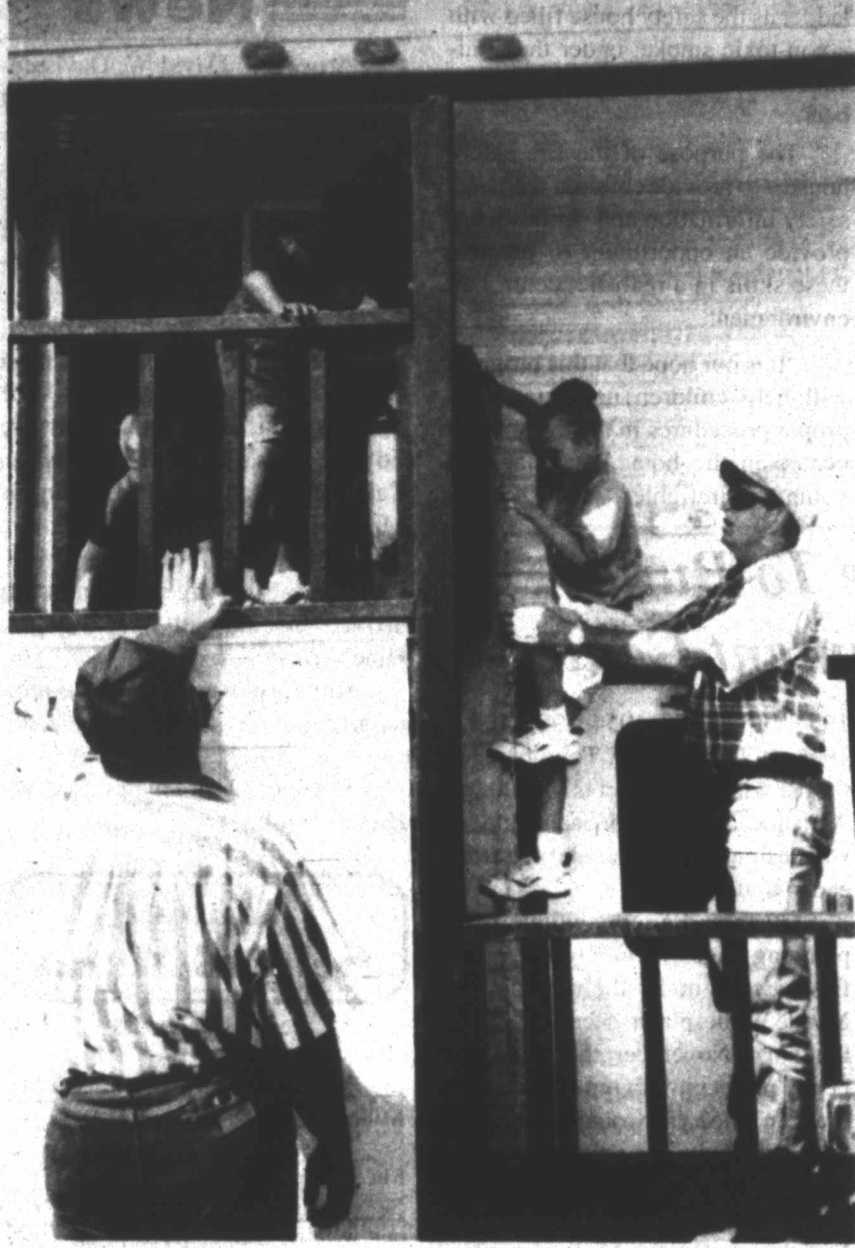

## Dogs Bite Cats 49-14 For Third Victory

The Tahoka Bulldogs started chasing the Smyer Bobcats with a 95-yard opening kickoff return and then picked up the pace with three second-quarter touchdowns to remain unbeaten this season with a score of 49-14.

Rocky Moore took the opening kickoff for Tahoka and ran it back for a touchdown. The point after was missed, but it was 6-0 with just 17 seconds gone.

Tahoka scored again in the first quarter on a drive which featured passes from QB Brent Raindl to Randy Burluson for 26 yards and to Monty Hale for 7, plus the running of TB Dustin Burluson, who went 3 yards for the score. Dustin Burluson gained a whopping 239 yards on 29 carries in the game and scored three other touchdowns, including two on runs of 35 and 22 yards.

Smyer scored on a 21-yard run by Riedell in the second to come within 18-6, but again the Bulldogs scored on the next kickoff, with Hale returning it 77 yards for a touchdown. A pass try for points failed and it was 24-6.

Before the half, D. Burluson ran

3 for a touchdown and then ran for 2 points to make it 32-6 at halftime. That drive for Tahoka included a 25-yard pass from Raindl to Randy Burluson.

The score went to 39-6 in the third when Burluson ran 25 and then Matt Garcia kicked the point.

In the fourth Garcia kicked a 38-yard field goal and Smyer came back with the kickoff return by Moore for 89 yards and a TD, followed by a 2-point pass play.

Bulldog running back Reggie Moore closed out the scoring with 1-yard plunge and Garcia kicked the final point.

This week Tahoka will go to Crosbyton to face their first Class AA opponent. The Chieftains are 2-1, losing last week to Soudown 19-3.

A 5-year-old boy was reportedly bitten by a dog on N. 6th St. last Wednesday. The dog was impounded.

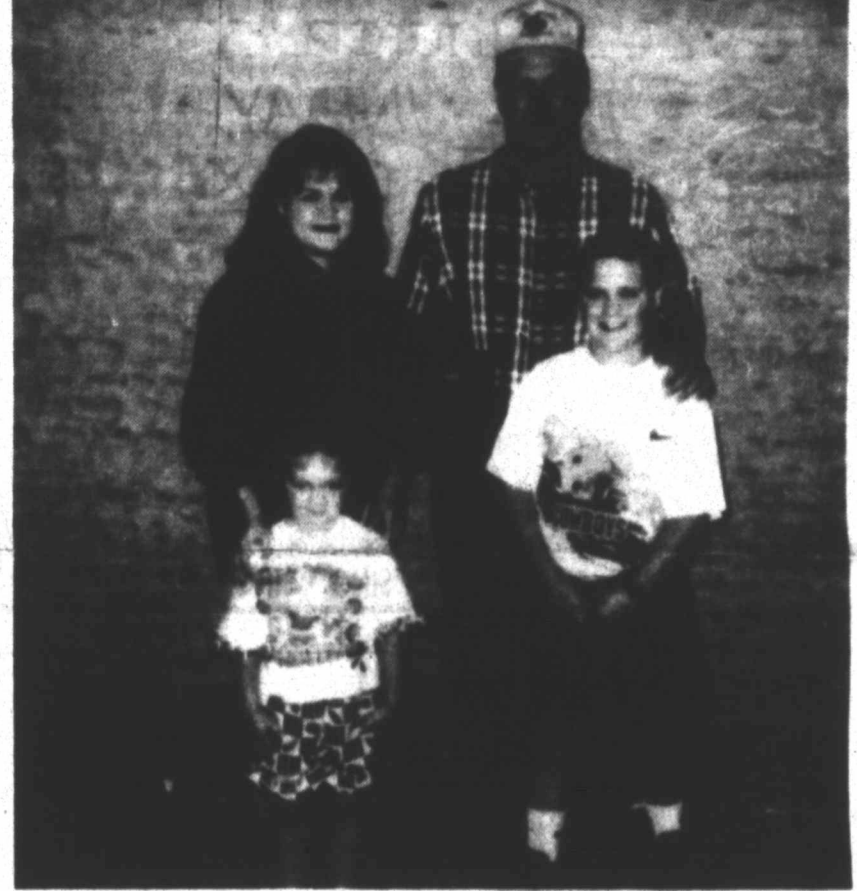

## 53 Attend Lynn County Farm Tour Here Friday

Approximately 53 farmers, ranchers and agribusinessmen gathered at the Lynn County Show Barn this past Friday to go on the Lynn County Farm Tour. The farm tour was sponsored by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), and the Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District.

Local producers Ralph Huffaker, Nelson Hogg, Don Blair, Glen Hogg, and Glen Phipps participated in pre-

sentations at their respective farms. The results of various test plots were discussed by Dr. Jim Leser with the experiment station in Lubbock; Tommy Doederlein, integrated pest management specialist; and Bryan Reynolds, local agricultural extension agent.

Kyle Pyron, O'Donnell volunteer fireman, and Mario Avila, NRCS district conservationist, reviewed the dry hydrant program sponsored by the Texas Forest Service. Avila also discussed the future of the Conservation Reserve Program.

Wayne Huffaker, Chairman of Plains Cotton Growers Boll Weevil Steering Committee, discussed the Enhanced Boll Weevil Diapause Program.

The tour culminated with a meal at the Lynn County Show Barn and the presentation of the Outstanding Farmer of the Year and the Goodyear/NACD Outstanding Conservation Farmer Award. Don Blair of O'Donnell was selected by the Lynn County Ag Committee as the Outstanding Farmer of the Year. Ty Askew of Tahoka received the Goodyear/NACD Outstanding Conservation Farmer Award.

The Lynn County Extension Service, the staff of the local NRCS office, and the Directors of the Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District would like to express their appreciation to all of those who helped or participated in making the tour a success. ## Elementary Youth Visit State Fire Safety House

Tahoka, Wilson and O'Donnell elementary youth got a chance to learn more about fire safety last week, when the State Fire Safety House was brought to their campuses, sponsored by local volunteer fire departments.

The Tahoka Volunteer Fire Department conducted lessons in home fire safety using the Texas Commission on Fire Protection's new fire safety house here last Wednesday. The Wilson Fire Dept. used the fire safety house to teach children at Wilson Elementary Thursday morning, and O'Donnell youth were provided the same opportunity that afternoon with their local fire department.

The \$26,000 two-story fire safety house was donated to the State of Texas in April by the Texas Fire Chiefs' Foundation. During the demonstration, the safety house was filled with non-toxic "safe smoke" to simulate a real emergency, and children learned to identify home fire hazards and had an opportunity to practice exiting a home safely in the event of an emergency.

The fire safety house is a 28-foot mobile travel trailer that is a scaled down "kid-sized" functional two-story house. The children were able to walk through a kitchen, living room, and bedroom locating potential fire hazards and practiced simple methods of eliminating potentially dangerous situations. They could feel a "hot door" and located an emergency escape route.

At the conclusion of the tour, children exited the house by a chain ladder as the safety house filled with a non-toxic smoke, under the guidance of local fire department members.

The purpose of the fire safety house is to provide children with fire-safety information and skills, and to provide an opportunity to practice these skills in a realistic, controlled environment.

"It is our hope that this program will help children understand the proper procedures in the event a fire occurs in the home," said a local volunteer firefighter.

## Funds Continue To Build For Life Enrichment Center

Pledges and donations continue to accumulate funds for the proposed Life Enrichment Center in Tahoka, a facility which already has more than half the funds garnered.

Total pledges and contributions received locally to date amount to \$9,390.32, in addition to the \$100,000 grant promise from a private West Texas foundation who contributed anonymously to the \$218,000 project for the City of Tahoka. Additional "in-kind" volunteer services already promised adds approximately \$29,000 to the amount raised for the project.

The Life Enrichment Center Committee operated a booth at the Lynn County Harvest Festival, raising \$295.32, and individual donations chalked up an additional \$945.00. Total cash pledges to date, as of Sept. 20, amount to \$2,650, with \$5,500 more in pledges promised to date.

The winner of the penny-guessing contest at the Harvest Festival booth, furnished by Mrs. Mildred Abbe, was Tahoka sixth grader Johnna Alvarado, who guessed 1,839 pennies in the jar. The jar actually held 1,893 pennies.

Pledges since the last printing in *The Lynn County News* include Morton Manufacturing in Wilson, Lynn-Garza Farm Bureau, Thriftway and White Funeral Home. Donations have been made by Al Griggs Autocenter, Memorial for C.E. and Lena Short, Honorarium for Dink and E.L. Short, Jan Whitaker Gray, Nolan Ryan, Spike Dykes and Texas Tech, Keith Paschal, Stan Lambert and ACU, and Mildred Abbe, and in-kind services from Huffaker, Green and Huffaker.

The window project, selling the ten windows in the center to graduating class, went very well, with windows sold to the THS classes of 1950,

1951, 1952, 1953, 1954, 1956, 1965, 1966, 1976 and 1990. Total pledges for the window project is \$3,500.00. A plaque at the base of each window will designate the class who sponsors each window.

Other fundraisers continue in the planning stages, including the gospel fiesta event, under the direction of Myrtle White, planned tentatively for the first of November; the upcoming penny project involving school children; and the Lynn County Historical Society is planning a concession stand at an estate sale in Tahoka on Oct. 12, with all proceeds to benefit the Life Enrichment Center. Most, if not all, of the food and drinks for the concession are being donated, which will enable more funds to be contributed for the community center project.

"We're still very excited about this project, and appreciate everyone's interest and generosity," said a member of the steering committee. "We believe, with God's help, that we will be able to build this community center."

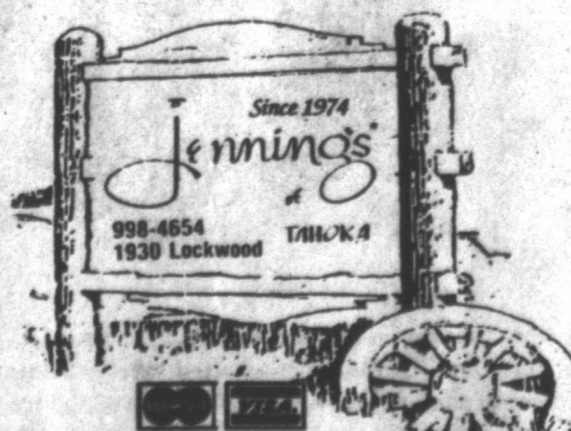

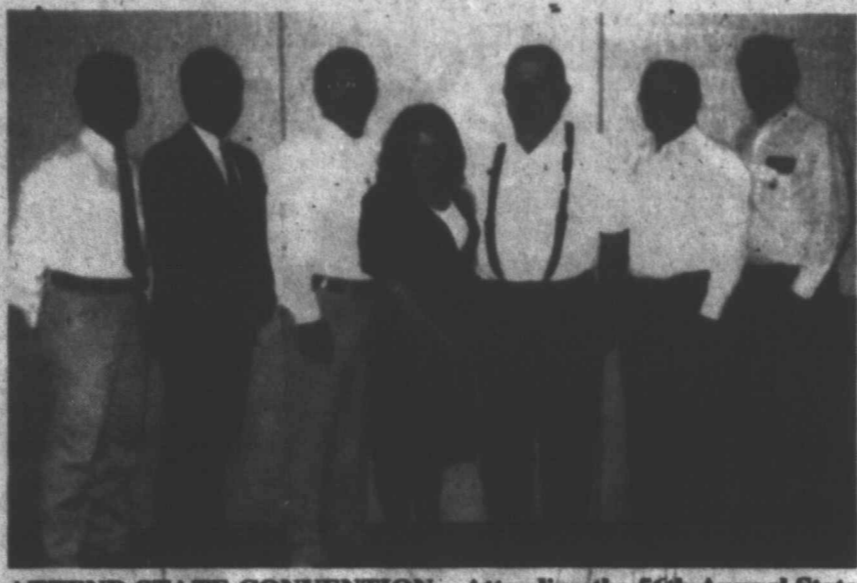
The girls played Lubbock Christian on Monday, Sept. 16 with both A and B teams combined, winning with scores of 15-4, 9-15, 15-5.

### GED Test To Be Given Saturday, Sept. 28

G.E.D. (Adult Education) testing will be held this Saturday, Sept. 28, in the Tahoka High School library. Registration will be held at 7:45 a.m. and the test will begin at 8 a.m.

### Local Directors Attend State Soil & Water Conservation Meeting

Directors from the Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District were at Fort Worth, Sept. 16-18, to attend the 56th Annual State Meeting of Texas Soil & Water Conservation District Directors. This meeting was held in the Raddison Hotel and Ft. Worth Tarrant County Convention Center.

Attending with the directors from Lynn County were Helen Saldana, Recording Secretary; Mario Avila, District Conservationist; Jerri Steen, Janell Franklin, Celia Mason, Ethelynn Zant and Bertha Brewer.

Approximately 1,000 attended the meeting. Bobby Waddle of De Soto, Director of the Dalworth Soil and Water Conservation District, welcomed the attendees on Tuesday morning. Other speakers addressing the group included Guillermo "Merno" Benavides, President of the Association of the Texas Soil and Water Conservation Districts and Robert G. Buckley, Executive Director of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board.

The special guest speaker was inspirational/motivational speaker and author, Nancy Robinson Masters of Abilene, who entertained and motivated listeners with her wit and "down home" style.

The main focus of this year's meeting was the Conservation Issues Workshops held on Tuesday afternoon that featured panel discussions on Conservation Districts and the Farm Bill, Challenges and Issues for the 75th Texas Legislature, and Funding of Districts.

The Conservation Districts and the Farm Bill workshop was presented by Robert Toole, Southern Representative for the National Association of Conservation Districts and Wes Oneth, State Conservationist of the Natural Resources Conservation, and focused on the conservation districts roles in selected conservation programs under the new Farm Bill.

"The 1996 Farm Bill provides a powerful set of new conservation tools to help farmers, ranchers and other land managers address agricultural and related natural resource concerns on the nation's private lands,"

said Toole. "It provides tremendous opportunities for districts to emerge as leaders assessing local resource needs, setting priorities, developing policy and tailoring national conservation objectives to local programs."

### Thornberry Expresses Concern About New CRP Ruling

U.S. Rep. Mac Thornberry (TX-13) expressed concern about the new rule changes proposed by the U.S. Department of Agriculture that would dramatically alter the way crop land is enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP).

"In the 13th district alone, there are nearly 1.5 million acres of CRP land. If the USDA's plan is allowed to go into effect, nearly half of these acres could be prevented from reapplying to the program. This could potentially have devastating effects. Not only has the program provided supply control and price stabilization, but has also provided the additional environmental benefits of soil restoration, cleaner air, and decreased depletion of the aquifer."

The new rules were formally published September 23 in the Federal Register. Among other things, the rules would stipulate that land meet an Environmental Index level of 8 and over in order to participate in the program. "The problem with this rule change," Thornberry noted, "is that it puts too much emphasis on water erosion and disregards the full impact of wind erosion."

According to Thornberry, the proposed rule will be open for public review and comment for the next 45 days. After that, it will be sent to Congress for 60 days of consideration on Capitol Hill — a requirement that was just enacted last year and, Thornberry said, is the most logical place for the rule to be defeated.



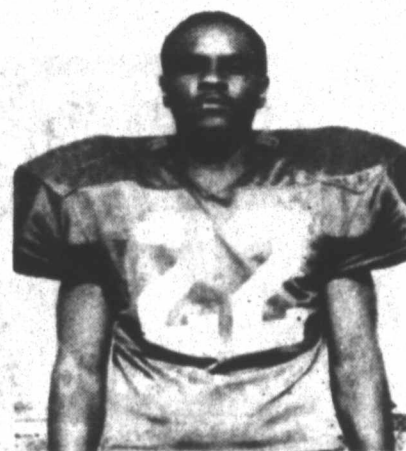
