Filing Period Over For City, School Board Elections

Deadline for candidates to file for seats on area city and school boards has passed, at 5 p.m. Wednesday. As of press time at 10 a.m. Wednesday, the following candidates had filed for places on ballots for the May 4 election.

Tahoka ISD—(two single-member district seats, 3-year terms)—District 3: Clint Gardner (incumbent), Ginger Henry, and Carlos Morales. District 4: Brad Hammonds (incumbent). According to school officials, all candidates may draw for the order of names on the ballot at 9 a.m. Monday, March 25, at the school business office.

Tahoka City—(two single-member district seats, one at-large seat, 2-year terms)—District 2: Rudy Tejada Jr.; District 4: Todd Henry (incumbent), Jay Dee House (incumbent), and Dustie Cook; At-Large: Ray Box (incumbent), and Ken Turner.

A map showing district lines for the City of Tahoka and Tahoka I.S.D. will be displayed at The Lynn County News office, as well as at City Hall

and the TISD Superintendent's Office.

Wilson ISD—two seats, 3-year terms: Clyde Wilke, David Wied (incumbent), and John Earl Fields (incumbent).

Wilson City—mayor and two council seats, 2-year terms—Mayor: Jackie Bishop (incumbent); Council: Oscar Pollis (incumbent). No candidates had filed for the other council seat as of press time.

New Home ISD—two seats, 3-year terms: Rick Clem, Andy Fillingim (incumbent), and Russel Barnett (incumbent).

New Home City—three council seats, 2-year terms: Louis Rodriguez (incumbent), Dale Clem (incumbent), Don Sharp, (incumbent), Jesse Ramirez, Rob Mello.

O'Donnell ISD—two seats, 3-year terms: No information was available.

O'Donnell City—mayor and two council seats, 2-year terms—Mayor: Tommy Woolam (incumbent); Council: Alan Eaker and Oscar Calzada, both incumbents.

Custodial Care Program Offers Hometown Medical Care Here

Custodial care at Lynn County Hospital in Tahoka plays a special role in the eyes of their patients. The Custodial Care Program, put into effect in the later part of 1988, provides experienced health care service at the hospital for patients desiring 24 hour daily health care.

For these patients, the hospital room becomes their home. "It's like a private nursing home—this is like their home away from home," says Dorothy Horwood, Special Care Coordinator who has overseen the program with Lynn County Hospital for the past seven months.

Medical insurance will not cover custodial care fees, according to Mrs. Horwood. Usually the family of the patient pays for the time spent at the hospital. For a patient who requires full time medical care, they are automatically qualified to be admitted into the Custodial Care Program. It is an option for someone who needs full-time medical care but cannot receive it at home, and prefers not to go to a nursing home.

"It would be nice if Medicare did pay for their stay, because the care provided is really not that much different from a nursing home," Mrs. Horwood said.

The hospital custodial care program is not near the size of a nursing home, therefore more time is allowed for the patients, says the director.

At the present time there are three custodial care patients at Lynn County Hospital. "Patients like the

one-on-one attention they receive," Mrs. Horwood said.

Dr. Griffith Thomas, Lynn County Hospital custodial care physician, checks the patients once a week. "He is really good with the patients," Mrs. Horwood said.

"I think in a smaller hospital, it is a lot more personal," added the director. "You have to work together in a smaller hospital, and at Lynn County Hospital we all do," Mrs. Horwood said.

Most patients prefer a hometown, personal attitude from their caregivers. It is fortunate that such a program is available at Lynn County Hospital—and the program is a financial boost for the hospital as well, providing an income from a program where there was previously no program in place.

Sheriff's Election Recount Planned

A recount of votes in the recent Democratic Primary balloting for the nomination for sheriff has been requested by Sheriff Jake Diggs, and the recount may be done sometime next week.

The first count of ballots showed Diggs receiving 631 votes to 655 for challenger Charlie Smith. Democratic nomination for the office virtually assures election, as the Republican Party has no nominee for the job on November's ballot.

Teacher Contracts Renewed, Four Resignations Accepted

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees last week renewed teaching contracts for professional staff members and were notified of the resignations of four teachers, and approved next year's school calendar, as well as conducting other routine business at the monthly meeting held last Thursday.

Superintendent David Hutton notified trustees of the resignations from high school computer teacher Valli Fell, coaches Clint Neighbors and Kelly Keith, and elementary teacher Laura McCleskey. One-year contract renewals were offered to other district teaching staff.

School will begin next year on Aug. 14, according to the 1996-97 school calendar which trustees unanimously approved as presented, with graduation slated for May 30. Christmas break will be Monday, Dec. 23 through Jan. 6, with students to return to class Tuesday, Jan. 7, and Spring Break will be March 17-21, 1997.

Trustees authorized Supt. Hutton to adjust salary stipends at his discretion, which may affect student activity sponsors and coaching staff. Policy updates were approved as presented, and trustees voted by ballot for Region 17 Education Service Center board members (no candidates were local).

Principal reports were presented by Bill Alcorn, Glo Hays and Ronald Roberts, and Athletic Director Darrell "Tooter" Draper and district counselor Sheri McCord also gave reports to trustees. Hutton notified the board of his approval for several overnight trips for students involved in Science Fair, BPA and FHA events.

Present for the meeting were six trustees, including Greg Henley, Brad Hammonds, Clint Gardner, Carmen Chapa, Rex Rash and Joe Calvillo, as well as Supt. Hutton and several district administrative and teaching staff. Trustee Juanell Jones was absent.

Theft, Vandalism Cases Reported

Theft of a CD player and 15 CDs from a vehicle was reported to Tahoka Police Dept. during the last week. Two cases of vandalism/criminal mischief also were reported.

Kendra Kerley said a window on her Pontiac Firebird was broken out to gain entry to her car last Thursday night while it was parked at her residence on N. 5th. A Craig CD player and CDs were stolen.

Tahoka High School Coach Cory Barnes reported that someone had damaged dugouts at the baseball field in south Tahoka last Thursday or Friday. And Louise Smith reported that a glass storm door had been broken at her residence on N. 4th Saturday night.

Two persons were jailed during the week for public intoxication.

Filing Period Now Open For Hospital Directors

Interested persons may pick up forms at Lynn County Hospital to file as candidates for two hospital directors, both three-year terms, for the hospital district. The filing period continues until 5 p.m. April 2 at the Hospital Business Office.

Two directors terms expire this year on the seven-member board, for Harold Barrett and Mike Rivas.

To be eligible for hospital director, a person must be a qualified voter, live in Lynn County, and file a report of campaign contributions and expenditures with the Administrator of the Hospital. The filing form also requires a minimum of 25 signatures turned in with the candidate's intent to run for election.

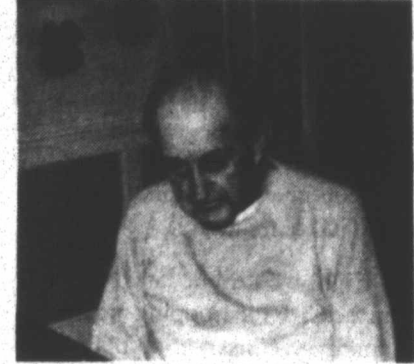

Sign Up Dates For CRP 'Earlyout,' CRP Contract Extensions Announced

Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman announced recently that an "early out" of some Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) contracts expiring Sept. 30, 1996, will be available during a sign up period to be held from March 20 through April 26 at local offices of USDA's Farm Service Agency.

Glickman also said that current CRP participants whose contracts expire on Sept. 30 would have an opportunity to extend their contracts for only one year. "A one year extension is the most prudent option until a new farm bill is enacted giving USDA new enrollment authority and establishing a longer-term policy for the CRP," Glickman said. After the farm bill is enacted, USDA will announce a policy for extension for all CRP contract holders.

Contracts with the following types of land will not be eligible for early out: land with an erodibility index greater than 15; land devoted to useful life easements; field windbreaks; grass waterways; shallow water areas; filterstrips; bottom land timber on wetlands; shelterbelts and land within an average of 100 feet of a stream or other permanent waterbody. "These restrictions ensure that environmentally-sensitive land continues to remain under contract," Glickman said.

Highly erodible land released from the CRP for cropping must have an approved conservation plan. Any land used for haying or pasture must have a haying or grazing plan.

For contract extensions, the Commodity Credit Corporation will offer producers with CRP contracts expiring on Sept. 30, the option to extend their contracts for one year.

The one-year extension will not change producers' rental rates. All or a portion of the acreage under contract may be included in an extension, but no new acreage may be added. Obligations existing under an original contract will continue to apply to contracts that are modified and extended.

The one-year extension policy permits those CRP participants with contracts expiring this year to make an informed decision about the earlyout. USDA intends to develop long-term CRP rules and regulations consistent with the changes Congress is now in the process of completing for the program. The actual terms and conditions will be developed through the regulatory process.

As with the current CRP, the actual level of future participation may be subject to the availability of appropriated funds.

Affected participants will be notified by their local FSA office during the spring of the opportunity to modify and extend their CRP contracts.

New Payment Options Available For Boll Weevil Program

Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers announced a breakthrough for High Plains cotton producers following the March 14 Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation (TBWEF) meeting in Abilene.

Concerned with the lack of options available to producers, Wayne Huffaker, High Plains member of the TBWEF Board of Directors, fought to win area producers a number of new payment options for 1996. The effort to reform the collection procedure was carried by Huffaker and several other members of the TBWEF Board.

Huffaker, who also served as Chairman of the PCG Boll Weevil Steering Committee, reports that approval was granted by the TBWEF Board to institute a new collection policy beginning in 1996. The need for a change in assessment collection procedures was first brought forward by PCG Director and current BWSC member Ronnie Hopper of Petersburg.

Huffaker notes that the new policy provides a number of payment options for producers ranging from early payment discounts to the development of a delayed payment plan based on the billing practices of agricultural businesses statewide.

"The new collection policy is a monumental step toward alleviating the apprehension of producers who feel they are simply unable to pay their assessment on the specified due date," explains Huffaker.

Specifics about the new collection policy are limited, however, the following breakdown covers what is currently known.

Early Payment - Cotton producers across the state will be given an incentive to pay boll weevil assessments early through the initiation of discounts for accounts settled prior to the scheduled due date in

each area. The High Plains currently has an assessment due date of July 15.

Producers opting to pay their 1996 assessments 30 days before the scheduled due date will qualify for a 1 percent discount. Producers who pay 45 days before the due date will receive a 2 percent discount.

Delayed Payment - Assessments for which a Payment Extension Agreement has been properly executed will not be assessed any penalties, but will be subject to a monthly finance charge of 1-1/2 percent on the unpaid balance. A 10 percent down payment will be required at the time an agreement is executed.


Failed Acreage - Those who suffer crop losses during the season will be allowed to request relief from the TBWEF in 1996. Producers who have failed acreage may furnish the TBWEF with a signed FSA Form 574 and proof of crop destruction to apply for a refund, partial refund, or credit for paid 1996 assessments.

Huffaker notes that these are only the bare bones of the new collection procedures, but that they mark a fundamental change in the manner in which assessments are collected. Among the benefits to producers is the ability to more closely match the payment of boll weevil assessments to their own operations.

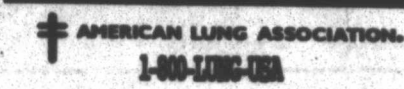
