Equipment Weighing More Than One Ton Reported Stolen

A piece of equipment for breaking up concrete, weighing more than a ton and valued at \$17,000 was reported stolen from a location 2.5 miles south of Tahoka on April 18 or 19. A son. representative of Colorado Bridge Co. of Big Spring, owner of the concrete breaker, said it was taken between 6:30 p.m. April 18 and the following morning. manually Several thefts and burglaries during the last couple of weeks are being investigated by Lynn County sheriff's office, including one report of cash stolen from a home in Tahoka.

Justice of the Peace H.W. Edwards told officers some money had been stolen from his home sometime in the last few months and was missed just in the last weeks.

John Paul Grisson of Rt. 1, Wilson, reported that items valued at more than \$175 had been stolen from his residence in a burglary April 4. Missing items included a director's chair, Gerber game shears and Gerber folding knife.

Five lights were reported stolen from intersections along U.S. 87 between Tahoka and O'Donnell where construction has been underway. Barricades Unlimited of Lubbock, owner of the warning lights, said they were stolen April 18 and are valued at about \$20 each.

A 31-year-old Tahoka man complained that a 74-year-old Taho man struck him in the mouth in a dispute over a phone bill.

stolen April 17-18 from a farm owned by John Fields of Wilson. About 25 wrenches were listed as missing from the location on a dirt road near Wil-

Weldon Neugebauer of Slaton reported an air compressor, Sears battery charger and a dozen containers of beer had been stolen from his farm house east of Wilson on FM 211 between April 16-18.

Four persons involved in several car thefts on April 13, when one of the cars was left in the yard of the Tahoka mayor, were indicted on three different charges as a 106th District Court grand jury met last week.

The four, all believed to be from Lubbock, and now held in Dawson County jail, are Jeremy Sanchez, Baldo Gonzales, John Anthony Flores and Veronica Montemayor, no ages or addresses listed in the indictment. The charges specified were "engaging in organized criminal activity." burglary of a motor vehicle owned by Jim Anderson, and unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, a 1983 Buick owned by Antonio Montantes.

Five other persons also were indicted by the grand jury which met April 18, including the following:

John Austin, 31, of Tahoka, misapplication of fiduciary property, specifically charges of misapplying



more than \$10,000 in the Julia Ann Austin trust "involving a substantial risk of loss to the beneficiaries of that trust.'

Bobby De La Cruz, 18, of Tahoka, burglary of a beauty shop owned by Byron Norwood of Tahoka on March 12. De La Cruz pleaded guilty following the indictment and Judge George Hansard assessed 10 years deferred adjudication.

Ricky Rodriguez, 32, of Brownfield, driving while intoxicated (DWI), subsequent offense.

Simon Frank Rodriguez, 40, Tahoka, DWI subsequent offense.

Rogelio De La Cruz, 48, of Wolfforth, DWI subsequent offense.

Judge Hansard also has revoked probation of Joe Anthony Torres, 20, of O'Donnell, on charges of unauthorized use of a motor vehicle, and sentenced Torres to three years in

LAWRENCE of Arabia came into the office Monday and asked to look at the world map on the wall. He explained that he was wondering how soon he could get out of here back to the Sahara, where there's not so much dirt in the air.

Actually, Monday was just one of those occasional days which some longtime residents call "Yankee Stoppers," because such choking dust storms discourage outsiders from settling in this great country and taking it over, like Cubans and Haitians in Florida and Orientals, Asians and weirdos in California.

That's not intended to mean that we don't like some Yankees, because many of them are fine, friendly people. We like the rest of them, too, but we usually like them better when they stay in Ohio or Boston, or wherever. (And yes, we do have many native citizens down here who we could do without).

Someone from the Outside World once asked me if longtime residents of this area get used to the sandstorms. "We get used to them, but we still don't enjoy them," I told him.

Anyway, days like Monday make even the most dedicated citizens think about moving someplace else. However, we who have been around here awhile know that when the dust blows for a day or two, the first day following a lousy dust storm is usually incredibly nice. Sunshine, almost no wind, and birds chirping (or maybe that's just coughing up the dirt they swallowed the day before).

This is being written on Monday, and probably by the time anyone reads this, we will have had that pretty day.

And everyone in Lynn County will have washed his or her hair Monday night.

I READ IN Monday's daily newspaper that gasoline prices have increased more than 1.4 cents per gallon. I didn't read far enough to see if that was in the last month, last week, day or 30 minutes or what. But I do know where there's a station which is doing its best to raise the average price to all-time highs: It is just off Interstate 10 in Deming, NM.

There were four men, each with his own vehicle, tooling along that area last weekend, and all four vehicles were getting low on gas. I had the lead vehicle, so the others were counting on me to find a place soon to get gas. So I promptly exited the interstate and pulled up at what turned out to be the highest-priced gas in New Mexico-Texaco regular unleaded at \$1.49.9 per gallon.

Nobody grumbled too much, though, until we rounded the next corner after filling up and passed a station offering regular at 1.07.9. Some of the men then hinted it was time to elect a new leader, but nobody else wanted the job.



O'Donnell Clinic Temporarily Closed; Hospital Breezeway To Be Enclosed

Due to the resignation of Family Nurse Practitioner Dixie Bruce, the O'Donnell Rural Health Clinic facilities are temporarily closed until staffing is reorganized, according to Louise Landers, Administrator for Lynn County Hospital. Hospital Board of Directors accepted Ms. Bruce's resignation at a regularlyscheduled board meeting last Thursday morning, noting that she cited "personal reasons" in making her decision.

"We are committed to keeping the O'Donnell Clinic facilities in operation, and are exploring all possible avenues to help us facilitate re-staffing," said Mrs. Landers. "It's just going to be a matter of time," she added, noting that the clinic phone is still being answered and that other. staff members are still in place.

In other matters, directors heard a presentation from Ken Condray of Condray Designs, who presented drawings and information on a proposed retirement facility here. His proposal detailed a 16-unit complex under one roof which included efficiency apartments, two-bedroom two-bath, two-bedroom one-bath,

and one-bedroom one-bath apartments, as well as a central dining area and living area, with a total square footage of 19,340 sq. ft.

Directors approved of the design and invited Condray to attend a meeting of the Wes-Tex Resource Conservation and Development (RC&D) council, who had approached the hospital district directors with the retirement facility idea and offered to assist in searching for grants to fund the project.

In another project, directors voted unanimously to begin work on the hospital breezeway enclosure, accepting a bid from LDC Construction Co., Inc. of Lubbock for \$9,995 to build a double brick wall along the clinic breezeway, and a bid of \$4,315 for concrete work on the project.

The project entails enclosing the walking area from the clinic to the emergency room doors with a brick and glass wall, as well as providing a new covered parking area for the new ambulance. Funds from the Hospital Auxiliary's Fun/Food Festival are expected to defray some of the costs in this project.

"This is something the hospital has needed for a long time," said Mrs.

Landers. "Patients from the clinic needing lab work have to go outside · to get there, and if the sand is blowing, or it is cold and icy, it can be treacherous," she explained.

In other action, directors approved a resolution to amend the bylaws to assign directors places and to define terms of office for directors, which gives directors three-year terms with a rotating basis of 3-2-2. (three elected one year, two elected the next year, and two elected the next year). Prior to this year, directors served two-year terms, with three elected one year and four elected the next. The board also approved a resolution to amend the bylaws to include a conflict of interest clause.

Directors reviewed three resumes for physician recruitment for the hospital, and will interview one candidate this week.

Also, directors reviewed and approved salaries for all hospital staff, including the hospital administrator.

Present at the meeting were directors Leland White, Billy Tomlinson, Harold Barrett, Norman Ledbetter, and Bettye Green, as well as Mrs. Landers.




The couple plans to marry August 13 at the First Baptist Church on Broadway in Lubbock.

Diligence, Hard Work Pay Off As Dream Comes True For Local Woman

For Beverly Carlisle of Tahoka, a dream 35 years in the making has finally come true, as she has just recently earned her Registered Nurse certification. The dream began when she was a student at Tahoka High School, but was put on hold for more than three decades after she graduated in 1958.

"I've always wanted to be a nurse ... I got married right out of high school, and at that time if you wanted to study to be a nurse you had to live on campus, and that wasn't possible for me, so I've put this dream on hold for 35 years," said Ms. Carlisle.

Since then, she has raised four sons and gained two grandchildren. She lived in Missouri for 14 years where she worked for a time as a department manager at a WalMart store. She returned to Tahoka and in 1986 she laid the foundation for her dream, becoming a Nurses Aide at "It was the last pencil and paper test, literally, offered on this state exam," she said with a laugh. "I was told that all testing will be computerized from now on, and although that would let participants know immediately whether or not they pass the test, I'm glad I didn't have to take it on a computer, as that would have given me one more thing to worry about." She was notified six weeks later that she had passed the test.

"Everyone here at the hospital has really helped me out," said Ms. Carlisle. "The hospital paid for me taking the test, and I am really grateful for that because it would have taken me a lot longer to finish had they not helped me and encouraged me. Everybody here has encouraged me to do this, and I finally made it. As one of my sons said, 'Imagine, a woman of my age, making a life for herself'," she said with a grin.



On February 22, 1994, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company ("Southwestern Bell" or "Company") filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("Commission") to restructure the Company's Local Transport and Directory Transport categories of its Switched Access Service. This matter has been assigned to Docket No. 12784. The tariff sheets in Southwestern Bell's application, if approved, will bring the Company's intrastate Access Service Tariff into structural parity with the Company's interstate Tariff No. 73 for Local Transport. Southwestern Bell's companion interstate tariff became effective on January 1, 1994.

The transport rate elements provide for the transmission facilities between the cutomer's premises and the end office switch(es) where the customer's traffic is switched to originate or terminate the customer's communications.

Southwestern Bell proposes to implement the revised tariffs on a revenue neutral basis. Although the proposed tariff changes will affect all customers subscribing to Switched Access Service, the Local Transport and Directory Transport categories of Southwestern Bell's Switched Access Service is primarily for interexchange carriers. If approved, this application will result in an increase in Southwestern Bell's revenues of approximately \$1682.00 during the first year. Southwestern Bell proposes that the changes be effective on December 1, 1994.

Persons who wish to intervene in or comment upon these proceedings should notify the commission as soon as possible, as an intervention deadline will be imposed. A request to intervene or for further information should be mailed to the Public Utility Commission of Texas, 7800 Shoal Creek Boulevard, Suite 400N, Austin, Texas 78757. The deadline for intervention in the proceeding is May 6, 1994.
