Tahoka I.S.D. Approves Audit

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees approved the annual audit and conducted other routine business during a meeting held Thursday night. The audit was unanimously approved as presented by Keith Reeger of Keith Reeger & Company, L.L.P., who concluded his report by saying the district was in good financial shape and also added his appreciation for the work ethics of Business Manager Loretta Tekell and her office staff.

In other business, trustees ap-

proved naming Lynn County Extension Agents Bryan Reynolds and Doris Collins as adjunct faculty members so that students involved in 4-H activities involving absences from school may receive attendance credit. Trustees also approved requesting a waiver from the Texas Education Agency for the district's two-year algebra I program.

Several budget amendments were approved as presented by Superintendent David Hutton, totaling \$52,476, and additions to the substi-

tute teacher list were also approved as presented.

All seven trustees were present for the two-and-a-half hour meeting. The next meeting was scheduled for 7 p.m. Thursday, Nov. 14.

Bulldogs Bite Indians For Sixth Straight Win

The Tahoka Bulldogs romped to their sixth straight win of the season at Morton last Friday, when tailback Dustin Burleson scored five touchdowns on the way to a 41-8 pounding of the Indians in the district opener for both teams.

The celebration was short, though, as Tahoka prepared this week for a trip to Shallowater, one of the district favorites. The Mustangs kicked Plains 31-8 Friday, and should be the toughest opponent the Dogs have faced so far this season.

Burleson, who gained 209 yards on 25 carries in the game, scored the first three touchdowns on runs of 1, 5 and 4 yards, and on a 10-yard run, all in the first half. He scored again on a 33-yard run in the fourth period.

Reggie Moore scored from 3 yards out in the third quarter. Matt Garcia kicked five extra points.

Moore gained 53 yards in 8 carries in the game.

Tahoka's defense was strong, allowing Morton just 8 first downs. Moore played a strong game at his defensive tackle position, and was credited with 11 unassisted tackles, two assists and two quarterback sacks.

Burleson now has gone over 1,000 yards for the season, and is the leading rusher and scorer on Class AA teams on the South Plains. He has 86 points, and has gained 1,063 yards in 156 carries.

Wreck, Theft Incidents Are Investigated

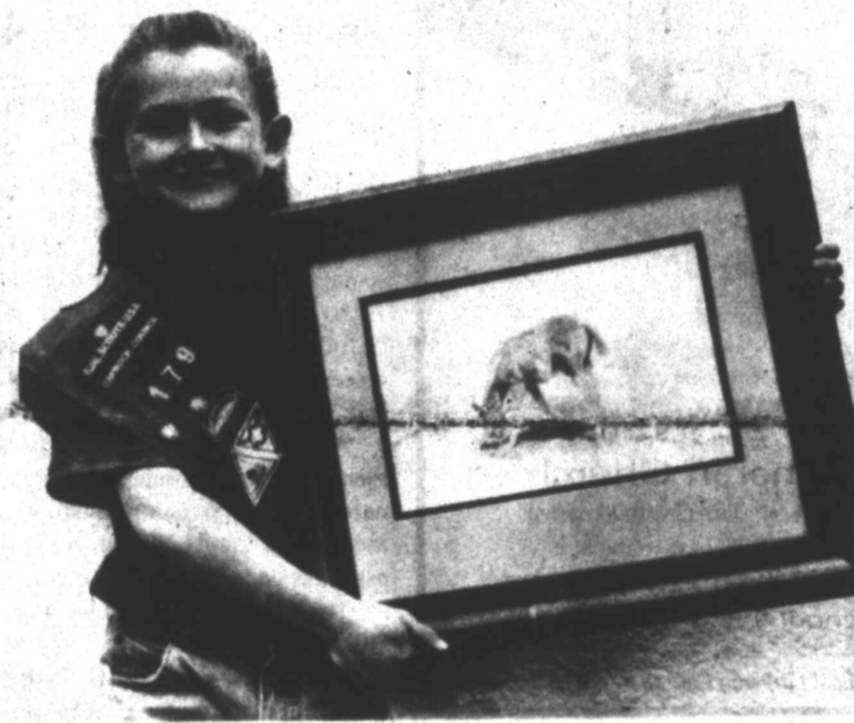
A traffic accident in Tahoka and theft of a pistol were among incidents investigated by law enforcement officers in the county during the last week.

Abell-Hanger Foundation Is Generous Donor Here

One of the private foundations who contributed a generous amount to the Life Enrichment Center project in Tahoka is the Abell-Hanger Foundation of Midland, who gave a \$50,000 grant to the project in late September.

David L. Smith, Executive Director of the foundation, told Project Director Retha Pittman this week that he was impressed with the fact that the Life Enrichment Center project is encompassing efforts of the entire community, including the elementary school's "Pennies for the Principal" project, and the Student Council's "Hole-In-One" project, and he especially liked the community Gospel Fiesta idea, planned here on Nov. 2.

"This project has the whole community involved in the fund raising process - and that will make it truly theirs," Smith said.

George Thomas Abell and Gladys Hanger Abell were founders of the Abell-Hanger Foundation. Abell moved to Midland in 1927 where he trained himself as a geologist and entered the petroleum business as an independent oil operator. In 1939, he married Gladys Hanger of Ft. Worth. Both were involved in various community, civic, cultural, educational and historical activities. The Abell-Hanger Foundation was formed to carry on the philanthropic endeavors which they pursued during their lifetimes.

The Foundation makes grants to

nonprofit organizations, other than private foundations, which are involved in undertakings for the public welfare, including higher education, cultural activities, health services, youth programs and the handicapped.

The foundation's board reviewed the grant application submitted by Mrs. Pittman for the life enrichment center, and according to Smith, were favorably impressed with the project. On Sept. 27, Smith told Mrs. Pittman that the foundation was contributing \$50,000 to the project.

"We are so excited about this project," said Mrs. Pittman. "We're doing what we can here to raise funds, but the generosity of the Abell-Hanger Foundation has taken us a giant step forward towards realizing this dream - we cannot thank them enough for sharing our faith in this project," she added.

The Life Enrichment Center will be owned and operated by the City of Tahoka, and will be located on Main Street just south of the Wharton building. Approximately \$20,000 more in funds is needed to reach the \$218,886 goal to build the facility, which will house the city/county library (doubling the size of the current library facility), a small workshop classroom seating 30, a multipurpose activity room with space for seating 125 persons, a kitchen, storage space, and a foyer to display local artwork.

American Heart Association To Sponsor Heart Walk

The Lynn County Chapter of the American Heart Association will be sponsoring the "Ma Hill Honorary Heart Walk" on Saturday, Nov. 2, at the Tahoka Mini Park. Juice and cookies will be served. Awards will be presented to those raising the most money. A flat donation may be given or donations in memory of family, friend, business associates and others are welcome.

The Walk will be dedicated to Ma Hill who has participated in heart walks in the past and usually walked more miles than anyone. At 89 years

of age, Ma Hill can be seen walking almost daily. During her walks, she occasionally drops by with homemade cookies for friends that are not able to get out and about.

"Everyone is urged to come join Ma Hill and the AHA in the fight against heart disease and stroke," said Dr. Freitag.

Reading Program Rewards Students

Tahoka Middle School students recently cashed in points they had earned in the Accelerated Reader program. In its second year at TMS, the program rewards students who read prescribed library books and then successfully pass a test over the books.

Tests are taken in the computer lab, and points accumulated for each student. Once each six weeks, students are allowed to "purchase" goods from the AR store with points. Examples of merchandise are pocket radios, telephones, calculators, gum, pens, pencils, sports equipment and snack materials. Some students are developing a thriftiness with their points, saving them until they can buy more valuable prizes.

Accelerated Reader programs across the country attest to the higher

reading and comprehension scores evidenced by their students. It is also the goal of the local program to raise TAAS scores in reading as well as to provide skills in a life-long area of enrichment. Mary Belew is coordinator of the middle school program.

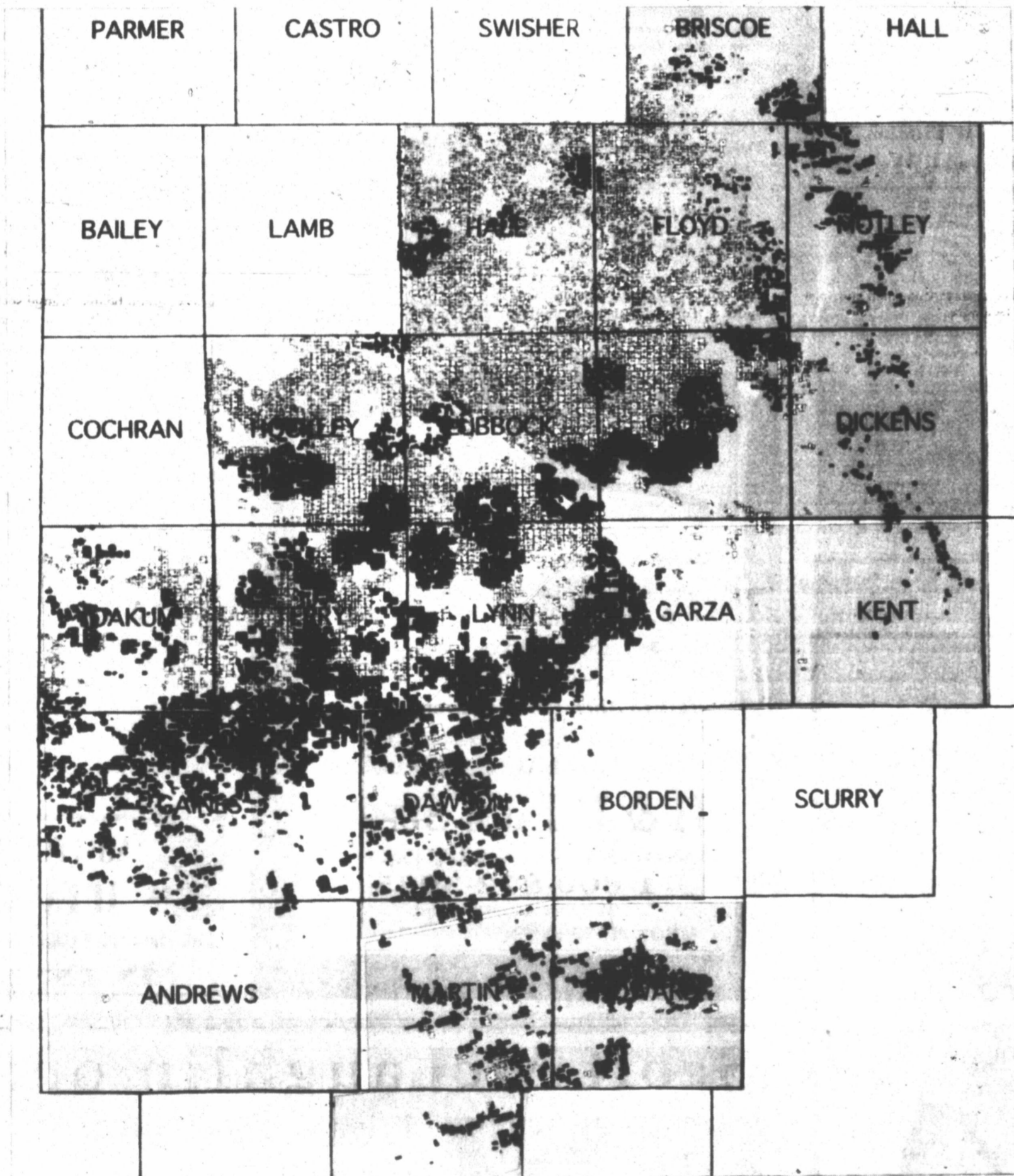

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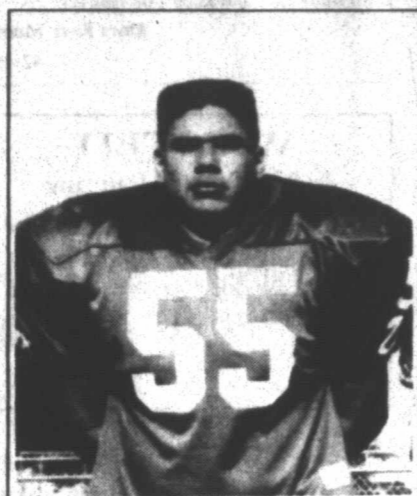
