## Mood vorkro－

ONCE A MONTH I get this letter from the bank containing my statement，and I get to sit down for an hour or two and try to figure out where all the money went and how come the bottom line for how much is left is nowhere near what the bank thinks it is．

In almost all cases，the bank is correct，because I have written down a wrong number，messed up on my addition and subiraction，or lailed to enter something or other．
don＇t mind when the bank shows more money in my account than I thought I had，but when it＇s the other way around，I get upset．Either way，I usually try to find out how the difference came about，and usually I don＇t find out．
Once I caught the bank in an error，which they cor－ rected．But 99 per cent of the time，the error is mine．

This is why my wife and I have separate checking accounts．She balances her checkbook to the penny every month，and my kind of bookkeeping drives her up the wall． Mine usually varies，because I like tokeep an extra amount in there which I have not entered，to take care of the mistakes I know I＇m going to make．Actually this is an improvement on the way I used to keep my checkbook totals．For years，I would just round off my checks to the next dollar，knowing that I couldn＇t balance with the bank anyway．If I wrote a check for $\$ 5.63$ ，I＇d just stub it as $\$ 6$ ． Eventually you get enough extra in there to take care of the $\$ 45$ check you forgot to enter at all．My wife thought that was a dumb system，so I changed to my present clever one．

On the outside of the bank statement envelope，I write down the difference between what the bank says I have and what my checkbook says．For several months in a row， the note said something like＂Bank shows 42.18 more than checkbook．＂Then it will be $\$ 22.18$ ，and the next month 23．58．And I never can find out what happened to change 23．58．And I never can fin
things in that one month．

Looking at financial numbers always has confused me． Just a couple of weeks ago I was a delegate to a church conference and I voted along with about 700 others on a lot of budget figures which I didn＇t understand at all．I happily raised my hand each time to approve these budgets，so they would move on to something I might comprehend．

No accountant has ever been able to explain to me why，on a financial statement，assets and liabilities have to total the same．Any dummy ought to know that if your assets aren＇t worth more than your liabilities，you＇re not尚免ing any money．Accountants may be the reason l＇ve never made any money in business．

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## Russian Mission Trip Involved Helping Hands, New Friends For Tahoka's Terri Solomon

## by Junnel jones

Two weeks in Russia, scraping and stripping paint off concrete walls,
doesn't sound like most people's ver doess 1 tsouncilike most peopper sver
sion of a drean vacation. But for ten college youth, including Terri Solomon of Tahokk, the mission trip
to a Russian childron's home was 10 a Russian childron's home was
time well spent and an experience she will never forget.

Terri, 22, daughter of Jim and and nine others from the Texas Tech Wesley Foundation overcame the barriers of language, strange food, and cultural differences through the universal language of friendship, helping gands, and hugs. "Thesechil-
dren loved us - and we loved them right back," she said.
The purpose of the two-week mission trip was to renovate and répair the walls of a children's home in Istra, a large facility which houses children ranging from $5-18$ years of
age who are hearing impaired and/or age wholl are hearing impaired and/or proximately 30 miles from Moscow, the facility also serves as a boarding school and orphanage.
The Tech Wesley Foundation group was comprised of six young
women and four men, all in their 20's, none of whom could speak the Russian language, or knew the hand signals of Russian sign language. They were met in Moscow by an American PeaceCorps leaderon May 13. following a 10 -hour day of flying from Dallas, to Detroit, to
Amsterdam, and finally to Moscow, where they would travel by bus to
Istra. For the next two weeks, they would live at the children's home, sharing meals at the facility and working on the walls, while spending as much time as possible with the young
children and teenagers who resided children and teenagers who resided
there.
"When we arrived, our Peace Corps leader took us to the children's home, and left us there on the first
day with no tools, and a 'foreman' day with no tools, and a 'foreman'
there who was just beginning to learn there who was just beginning to learn
English but had a hard time underEnglish but had a hard time under-
standing us," said Terri with a laugh "We finally found buckets and tags, and one of our guys found some old
tiles which we used to scrape the old
plaster off the walls with that first the Kremlin, and when the Ameriday. We had brought money to buy

 dren would come, by dhemselves or in paip and in groups, to watch the "funny Americans," said Terii. "We would tome and watch us for a little while, and then they would go find a stand beside us and scrubo the walls like we were. And they all wanted
their picture taken,"sherecalled with their picture taken" sherecalled with knew we were there to help them ${ }^{-1}$ she added.
She said she and her group found ways to communicate with the children, many of whom were hearing impaired, and, anyway, didn't know the English language. "We'd just use body language, and although many
times we felt fustrated in trying to times we felt frustrated in trying to
communicate, it worked out." she said, noting that the American in preter would come from time to time: precer would come from time to time
to said one of the girls in her group knew sign language, but that Russian sign language and American sign lan-
guage was so different that it didn guage was so difierent that it didn able to communicate better than the rest of the group.

The mission group was able to spend a lot of time with whe childden,
says Terri, because they were says Terri, because they were living with them at the children"s home.
"We had no privacy - we slayed with the girls on one floor, and our guys stayed with the boys on another floor. We brought two suitcases full of toys and plyyed games with them,
and showed them how to play frishe and showed them how to play frisbee - which they had never seen - and
they showed us the lake where they they showed us the lake where they
went to bathe and swim ... although they teased us by showing us a scumhey teased us by showing us a scum-
filled pond first as the place where we could all swim!," she said with a grin. Between spending time with the children and working on the renovation project, the Americans were able
