Six Jailed In Week

Six new inmates were jailed at Lynn County jail during the last week, including two for "forgery by making," and one each for theft by check, judgment and sentencing on charges of driving while intoxicated, second offense, DWI third offense plus driving while license suspended and no liability insurance.

There were no new reports of offenses or traffic accidents, although there reportedly was a one-car accident involving a Slaton woman on FM 400 near Wilson Saturday morning. The accident was investigated by Lubbock DPS, and no information was immediately available.

Sheriff's officers were investigating reports that more than 20 street lights in the city of Wilson had been shot out during the last week.

New Doctor May Open Practice Oct. 1 At Lynn County Hospital

Dr. Griff Thomas, who recently contracted with Lynn County Hospital-Clinic to begin a family practice here, has targeted October 1 as the date which he hopes to open his clinic office, Hospital Administrator Louise Landers told the hospital's Board of Directors Thursday morning.

Board President Leland White appointed a search committee, composed of directors Boyd Barnes, Norman Ledbetter and Virginia Griffing, to look for housing in the Tahoka area for the new doctor and his family. Dr. Thomas currently resides in Ohio, and will be moving to Tahoka with his wife and two children. Although the hospital does not provide housing, the committee will compose a list of possible housing options for the doctor to investigate.

In other business at the regular monthly meeting, directors recognized past directors, awarding a plaque to Peggy Morton, who attended the meeting, and to Bettye Green, who was unable to attend the meeting.

Mrs. Landers told directors that work was continuing on the breezeway enclosure project at the hospital, with bricklaying as the next step. She updated the board on the proposed retirement facility project, which is still in the planning and grant-seeking process, and told directors about a meeting with the Wes-Tex Resource

Conservation and Development (RC&D) group and a possible grant writer for the project.

The board approved a courtesy staff application for Frederick Passmann, M.D., for emergency room coverage at the hospital. Dr. Passmann, of Lubbock, also currently sees patients at the hospital's clinic on a temporary basis.

Sr. Mary Hospital representatives met with the Lynn County Hospital board, seeking a cooperative effort in providing wellness clinics to area businesses. According to Mrs. Landers, St. Mary's staff will provide the service to businesses who wish to conduct wellness clinics for their employees, and the lab work will be done at Lynn County Hospital. Directors voted to participate in the venture, which may also provide some community health education classes.

Monthly bills were approved and a financial statement was given at the meeting. All board members were present.

Tahoka Middle/High School Registration Set August 2-9

Registration for previously enrolled students in Tahoka Middle School and High School grades 7-12 will be Tuesday, August 2 through Monday, August 8. The following days are assigned for each grade level:

12th grade- Tuesday, Aug. 2; 11th grade- Wednesday, Aug. 3; 10th grade- Thursday, Aug. 4; 9th grade- Friday, Aug. 5; 8th grade- Monday, Aug. 8; and 7th grade- Monday, Aug. 8 at 7 p.m.

Students are asked to come according to the time period allotted for their last name:

9-10 a.m.- A-E; 10-11 a.m. - F-J; 11-12 noon - K-O; 12-1 p.m. - P-T; 1-2 p.m. - U-Z.

Registration will be from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. each day in the counselor's office with an exception on Thursday, August 4 when registration will be from 1-5 p.m. for the sophomores. Students will receive their schedules, books, locker assignments, handbook and assignment books.

WISD Board Discusses Suit

The Wilson ISD Board of Trustees met in a called meeting on Monday, July 25, at 8 p.m. to discuss a settlement in the Martin vs. Wilson Board of Trustees suit. No action was taken by the board concerning the suit.

The Board also appointed Nancy Templeton, superintendent, to establish a committee to review the district's existing school facilities to identify physical obstacles which limit the accessibility of programs or activities to individuals with disabilities and to develop an ADA transition plan for the district.

Parking spaces will be sold on a first come first serve basis the day of registration. Parking fees of \$20 must be paid in full before parking space will be assigned.

It is extremely important that each student attend registration because schedules will not be changed after their designated day of registration, according to school officials.

During registration each student will also be updating data sheets and emergency notification forms. Data needed for these includes current address, current home and emergency phone numbers, emergency contact and family physician and phone number. The school would like to stress that they must have at least one phone number, either home or relative, on each student. Also, they remind those students who received notice that immunization shots were needed that this matter must be taken care of before they will be allowed to attend school. Students are urged to bring immunization records with them the first day of school.

Registration for new students will be Tuesday, Aug. 9, from 9 a.m.-2 p.m. in the counselor's office. Each new student must bring their immunization record, social security card, report card from previous school attended, address and phone number of previous school and all emergency notification data.

Road/Bridge Fees Retained; Sheriff To Get New Vehicle

Although there apparently are no bridges in Lynn County other than a couple of overpasses across highways, the county will continue to add \$10 for "road and bridge fees" to each vehicle license fee.

Commissioners approved keeping the fee as one of the items of business in a regular session Monday. Most Texas counties collect the fee routinely.

With all commissioners present Monday for the session presided over by Judge J.F. Brandon, the group also decided to join an organization called "Keep Texas Beautiful", approved bids for a new maintainer for Precinct 4 and approved a new vehicle for the Sheriff's Dept., with a ceiling set on a trade differential.

The court met in closed session with Dr. Bob Robinson of the District Extension Office, but no action was taken regarding the vacancy of the County Agricultural Extension Agent's office here. It was reported that no applicants have applied for the position.

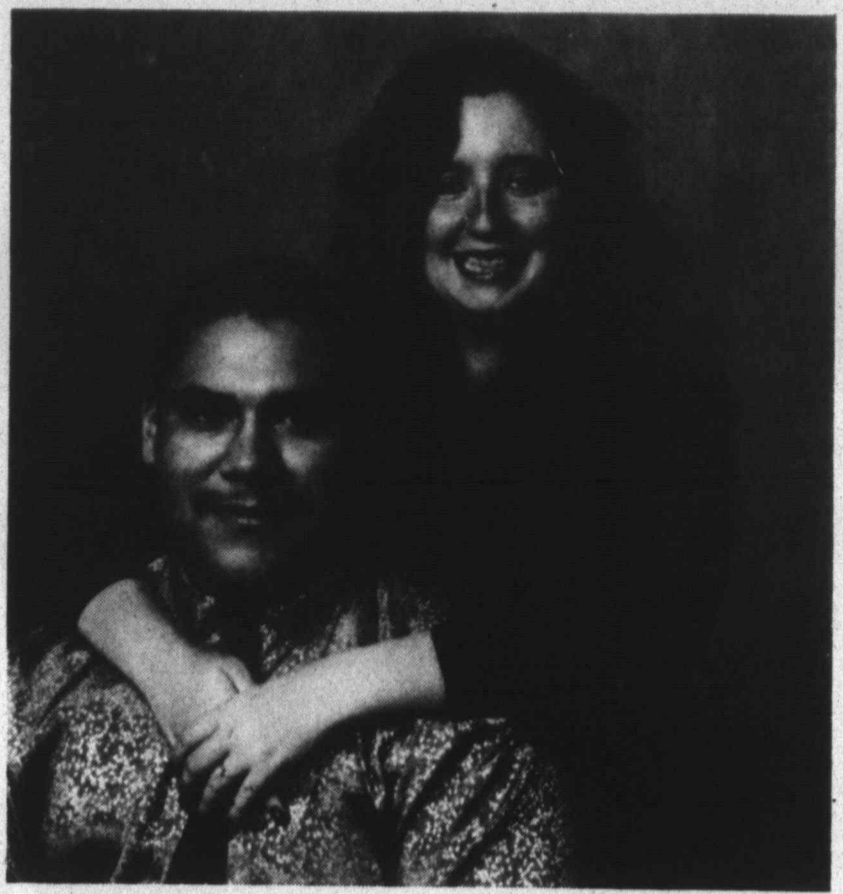

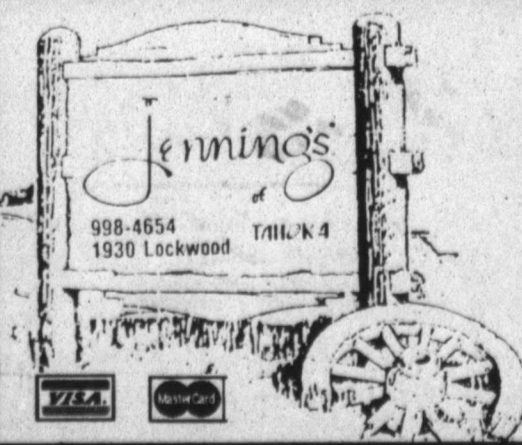

NOTICE OF FLUORIDE LEVEL IN WATER
The City of Wilson has been notified by the Texas Department of Health that the water being supplied by our system exceeds the maximum constituent level for fluoride established by the department's "Safe Drinking Water Act."
The samples of water from the Wilson system contain 4.1 milligrams of fluoride per liter, and the department requires the city to notify all customers. There is no immediate health hazard for drinking water containing fluoride at this level except that it could cause mottling (brown stain) on the teeth of children under 14 years of age.
All the dentists in this area are aware of the fluoride level.
The City will continue to search for alternate sources of supply and will investigate any available treatment techniques to lower the level of our fluoride if they are affordable at all.

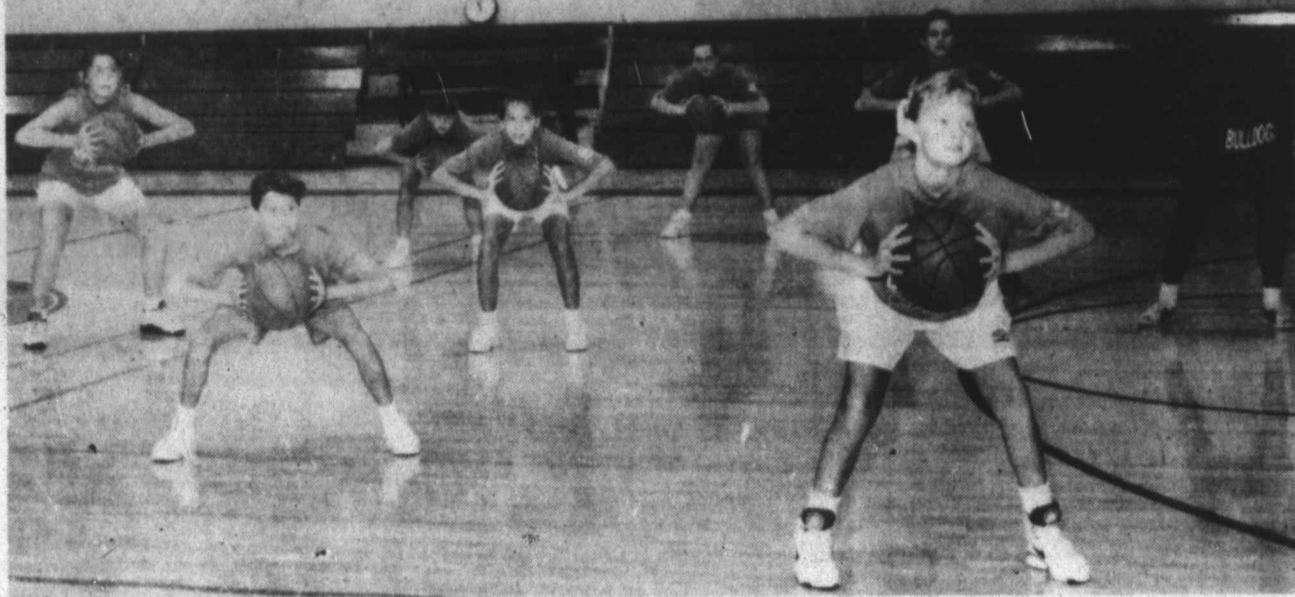
