Tittle Resigns, Hail Loss Total Staggering Goes To Stinnett

Hundreds of homes were heavily damaged in Saturday's hail storm, which also damaged a large number of automobiles and wiped out thousands of acres ofyoung crops.

Every available adjuster has been in the area since that time and they still have lots of work to do. Staffs at Muleshoe insurance agencies have had their hands full filling out claims and accompanying adjusters.

Hail stones ranging in size up to 14 inches circumference devasted an area northeast of Muleshoe and around the West Camp. Progress Lariat area. Acompanying this storm are two pictures showing what happened at the Jinks Meyers farm, 71/2 miles northwest of town.


These big stones broke through roofs, broke out window lights.
