two-year term. Seeking seats on the city council are incumbent Bill Clopton and candidates Allen Eaker and Oscar Calzada, for two positions on the council, both two-year terms. Clopton and Stella Arguello both have terms expiring.

City and school elections throughout the county will be held May 7, 1994.

Two Arrested For Burglary

Two teenage youths were arrested this week by Tahoka Police officers in connection with the recent burglary of Mr. Bernie's, a Tahoka hair salon. Most of the stolen items, valued at about \$600, were recovered.

A 16-year-old boy already has been put on juvenile probation in the case, and charges of burglary were expected to be filed Wednesday against a 17-year-old Tahoka youth. Most of the stolen items were clippers and other hair equipment and supplies, and the two boys reportedly had given each other haircuts.

In jail during the week were two persons for driving while intoxicated (DWI) first offense, two for public intoxication, and one each for burglary of a habitation, DWI third offense and assault on a family member.

Woodwork...

IT'S TRUE THAT you can learn things every day, even when you are older (than you once were, which applies to all of us). A couple of years ago, I declared myself semi-retired, and turned over most of the responsibilities of running a newspaper to a couple of family members who didn't know when to say no. 2. 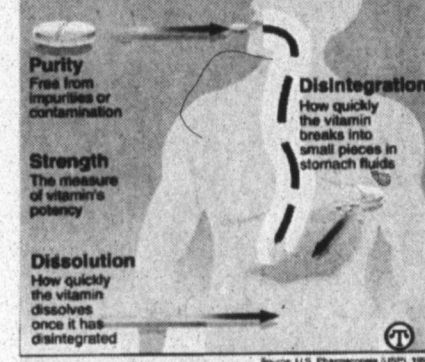

Boy Kills Father With An Axe

Special To The News
FLOYDADA, TEXAS, AUG. 13 — Monday evening A.A. Lomax, a farmer living 10 or 12 miles southeast of here [Floydada], was killed by his 19-year-old son and was buried in the Lakeview Cemetery today.

As well as your correspondent can learn, the facts are as follows: Mr. Lomax and family came to town [Floydada] yesterday and Lomax, not being able to get any booze, tanked up on bay rum, quarreled with his wife all the way home and as soon as he got out of the wagon attempted to beat up one of the little girls.

Mrs. Lomax and her son interfered, whereupon the infuriated man ran into the house, grated open a razor and proceeded to chase the boy around the place with the evident intention of cutting him up like he would a chicken.

Around they went until the nearly exhausted and desperate boy spied the axe, which in his dire extremity he seized and turning, struck his father a crushing blow that produced instant death.

Under the circumstances it is not thought here that anything will be done to the boy.

Lynn County Vital Statistics For 1912

The report of Lynn County births gives us 14 male and 21 female, or a total of 35 babies, born in 1912. In 1911 there were 20 male and 25 female [babies] born in Lynn County as shown by the vital statistics.

In 1912 the report shows seven deaths — two of whom were married women; one was that of a man that was here on a visit and had been very sick before coming to the county; two were babies under two months old; one was a child of 18 months; and a man who came to a violent death, being killed by a storm. In 1911 there were six deaths, one of them being a violent one, a young man who was accidentally shot.

During the past calendar year we have had 19 weddings in Lynn County. Of these, ten were married by Methodist preachers, three by Baptist, three by Christian, two by Primitive Baptist, and one by the County Judge. Of this number, three of the women were widows and five, at least, of the men were widowers. In 1911 there were 14 marriages.

pected financial disaster. Consider what happened to Zoe Baird. She had to give up what could have been the job of a lifetime, when she withdrew her nomination as U.S. Attorney General over a flap concerning her negligence in hiring household help.

Whether it's a housecleaner, gardener, babysitter, or handy-person, the IRS estimates that 1.5 million households could potentially be held liable for not complying with its household employee regulations.

If you have questions regarding what constitutes household help and what your tax responsibilities are, contact your local IRS office and ask for Publication 937. If you're considering hiring a cleaning service, make sure you ask about their IRS, INS, Workmen's Comp and insurance regulation compliance. A cleaning company who can't or won't answer your questions should be avoided.

HOME CLEANING CORNER

Household Help And The IRS: What You Don't Know Could Cost You Your Home

(NAPS)—Millions of Americans are turning to hired housecleaning help as a way to maximize their ever-decreasing leisure time. As a result, they could be one of the 1.5 million households the IRS estimates are breaking the law.

Whether they are aware of it or not, they could be negligent in reporting their employee's wages and in paying the required Social Security taxes. According to the IRS, anyone who pays an employee more than \$50 over a three-month period is

required to report those wages to the IRS via Form #942 and to make quarterly Social Security tax payments. Even if you have a cleaning service, you could still be personally responsible if the cleaning service doesn't report the employee's wages.

Failure to comply could result in your being liable for all of your housecleaner's Social Security taxes, accumulated interest on those taxes, and as much as an additional 100 percent fine. Should your employee also turn out to be an illegal alien, failure to file Form I-9 with the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS) could result in additional penalties of as much as \$10,000.

Q: Please settle a friendly argument. I say aerosol cans can't be recycled, but my son says there are no good reasons not to recycle them with our other aluminum and steel cans. Who's right?

A: You're both right - or perhaps the more precise answer is that either of you could be right, depending on where you live in Texas. Aerosol cans aren't universally accepted in curbside or collection-center recycling programs. However, the Steel Recycling Institute encourages the inclusion of steel aerosol cans with other steel cans and is now working with many recycling programs in Texas to change their policies to include aerosol cans. Call the managers of your local program to find out their policy. The programs that do accept cans have found that when empty, aerosol cans don't pose any special problems. Cans with trace amounts of product, whether paint, shaving cream or any other material, generally don't interfere with the recycling process. Some programs won't accept these cans due to fear of explosions, but the research we have seen indicates the cans don't explode when crushed, they simply vent the remaining contents. If you have a can that is full and the contents won't come out, save it for your next local

household hazardous waste collection day. Contact your local government or call 1-800-64-TEXAS for more information about collection days in your area.

Q: I'm curious about Xeriscape landscaping. If I'm using less water, won't I have to add extra fertilizer to keep some color in my yard?

A: Xeriscape, or water- and energy-efficient landscaping, should reduce both your water use and your chemical use, including fertilizers. A recent study by the Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center in Dallas compared low-water use landscapes with more traditional landscapes and found that the "resource efficient" landscapes, as they called them, demanded less water, fertilizers, pesticides and resulted in lower amounts of chemicals in the runoff from the landscape during rainfall. The study suggested that cities

could use Xeriscape or similar landscapes as a form of pollution-control technology. Also, adding too much fertilizer to many native plants - key to many Xeriscape plans - actually reduces their color by producing leggy, spindly plants with fewer colorful blooms. The best fertilizer strategy for native plants is to mulch them with compost and other organic material and to apply small amounts of organic fertilizer. You'll have a beautiful yard and will be protecting our water!

Some preferred to wear a confining belt rather than have the operation. But today recovery is much more rapid and it is more advisable and common to have it taken care of. 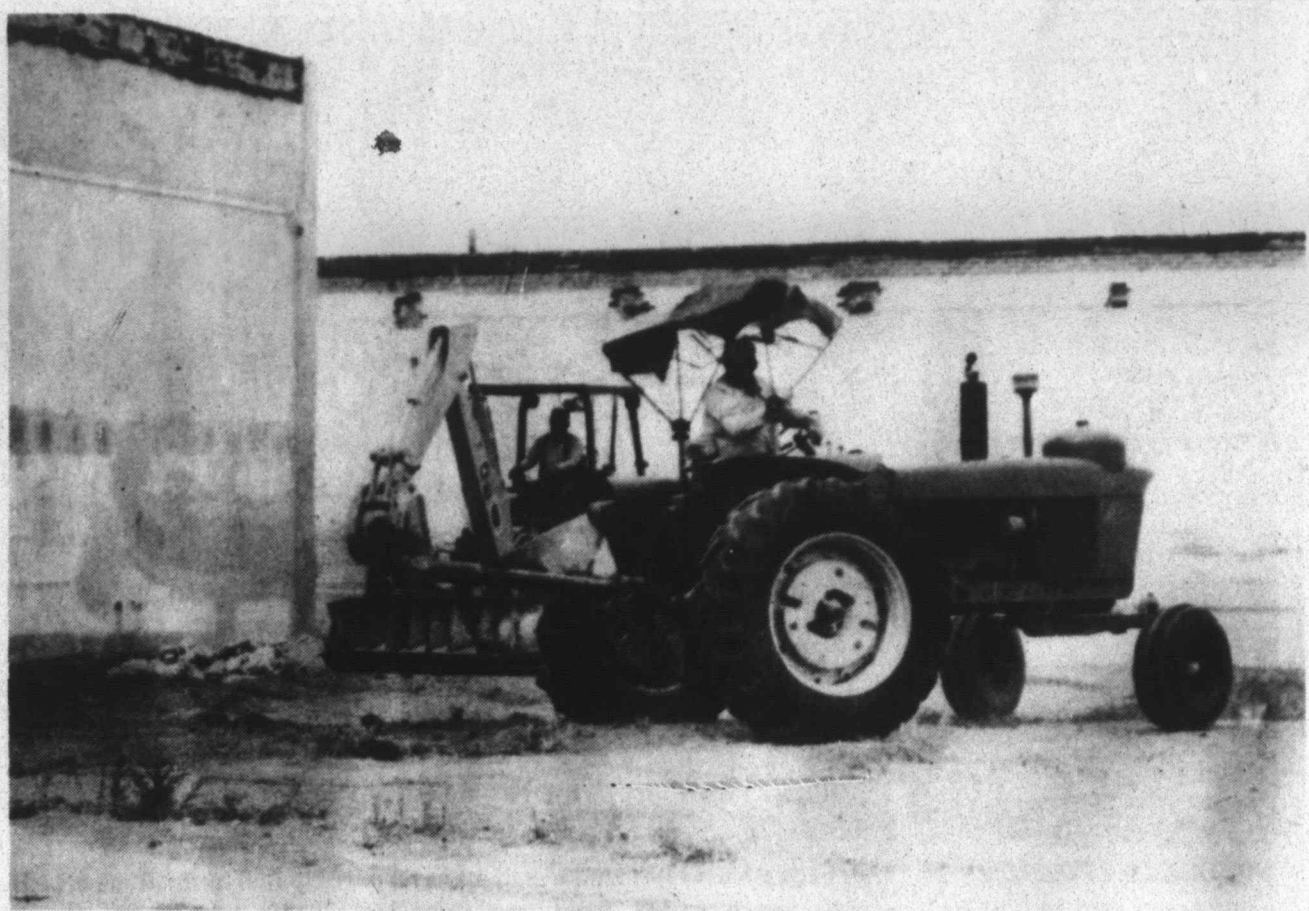
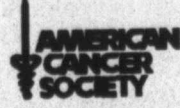

Boll Weevil Trapping Program Offered By Extension Service

The Texas Agriculture Extension Service (TAEX) in cooperation with the Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) is making available boll weevil pheromone traps to interested consultants and producers. The only stipulations placed on participants is that they follow the guidelines provided with the traps as to where to place them, how to check them and providing trap catches to Extension Agents so that this information can be plugged into the High Plains Boll Weevil Update, a service that tracks weevil infestations. This information will be summarized and provided through a PCG newsletter and to DTN (Data Transmission Network) subscribers. The Dawson/Lynn Pest Management Association will also be running traps. All local information, from Dawson and Lynn counties, will be provided through the IPM weekly newsletter and media outlets.

The particulars of the program are as follows:

Traps will be provided from Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. through the local Extension Agent to interested consultants and producers.

Traps will be provided in sets of four only: 4 traps, 4 poles, 12 pheromone and 4 kill strips. This will allow traps to be run for 6 weeks. Each pheromone will last 2 weeks. It is recommended that at least 4 traps be

placed per trapped field. These should be placed on the side(s) nearest overwintering habitat as near to planting date as possible.

Each trap set will be accompanied with a fact sheet outlining trap use and how to make decisions as to whether insecticidal control is necessary. Also included will be a set of data sheets for recording of trap catches and other pertinent information.

Each 4-trap unit will cost \$10, which is less expensive than commercial prices.

The best fields to select for trapping would be those that were infested last year, those that are nearest good overwintering habitat and especially the earlier planted fields.

Traps must be ordered through the local agent in units of four. The deadline for placement of orders will be April 7.

The value of this program lies in the exchange of trapping information about where weevils are appearing and ultimately will help develop a better weevil management program this year. Individual consultants and producers will benefit by knowing where weevils appear first and if they might be in danger of having early weevil infestations. Management guidelines for early weevil infestations will be provided in the fact sheet enclosed with each trap order.

Lynn County cotton producers and agribusiness representatives will elect a Business Director to Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. at 7 p.m. on Thursday, March 24, 1994 in the Reddy Room of Southwestern Public Service, Tahoka.

Announcement of the election comes from Wayne Huffaker of Tahoka, Lynn County Producer Director to the 25-county cotton organization, and Joe D. Unfred of New Home, current Business Director.

Each county in PCG's service area has two directors, one a business person and the other a cotton producer. They are elected on alternate years for two-year terms. Each is eligible for re-election every second year.

All producers and business people are invited to attend the meeting. However, under PCG By-Laws, only current dues-paying members of PCG will be eligible to be elected a director or to vote in the election. This provision of the by-laws will be fully explained at the meeting.

A PCG representative will conduct the election, review and answer questions about recent and planned PCG activities.

PCG officials note that the area calendar includes several events that will be of particular interest to cotton producers. Some of the events that will be of the most interest are: the 37th PCG Annual Meeting, April 8; the Texas Cotton Ginners' Association (TCGA) Convention and Trade Show, April 8-9; a public meeting with Congressman Larry Combest and Ken Ackerman, National Manager of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation, March 29; and, a Texas Department of Agriculture WPS training meeting March 30.

The TDA meeting will be conducted at the Ollie Linder Center in Plainview and is the first for the Train-the-Trainer program associated with implementation of Federal Worker Protection Standards (WPS). The Train-the-Trainer program is designed to certify agricultural employees to train other agricultural workers regarding WPS rules

Tailwater Escape Laws Noted

Many High Plains producers are busy applying a last-minute pre-plant irrigation to wet the soil profile for 1994 planting. Unfortunately, some of this precious irrigation water is escaping from fields, and that is against both State Law and High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 rules.

Water District rules define tailwater as "ground water pumped for irrigation that escapes...onto land other than that of the owner of the well unless permission has been granted by the occupant of the land receiving the discharge. This permission must be in the form of an agreement signed between the parties on a form acceptable to the Water District. Potential parties to such an agreement are warned that it may obligate the provider to provide a specified supply of water into perpetuity and/or the recipient to accept runoff in whatever quantities at whatever time the provider chooses."

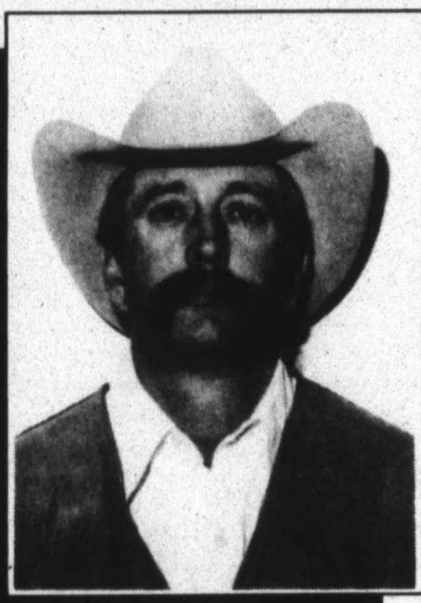
