Local Doctor Honored For 21 Years Of Dedicated Service To County Residents

Sometimes, after many years of relying on the dependability and reliability of someone, it is within human nature to become complacent, perhaps even insensitive, about the availability of such a person. Take, for instance, the case of a small town doctor who for more than two decades has provided not only professional medical care, but also a friendly shoulder to lean on, a gentle heart to commiserate with, and a dedication devoted to the needs of his patients.

Throughout these 21 years, Dr. Wright and his wife, Katrina, have put the needs of his patients first in their lives, delegating their social and family life as secondary to his medical practice.

During the past two years, Dr. Wright has been plagued with his own health problems, and although still a practicing physician here, has found himself a patient in the hospital at times and is now forced to consider "slowing down a bit" and taking some

much-deserved time off. "I know nearly every single person in this county except those who have arrived in the last two years, and it has been an honor to do so," said the doctor.

The honor, however, is for the citizens of Lynn County in knowing the dedicated British doctor who has devoted so much time for their sakes. And, last week in a first-ever award presented by the City of Tahoka, Mayor Jim Solomon bestowed an "Outstanding Citizenship Award" to Dr. Richard F. Wright for his many years of loyal service to all citizens of Lynn County.

In a speech delivered to a crowd at the annual Lynn County Hospital Auxiliary Fun/Food Festival held Saturday, April 30, Mayor Solomon apologized for taking so long to honor the long-time physician. "Words cannot express our gratitude for your personal sacrifices and professional dedication over the past 21 years," he said, reading from the plaque which (See Dr. Wright, page 3)

\$14,800 Raised At Festival The citizens of Lynn County proved once again last week that, uncertain economic futures notwithstanding, they support the local hospital, contributing almost \$15,000 at the 14th annual Lynn County Hospital Auxiliary Fun/Food Festival and

Auction held Saturday. A record high \$14,832 has been donated to date, with contributions still coming in, according to Auxiliary President Betsy Pridmore. "The people here continue to amaze me with their show of support and goodwill towards our hospital ... even with area farmers and businessmen concerned with conditions for an uncertain cotton crop this year, people still give and give - they're wonderful," said Mrs. Pridmore. Last year's auction raised \$13,000 for the Auxil-

A good crowd turned out for this year's auction, including Republican candidate for State Representative, Wilma Hogan and her family, who brought a handmade quilt rack to be auctioned for the fund-raising event, and remained throughout the evening for the festivities. Mrs. Hogan, who is from Munday, said, "This [event] is amazing ... we have auctions in our town for fund-raising events, but nothing of this magnitude. I can see that the people of Lynn County are not only extraordinarily talented by the many handmade items here, but quite generous and supportive of the

local hospital."

Many auction items brought substantial amounts, but the highest bid came in at \$1,000 for a painting by local artist Diana Hawthorne, which was purchased by First National Bank of Tahoka. Aside from the auction, many area citizens and businesses also contributed monetary donations. A silent auction table brought in approximately \$300, and food booths by 4-H'ers, Phebe K. Warner Club, St. Jude's Catholic Church, Tahoka Volunteer Firemen and Hospital Board of Directors brought in substantial funds as well. Tahoka Elementary staff provided a booth of games to entertain young children at the festival.

The highlight of the evening was an emotionally/charged moment when Mayor Jim Solomon presented a plaque from the City of Tahoka to Dr. Richard F. Wright in appreciation for his loyal service to the citizens of Lynn County. The crowd See FESTIVAL Page 4

FIFTEEN YEARS and one week ago I came to Tahoka from Slaton and started operating The Lynn County News. In some ways, this seems like a short time; in other ways it seems like a long time. One sorehead who was here when I came told me it seems like forever.

Fifteen years is not a long time to operate this newspaper, since The News is the oldest business in Lynn County, established in 1903. However, 15 years is longer than I ever lived in any other town since I graduated from high school.

These have been good years. Although my wife and I liked every town we ever lived in (seven years each in Sudan, Plainview and Slaton), Tahoka has been the best. Not everybody in Tahoka, New Home, Wilson and O'Donnell is friendly, loyal, helpful, courteous, kind and cheerful, but most of them are. We have many friends in Tahoka and the surrounding area, and this makes us rich. Friends, good health and enough money to meet our real needs and obligations should make anyone happy.

Over the years I have occasionally forgot to put something in the paper when I should have. In keeping with that failing, I forgot to write this last week, which was the real anniversary of our coming to town on April 29, 1979.

I plan to repeat some of this stuff in a column nearest to April 29, 2004.

BEING A WEEK late writing about our anniversary here doesn't even come close to qualifying me for government job. The U.S. Dept. of Commerce in December released a report called County Business Patterns, 1991, Texas. We were mailed a copy last week.

Yeah, that's right: 1991. The information they have compiled and studied and finally listed is three years old. It tells about how many people were employed in various kinds of businesses in Lynn County during 1991. We're not publishing the entire report, because it's so old nobody cares very much any more. No doubt most of the figures have changed by now, but in 1991 in the county there were 122 employes in retail trade, including Betty Jolly, who works in our front office. These employes were paid \$1,214,000 that year, most of which Betty says she didn't get, but it doesn't matter, since all that money has been spent long ago.




Hospital Board Accepts Bid For Structure





(continued from page 1) he presented to the doctor's wife as the crowd rose spontaneously to their

feet in a standing ovation.

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With tears in her eyes, Mrs. Wright accepted the plaque in her husband's honor because, unfortunately, the doctor was unable to attend the event due to being hospitalized for treatment. When Dr. Wright returned home this week to recuperate, the mayor visited him and formally presented him with the plaque, which the doctor accepted with delight.

"I am very glad to have Dr. Wright as my physician and, more importantly, my friend," said Solomon. "He is truly an outstanding man, and was certainly instrumental in keeping the hospital alive, particularly when he was the only doctor here for several months. I know we've had at least eight doctors come and go through the years, but Dr. Wright has always been here," he added.

Dr. Richard F. Wright came to Tahoka from London, England 21 years ago to practice medicine at Lynn County Hospital, ready to embrace the rural West Texas way of life with a no-nonsense British sense of humor and an unflagging devotion to his practice.

Prior to his decision to come to Tahoka, the doctor had visited South Hampton, R.I., Lancaster City, Penn., Abilene, Tx., San Francisco, Calif., and Denver, Colo. In an interview in The Lynn County News June 21, 1973 edition, Dr. Wright said one of the reasons for his deciding on Tahoka was that he didn't feel he was as needed and wanted anywhere else as in Tahoka, and that he liked Tahoka and the surrounding areas, the small town atmosphere, and the friendliness of the people here.

Born in Dublin, Ireland, Dr. Wright went to boarding school, then to Cambridge and London University. He grew up in southern England near the seashore, and had a lucrative medical practice on Hawley Street in London for 10 years. His father was a doctor in the British Navy.

Through contacts he made in London with American oil men and other business leaders, his curiosity about the United States of America was aroused to the point, he said in the earlier interview, where he decided

to come and see for himself. Following his decision to practice in Lynn County, Dr. Wright was welcomed to Tahoka on June 19, 1973 with a large crowd gathering at Lynn County Hospital to greet him. He began his practice on Monday, June 25, 1973, just a few weeks before the new clinic facilities were

Since that time, Dr. Richard F. Wright has seen approximately a quarter of a million patients - that's 40 patients a day, five days a week, for 21 years, plus an untold number of patients "worked into his schedule" without an appointment, and a multitude of emergency room patients in the dark hours of the night.

He estimates he has delivered more than 800 babies into this world, experienced a lot of tragedy and triumph, had a lot of luck (both good and bad) and has made lots of friends and very few enemies. "I've been sustained by friendship and trust, and this county has been very good to me," said the doctor, who, though small in stature, has taken upon his shoulders the burden of caregiver for many of his neighbors and friends during these past two decades.

Now, at a time when Dr. Wright is taking some time off to recuperate from health problems, Dr. Donald Freitag is the other full-time physician on staff at the local clinic. "I'd like to sing Dr. Freitag's praises," said Dr. Wright. "How lucky we are to acquire such a friendly, sensible young doctor. He is a good man, he knows his stuff and is very conscientious," he added.

"I'd like to say, about the hospital, that we have tried to be most things to most people," said Dr. Wright. "If we felt patients needed specialized help, we were not jealous about where they needed to go to obtain that care," he

"I believe we have kept the death rate in this hospital at a very low level, considering the number of elderly people in this county. I have seen this hospital come through some very difficult days, and have been continually amazed at how loyal the county has been to the hospital," said the doctor.

In the past several years, in the precious few spare hours available to the doctor, he acquired another interest quite separate from the medical field - literally in the fields a few miles from Tahoka, where he owns grape vineyards.

"People think I came here [to Americal for the money," said the doctor, "but I didn't ... I came here for the weather! You've no idea how awful it is in Europe. USDA Announces Support Level, By Type, For 1994 Peanut Crop

\$9,567.

Commodity Credit Corporation announced the average support levels by type, quality and location for the 1994 peanut crop.

The figures are based on national price support levels of \$678.36 per short ton for quota peanuts and \$132 per short ton for additional peanuts. Additional peanuts are those peanuts that are produced in excess of the quota established for a farm or on a farm that has no quota

The quota support level by type for an average grade ton of 1994crop peanuts will be: \$675.30 for Virginia-type peanuts; \$682.26 for Runner-type peanuts; \$634.46 for Spanish-type peanuts; \$675.30 for Valencia-type peanuts from the Southwest area which are suitable for cleaning and roasting; and \$634.46 for other Valencias.

The method of computing the price support levels for 1994 crop peanuts and the grades within the

types is the same as last year.

The U.S. Dept. of Agriculture's kernels in a ton, including sound split kernels, the support level will be: Virginia-type peanuts, \$9,807; Runner-type peanuts, \$9615; Spanishtype peanuts, \$9,567; Valencia-type peanuts in the Southwest area which are suitable for cleaning and roasting, \$10,166; and other Valencias,

> The loan value for additional peanuts is 19.46 percent of the applicable quota support level. The factor represents the ratio of the \$132 per short ton national support level for additional peanuts to the \$678.36 per short ton national support level for quota peanuts.

As with the 1993 crop, the price support level for 1994-crop peanuts on which a growth regulator was used will be discounted by 100 percent from the price support level that otherwise would be applible.

The actual price support levels for an individual lot of peanuts will depend on the percent of the various sizes of kernels in each ton of peanuts For each percent of sound mature and other factors.

Sixteen lambs and over 50 barrows were on feed this year in the FFA program.

Scholarship is also important in Tahoka ag. For the past 10 years, students who have been through the agricultural program have earned more than \$97,000 in agricultural scholarships. Tahoka FFA will offer its own scholarship this year with proceeds made from its barrow jack-

Region XVII Non-Traditional Vocational Student of the Year was senior Darla Willis. She said "Ag and FFA have given me more confidence and helped me to grow in the area of leadership."

FFA also has a livestock and dairy judging team, an annual fruit sale at Christmas, and volunteers at the Hospital Auxiliary Fun and Food Festival where they help set up and donate items for auction.

Mexico signed a peace agreement with other European countries, but could not meet the demands of the French. France, under the rule of Napoleon III, wanted to build an empire in Mexico.

Napoleon ordered his troops to march to Mexico City. The French troops were stopped by the poorly armed Mexican army led by General Zaragosa in a small town named Puebla. Mexico defeated France in this battle on the fifth of May, which now is celebrated as Cinco de Mayo.







That's the weather forecast for the planet Pluto, which joins Earth, Mars, and Triton (Neptune's moon) as the only bodies in the solar system known to experience seasons, according to MIT scientists who observed Pluto from 1985 through 1990 using three telescopes at the McDonald Observatory in Texas.

Pluto is so far away (30 to 50 times farther from the sun than Earth is), and so tiny, that the scientists were only able to observe it because of a chance alignment of Earth, Pluto, and its satellite Charon that occurs twice during Pluto's 248-year swing around the sun.

What a job to have! Scientists have jobs rather like newspaper people – they go to work every day but nobody can ever figure out what they're doing. But at least we here at our office put out, a paper every week, exercising the right of the people to know that we don't know what we're doing.



Conservation Practices Benefit Area Farmers

Willie Neiman, who lives west of Petty, uses perennial grass windstrips to control erosion on his highly erodible cropland. The windstrips protects his young cotton from damage, reduces terrace maintenance, and complies with the provisions of the Food Security Act, according to sources at the Soil Conservation Service in Tahoka

The back toe of all terrace ridges are planted to permanent grass. Neiman used Ermelo Lovegrass because it gets off to a good start in the spring, which helps block the wind when it is time to plant. Neiman does not have more than 180 feet between the grass strips. The grass trips are a minimum of 16 feet wide.

In addition to using windstrips to meet the requirements of his conservation plan, Nieman also spreads burrs on about 35 acres each year. Neiman said, "The cotton just looks better when the burrs were spread on the field than the areas that did not receive any burrs. Where the burrs (were spread, the previous winter, the cotton was not as affected by the drought. When it did rain in August the cotton responded better," he ex-

Neiman said,"The gin manager tries not to send burrs to a field that will cause a big weed problem. Where the burrs were spread this past year, it did not cause any additional weed

ASCS Reminds Foreigners Of AFIDA Requirement

the 16-county area.

"Foreigners who have bought or sold agricultural land in Lynn County are reminded to report the transaction to our office within 90 days," Jimmy Woodard, County Executive Director of the Lynn County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said this week.

To avoid Federal penalties and monetary fines, foreign owners of US agricultural land must report their holdings, acquisitions, dispositions, leases of 10 years or more, and landuse changes to (ASCS) within 90 days.

"The report is required by the Agricultural Foreign Investment Disclosure Act, (AFIDA) which is still in effect," Woodard said. Foreign investors are required to file a report if all or part of any agricultural land is sold, or the title is transferred to another person.

Failure to file the AFIDA report could result in a civil penalty of up to 25 percent of the fair market value of the interest held in the agricultural land, he said.

For reporting purposes, agricultural land is any tract of more than 10 acres in the aggregate now in the farming or ranching operation. "This includes land in agricultural use when purchased, as well as land later converted to agricultural use," the ASCS official said.

County government offices, realtors, attorneys and others involved in real estate transactions are asked to notify the foreign investor of these reporting requirements.


