Many girls grow up playing with dolls and doll houses. Mildred Abbe of Tahoka was like these girls, except for one thing - she never stopped playing.

Mrs. Abbe received her first doll house in 1978 at age 66 from her children as a Christmas gift.

She says she has always had an interest in doll houses. The first one she played with was built by her father around 1910 for his step-sister. That doll house was passed on through several family members and is now in the Lydia Girl's Home, an orphanage in Chicago.

Her interest in miniatures continued as a child when her parents moved into a new home in Chicago and found a postage-stamp size dictionary. She still has the dictionary that is accompanied with a magnifying glass needed to read the printed words.

She says she enjoys decorating doll houses because, "you can put as much time and money into a doll house as you want and have it to pass on to your children."

She began decorating her first doll house in a Victorian, late 1880s to early 1900s, theme. The decorations and accessories are accurate for the time period the house was designed to represent.


The Victorian house is three-stories tall and is equipped with electricity and indoor plumbing. The house has a sewing room, a nursery complete with toys and even a miniature doll house. There is a dining room with the table set for four. In the master bedroom a glass of iced tea sits on the table, and in the parlor, playing cards are left scattered on the table. The kitchen shows food ready to eat -ham, turkey, salad-and a chicken with its head cut off lays on the cutting board. Other amenities of the house include a vacuum cleaner, a hot water bottle, a baby potty, a box of tissues, and a fireplace that glows.

The historical aspect is enhanced with the presence of an ice wagon and a vegetable cart outside.

Mrs. Abbe purchased her second doll house partially complete. She decided to decorate this house in a Federalist theme. This realistic house has no electric lights and has a stove in each room for heat. In the top story of this "Southern Mansion" is a nursery complete with a baby and a doll for the baby. A room for the nanny is next to the nursery.

There is a master bedroom with a meal waiting on a tray on the bed. The dressing room has a screened tub and a shaving stand. There is a music room, a dining room, and a kitchen with a stone wall fireplace. The house in intricately decorated and there are even bunny slippers in the child's

One of the miniatures decorating Mrs. Abbe's Victorian doll house is a hand made "Wooten desk." The desk stands five inches high and is the first one made by Bobbie Walls of Plainview, who owned a miniature

Although not widely publicized, Mrs. Abbe said that there is an interest in building and decorating doll houses. Books and mail-order cata-

logues are available and there is an annual doll house show in Lubbock. It was at this show several years ago that Mrs. Abbe won a first place blue ribbon for her Victorian doll house.

"It's an accomplishment," said Mrs. Abbe. And while she doesn't think she will ever completely finish a house, she says it is satisfying to see what she has done.

Besides her two doll houses, Mrs. Abbe also has decorated a room box, which is enclosed with glass. The room is decorated to look like an accountant's office. Mrs. Abbe says she decorated it similar to they way her late husband's accounting office looked. The realistic display has a file cabinet, book shelves containing actual printed books, and horsehead bookends. On the accountant's desk is an open bottle of aspirin and tax forms.

Mrs. Abbe said she does not think she will start decorating another doll

"It's been fun," said Mrs. Abbe. "I've enjoyed it (and) it has occupied lots of hours when I may have been thinking of other things," she added.

50-Cent Hike On City Water Rates Approved

City of Tahoka minimum water charges were raised from \$9.75 to \$10.25, a 50-cent increase, in a decision by city councilmen Monday evening during regular session. The rate increase was approved unanimously following approval of the 1994-95 budget which is based on a tax rate increase from 54.284 cents per \$100 property valuation to 59.284 cents.

The City Council will vote on the proposed tax increase Monday evening, Sept. 19 at a 7 p.m. meeting. No citizens were present for the public hearing on the tax increase at the Sept. 12 meeting.

In other action, the council approved Resolution 9-94A, authorizing the submission of a Texas Community Development Program grant application to the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs to replace two sewer lift stations in Tahoka. Discussion was held on applying for a grant to the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission for a used oil collection point, but no action was taken.

Monthly bills were approved, and Police Chief Jerry Webster informed the council of the police department's activities for the previ-

Cal Huffaker informed the council on the activities of the Tahoka Downtown Park Committee and the progress on the Downtown Park.

All councilmen were present for the meeting, as well City Manager Barry Pittman and Mayor Jim Solomon.

Agenda items for the Sept. 19 council meeting include a vote on the proposed tax increase, as well as discussion on building a new fire hall for the fire department and consideration of raising opening and closing fees at the city cemetery.

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Bulldogs Survive Lorenzo Raid, Stay Unbeaten

The Tahoka defense against the run was super last Friday night, and although the pass defense was battered by a very good passing attack, the Bulldogs came away with their second win of the season by scoring with just over a minute left to beat Lorenzo 15-12.

This week the Dogs will go to Olton, to face another unbeaten team. Olton beat Bovina 39-6 in the opener and outscored Farwell 48-26 last week.

Olton cancelled this week's scheduled junior varsity game. Tahoka 7th grade will play here against Olton at 5 p.m. today (Thursday) with the 8th grade teams to play at 6:30.

Tahoka had a good crowd for the home field opener Friday and they were treated to a close game featuring 29 passes by Lorenzo-with 15 completions-and a rugged Bulldog rushing defense which held the visitors to just 48 yards net for the entire game. Tahoka's ground attack struggled, but was much more successful than that of the Hornets. Tahoka gained 96 yards on the ground, with 73 of that by tailback Dustin Burleson, on 16 carries. Tahoka's longest running gain of the evening was 15 yards by Burleson in the first period.

Lorenzo scored late in the first quarter on a 19-yard pass from OB Gabriel Puente to David Guzman, then missed the point after a 15-yard penalty.

After a short punt by Lorenzo, Tahoka scored on an 8-yard run by Burleson, set up by 10 yards on two runs by Steve Wiseman, and an 8yard run by QB Wesley Solomon. The extra point try was missed, and the score was 6-6 at halftime, although Lorenzo reached the Tahoka 1-yard line with fourth down, when Tahoka took over as the defense, led by defensive end Joseph DeLeon and linebacker Jesse Perez stopped a scoring try.

In the second quarter Tahoka had trouble getting its offense underway as defensive lineman Arcario Hernandez kept breaking through to mess up the plays.

Solomon put a crimp in the

Lorenzo passing game with the rare feat of intercepting two passes in three plays in the third period. After his first interception at the Bulldog 20. Tahoka fumbled on the next play and Guzman recovered for Lorenzo. On the next play, Lorenzo passed and Solomon intercepted in the end zone. Altogether, Tahoka turned the ball over six times (five on fumbles), and Lorenzo lost it five times.

Lorenzo did take the lead again in the third, with a 28-yard pass to Vincente Salinas. But a whole pack of Dogs, led by DeLeon and Clay Taylor, came in to block the extra point attempt, leaving the score at 12-

Tahoka's Edward Ramirez hit a fine punt which was downed at the Lorenzo 7 later in the third, and Perez and friends allowed the Hornets no yards in three plays. Then a fourth down punttry was a bad snap over the head of the punter and out of the end zone for a Tahoka safety, making it 12-8 starting the fourth period.

Late in the fourth after a Lorenzo

fumble was recovered by Tahoka at the Hornets' 20, Tahoka moved to the winning touchdown, with 19 of those yards gained by Burleson. It was Matt Garcia's only carry of the night which scored as Garcia smashed in from the 1 on 4th down. Gerold Cantu kicked the point to make it 152 12, with 1:07 left.

Lorenzo then hit on three straight passes to move into Dog territory, but the defense stopped them on the final play, with Monte Hale leading a group of Bulldogs to stop the Lorenzo quarterback and seal the victory.

DeLeon, Perez, Mike Castillon, Hale, Cantu, Solomon, Reggie Moore and Taylor all played well on defense for Tahoka.






