Police Dept.To Move To New Location

Tahoka City Council Monday night voted approval of several major items of city business, including acceptance of a building which will some renovation of the donated facility.

The department will be moved into the former office building of Energas at 1712 Main St. The building was donated with the stipulation that the city pay the appraisal and legal fees.

The city also approved painting and repairs on the overhead water tank on Lockwood, targeted a dilapidated building, raised the fees for opening and closing graves at the cemetery, and called for a general election on May 6 for two council members and a mayor.

Terms of Mayor Jim Solomon and councilmen Wayne Huffaker and Mike Mensch are scheduled to expire. The mayor is elected by all voters in the city, but only voters in newly created city districts 1 and 3 may vote on their respective council representatives. However, according to City Manager Barry Pittman, candidates for those districts on the council do not have to live in the district boundaries. A map of district boundaries is scheduled for release soon, he

Abid of \$54,000 from N.G. Painting of Kerrville was accepted for painting and repairs on the inside of the water tower. An additional bid of house the Tahoka Police Dept. after \$84,000 for painting and repairs on the outside of the tower was rejected.

> Tahoka will join Post, Littlefield and several other cities in contracting with Oller Engineering to initiate a seal coat project for city streets. Tahoka has budgeted \$30,000 per year for the past few years to do as much seal coating as this will pay for, thereby preventing total deterioration of city streets.

Prices of opening and closing graves at the city cemetery were raised to \$250 "in consideration of an increase in the fee charged."

Dr. Donald Freitag was appointed as the city's health authority.

A building at 2218 Lockwood was targeted for non-compliance with the dilapidated building ordinance.

Police Chief Jerry Webster gave a report on his department's activities for the month.

All council members were present, and all items voted on were passed unanimously. Mayor Solomon presided and council members are Jay Dee House, Mensch, Jacky Henry, Ray Don Box and Huffaker.



I can't believe we did it again. I thought we were through with these types of situations years ago when our children became old enough to prefer expensive electronic gadgets and such. But Sunday we found ourselves faced with the three most dreaded words in the human language ... words which strike fear into the most hardy of souls: Some Assembly Required.

It was one of those times when what you see in the store and what you actually get in a box bears no resemblance whatsoever to each other. This box, of course, is always accompanied by a single sheet of what is ridiculously referred to as "instructions" written in at least four different languages. In our case, the English is usually no easier to understand than the Spanish, Italian or French instructions.

Sometimes, if you're lucky, the instructions are illustrated with graphics or pictures which may or may not look like the model you purchased. In the case where your model is "slightly" different (that's always the one we buy) the illustration has a small notation saying, "Some models may vary somewhat." Geez, that's a big help.

I figured out a long time ago a well-kept secret in the assembly industry - one which I feel duty-bound to share with both of my readers here: There is only one set of instructions. Period.

I figure these instructions were written about 50 years ago when the first, say, toaster oven came on the market and people had to attach the handle. So somebody, somewhere, wrote a set of instructions to do that. And ever since, we've been getting the same set of instructions, only the picture is varied a little bit and the instructions have been randomly re-worded by various foreign personnel who hate Americans, who are the only people who will actually buy any product which you have to put together yourself, even though the finished product is what is displayed in the store.

In our particular case, the product (a telescope) was so bizarrely different from a toaster oven that the foreigners just gave up and passed the instruction sheet on to a professional astronomer, who assumed that anybody who bought a telescope would know something about telescopes. If you can

So these instructions read (I'm not making this up): "Now take one of the black flexible control cables and attach it to one of the silver posts of the Worm Gear just under the hour circle. This shaft controls the Right Ascension Axis."

Worm gear? There's no "worm gear" in the illustration. There are some silver doo-dads which look vaguely like ... well ... handles for a toaster oven.

So anyway, we put this telescope together the way we wanted to, by looking at the picture on the front of the box (model inside box slightly different), and after about three hours, the very last piece we get to, which is part of the eyepiece, is CRACKED. So now. God help us, we have to take the telescope apart and put it back into the box, and return it to the store where we can get

another telescope and put it together. Again. My husband was thrilled with his birthday present. I hope we have it put together by the time summer gets here. Watch this space for a star-gazing party invitation (or possibly a "telescope assembly party" invitation).

Lynn County Soils To Field Capacity

Lynn County producers within the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 service area need four to eight inches of water from precipitation and/or irrigation to bring the five foot root zone soil profile to field capacity before the 1995 spring planting, according to pre-plant soil moisture survey data released by the Water District and the USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS).

"We found that six percent of the Water District service area will need from 0 to 4 inches of moisture to bring the soils to field capacity. About 45 percent of the area will need 4 to 6 inches of moisture, and 48 percent will need 6 to 8 inches of moisture. One percent of the area needs 8 to 10 inches of moisture to refill the soil profile," said Gerald Crenwelge, USDA-NRCS Soil Scientist.

Soil moisture readings are taken by lowering a neutron probe into a permanently-installed aluminium access tube at each of the 301 monitoring sites within the 15-county Water District service area. Each site is chosen based upon the soil type, the variations in the saturated thickness of the Ogallala Aquifer which indicates potential well yields, and typical farming operations in the area.

Plant available soil moisture varies according to the previous crop produced at the site. For example, soil moisture at cotton sites averaged about 0.4 inches at the one foot soil level, 0.3 inches at the two foot level, 0.3 inches at the three foot level, 0.4 inches at the four foot level, and 0.5 inches at the five foot level.

Sites in corn producing areas had about 0.6 inches at the one foot level, 0.6 at the two foot level, 0.6 inches at the three foot level, one inch at the four foot level, and one inch at the five foot level.

Available soil moisture for grain sorghum and wheat sites was found to be between that of corn and cotton: Grain sorghum sites averaged 0.5 inches at the one foot level, 0.3 inches at the two foot level, 0.2 inches at the three foot level, 0.3 inches at the four foot level, and 0.4 inches at the five foot level.

Wheat producing sites averaged about 0.7 inches at the one foot level, 0.5 inches at the two foot level, 0.4 inches at the three foot level, 0.6 inches at the four foot level, and 0.7 inches at the five foot level.

Generally, each foot of soil has a capacity to hold about two inches of soil moisture, or a total of about 10 inches at the five foot root zone soil

Historical data shows that aboveaverage crop yields are more likely when the five foot root zone soil profile is at or near field capacity at

"We hope the area will receive significant precipitation that will help reduce these soil moisture deficits prior to planting," said Crenwelge. Rain gauge readings taken by Water District staff at the soil moisture monitoring sites in Lynn County show 11.83 inches of precipitation during

Use of furrow dikes will help keep any moisture that falls between now and spring planting on the field so that it can soak into the soil.

The annual pre-plant soil moisture survey data informs producers about general plant available soil moisture conditions across the Water District. "Irrigators can use this information to estimate the amount of water needed to bring their soil closer to field capacity without wasting water by over-irrigating. This information reflects general soil moisture trends and should not be used in place of individual soil moisture testing on farms," said Crenwelge.

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Producers, Taxpayers Benefit From Rising Upland Cotton Prices

Higher prices for upland cotton, 4.6 cents per pound, which is the up 14 cents-per pound from a year ago, means increased income for producers and savings for the taxpaver. according to Grant Buntrock, Acting Executive Vice President of the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Commodity Credit Corporation.

"Strong world-wide cotton demand, combined with poor crops in competing foreign countries, have caused upland cotton prices to rise in a relatively short period of time," Buntrock said. "This results in increased profits for producers that will translate into less cost for taxpayers in deficiency payments."

Deficiency payments are required when the national average price received by producers during the calendar year which includes the first five months of the marketing year is below the established target price of 72.9 cents per pound. The payment rate is equal to the difference between the target price and the higher of the calender year national average market price or the price support loan rate. The 1994 calender year average price is 68.3 cents per pound, which is higher than the price support loan rate of 50.0 cents per pound. Therefore, the deficiency payment rate of

difference between the target price and the calendar year price.

Advance payments of 6.45 cents per pound were made earlier to ekgible producers requesting advance payments. Since the advance payment exceeds the calculated final payment, producers who received advances must refund the overpayment at a rate of 1.85 cents per pound to the Commodity Credit Corpora-

Producers who received advance deficiency payments under the 50/85 and 50/92 provisions of the 1994 program do not have to make refunds with respect to acreage subject to these provisions. Producers who did not receive advance payments will receive their final full payment in

Refunds of 1994-crop deficiency overpayments are not due until the marketing year ends on July 31, 1995. Producers have the option of offsetting the refund against other program payments due prior to the end of the marketing year. Producers who were overpaid will receive a letter regarding the refund from their local Consolidated Farm Service Agency office in February.

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

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



Carpet Care: What You Should Know

(NAPS)—When you get right down to it, carpet can be good for your family's comfort—and a little wisdom on your part can make it perform even better.

warmth, helping to cut down energy costs.
noise reduction, which in

turn reduces stress.
• safety, as it prevents danger-

ous falls and injuries.

Fortunately, you can enjoy all of these benefits and enhance your comfort with these hints from the Carpet and Rug Institute (CRI) on

carpet installation and care:

• A quality installation can provide long-lasting performance and minimize the impact on indoor air quality. Vacuum the old carpet to remove dust and dirt. Provide fresh air ventilation during removal of the old carpet and cushion. Vacuum the bare floor before

o Ventilate the room with fresh air during the installation of any redecorating product and for 72 hours after, to allow the small quantity of emissions to dissipate. Vacuum immediately after installation to remove loose fibers and

other installation debris.

• Carpet is a benefit to allergic families because it traps dust particles so they are not airborne. It is esential to vacuum often and on a regular basis, using a top quality vacuum cleaner with an efficient dust catching bag, to prolong the life of carpet. For areas of heavy traffic, it is recommended that carpet be vacuumed three or four times per week. To protect

indoor air quality, be sure your vacuum has an internally-housed, effective high filtration bag and proper brush height adjustment.

• Act quickly when anything is dropped or spilled. Blot liquids with a clean, white, absorbent cloth or paper towel. Scoop up solids or break up and vacuum out as much as possible. Apply a small amount of a recommended cleaning solution. Work in gently and blot thoroughly.

• Consider deep cleaning carpet at least once every 12 to 18 months. You can do it yourself or hire a professional cleaner. Be sure the room is well ventilated during and immediately after the cleaning process, and that all the moisture and agent are removed from the carpet.
