As for the best advice this couple can give on being married 66 years: "Always turn a deaf ear to what you don't want to hear," says Mrs. Eudy





Trustees Make AD Position Administrative; Approve Pay Hikes, Contract Extensions

In a move geared to allow the Athletic Director more time to fulfill his duties, Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees changed the AD position from teaching to administrative, approving a salary hike and extending Coach Darrell "Tooter" Draper's contract for another year.

Other administrative positions were discussed as well at last Thursday night's meeting, with contract extensions and salary increases en a unanimous vote of approval by the seven trustees. Trustees set an election date for May 4, approved Policy Update 50 and voted to keep employee health insurance with the current provider for another year, among other routine business.

Trustees voted unanimously to extend Coach Draper's contract for a year, changing his contract to an administrative 226-day contract and increasing his salary to \$37,000. Draper will continue to serve the district as head football coach and Athletic Director, but will not have regular classroom duties next year.

Principal contracts were renewed for all three campus principals in the district, with one-year extensions added to contracts for Elementary Principal Ronald Roberts, Middle School Principal Glo Hays, and High School Principal Bill Alcorn. Trustees voted to increase Roberts' salary by \$3,000, bringing his salary to \$43,000; Mrs. Hays' salary was increased by \$2,000 to make \$37,000, and Alcorn's salary was also hiked \$2,000 for a total of \$49,500. All

salary increases and contract renewals were approved unanimously by the seven trustees.

Business Manager Loretta Tekell's contract was renewed for a year, with a \$2,000 salary increase, and Counselor Sheri McCord's contract was renewed for another year.

Trustees went with the recommendation of an ad-hoc insurance committee composed of district staff, and renewed employee insurance with Horace Mann Insurance Co. for the next year. The committee als for insurance.

The school trustee election date was set for May 4, 1996, with Dean Bartley appointed as election judge, Jackie Stephens as alternate judge, and Jerry Webster as early voting judge. Two places on the board expire this year, in Districts 3 and 4. Trustees Clint Gardner and Brad Hammonds currently serve in those

Candidates may file for election at the school business office from Feb. 19 through March 20. Trustees do not have to live in the districts they represent, but only those who reside in those districts may vote. A map showing district lines is on display at the school.

Bids for two surplus school vehicles were looked at by trustees, who accepted the highest bids, of \$615 for a truck, and \$525 for a van. Trustees adopted Update 50 Board Policy as presented.

Mrs. Tekell reported an account balance in all funds of \$2,167,795.69, and monthly bills

were approved as presented. Principals Hays and Roberts reported successful initiations of accelerated reading programs on their campuses, and said both campuses are also looking at the Saxon math programs in their curriculums for next year. Principal Alcorn provided information on the district realignments, as well as enrollment figures.

Counselor McCord reported she had tested nine in the GED program in January, and will offer the test again in March. THS students will have an opportunity to take the exit TAAS test on March 5-7, she said.

Trustees and their spouses were treated to a dinner preceding the 7 o'clock meeting, in recognition of **Board Appreciation Month. Students** had written letters and cards to trustees, which were read at the dinner. A group of several second grade students presented a short musical program for trustees before the board began their business session.

Trustees retired to executive session at 8:15 p.m. to discuss personnel, and returned to open session at 12:53 a.m., concluding business in just a few minutes to adjourn at 1:05

The next board meeting was set for Thursday, March 14, at 7 p.m.

All seven trustees were present for the meeting, including Greg Henley, Clint Gardner, Brad Hammonds, Carmen Chapa, Joe Calvillo, Rex Rash and Juanell Jones; as well as Superintendent David Hutton, several district staff, and representatives from site-base

I STILL HAVE SOME February stuff to dispose of, so now I'd like to comment on St. Valentine's Day and Leap Year.

St. Valentine was two people, the encyclopedia tells me. It was a name given to two Christian martyrs whose feasts were formerly observed on Feb. 14. One was believed to be a Roman priest martyred "during the persecution of Claudius the Goth. and buried on the Flaminian Way; the second was probably a bishop of Terni martyred in Rome. It is possible that these two legends were based on real people or, as some believe, one person. The association of St. Valentine's Day with love and courtship may have arisen from the coincidence of the date with the Roman festival of Lupercalia, a feast day dropped from the Roman church calendar in 1969."

So the St. Valentines had their feasts on the same day the Romans had a love feast, so the day comes to be a day of love and courting.

The book digressed into birthstones and associated beliefs, and told me that the purple amethyst is St. Valentine's stone and it also protects its owner from drunkenness. I never saw a purple amethyst; it sounds like some kind of demon. Nor do I need any proteshian from intoshication.

LEAP YEAR is the result of various rulers messing with the calendar since about 46 BC, when one year went on for 445 days to make up for past errors. Anybody born in one of those extra 80 days presumably never got any older, which would be neat. My reference tells me:

Romans, during the late republic, used various lunar-solar calendars. These calendars were supposedly based only on observation, but it in fact they were influenced by political considerations. The Roman! calendar was in error by several months during the reign of Julius Caesar, who recognized the need for a stable, predictable calendar and formed one with the help of an astronomer, Sosigenes. The year 46 BC was given 445 days, to compensate for past errors, and every common year thereafter was to have 365 days. Every fourth year, starting with 45 BC, was to be designated a leap year of 366 days, during which February, which commonly had 28 days, was extended by one day. The rule was not correctly applied, but the calendar was corrected by Augustus Caesar by AD 8.

The Julian leap-year rule created three leap years too many in every period of 385 years. As a result, the actual occurrence of the equinoxes and solstices drifted away from their assigned calendar dates. As the date of the spring equinox determines that of Easter, the church was concerned, and Pope Gregory XIII, with the help of an astronomer, Christopher Clavius (1537-1612), introduced what is now called the Gregorian calendar. Thursday, Oct. 4, 1582 (Julian), was followed by Friday, Oct. 15, 1582 (Gregorian); leap years occur in years exactly divisible by four, except that years ending in 00 must be divisible by 400 to be leap years. Thus, 1600, 1984, and 2000 are leap years, but 1800 and 1900 are not.

The Gregorian civil calendar is a solar calendar, calculated without reference to the Moon. However, the Gregorian calendar also includes rules for determining the date of Easter and other religious holidays, which are based on both the Sun and the Moon. The Gregorian calendar was quickly adopted by Roman Catholic countries and, eventually, by every Western country and Japan, Egypt, and

That no doubt is more information on Leap Year than you wanted; there was a lot more about calendars, some of it pretty: confusing, and by the time I could absorb all that stuff, February would be gone. (For instance, one part said that by the calendar used by the British at that time, George Washington was born on Feb. 11).

I recall that when I was courting age, Leap Year was the time when females could ask males to marry them. I haven't heard much about that tradition in years. No female ever asked me to: marry her.

Survivors include a son, Charles of Glendale, Ariz.; three grandchildren; and four great-grandchildren.



On November 29, 1995, GTE Southwest, Inc. (GTE) distributed ballots to customers in the Tahoka exchange, to expand its local calling area to the Brownfield, Lamesa Lubbock, O'Donnell, Post and Southland exchanges. The ballots inadvertently provided customers an option to vote for or against expanded local calling (ELC) service to the Southland exchange, which was replaced with the Post exchange in the amended petition filed September 29, 1995. On December 13, 1995, GTE distributed a second ballot to the Tahoka customers, omitting Southland; however, the second ballot contained an erroneous fee statement. The Public Utility Commission (PUC) recommended that the results of the second ballot be disregarded

The PUC recommends that the initial ballot be used for determining whether ELC to Brownfield, Lamesa, Lubbock, O'Donnell and Post be granted, and recommends tha ELC to the Southland exchange not be approved because the amended petition did not include the Southland exchange. The results of the initial ballot reflected that Brownfield, Lamesa, Lubbock, O'Donnell, and Post exchanges all received more than the 70% favorable vote needed to pass the ballot. Therefore, Tahoka customers will have their calling scope expanded to five new exchanges: Brownfield, Lamesa, Lubbock, O'Donnell, and Post, for a maximum per line charge per month of no more than \$3.50 for residence and \$7.00 for business. No fees will be charged until they are approved and service is provided according to the PUC Rules. Tahoka customers may petition for additional exchanges to be added to their local calling scope at a price of \$1.50 per month per line for each exchange added.
