## O'Donnell High Science Team Wins National Seiko Competition

Distinguished science educators across the nation selected O'Donnell High School's Science Team as one of five Regional Winning teams for the Seiko Youth Challenge - Year IV from over 300 projects entered this year. The four-member team and advisor Rubeth Griffing won an all-expense paid trip to New York City to the National Awards Ceremony June 1.

The Seiko Team of O'Donnell High School was named the Central Region Winner for their project "Heavy Metal Poisoning - The Environmental Impact of Toxic Hazardous Waste." The team members include Jennifer Barrett, 10th grader; Amanda Childress, 11th grader; Charlie Vaughn, 11th grader, and Robert Eaker, 12th grader.

## Burglaries Reported In County

Two burglaries in the New Home area were reported during the last week, although one of them, in which a Black and Decker jig saw was stolen, may have occurred as early as three weeks ago.

D.B. Marris of Rt. 1, Wilson, reported the saw, valued at \$64, was taken from a wood shop about 4 miles east of New Home on FM 211.

The other burglary was reported by Carey Rudd, Rt. 1, Wilson, who said Pioneer and Emerson stereo and video equipment was taken from a residence north of New Home on FM 1729 Friday evening.

Charles Brookshire of Tahoka reported that his truck which had been stuck on a dirt road east of FM 1054 and south of U.S. 380 Saturday had burned by Sunday morning when he returned to the vehicle.

Tahoka Police Dept. investigated a collision last Wednesday at the intersection of Main and N. 2nd St. involving a 1986 Ford driven by Roy William Burdett, 76, of Tahoka and a 1977 GMC pickup driven by Enrique Quesada Tarango, 51, of Tahoka.

In jail during the week were two persons for driving while intoxicated, first offense, and one each for failure to appear on DWI charges, application to revoke probation on DWI charges and application to revoke probation on charges of fleeing.

The Seiko Youth Challenge is a national science competition which asks teams of high school students to identify, research, analyze and propose a solution to a local environmental problem. Written submissions were received in February, and the 25 teams selected as Regional Finalists in March went on to submit videotape versions of their projects.

Five teams, including O'Donnell, have now been judged as best in their regions. The five regions of the United States include the Northeast, Southeast, Midwest, Central and West.

The first phase of the project involved growing garden plants such as corn, squash, pumpkin, spinach, lettuce, and carrot. The plants were used to find how much heavy metal they would absorb, thus showing the potential danger of heavy metals entering the food web.

The second phase of the project involved research with hyperaccumulators. Hyperaccumulators are plants that are used to purify soil. They can absorb a large amount of heavy metal in their cell structure. The team found through their research that cocklebur plants act as a hyperaccumulator.

The plants were grown and tested to see how much heavy metal they would absorb. The plants were then dried and burned in crucibles inside a protective laboratory hood to recover the heavy metals.

The third phase of the project involved testing the toxicity of the heavy metals. Small amounts of standard heavy metal solutions were added to live yeast cells. The inhibition of cell division of the yeast cells could be directly related to the lethal dosage given to animals.

The fourth phase of the project involved finding out what local people knew about heavy metals. This information, along with research the students collected, was used to educate the public.

The members of the team and advisor have won special edition Seiko watches, and the trip to New York City to the National Awards Ceremony. The team also received \$5,000 in scholarships to be split equally among the members and the school received \$1,000.

A national winner will be named June 1 at the awards ceremony. If O'Donnell is chosen as the national winner, the team will receive \$25,000 in scholarships to be split equally among the students and the school will receive \$5,000.

The O'Donnell Seiko Teams have proven to be very successful. The Seiko I Team was also named the Central Region Winner. The members of this team included Lea Bessire, Kristy Russ, Joe Sanchez, John Hogg, and Brandi Barton.

The Seiko II Team was named Regional Finalist, only five points from the Central Region Winner. The members of this team included Gary Stidham, Ernie Cruz, Brandi Barton, and Joe Sanchez.

The Seiko III Team was named Regional Finalist, only two points from the Central Region Winner. The members of this team included Robert Eaker, Brandi Barton, Kristy Franklin, and Misty Franklin.

The 24 officers are running from Lubbock to Austin, with each officer running two miles at a time and switching out.

## Robert White Named Head Boys Basketball Coach Here

Robert Lynn White, head coach at McCamey I.S.D., was offered a contract as Tahoka High School head boys basketball coach by Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees Tuesday night.

Trustees voted 7-0 to offer White the position, on the recommendation of Athletic Director Darrell "Tooter" Draper. White has held the position of head boys basketball coach at the 2-A McCamey school district for the past two years. Prior to that position he was assistant coach at Aubrey I.S.D. for two years. He is a graduate of Howard Payne University, where during his last two years in attendance he was head junior varsity coach and assistant varsity coach for the college teams.

"He is a strong disciplinarian, but very fair, has high moral values, is good with kids and a strong classroom teacher," Draper told The News. "As a basketball coach, he has a very up-tempo, fast-paced game with a man-to-man defense," Draper added. He said White was 27 years old, and he and his wife have a five-week-old baby girl.

Trustees also voted unanimously to offer a contract to Jennifer McLelland of Tahoka for an elementary teaching position. Superintendent Dr. Duane Carter informed trustees of his acceptance of a letter of resignation from coach Jimmy Burns, effective at the end of this school year.

Deputy State Fire Marshal Bryan Wheeler, from the Lubbock regional office of the Texas Commission on Fire Protection, addressed the board concerning a fire safety inspection visit based on a complaint of a local citizen. He informed trustees that the inspection, conducted on Jan. 18, 1994, showed that some of the doors at the high school gym were locked during school functions.

"No door in the gym should be locked where people can not get out from inside the gym during any type of function, either during school hours, basketball games, or any function conducted inside the gym," Wheeler said. "People need to be able to get out from any door, especially during a panic situation, not only for fire safety but for any type of panic situation," he explained, adding that trustees should consider writing a new policy to ensure the problem is corrected.

Wheeler had conferred previously with High School Principal Charles Cate and Supt. Carter. Board President Greg Henley informed Wheeler that the district was in the midst of changing administrative personnel, and invited him to return in a month or two to help the board form a new policy to address the fire marshal's concerns. "Certainly the safety of the students comes first," Henley said.

In other business, the board approved a list of six transfer students to the district, approved a contract with West Texas Food Service Purchasing Cooperative for another year, as well as a Regional Media Services contract with Region 17 Education Service Center.

Newly elected officers Greg Henley and Rex Rash took the oath of office for new members, and Henley was re-elected by trustees as President of the Board. Clint Gardner was re-elected as Vice President, and Brad Hammonds was re-elected Secretary of the Board.

David Hutton, who will assume the responsibilities of superintendent for the district on June 1, was present for the meeting, and met with trustees in executive session to interview a candidate for high school principal. Trustees will meet in a special meeting Monday, May 23 at 7:45 a.m. with the principal position on the agenda.

Bookkeeper Loretta Tekell gave a financial report, noting that 91.53 percent of tax collections had been received, with an account balance in all funds of \$1,501,264.80.

Several classroom improvement projects for the typing, journalism, science, biology and business classrooms were discussed, including several computer purchases. No action was taken on the computer purchases, but trustees voted 6-1 to replace the work lab stations in the high school biology classroom with new work stations, at a cost of less than \$25,000, noting that the safety issue was a major factor in their decision after looking at the classroom. The current lab stations face away from the teaching center, have electrical outlets placed adjacent to water faucets, and very narrow work spaces for students. It is expected that the new work stations will be ready for installation in September.

Dr. Carter reviewed the district's graduation policy for the board, noting that any student who has not met

state course requirements can not participate in graduation exercises and that any student who has met state requirements but fails the exit-level TAAS test (also state-mandated) will be allowed to march in with the graduating class but will be designated as a later graduate. He noted that Baccalaureate services will be held Sunday, and commencement exercises next Friday.

The June board meeting was scheduled for June 16 at 7:30 p.m. All trustees were present at the meeting, including Henley, Rash, Gardner, Hammonds, Dan Stone, Juanell Jones and Myrtle White, as well as several district personnel and site-based council representative Stan Gill. The five-hour meeting adjourned at 1 a.m.

## Retirement Reception Set Sunday

A retirement reception honoring Tahoka Independent School District Superintendent Dr. Duane Carter, superintendent secretary Freda Jeffcoat, and high school librarian JoAnn Pennington will be held Sunday, May 22 from 2:30 to 4 p.m. in the fellowship hall of the First Baptist Church of Tahoka, located at 1701 Ave. K.

The reception is hosted by the TISD Board of Trustees. Dr. Carter is retiring after serving 12 years at Tahoka, two years as a teacher, two as a principal, and the last eight as superintendent. Mrs. Jeffcoat is retiring after 30 years as superintendent secretary here, having served with eight superintendents since 1964. Mrs. Pennington has been high school librarian for 18 years.

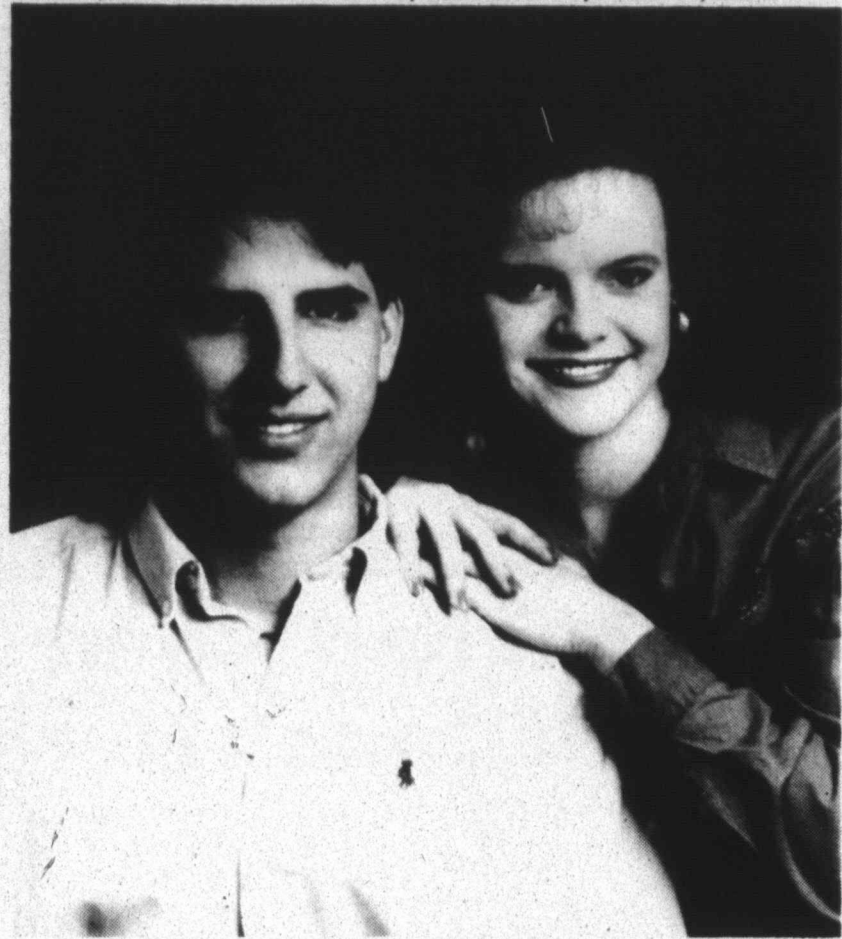

Formula One is one of the best known products on the market containing Ephedrine which is a stimulant.

Dr. David Smith, State health commissioner says he can prohibit the sale of Formula One because it fails to list Ephedrine and Caffeine as ingredients. The label also fails to warn of those stimulants, he said.

The Texas Agricultural Extension Service Nutrition Specialist says that you should consult your physician before taking this or any other diet supplement.

## Scale Insects Attacking Area Live Oak Trees

A small insect, Lecanium scales, can pose a threat to live oaks and now is the time to apply a pesticide to infested trees, says Extension Agent, Entomology, Tommy Doederlein.

Lecanium scales are most prominent on twigs and small branches during the spring and early summer. A single infested twig may have more than 100 scales on it, although fewer scales are more commonly present.

These scales are hemispherical in shape and dark brown in color. They're about one-eighth to one-fourth inch in diameter.

by reducing vitality and causing die-back of infested branches. Heavily infested trees produce a sticky honeydew in late April which falls to the ground. While they are most damaging to live oaks, they also occur on red oaks, the agent said.

Eggs are produced underneath the hard-shelled female during late spring and hatch in May. The immature insects then feed on the underside of leaves during the summer. They migrate to twigs in the fall and overwinter there. There is only one generation a year.

Eggs are hatching now on the South Plains. Scale insects are most susceptible to control at this time, Doederlein said, and insecticide treatments will be most effective if applied now. Heavily infested trees may require two applications two weeks apart.

Insecticides recommended for control include orthene, dursban, sevin, malathion and diazinon. Thorough coverage will improve the effectiveness of sprays. Always read and follow insecticide label instructions carefully, the agent cautioned.

## April Weather Cooler Than Normal

The weather across the Texas South Plains during the month of April 1994 turned out to be cooler than normal with above normal precipitation, according to the National Weather Service, Lubbock office.

Temperatures averaged 1.1 degrees below normal and ranged from one degree above normal at Lubbock to 2.1 degrees below normal at Tahoka, which averaged at 58.7 for the month of April.

Maximum temperatures averaged 0.5 degree below normal and ranged from 1.9 degrees above normal at Lubbock to 2.8 degrees below normal at Dimmitt. The highest temperature of the month was recorded at Jayton, Paducah and Spur on April 15.

Minimum temperatures averaged 1.6 degrees below normal and ranged from 0.3 degree above normal at Morton to 3.9 degrees below normal at Lamesa.

Precipitation finally was above normal, thanks to the last few days of the month.

## Expense Account For County Agent Discussed Again

Lynn County Commissioners met again this week to discuss conflicting reports of travel expense accounts for Lynn County Agricultural Extension Agent Wade Shackelford, who was relieved of his county agent duties last week, on May 10.

It had been reported that \$3900 of a \$4500 travel expense account had been used since January 1994, but failed to mention a \$1500 vehicle expense account with a full balance remaining, totaling for a \$6000 combined travel and vehicle expense account fund.

County Treasurer Janet Porterfield reported Monday to the court that as of May 16, \$4,224.74 from the combined accounts had been spent, leaving a balance of \$1,775.26. County Judge J.F. Brandon told commissioners that those figures meant that 70.4% of the total annual travel and vehicle budget had been used in the four-and-a-half months since January.

Shackelford was not present at the meeting but told *The News* that, according to his figures, he had been reimbursed for \$2,118.19 for actual travel expenses (hotels and meals, excluding any vehicle expense such

as gas, oil and maintenance) since January. "I have been out of the county for 36 days at stock shows, and that figure averages to \$58.83 per day spent on motels and meals," said Shackelford. "The truck (owned by the county) has 129,000 miles on it, and I can't control the expense it takes for gas, oil and maintenance," he added.

According to figures released by the county treasurer from a compilation of receipt records, a total of \$1,655.30 has been spent on gas, oil and maintenance for the vehicle since January to date.

Shackelford submitted a letter of resignation to the Commissioners Court in December 1993, effective June 1, 1994. He continues to receive his regular salary until June 1.

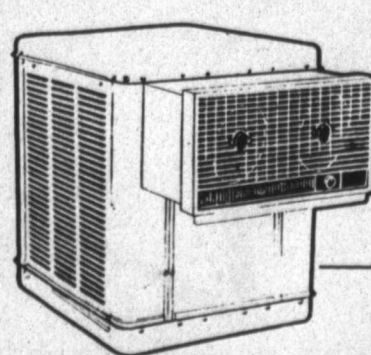

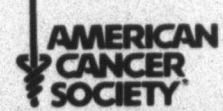

The 32 members in the High School Band will perform Friend Like Me, Man from Snowy River, Surfin' USA, and Barbara Ann.

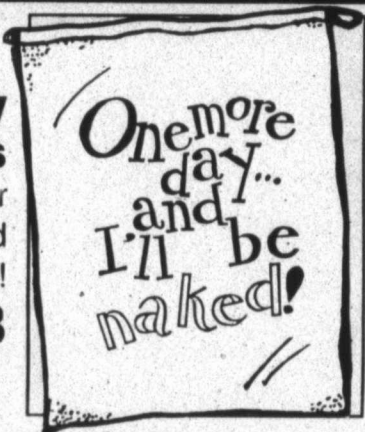

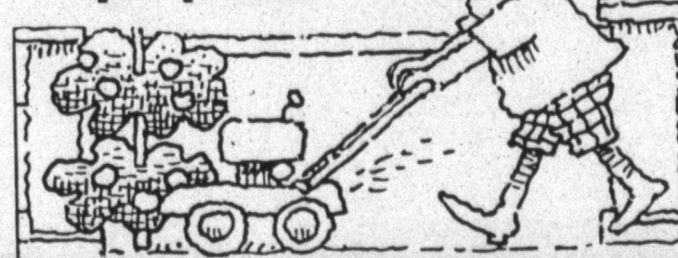

**Public Notice**

On March 23, 1994, GTE and Contel ("The Companies") filed applications with the Public Utility Commission of Texas ("PUC") to restructure the Companies' Switched Transport rate category and reduce the Carrier Common Line (CCL) charge of its Switched Access Service.
