Bulldogs Win, End Best Season Since '81

 Tahoka overcame a stubborn Plains football team 18-14 here Friday to close out the season for both schools, and give the Bulldogs, coached by Troy Hinds, their best won-loss record in 15 years.

The Dogs were 7-3 for the year, 2-3 in district. In 1981, Tahoka was 8-3, winning district and losing to Floydada 16-0 in bi-district. That team was coached by A.D. Shaver, master of the "40-trap" play always featured by his teams.

Reggie Moore scored touchdowns on runs of 1 and 9 yards last Friday and also played a strong game on defense to lead the Bulldogs in the win, which was never assured until the last half minute of play. Moore gained 46 yards in 9 carries. The leading rusher was tailback Dustin Burleson, who gained 106 yards in 23 carries.

With two seconds left in the first quarter, Moore's 1-yard plunge and a missed extra point gave Tahoka a 6-

0 lead. Early in the second, Randy Burleson ran 4 yards for a touchdown, and a running try for points failed, putting Tahoka up 12-0 with 9:23 left in the half.

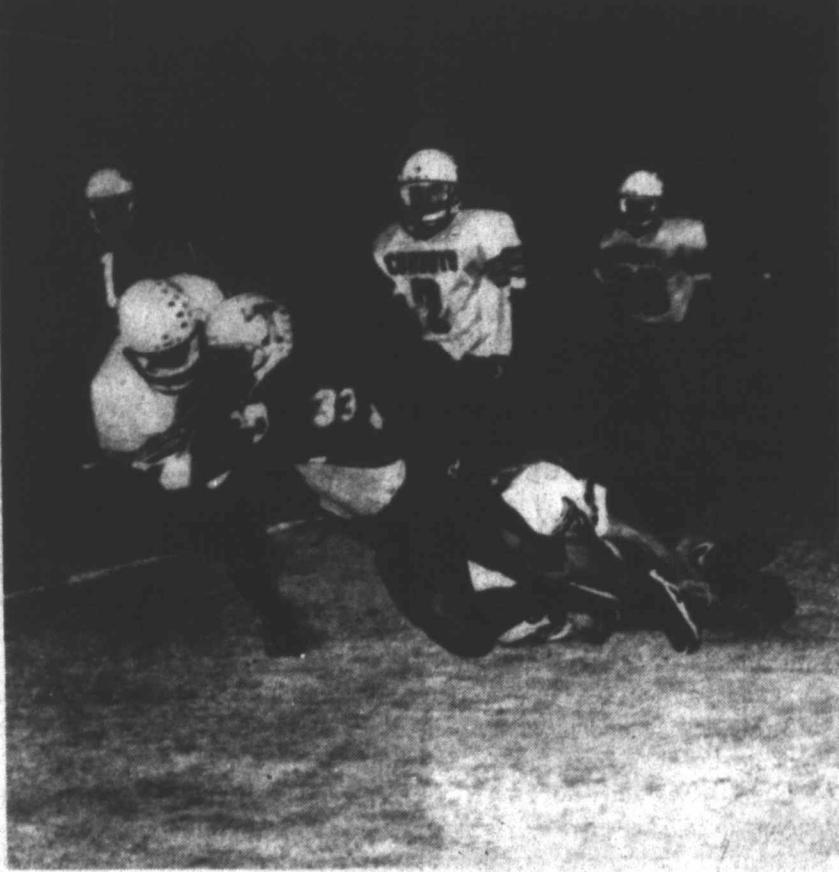
Aided by a couple of Tahoka's many penalties, Plains drove to a score with 5:04 left in the half, Joe Luna going over from the 1. An extra point kick made it 12-7, Tahoka.

Moore ran 9 for Tahoka's third touchdown with 5 minutes left in the third, and again a point try was no good, and Tahoka led 18-7. But Plains answered with a drive for a touchdown with 1:09 left in the quarter, Luna going 10 yards, and a kick narrowed the margin to 18-14.

In the fourth period, two unsportsmanlike conduct penalties against Tahoka almost lost it for the Bulldogs, as Plains moved inside the Tahoka 20. Moore hit Luna for a loss of 7 yards, however, and a fourth down pass was incomplete.

Later in the quarter, Tahoka lost the ball on downs at the Plains 25 after a long drive which featured runs of 11 and 25 yards by Dustin Burleson. Then Randy Burleson intercepted a Cowboys pass and returned to the Plains 10. The game ended with Tahoka on the Plains 1-foot line.

Matt Garcia and Joseph DeLeon also turned in good games on defense, as did Davy Stone, Derrick Hatchett, Monty Hale, Gary Chapa and Aaron Long.

Others who played for the Bulldogs Tuesday were Brady Raindl, Matt Chancy, Brad Pewsorth, Davy Stone, Derrick Hatchett, Brent Raindl, Adrian Graves and Aaron Long.

"They did a good job and I am very proud of them," said Coach Villa.

The boys will play again Friday at Whiteface, with a JV team to play at 5:30 and varsity scheduled for 7 p.m.

The Tahoka Lady Bulldogs also played Dawson on Tuesday night, losing 40-28. Leading scorers for Tahoka were Abby Wells, Micah Smith and Jennifer Dotson, who scored 7 points each.

Police Chief Smith Resigns This Week

Tahoka Police Chief Randy Smith has resigned his position this week, according to City Administrator Jerry Webster, who told *The News* that Smith submitted his resignation Tuesday, effective Friday, Nov. 15. Tahoka Mayor Jim Solomon has appointed Sgt. Steve McKay of the local department as interim chief until a decision can be made on the position.

Smith's resignation was not an unexpected decision, according to both Webster and Mayor Jim Solomon, who both said Smith had an opportunity for another position outside the law enforcement field in another city.

"His decision wasn't really unexpected, but there was no warning it would come this quickly," said Webster. "Smith said he was 'burned out' in police work and that this [move] is something he has been considering for a while," added the ad-

ministrator.

Smith was appointed from within the ranks as Tahoka Police Chief in May 1995, according to Webster.

The resignation occurred only a week after the council met in closed session citing personnel reasons. And, a rumor that city funds may have been missing was emphatically denied by Mayor Solomon. "There has never been any funds missing from the police department, and Smith's resignation had nothing to do with any such rumors," said Solomon.

Mayor Solomon said he expects to call a city council meeting next week to discuss the position and begin the process of taking applications.

"We will certainly encourage our local police officers to apply if they so desire, but I will recommend that we open up the application process," Solomon said, and the City Administrator concurred.

Theft, Criminal Mischief Cases Are Reported

Theft of lumber from a construction site, vandalism to a car left near O'Donnell and hit-run damage to a recreational vehicle were among reports received by law enforcement officers in Lynn County during the last two weeks.

Lubbock contractor Raleigh Hudzitz reported that 60 2x6s, 14 and 16 feet long, valued at \$415, had been stolen from a home construction site at U.S. 87 and County Rd. 1, around the last of October.

All the windows and lights of a 1983 Chevrolet owned by Tim Taylor of Shallowater were broken out after the car was left on Loop 76 at O'Donnell following mechanical failure Nov. 2. Investigation was continuing, and sheriff's officers indicated that charges are expected.

A camping trailer parked on N. 3rd St. and owned by Leslie Paris was struck by a vehicle which left the scene early Sunday, moving the trailing 34 feet and causing extensive damage. Tahoka Police officers had a witness' description of a pickup which struck the trailer and left the scene, and investigation is continuing.

In jail during the last two weeks were four persons for possession of marijuana, with two also charged with driving while intoxicated, one also with possession of narcotics paraphernalia and one also with public intoxication. In addition, two other

persons were jailed for DWI first offense and one for DWI subsequent offense. Two more were jailed for public intoxication, one for theft by check, one for no drivers license plus operating an unregistered vehicle, one on a bench warrant, one for revocation of probation and still another persons for driving while license suspended.

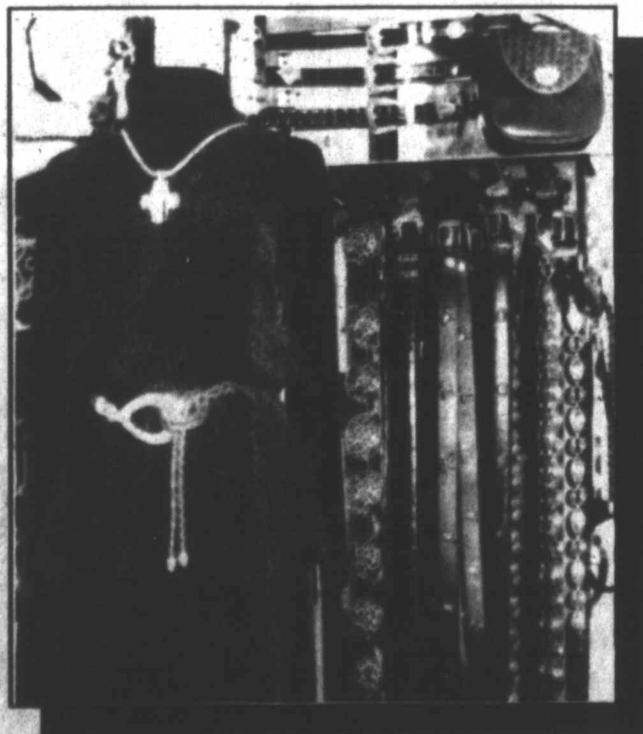
Felix Perez gained 101 yards in just three carries, including a 49-yard scoring run, and Romero Montez rushed for two touchdowns and had two interceptions on defense.

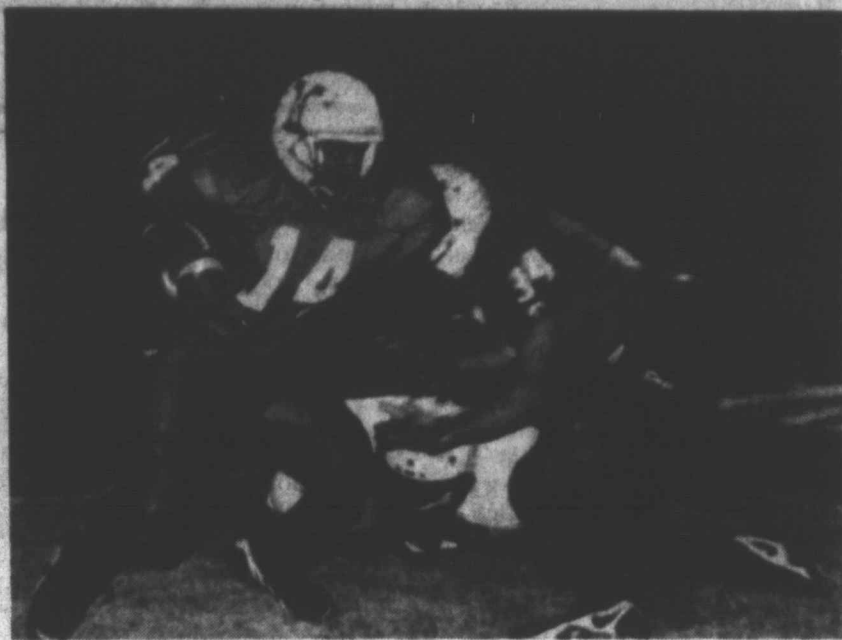

Commissioners Look At Lawn Watering Setup

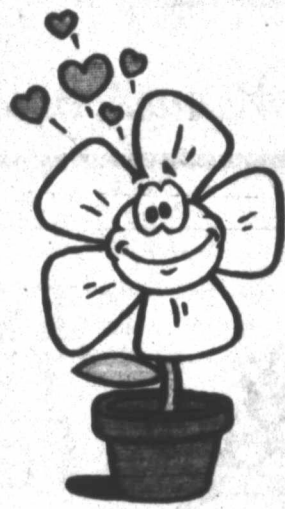
Lynn County commissioners Monday discussed the watering system for the courthouse lawn, but took no action on the item, one of several mostly routine matters for consideration.

Sharp Delivers Sales Tax Rebates

John Sharp, State comptroller of Public Accounts, recently delivered a total of \$206.2 million in November sales tax payments to 1,083 Texas cities and 116 counties.
 "Total city and county sales tax rebates year-to-date are 8 percent higher than those for the first 11 months of last year, as the Texas economy continues to clock along at a good pace," Sharp said.
 Sharp delivered city sales tax rebates totaling \$190.5 million, 4.9 percent above payments in November 1995 of \$181.5 million. Rebates of \$15.7 million to Texas counties were 2.1 percent below the \$16 million payments of November of last year.
 This month's payments to Texas cities and counties include taxes collected by monthly sales tax filers on September sales and by quarterly filers for July, August, and September, and reported to the Comptroller in October.
 O'Donnell received \$2,037.41 net payment this period, compared to \$3,068.31 last year, for a decrease of 33.59 percent. Tahoka received \$5,027.72 net payment this period, compared to \$5,882.05 last year, for a decrease of 14.52 percent. Wilson has received \$1,234.87 net payment this period, compared to \$1,465.06 last year, for an increase of 165.52 percent. As a whole, the county received \$8,300.00 net payment this period, compared to \$9,414.42 last year, for a decrease of 11.84 percent.
