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

Does Tahoka really want and need a Community Center? From all indications, and from a cross section of the citizens, the need is great. The Community Center Steering Committee met at the City Council chamber on Feb. 15 and discussed and tallied the sheets regarding the feasibility of such a facility in Tahoka. The results of an Advisory Committee of approximately 50 members indicated a great need for the facility, according to favorable responses at a meeting held recently.

The concensus of opinion was that a library be included in the planning, and that there be rooms where various groups could meet, such as Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, civic organizations and clubs, such as Rotary and Phebe K. Warner Federated Club, Tahoka Garden Club, and any other organization that may currently be meeting in members' homes, or the very accommodating church fa-

The need would ascertain the size and type of building, as well as possible locations for such a facility.

Retha Pittman, who will be responsible for writing the grant for funding through the City of Tahoka, will contact Texas Tech University to determine if the facility design could be a class project for a class in architecture.

The Steering Committee hopes that this facility would be a multicultural center where programs, on many levels, would be available. In connection with the library, reading programs and resources for all ages would be available. The Committee will visit vari-

ous facilities in other towns to gain insight on different concepts and designs of community facilities and will also welcome ideas from any and all interested citizens. "The Advisory Committee has

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

Serious horticulturists and amateur gardeners across the South Plains can improve their knowledge and skills, and help others in their communities, by taking part in the Texas Master Gardener training to be conducted in Lubbock in March, April and May by the Texas Agricultural **Extension Service.**

"This is an intensive course designed not only to improve the horticultural knowledge of the participants, but also to give them a chance to help spread that knowledge to improve the quality of life with horticultural projects," said Dr. Bob Robinson, Extension Service district

Persons wishing to enter the program should already have knowledge and skills in basic ornamental horticulture, gardening and general related areas, Robinson said.

Participants selected for the program will receive 50 hours of instruction during eight day-long sessions. Instructors will include faculty of the Extension Service, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station and the Texas Forest Service, which are agencies of the Texas A&M University System; Texas Tech University; and members of the West Texas Arts and Botanical Association, and the Lub-, bock Rose Society.

The course fee of \$50 includes a detailed Master Gardener Handbook, other training materials, a certificate and wallet identification card. All training will be at the Texas A&M University Agricultural Research and Extension Center in Lubbock. It is on FM 1294 just east of Interstate 27 at the Shallowater exit.

At the end of the training, participants must pass a written examination and complete 50 hours of volunteer horticultural service in the county, under supervision of their county Extension Service faculty. Upon satisfactory completion of these requirements, a graduate will become a Certified Texas Master Gardener. To retain certification, a Master Gardener must update his training every two years.

The volunteer service can include answering horticultural questions telephoned to the county extension office, assisting with plant clinics and gardening demonstrations, presenting educational programs to civic and garden clubs, assisting youths with horticultural projects and similar duties, explained Stanley Young. Young, the Lubbock County Extension agricultural agent, is coordinator for the district Master Gardener program.

Persons wishing to enter the program may obtain an application at their county Extension Service office. The completed form is returned to the county agent, who must select participants from that county by March 5. Participants must agree to attend at least five of the eight train-

Three Seats To Open On City Council Here

Three places on the Tahoka City Council will be on the ballots this May, with the terms of Todd Henry. Jay Dee House and Ray Box expiring. Interested candidates may file at City Hall from now through March 20 for a place on the ballot, for District 2, District 4, and an At-Large

Box has already filed for re-election, to the at-large position, and Ken Turner has also filed for the at-large seat. As of press time Wednesday, no other candidates had yet filed.

The city is divided into four districts, with one representative from each district and one at-large member composing the five-member City Council. A map showing district lines is displayed at City Hall.

Those who live in District 2 may vote for a District 2 representative and the at-large position, and those who live in District 4 may vote for a District 4 representative and the atlarge position, while all other city residents may vote only for the atlarge representative.

Weight/Fitness Series To Be Presented Here

"Replacing the extra fat you eat with at least five fruits and vegetables a day, and eating according to the Food Guide Pyramid is a healthy eating practice," says Doris Collins, Lynn County Extension Agent.

"This allows you to eat food to 'feel full' or to have the feeling that you have had 'enough' to eat. You

are able to have enough calories while having a wider variety of important nutrients and fiber. Combine this practice with some regular exercise three to five times a week to reduce stress and to be at your healthy weight," she

explained. Eating right may not prevent or entirely eliminate illnesses like heart disease, stroke, cancer, diabetes and other illnesses, but it may help delay them or reduce their effect. However, eating right will not give much protection if people continue to smoke cigarettes, use smokeless tobacco, drink excessively or do not have enough exercise.

"This information is not new, but it can make a big difference in your life when practiced on an every day basis," said Mrs. Collins.

"If you are interested in learning more about managing or reducing your weight and or increasing your physical fitness you are invited to attend all or part of a meeting series sponsored by the Lynn County Extension Office and the Family and Consumer Sciences Committee titled 'Why Weight? Accept the Challenge!' The first meeting will be in the Lyntegar meeting room on Tuesday, Feb. 27 at 5:30 p.m. This promises to be an exciting series and I look forward to seeing you there," adds the county agent.

Volunteer Firefighters Here **Conduct Rescue Training**

The fire whistle blows, and immediately claims the attention of everyone within hearing distance. Perhaps they take a few moments to wonder, and offer a quick prayer, for the unknown victims of unknown tragedies ... unless it's a Monday evening in Tahoka.

Every other Monday evening in Tahoka, residents have become so accustomed to hearing the fire whistle that they simply pause, wait for the shrill sound to fade away in only a few seconds, and think to themselves as they go on about their business: "of course ... fire practice".

But for the 20 members of the Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department, the bi-weekly session at the fire hall is a time for honing their skills as rescue workers and firefighters, as well as a time for camaraderie and fellowship with a special brotherhood that comes from the bond of volunteerism and dedication to a worthy cause - protecting their families, friends and neighbors from the ravages of fire.

Training involves time from these volunteers ... time to relearn safety methods to ensure personal safety as well as the safety of those who may need rescuing ... time to get to know how a partner may react in certain situations ... and time to learn the proper way to use all the specialized equipment firefighters may be required to use.

In a recent session, Tahoka volunteer firefighters used their time for training in rescue methods, simulating a rescue of a person trapped in a smoke-filled house. By using the apartment located behind Tahoka City Hall as the structure, and dummies as trapped victims, firefighters practiced the skills needed to complete the res-

Firemen teamed up as partners (employing the required buddy system for any rescue operation) and donned full gear for the training, including self-contained breathing apparatus (SCBA). In a real fire, smoke, heat and toxic fumes would require firefighters to use the breathing equipment, as well as reducing visibility to the point where rescuers may be forced to feel their way through a structure, moving on their hands and

The training session here simu-

lated that experience, although in stead of a smoke-filled structure, the firemen's face-pieces were covered so that vision was completely blocked. In teams of two, breathing through the specialized equipment, firemen completed the rescue exercise.

"A systematic search is made of the house to locate victims, and whe a victim is found, the route taken must then be retraced (again, completely by feel) to exit the house carrying the victim," explained Assistant Fire Chief Jimmy Woodard.

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Activities such as this rescue training are conducted at each meeting to allow members to become better trained. "We can give more time on the breathing equipment now because we have our own specialized air compressor to refill air bottles," noted Chad Ford, the department's training coordinator, adding that the new compressor is for the use of all fire departments in Lynn County, and was provided by the Lynn County Commissioners Court. Prior to the purchase of the compressor, all air bottles had to be refilled in Lubbock, costing time and considerably more money in the long run.

These training sessions better equip these volunteer firefighters to be able to help their neighbors when an emergency arises. "Our volunteers realize, and take very seriously, their responsibility in providing help when it's needed - and in taking the time to obtain the needed training to have the skills when called for action," said Fire Chief Steve Miller.

And so those neighbors - the people of Tahoka and surrounding areas - can rest a little easier, knowing that there is a dedicated group of men who are willing, and very able, to extend a helping hand if needed.

2-8" Of Moisture Needed To **Bring Soils To Field Capacity**

Lynn County producers within Conservation District No. 1 service from precipitation and/or irrigation to bring the five foot root zone soil profile to field capacity before Spring 1996 planting, according to pre-plant soil moisture survey data released by the Water District and the USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS).

We found that 12 percent of the Water District service area will need from 2 to 4 inches of moisture to bring the soils to field capacity. About 40 percent of the area will need 4 to 6 inches of moisture, and 40 percent will need 6 to 8 inches of moisture. About eight percent of the area needs 8 to 10 inches of moisture to refill the soil profile," said Gerald Crenwelge, USDA-NRCS Soil Scientist.

Soil Moisture readings are taken by lowering a neutron probe into a permanently-installed aluminum access tube at each of the 293 monitoring sites within the 15-county Water District service area. Each site is chosen based upon the soil type, the variations in the saturated thickness of the Ogallala Aquifer which indicates potential well yields, and typical farming operations in the area.

Plant available soil moisture varies according to the previous crop produced at the site. For example, soil moisture from the one to five foot level ranged from 1.2 and 1.6 inches per foot for the four main crops grown within the Water District service area (corn, cotton, grain sorghum, and

Generally, each foot of soil has a the High Plains Underground Water , capacity to hold about two inches of soil moisture, or a total of about 10 area need two to eight inches of water. inches in the five foot root zone soil

> Historical data shows that aboveaverage crop yields are more likely when the five foot root zone soil profile is at or near filed capacity at

"We hope the area will receive significant precipitation that will help reduce these soil moisture deficits prior to planting," said Crenwelge. Rain gauge readings taken at soil mpisture sites in Lynn County indicated an average of 17 inches of rainfall during 1995.

Use of furrow dikes helps keep any moisture that falls between now and spring planting on the field so that it can soak into the soil.

The annual pre-plant soil moisture survey data informs producers about general plant available soil moisture conditions across the Water District. "Irrigators can use this information to estimate the amount of water needed to bring their soil closer to field capacity without wasting water by over-irrigating. This information reflects general soil moisture trends and should not be used in place of individual soil moisture testing on farms," said Crenwelge.
