## Dogs' Super Effort Stuns Olton 21-14

By DALTON WOOD In one of Tahoka's finest footbal games ever, the Tahoka Bulldogs came from behind and defeated a fa ing a large homecoming crowd with spectacular plays on offense and tenacious defense to win 21-14. Olton came into the game after winningtwo games by lopsided scores and featuring the leading Class AA rusher and scorer in Michael Wilborn, a210-pound senior. And Wilborn wa gaining more than 200 yards from aining more han 200 yards from
crimmage, including a 77 -yard scoring run the first time he touched the ball. But the Bulldogs' swarming defense, led by tackles Reggie Moore and Matt Garcia, but with just about everybody contributing, managed to
keep Wilborn out of the end zone in the second half.

Enhanced Diapause Program would Enhanced Diapause Program would
have allowed the boll weevil to infes have allowed the boll weevilt o infest
an even larger area of the High Plain and caused producercosts to increase dramatically
The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) supports the program through the loan of vehicles
and equipment. USDA also provides support through the Environmental support through the Environmental
Monitoring Plan which helps ensure the safety and soundness of all program operations
"This year's program initiates the first year of a three year program
designed to step up the battle designed to step up the battle against
the boll weevil," said PCG Boll Weevil Steering Committee Chairman Wayne Huffaker of Tahoka. "By the end of the third year we should have halted boll weevil movement onto the High Plains and reduced the size
of the currently infested area prior to of the currently infested area prior to
the start of eradication in 1998." he start of eradication in 1998."
Huffaker notes that without the program the High Plains faces a potential farm level loss of revenue that could easily exceed $\$ 300$ million.
This loss to the farmer would come mainly from increased costs associ ated with battling the boll weevil and reduced yields. Areawide the impact
of these losses couldeasily amount to over \$1 billion in lost economic ac-

ness." said Jim Leseri, Texas Agricul ness," said Jim Leser, Texas Agricul
tural Extension Service Entomologist "This year a lot of attention has been focused at the potential loss associated with a beet arnyworm infestation on the High Plains. The
reality of the situation is that if the reality of the situation is that if the
boll weevil is allowed to infest this boll weevil is allowed to infest this
area the losses will easily exceed area the losses will easily exceed
anything that the beet armyworm anything that the beet a
could have done this year.

High Plains have been located and High Plains have been located and
mapped inside the Enhanced Control
Zone. This represents approximately Zone. This represents approximately
2.4 million cotton acres and over
15000 individual fields. 15,000 individual fields. The control phase of the program
could total up to 5 million acres. The first application is expected to cover
between 1.5 and 1.6 million acres. "The goal of this year's program
is to start the process of permanently removing the boll weevil from the
Plains," said Plains," said Roger Haldenby, PCG
Boll Weevil Program Coordinator Boil weevil Program Coordinator.
"This is only the first of a three year,
coordinated effort that is vital to the fuoture of the High Plains cotton industry. The reason for the dramatic increase in the size of the program is the tremendous increase in boll wee-
vil populations following five mild vil populations following five mild
winters in a row." By following the three year plan
we expect to systematically elimiwe expect to systematically elimi-
nate the boll weevil from most of the area and then follow up with a fullscale eradication effort to complete the job, adds Haldenby
Many people have been concerned
with the potential effect of with the potential effect of the pro-
gram on beneficial insects early in gram on beneficial insects early in
the season. That won't be problem in this area since early season treathis area since early season treat-
ments will not be used until 1998. By that time, explains Haldenby, two things will have happened: First the size of the area that will need these
treatments will be wreatly reduced treatments will be greatly reduced:
second, refinements to program opsecond, refinements to program op-
erations will have beendevised, tested and proved in other areas so that we can avoid similar problems.
By the time the eradication phase of the program gets underway in 1998
the Texas Boll Weevil Erastiction the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication
Foundation, PCG and the Texas AgFoundation, PCG and the Texas Ag-
ricultural Extension Service will be able to develop new techniques and
strategies that will help to preserve
beneficial insects early in the season. Work on this problem is already underway in other areas of Texas currently actively engaged in eradicating the boll weevil and will allow the High Plains Program to take advan tage of what they learn. the largest pest control operation the world and makes use of the lates in aircraft and guidance technology. All of the aircraft being used on the 1995 Program are turbine powere giving them extended range and car-
rying capacity. They can also mak treatment applications with increase effectiveness while flying at safes heights and higher speeds. In the old days of the program planes had to fly lower to ensure maximum coverage. Today's modern aircraft are able to effectively apply the 12 ounces of
ULV Malathion used on the program the same material used by countless the same material used by countess
towns and cities for mosquito control each year. PCG performs regular checks to ensure the accuracy of each aircraft by putting out dye cards that provide a physical picture of actual spray coverage at ground level.
In addition to the random use In addition to the random use or
ye cards PCG also makes use of the dye cards PCG also makes use of the
latest aircraft guidance and tracking technology during Program operations. PCG was leader in developing the technology that allowed aerial
applicators to move away from huapplicators to move away from hu-
man flaggers for aircraft guidance. man flaggers for aircraft guidance by Satloc, Inc. of Tempe, Arizona the PCG Program utilizes the latest i the PCG Program utilizest het atest in
Global Positioning System (GPS) technology to aid in the tracking and control of aircraft used on the Program. Each plane is equipped with
the Satlocsystem which serves double duty on the Program. The first func duty on the Program. The first func-
tion it provides is the ability to accurately track an aircraft's movement across a field without the need for human flaggers, showing the pilot where their next pass should begin.
The second function of the Satloc The second function of the Satloc records ofeach aircraft flightforquality control and record-keeping by program personnel.
