Smith Wins Race Over Sheriff Diggs

Lynn County Deputy Sheriff Charlie Smith won the Democratic nomination for sheriff by just 24 votes over incumbent Sheriff Jake Diggs in a close race with a relatively low voter turnout in the county Tuesday.

Smith drew 655 votes to 631 for Diggs, and with no Republican candidate for sheriff on the ballot next November, the Democratic nomination means election to the office for Smith next January.

Diggs congratulated his opponent Wednesday, but did say he plans to ask for a recount of the votes.

Total vote in Lynn County was 1388, with 1301 in the Democratic primary and 87 in the Republican primary, believed to be the largest turnout in a GOP primary here, although there were no local races on the ballot.

In Lynn County commissioner precinct 1, Jacky Henry was re-elected commissioner with 210 votes, to 80 for Dan Lockaby and 74 for Melvin Edwards. Sandra Cox was re-elected as commissioner of precinct 3 without opposition.

In the Democratic voting for sheriff, Smith won at Wilson 122-24, at O'Donnell 130-67, at New Home

44-14, at Draw 14-8, Grassland 18-5, N. Lynn 16-14, and Lakeview 17-2. Diggs won all Tahoka boxes and Hackberry and New Moore, and won the early voting totals by 167-76.

County Democrats gave President Bill Clinton 566 votes and for U.S. Senate, Jim Chapman got 398 votes, Victor Morales 310 and John Bryant 174. For U.S. Representative, Samuel Silverman had 612 and Aaron Alejandro 299.

On the Republican side in the county, Carl Willingham had a 26-19 margin over Scott McLaughlin for nomination as state representative of District 70, to oppose incumbent Democrat David Counts, who was re-nominated without opposition. It was not known Wednesday morning if Willingham or McLaughlin won the GOP nomination throughout the district.

For President, Republicans in the county gave Robert Dole 53 votes and Pat Buchanan 25. Steve Forbes got just 5 votes in Lynn County. For U.S. Senate, incumbent Phil Gramm got 71 votes to just 6 each for two opponents. Lauren Childress was elected new GOP party chairman for Lynn County.

Barbara Jaquess will accompany seven students in her chapter to Phoenix, Ariz. for the national competition, May 1-5. The presentation management team, consisting of Blanda Miller, J'Lyn Williams, Rebekah Hutton, and Jeremy Brandon, placed second out of 28 teams, earning a spot a nationals.

Brandon also advanced with his second place finish in Document Formatting. Other qualifiers were Robin Martin, third in Verbal Communications, Prepared Level II, and Kerri Bryan and Misty Nance, who

finished second in their Entrepreneur contest.

Other students from chapter one who placed were Jeremy Brandon, third, Business math; fifth, Proofreading/Editing; and Gary Gandy and Rebekah Curry, who advanced to the final round of competition in their speaking events.

Also participating at state were Gerold Cantu, Robert Fant, Erica Handley, and Felicia Davis.

Chapter 2, under the direction of Valli Fell, also had good results in Corpus. Sophomore Abbie Gill was elected to the office of State Parliamentarian for BPA. Miss Gill will also advance to nationals as she placed first in Verbal Communications, Prepared Level II.

Georgia Williams placed fourth in Verbal Communications, Extemporeous Level I. Marisa Martin placed seventh in Entrepreneur.

Other participants for Chapter 2 were Amanda Fuentes, Monty Hale and Kristi Chapa.

"Overall we had an excellent showing and a great time," said Mrs. Jaquess. "We can't wait for Phoenix."

One Week Left To File In City, School Elections

With only one week remaining for candidates to file for seats on area city and school boards, several have filed during the past week, except in O'Donnell where no one has filed for either the city or school elections. Filing deadline is next Wednesday, March 20.

As of press time Wednesday, here is what the slate looks like for Tahoka, Wilson and New Home city and school elections.

Tahoka ISD - District 3: Clint Gardner (incumbent), Ginger Henry, and Carlos Morales. District 4: Brad Hammonds (incumbent). According to school officials, all candidates may draw for the order of names on the ballot at 9 a.m. Monday, March 25, at the school business office.

Tahoka City - District 2: Rudy Tejeda Jr. District 4: Todd Henry (incumbent), and Dustie Cook. At-Large: Ray Box (incumbent), and Ken Turner.

Wilson ISD - two seats, 3-year terms: Clyde Wilke.

Wilson City - mayor and two council seats, 2-year terms: Mayor - Jackie Bishop (incumbent). Council - Oscar Follis (incumbent).

New Home ISD - two seats, 3-year terms: Rick Clem, Andy Fillingim (incumbent), and Russel Barnett (incumbent).

New Home City - three council seats, 2-year terms: Louis Rodriguez, Dale Clem, and Don Sharp, all incumbents.

In the O'Donnell school election, two trustee terms expire, both three-year terms. In the city election, the mayor position and two council seats, all two-year terms, will be on the ballot.

The election will be held May 4.

Commissioners Approve Audit

Lynn County Commissioners Monday approved the annual county audit, named an advisory board for the 9-1-1 emergency system here, and discussed changes for updating the emergency system equipment at the Sheriff's Office.
Keith Reeger with Love, Hays and Reeger reported on the county's 1995 audit, which commissioners approved as presented.
Billy Tomlinson and Barry Pittman were named to the advisory board for 9-1-1 emergency by commissioners.
Representatives from Automated Controls in Lamesa and Sheriff Jake Diggs met with the court to discuss some changes that needed to be made in the Sheriff's Office for radio communications and to comply with 9-1-1 emergency system requirements.
After lengthy discussion, commissioners voted unanimously to contract with the Lamesa company to re-wire for the 9-1-1 emergency system, at an estimated cost of \$6,000. Commissioners also voted to employ the company to do electrical updating for radio and communications for the

Sheriff's Department, at an estimated \$12,500 cost.
A resolution authorizing Lynn County to participate in the Permian Basin Drug Task Force was approved unanimously.
Monthly bills and officials reports were approved as presented.
Present at the meeting were three commissioners, including J.T. Miller, Sandy Cox and Jacky Henry, and Lynn County Judge J.F. Brandon, with commissioner T.A. Stone absent.

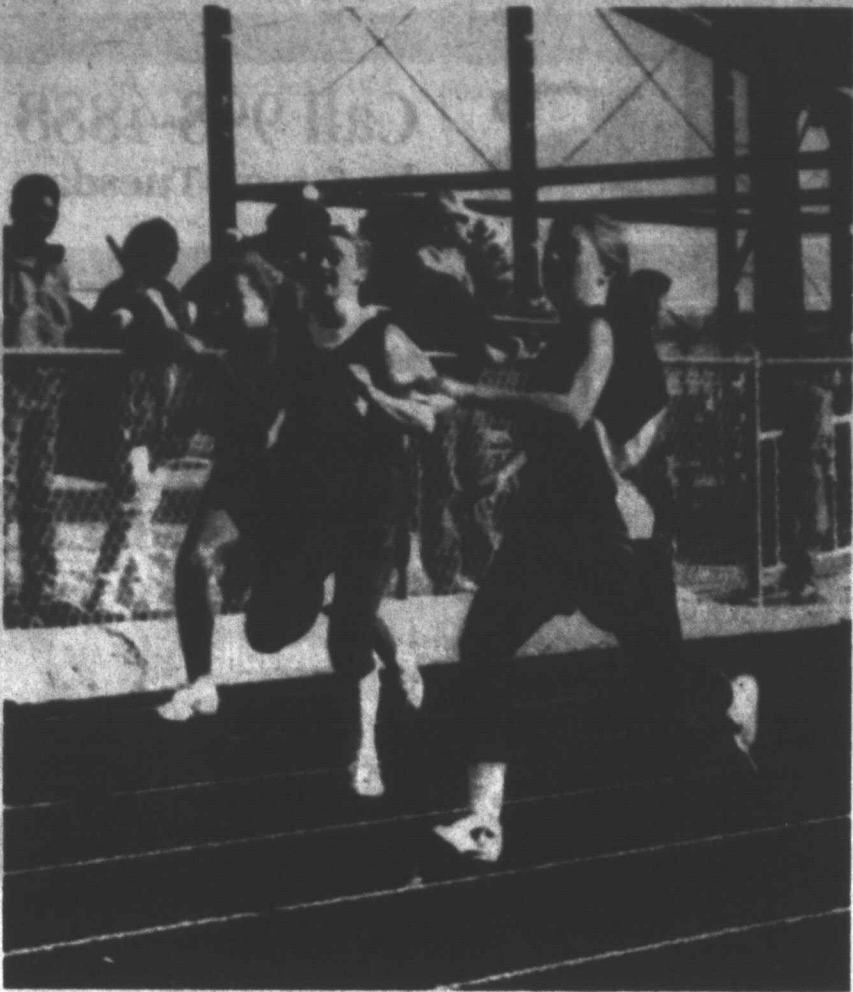

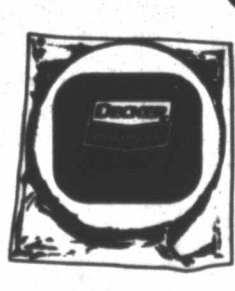
