LABOR STRIKES BEGIN

Again in 1897 business steadiimproved and permanent prosperity was prophesied, accompanied by stock splits, mergers, and large security offerings. Suddenly, in 1903, there came rumors of great quantities of "undigested" securitiesaccompanied by the investigation of large life insurance and traction companies. The crash came just following the San Francisco Earthquake.




