Manuel Zamora Is **Write-In Candidate For Commissioner**


Manuel Zamora filed this week as a write-in candidate in the November General Election for Lynn County Commissioner, Precinct 1.

Bulldogs Begin Season With Win Over Eagles

Tahoka and O'Donnell opened their football seasons here Friday night, and Tahoka won 28-0 as the two county schools renewed a rivalry which last was played in 1967.

Quarterback Brent Raindl scored one touchdown and passed for another as the Bulldogs overcame a tough Eagle defense which kept the game scoreless in the first quarter. And Tahoka led only 9-0 at halftime.

This week O'Donnell will host Plains, while the Bulldogs will play Lorenzo in Tahoka's homecoming game. Plains lost 20-19 to Abernathy last week and Lorenzo beat Happy

In the first quarter Friday, O'Donnell took the opening kickoff and Felix Perez had a 10-yard gain before the Eagle offense stalled. Tahoka tailback Dustin Burleson ripped off a 29-yard run which started off his super running game of 164 yards in 20 carries. This drive also stalled, but after Randy Burleson intercepted an O'Donnell pass at the Eagle 30, Tahoka cranked up a short drive which was capped by Raindl's 1-foot dive across the goal line on the first play of the second quarter. A point kick try was no good,

and it was 6-0. Another Eagle drive was stopped by Rocky Moore's interception. Later in the period, Matt Garcia kicked a field goal to make it 9-0. After the kickoff to O'Donnell, Eagle running back Ramiro Montez broke away on a 36-yard run to the Tahoka 39, the longest play from

game. A fumble recovered by the Bulldogs thwarted that drive.

Tahoka's top pass receiver last year, Monty Hale, showed that offseason surgery won't slow him much, as he took a 68-yard touchdown pass from Raindl, running about the last 40 yards very early in the third quarter. Garcia's kick made it 16-0.

Tahoka cranked up another drive, and with 7:52 left in the third, running back Reggie Moore ran 11 yards for a TD. The kick was no good, and Tahoka then led 22-0.

Still in the third, Tahoka wound up the scoring with a 32-yard run by Dustin Burleson, after Hale had caught a 17-yard pass to keep the drive going. The extra point kick was blocked. An earlier Bulldog drive had been halted by good Eagle defense, led by linebacker Mark Montez and tackle Arthur Sanchez. Sanchez, linebacker Calley Conner and safety Ruben Nambo all turned in good defensive work for

In the fourth, big defensive plays by Tahoka kept the Eagles from scoring. One was a pass interception by Adrian Graves and another was a fumble recovery by Reggie Moore. Later in the quarter, O'Donnell got a drive going with back-to-back passes of 16 and 11 yards from QB Manny Gutierrez to Nambo. But Bulldog defensive end Joseph DeLeon sacked Gutierrez for a loss of 15 and this stopped the Eagle drive which had gone down to the Tahoka 19.

For O'Donnell on offense, Ramiro Montez gained 42 yards on 6 carries and Perez had 26 on 10 carries. But the best average went to Tatum Bessire, who gained 34 yards on just three carries. Nambo caught four of O'Donnell's five completed passes, for 53 yards.

Burleson led Tahoka groundgainers with his 164 yards. Reggie Moore rushed 6 times for 27 yards. Hale caught three passes from Raindl for a total of 93 yards. The only other completions were a 43-yarder to Rocky Moore and a 13-yarder to

On defense, DeLeon, Garcia and Davy Stone were leaders.

Since 1945, the earliest year of complete football scores in the Lynn County News ' files, Tahoka and O'Donnell have played each other 23 times, with O'Donnell winning 9 and Tahoka 14. The last time they played before this year was 1967, when Tahoka won 42-0. O'Donnell's last win was 24-18 in 1963. The Eagles also won in 1961 and 1962.

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Housing Authority

Awarded \$831,997

In Grant Funds

The Tahoka Housing Authority has received notice that it has been awarded a grant from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development in the amount of \$831,997. According to Bill Miller, Executive Director, these funds will be used to improve the existing housing units and construct a facility which will house the Authority's office, educational facilities, and meeting rooms. This facility will be for use of the Housing Authority and will also be available to the public.

The Housing Authority began its application process for the grant several months ago and received notice of approval just last week.

"Miller and the Board of Directors are very pleased that such a positive thing as this will be affecting our community over the next several months," said one director.

The Tahoka Housing Authority has 50 housing units in Tahoka, which are currently 100 percent occupied. Directors say renovation on the housing units will begin soon.

Plans for the new office/education meeting room facility are still under discussion but the board expects to develop plans and begin the construction process in the near fu-

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Food, Drink **Okayed Fór Gym Here**

A decision to forbid food and drink in the seating area of the Tahoka High School gym was reversed Tuesday night during the Board of Trustees meeting. Food and drink will now be allowed in the gym, according to Superintendent David Hutton, and school maintenance personnel will apply sealer to bleachers and floors to help prevent damage

The next meeting was set for 8 p.m. Oct. 10.

All seven trustees were present at the meeting, as well as Supt. Hutton and other school officials.

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

SPS, PSCo and Intervenors File **Merger Settlement Agreement**

Southwestern Public Service Company (NYSE: SPS), Public Service Co. of Colorado (NYSE: PSR) and intervenors today filed a nearunanimous settlement agreement at the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, urging the FERC to approve expeditiously the merger of the two electric utilities.

"This settlement agreement is a major milestone," said SPS Chairman and CEO Bill D. Helton, who will become chairman and CEO of New Century Energies, the holding company that would be created by the merger. "We are making excellent progress toward completing our merger as early as January 1997."

SPS and PSCo on Aug. 23, 1995, announced plans to merge. Public utility regulators in Colorado, Wyoming and Kansas have approved the merger; regulators in Texas and New Mexico have completed hearings on the proposal, and are expected to announce their decisions later this


The FERC had set a hearing on two issues. The settlement agreement

addresses both: that the proposed merger's "hold harmless" commitment provides adequate protection for wholesale ratepayers, and that the merger, as conditioned, will not have an adverse effect on competition.

Under the hold harmless commitment, SPS and PSCo will not request recovery of any merger-related transaction or transition costs, unless such costs are offset by merger-related benefits. Competition is protected by an agreement that any interested parties may participate in a detailed, regional planning and solicitation process for a transmission line proposed to be constructed to interconnect SPS

"Strength has been an area where our girl athletes are behind, and this will definitely improve our competitiveness!" she added.

Knox has designed and built weight equipment for the past few years, for Tahoka and other school districts, and says his business is re-

ally building in that area. "Five or six years ago, I built 30 lockers for the Tahoka varsity boys dressing room ... this year I have built and sold over

3000 lockers," Knox said.

He is working with over 100 school districts this year in designing and building weight equipment and lockers, including two school districts in Houston. Closer to home, he built new lockers and fully equipped a weight room for the O'Donnell Independent School District boys athletic program, and has several pieces of equipment in the Tahoka boys field house.

He says he donated the weight equipment to the girls athletic program here because, in keeping with his Masonic beliefs, he wanted to help in providing better facilities for youth in the public school system.

"Masons started the public school system in Texas," Knox explained. "Most of the Masonic Lodges in early Texas history built two-story buildings with the Masonic Hall meeting upstairs and schoolroom downstairs, and in fact, Masons often paid the teachers salaries until the communities could do so," he added.

"We're (Masons) still very involved in the public school system. In Lubbock, there is a Scottish Rite school where children - and teachers - can go to learn how to deal with dyslexia (a reading impairment),"

He said he is still not finished

with the girls weight room here. "I still want to add mirrors on the walls and put in a sound system, so the girls can work out to music," he said, adding with a grin, "Anything to help them take their minds off the work; they're doing!"

Sharp Delivers September Sales Tax Rebates

John Sharp, State Comptroller of Public Accounts, recently issued a total of \$165.8 million in sales tax payments to 1.084 Texas cities and 114 counties, and reported that the year-to-date returns are running about 9 percent ahead of the total for the first nine months of last year.

Local city sales tax rebates for September are 150.8 million, 23.2 percent above the payments one year ago of \$122.4 million. Rebates of \$14.9 million to Texas counties reflect a 14.6 percent increase over the \$13 million payments of September

O'Donnell's net payment this period of \$1,098.36 was up compared to prior year of \$816.97. Total 1996 payments to date of \$13,174.79 reflects a 15.69 percent increase over last year's total of \$11,387.68.

Tahoka's net payment this period of \$7,769.94 increased from last year's total of \$4,903.55. 1996 payments to date of \$60,904.05 reflects a 21.98 percent increase over the 1995 payments of \$49,929.14.

Wilson's net payment this period of \$358.35 increased compared to last year's payment of \$275.41. 1996 payments to date of \$3,947.29 decreased 7.33 percent from 1995's payment of \$4,259.66.

August Much Wetter Than Usual

Minimum temperatures averaged 1.1 degree above normal and ranged from 1 degree below normal at Matador to 2.7 degrees above normal at Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge. The lowest temperature reported during the month was 53 degrees at Dimmitt on the 12th.

Precipitation averaged 2.12 inches above normal and ranged from 0.35 inch below normal at Lockettville to 6.34 inches above normal at Tahoka.

Producers Have Opportunity To Hay CRP During Drought

Livestock producers in Lynn County are talking advantage of a USDA Program that allows emergency having of Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) lands during the 1996 drought. The having program allows participants to hay their CRP fields, provided they obtain a haying plan from the USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS).

The having period runs through the summer and expires the last day of September. The cost to the producer for haying the CRP land is 25 percent of their annual rental pay-

The USDA-NRCS office in Tahoka is currently working with producers in developing having plans for their CRP acres. The haying plans address all aspects of hayland management. Most of the producers who Tahoka.

are taking advantage of this program are owner/operators who are utilizing the haying opportunity to provide feed for their own livestock.

Haying CRP fields provides lowcost forage to producers. The having also benefits the CRP fields by removing thatch and allowing for additional seedling development over the long term. Haying CRP fields will also increase plant vigor and rejuvenate the stand, that may be decadent from a lack of grazing.

Wildlife is addressed in haying plans. The plans are written so at least 25 percent of each field or contiguous fields must be left unhayed for wildlife habitat.

Pest Management News

Sticky Cotton Associated with Aphids: (from "Focus on Entomology" by Dr. Jim Leser) A small amount, maybe as few as 5 percent of our total bales, of cotton produced in the High Plains area in 1995 had a sticky problem associated with late aphid infestations. This sticky cotton does not cause a problem during the ginning process but does cause considerable problems at the mill. This was an unusual event caused by an unusual set of circumstances.

Most, if not all of the sticky cotton was produced on limited production fields-those fields which had insufficient moisture to prevent premature cutout. Heavy September rains caused a major regrowth problem in these fields which attracted and supported late season aphid infestations. These aphids excreted honeydew on the open bolls. There were no further rains to wash off this honeydew. It is very unusual not to have a late rain which will wash off this honeydew. A quarter inch rain is

Sticky cotton is difficult to detect until it adheres to machine surfaces in the textile mill. Therefore, sticky cotton was shipped undetected to mills. Even when blended with clean cotton, there was often still problems. Sticky cotton also collects fine soil particles which cause excessive wear of certain machine parts at

The bottom line was that sticky cotton caused a severe disruption in the manufacturing process and a substantial loss of money for the textile

Word of our sticky cotton problem has quickly spread among mills around the world. There is now a understandable reluctance on the part of many mills to buy our 1996 crop without some sort of assurance that there will be no sticky cotton problem. It is important that we undo the damage to our reputation for the 1996 and future crops. The West Texas Sticky Cotton Committee was formed several months ago to do just that. We have already communicated to concerned mills about our awareness of the problem and our goal to minimize the chance of this problem for developing again.



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Safety Rules Can **Prevent Tragedies**

New clothes, backpacks, lunch boxes, school buses. The first day of school is exciting for students, but the new school year can bring tragedy if school bus safety rules are not followed. The Texas Department of Public Safety reminds motorists to obey traffic laws and watch for children boarding or exiting school buses. Parents and teachers should talk to children about school bus safety.

In 1995, no school bus drivers or passengers were killed while riding on school buses in Texas, but 1,370 people were injured while traveling on them. Seven people were killed in accidents directly or indirectly involving school buses, while 2,556 were injured.

The most common time for accidents is when school buses are loading or unloading students. Students should be taught to follow safety rules

and to watch for traffic before crossing streets. Students also should watch for vehicles illegally passing stopped school buses on either side of the bus. According to the National School Bus Loading and Unloading Survey, most children injured or killed while getting on or off buses are under the age of 10.
