With only 55\% (about $\mathbf{\$ 4 8 7 , 8 6 0 )}$ of total assessments collected in Lynn County, your participation in this program can make the difference between marginal control and a knock-out punch. We should stand together against this common foe, and not let petty differences divide us.

The first round of diapause treatments has been completed on over 1.4 million acres of cotton. Completed October 9, the first round of treatments was completely paid for with producer assessments collected this year. Hopefully, two more treatments can be made to further improve the effectiveness of the High Plains program. Arrangements have been made to pay for the second round of treatments which began October 10.
It will be up to all those who say they support the program, but have not yet sent in their assessments, to make sure enough money comes in to pay for a third round of treatments.
