## Cub Scouts Foster Patriotism:

### Over 200 U.S. Flags Displayed In Tahoka

Over 200 United States Flags were displayed in Tahoka on Memorial Day, due to the efforts of Tahoka Cub Scout Pack 782. Through the Flag Membership Program, local Scouts and leaders placed 241 U.S. flags at Tahoka businesses and residences, and are aiming for a goal of 500. The flags will be displayed again next week on Flag Day, June 14, followed by Independence Day on July 4, and

three more holidays throughout the year. The Cub Scout Flag Membership Program fosters patriotism and responsibility for local scouts, as they begin early in the morning on six holidays a year, delivering and placing flag poles and flags to participating members, retrieving the flags and poles by dark, and storing them until the next holiday.

## WISD Trustees To Meet Tonight

Wilson Independent School District Board of Trustees will meet tonight (Thursday) at 6 p.m. The Oath of Office will be administered to newly elected board members Dan Cook and Keith Wied, and an election of officers will be conducted.

Other agenda items include a financial report, reports from staff, including TAAS results, campus proposals for 94-95, possible gym renovations, school finance, summer work projects, activity funds report, policy update information, and TEA letter concerning an audit report.

New business on the agenda includes a request for approval of an interlocal agreement to participate in an Alternative School Cooperative to be located at Meadow, Texas; consider employment of an attorney to defend a lawsuit; consider endorsing a candidate for Region 17 TASB Trustee; elect delegate to the State TASB Convention in Dallas, consider adoption of Local Policy Update on Credit by Examination, consider amending the budget to purchase a greenhouse for the Vocational Agriculture program.

"You never have to remember to put your flag out on these holidays - we'll do it for you, and store the flag as well," said Cub Scout leader Keith Paschal. "Not only does the program teach patriotism and responsibility to our scouts, it's also a fund-raising project for us," he added, noting that the local Cub Scout pack is raising money for camps and other projects.

The Flag Membership Program costs \$25 annually, with flags displayed on President's Day, Memorial Day, Flag Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, and Veteran's Day. Flags can be displayed on sidewalks in front of businesses, or on the front lawns of area residences.

For those living in the country, or for anyone wishing to display a flag as a memorial, the Scouts will place flags on the courthouse lawn on the square in downtown Tahoka. Tags designating memorials will be placed on each flag pole.

Cub Scout Pack 782 in Tahoka involves 43 local boys, ages 6-12. Leaders are Paschal, Jerry Webster, Todd Henry, Shawn Overton, Barry Pittman, Louis Vasquez, Gary Strickland, Angel Strickland and Jay Druessedow.

## City Plans To Repair Water Tank

The elevated water tank at Ave. P and Lockwood recently developed a leak which has since been repaired, but the tank still needs outside painting and internal repairs. So the Tahoka city council Monday authorized city engineers to draw specifications preparatory to seeking bids on repairs for that tower and tank.

Newly elected councilman Jay Dee House was administered the oath of office. All council members were present except Wayne Huffaker, who is hospitalized.

A scheduled public hearing on dilapidated buildings targeted for demolishing was postponed since mailing addresses of some of the owners could not be determined so they can be notified. The hearing will be held when owners can be located.

Police Chief Jerry Webster reported on activities of his department for the previous month. He also spoke regarding a Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) program which possibly could be conducted in conjunction with Tahoka public schools. Also present to comment on this program were DPS Officer Randy Gustafsen and reserve officer Richard Spears and the officers' wives.

## Burglaries Cleared; Vandalism, Thefts, Accident Investigated

Two burglaries in the city, one in February and one in 1992, were cleared this week with the arrest of a 21-year-old Tahoka man who later pleaded guilty before Judge George Hansard in 106th District Court here.

Judge Hansard sentenced Domingo Riojas III to a seven-year term, probated, on the burglaries, one in February at a home on N. 6th owned by Carla Moore of Lubbock and one in 1992 at the home of Betty Garcia, also on N. 6th, where a TV set valued at \$400 was stolen. Police said they obtained information on the 1992 burglary while looking for items stolen in the February burglary, from which a TV and microwave were recovered.

Judge Hansard ordered Riojas to pay restitution for items not recovered.

The judge also assessed terms last week for Simon Frank Rodriguez, 38, of Tahoka, on charges of driving while intoxicated, subsequent offense, four years probated; and for Jose Lopez, 18, of Tahoka, five years probated on a plea of guilty to possession of a prohibited weapon on school premises. And in Seminole, the judge assessed a 10-year probated sentence to Rucico Jauregui, 36, of O'Donnell, on charges of indecency with a child.

Tahoka Police questioned a suspect but charges have not yet been filed in the disappearance of a diamond necklace valued at \$1500 missing from the home of Sammy and Tina Sims on N. 4th St. Friday afternoon, when Mrs. Sims was having a garage sale. The necklace had been left near a telephone reportedly used by a customer at the garage sale. A

reward has been offered for the return of the necklace.

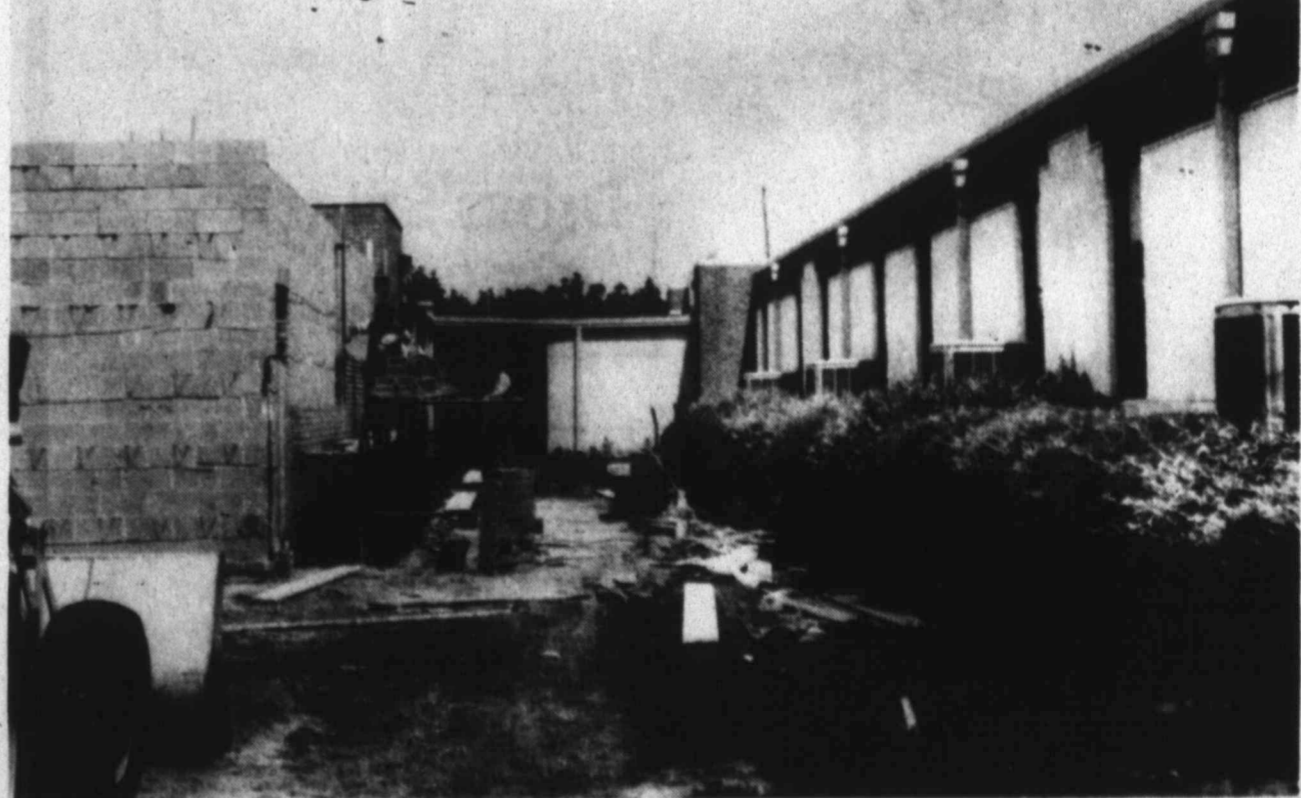

The front glass door at Perry's Variety Store was broken Sunday night, Tahoka Police Dept. was advised. Also on Sunday the windshield of a van owned by General Telephone Electronics parked by the GTE building in Tahoka was broken and the side of the van scratched with a

rock.

A 1985 Nissan driven by Cheryl Marie Isbell, 19, Tahoka, and 1989 GMC Jimmy driven by Christi Lockaby, 26, of Tahoka collided in the 1600-block of Lockwood Saturday morning. There were no injuries.

In jail during the week were three persons for DWI first offense, two for public intoxication, and one each for resisting arrest plus public intoxication, application to revoke probation on DWI charges, burglary of a habitation, bench warrant, and DWI third plus no drivers license.

IN THE FIRST few days of June, the daily newspapers and television channels ran 35 zillion stories about the 50th anniversary of D-Day. I didn't read or see them all, but some were interesting. However, not until the actual D-Day anniversary of June 6 did I see anywhere just what the D in D-Day stood for.

Some of us had wondered about this, so one friend looked it up in an encyclopedia and discovered that the "D" really doesn't stand for anything, so far as we could determine from the explanation. In spite of all this, I still would rather be out in temperatures of 97 than in 15-degree (or less) weather.

Fall and spring are good times, temperature-wise, around here. Please, Lord, if it suits your plans, give us year-round temperatures of 75-82 degrees in the daytime and about 50 at night.

## NHS Inducts New Members

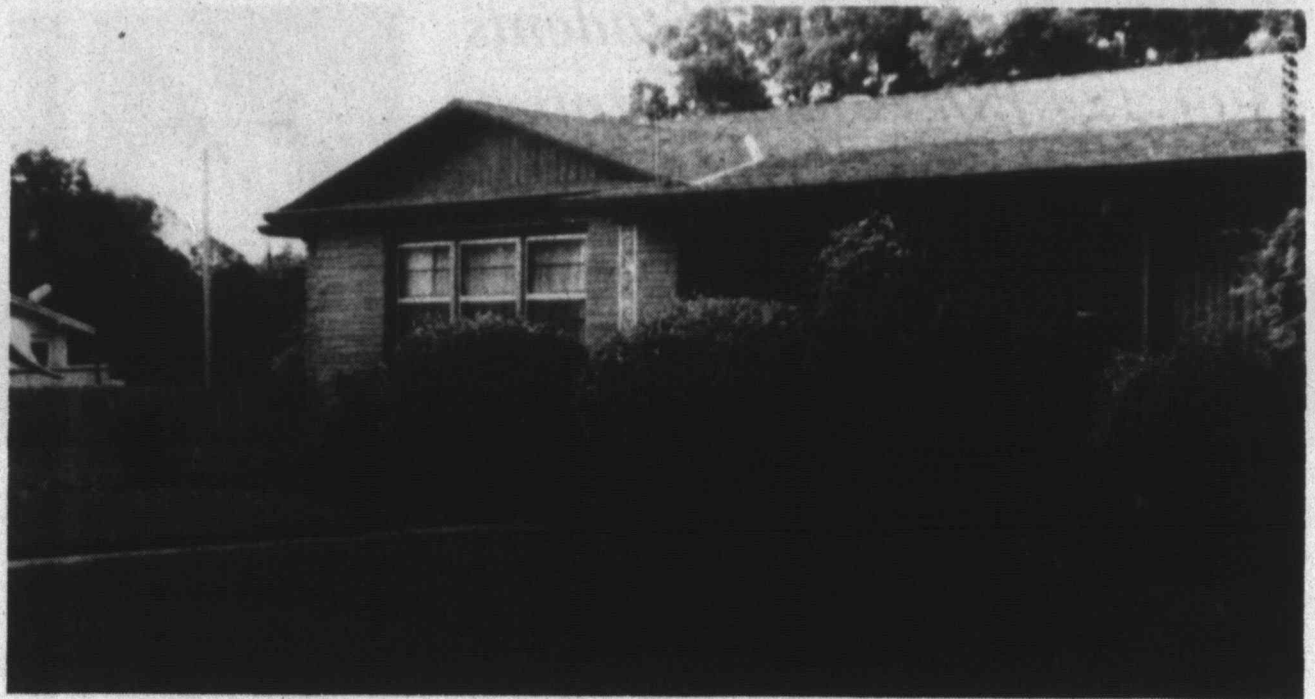
Tahoka High School National Honor Society officers and present members passed their torches to new officers and inductees at their annual candlelight initiation ceremony held May 2.

## BBB REPORT

A Pennsylvania health insurer, accused of mistreating Texas consumers, was suspended by the Texas Department of Insurance on February 22 because of its allegedly hazardous financial condition. An emergency cease and desist order prohibits its National American Life Insurance Company of Pennsylvania from writing new policies or renewing existing policies in Texas. The company may continue paying claims and the company does have a right to contest the emergency order and if it desires, must request a hearing within 30 days after receiving the order. Allegations, among other things, were that the company canceled 286 group policies, which covered 2,564 employees and their families, without offering replacement coverage as required by law. This left Texans with pre-existing medical conditions stranded without coverage. Certain actions taken by the company to ease its financial problems, such as failure to offer certain replacement coverage to employees whose insurance was cancelled, violated Texas insurance laws.

**Bank Robber Record Found Operated In Sooner State 25 Years; Served Pen Sentence; Was Starr's Partner**

"Hello, Bill!"  
"Hello, George — What the devil are you boys doing down here?"  
This was the greeting exchanged between Sheriff G.R. Lackey of McAlester, Oklahoma and Bill Tidwell, alias J.M. Bradshaw, in jail here on a charge of robbing the O'Donnell bank recently, when Lackey and his deputy H.H. Sherrill walked into the sheriff's office here Monday morning.

The two Oklahoma officers had heard of the O'Donnell job and from descriptions of Bradshaw that they had seen and from other evidence in their possession they believed him to be Bill Tidwell, a colorful criminal character of their state, and they came down just to take a look. Sure enough they were right, and Bradshaw acknowledged that his real name is Bill Tidwell.

Lackey and Sherrill had known Tidwell for 25 years. He has quite a criminal record in Oklahoma, according to these officers ...  
...and he is said to have been a member of the notorious Henry Starr gang.

### Time To Control Pesky Bagworms

Bagworms are one of the major pests of juniper and other trees and shrubs in Texas. Spring hatch began in early May on the South Plains this year. Hatching is usually completed in about three weeks. Insecticide control is most effective in early June when the bagworms are small, says Extension Agent Entomologist, Tommy Doederlein.

In the spring, bagworm larvae emerge from hatching eggs inside last year's bags and begin feeding on foliage. Each bagworm begins to construct its own protective bag of silk, twigs and leaves, making them camouflaged and hard to see. As the larvae and their bags continue to grow, control becomes more difficult.

Bagworms feed throughout the summer months, building their bags until they are about 1 1/2 inches long. Doederlein said. In the fall, the bagworms become adults, mate and the females lay eggs inside their bags. They then overwinter in these bags in the egg stage on trees and shrubs. Each overwintering female bag on the tree contains from 500 to 1,500 eggs.

"Since the bagworm only completes one generation a year and spreads very slowly from plant to plant, picking the bags off infested plants in the winter will help a lot toward controlling this pest," said Doederlein. "But if bagworms were present on plants last year and control measures weren't applied, chances are an insecticide will be needed this spring."

Insecticides which can be used to control bagworms include sevin, dursban, diazinon, malathion and orthene. The biological insecticide *Bacillus thuringiensis* can also be used. To obtain effective control, thorough coverage of the foliage is important. The addition of a small amount of liquid soap or surfactant to the spray solution will improve control because it helps adhere the insecticide to the treated trees and shrubs. "Always read and follow label instructions when applying insecticides," the county agent cautioned.

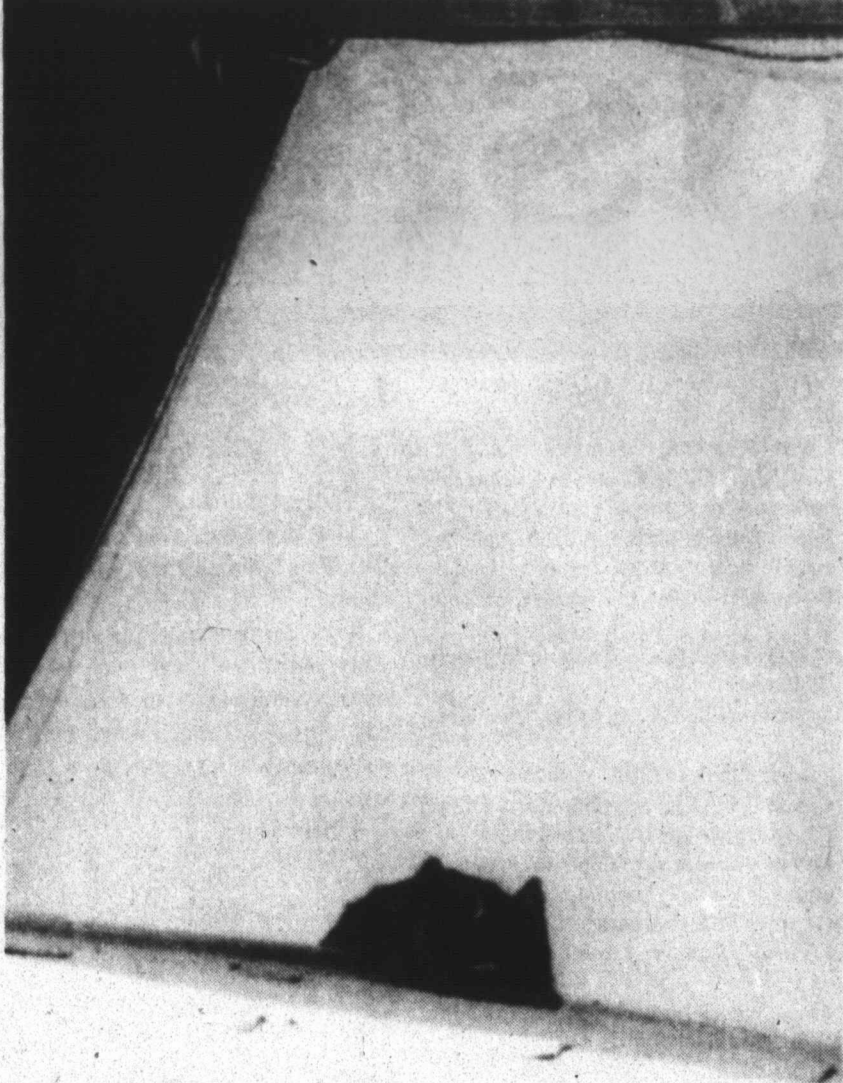

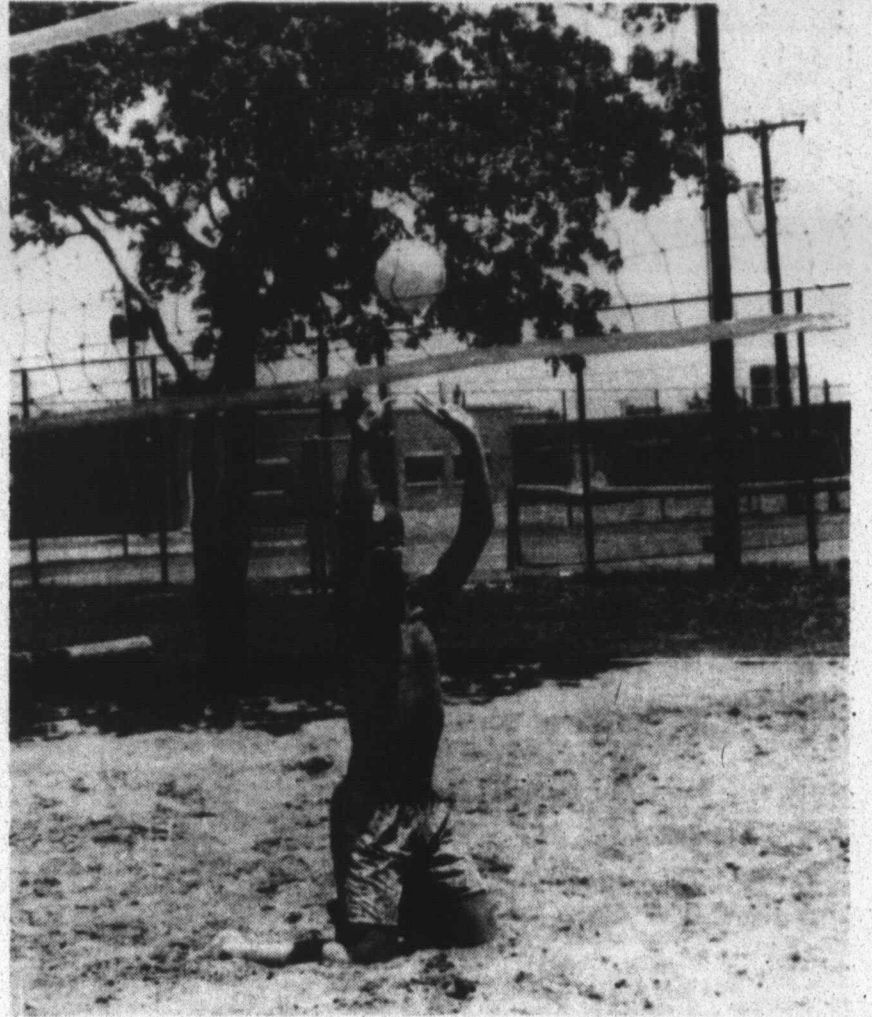
Rosalinda Resendez was the most improved 7th grade student in the Middle School Band. The 8th grader showing the most improvement was Jamie Luna.
