## **City Pool Here Delays Opening**

The Tahoka City Pool, scheduled to open last weekend, has delayed opening because no lifeguards are available to oversee the pool. The city is advertising for two certified lifeguards to oversee the pool from 1-6 p.m. Tuesdays through Saturdays.

According to City Administrator Jerry Webster, the pool was scheduled to open last weekend but lifeguard arrangements unexpectedly fell through, causing the delay in opening. Webster said he talked with officials at the Red Cross in Lubbock, who said there is a shortage of lifeguards this year.

The pool will remain closed indefinitely until lifeguards can be hired.


### Sandra Cox **Named To State Committee**

# **Ronald Roberts Named Elementary Principal Here**

Tahoka Middle School Principal Ronald Roberts was named Tahoka Elementary Principal by Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees last Wednesday evening.

All seven trustees voted unanimously to offer Roberts a two-year contract as principal at an annual salary of \$40,000. Roberts, who has worked in the district for eight years, will begin his duties as elementary principal on July 1. He has served as Middle School principal the past two years, was Assistant Principal for two years, and taught high scool science for four years prior to his administra-

Superintendent David Hutton and trustees will look at filling the vacancy in the middle school principal position in the near future.

In other business, the board approved an overnight trip for students who successfully passed the Exit level of the TAAS test to attend the Ropes Leadership Camp near Abilene, and approved a motion to allow Supt. Hutton authority to sign professional contracts for the Board of Trustees.

There was some discussion regarding an additional elementary teacher, but trustees took no action on the item.

Present were trustees Greg Henley, Clint Gardner, Rex Rash, Brad Hammonds, Carmen Chapa, Joe Calvillo, and Juanell Jones, as well as Supt. Hutton, administrative staff, and Business Manager Loretta Tekell.

Lynn County Sheriff's deputies investigated a traffic accident on Loop 76 just north of O'Donnell on Friday, May 19 involving a 1978 Ford F150 pickup in which the driver reportedly had a false insurance card.

In jail during the week were 11 persons, including three for driving while intoxicated, first offense; and one each on the following charges: application to revoke probation, DWI subsequent offense; application to adjudicate/forgery; possession of narcotic paraphernalia and public intoxication; possession of marijuana under two ounces; resisting arrest/ bond forfeiture; public intoxication and display of suspended driver's license; DWI and possession of marijuana under two ounces and no driver's license; and driving while license suspended/automatic license revocation suspension.

I SAW TWO shows on television last week dealing with mysterious disappearances and supposed abductions by aliens. One was admittedly fiction, "based on fact", and the other claimed to be a documentary.

Both touched on the Roswell, NM incident in the 40s (1947, I think). In that case, UFO believers say, an alien spacecraft crashed, and the weird little bodies were carted off on trucks by the military, reportedly to be studied underground at Wright-Patterson AFB, near Dayton, Ohio. One of the shows claimed they still have the bodies stored there. All of the wild stories are denied by the government.

This, of course, is the same government which has lied to the people on occasion, so maybe the UFO fanatics have a point.

One of the shows, Sightings, also had a segment about a woman psychic who has helped law enforcement officers solve murders and has, the show claims, located the bodies of missing persons and things.

This reminded me of a statement from the other show in which a character stated that "Nothing ever vanishes without a trace. "What he meant was that the people who had vanished had been abducted by aliens.

So maybe that explains why this psychic has not been asked to locate some of the famous missing persons in the world, like Jimmy Hoffa, Amelia Earhart, Glenn Miller and Andrea Phares (I'll explain who she was in a minute): All of these people were abducted by aliens, and never were returned, unlike some folks who report they have been abducted and then brought back to wherever they were abducted from.

Andrea Phares disappeared from near Cotton Center in the 1950s, as I recall. They searched for traces of her for many months and never did find her. It was an intriguing story, and I may call someone at the Avalanche-Journal and suggest they dig into their files and rehash some of it.

Meanwhile, I wish they would contact this woman psychic and she'd tell us what happened to Hoffa, Earhart, Miller, Phares and my youthful energy, all of which vanished more or less without a trace.

# TAAS Tests Available For Viewing

**Texas Education Commissioner** Mike Moses recently announced that the Spring 1995 TAAS tests will be released. School districts and education service centers are being provided with copies of the released test materials as part of Texas Education Agency's commitment to public disclosure.

The released TAAS tests include the following: the March 1995 Exit Level tests, the grades 4 and 8 March 1995 writing tests, the grades 3-8 March 1995 writing tests, and the May 1995 grades 3-8 mathematics and reading tests.

School districts have been authorized to use the released TAAS tests for two purposes only. Appropriate non-commerical use of the released test materials consists of disclosing the released test items to the public, and using the released tests for the formative evaluation of Texas students.

### **Leonard Flores Succumbs To Explosion Injuries**

Leonard Flores, one of two men badly burned while running from an explosion at the Tumbleweed Cafe & Grill here on May 8, died last Thursday in Lubbock's University Medical Center burn unit. He was 29.

The other victim, Michael McKean, the 34-year-old owner of the restaurant, remains in satisfactory condition at UMC. Flores was McKean's brother-in-law.

The explosion occurred about 2:45 a.m. and destroyed the cafe. The State Fire Marshal's Office ruled the fire as arson, but no arrests have been

Planting cotton on the High Plains of
Texas in 1995 hasn't been easy as the area
suffers from the second driest 12 month
period on record according to Lubbock-based
Plains Cotton Growers (PCG).
Irrigated acreage, which comprises about
one-half of the area's 3.5 million cotton
acres, is estimated to be 80-90 percent
planted through May 26. Irrigated cotton
emergence to date is estimated at around
60 percent

Dryland acres, on the other hand, are estimated at only 5-10 percent planted with many producers contemplating whether or not to "dry-plant" some of their acres instead of waiting for a "planting rain" to

instead of waiting for a "planting rain" to come along.

Dr. Kater Hake, Extension Cotton Specialist for the High Plains region, says he expects at least a portion of the areas unplanted dryland acres will be planted in a dry seedbed. Hake is advising producers who are thinking bout dry-planting cotton to be conservative and only plant part of their dryland acres in this manner.

"Currently there is still enough time for producers to implement some strategy into their planting efforts," notes Hake. "We still have a little time to get a planting rain. The key will be in getting the number of acres to be planted following that rain down to a manageable level."

Hake's advice is to dry-plant enough

Hake's advice is to dry-plant enough cotton acreage so that following a planting rain the producer can easily plant all unplanted acreage in 4-5 days.

Of the acreage already planted and up to a stand, most appears to be in good shape. Producers in some areas may see some increase in seedling disease pressure following several days of cool, damp weather, however, overall the crop is off to a

weather, however, overall the crop is off to a fairly good start.

For producers concerned about the possibility of being prevented from ever planting the 1995 crop the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) just issued some revised regulations for producers with crop insurance.

with crop insurance.

The revised provisions relate to a producers options under the Federal Crop Insurance program. For more information about the changes producers should contact their county Consolidated Farm Service Agency office.
