

Trustees Set Election For May 3; Approve Administrative Contracts

Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees set the school board election for May 3, appointed election judges, approved administrative contracts and discussed health insurance issues at Thursday night's meeting, which didn't adjourn until 12:30 a.m. Trustees went into closed executive session for approximately four hours during the 5-1/2 hour meet-

Trustees set the school board election for May 3 for the purpose of electing two at-large places on the board, and named Dean Bartley election judge, Jackie Stephens as alternate judge, and Jerry Webster as early voting judge. Currently holding the at-large positions are trustees Greg Henley and Rex Rash. Filing period to sign up as a candidate in the election is Feb. 17 through March 19.



Bulldogs To Face Stanton In Playoff

The basket shriveled up for the Tahoka Bulldogs in the last quarter of Tuesday night's Third Encounter of the Close Kind with the Shallowater Mustangs, and the Mustangs won the game at Levelland 73-54 to earn the number one seeding for District 5-AA in the playoffs.

The two schools are co-champions of the district, and the playoff was only to determine seedings. Tahoka as the No. 2 seed from the district, now will play Stanton, champion of Dist. 6-AA, at 7 p.m. next Thursday in Scurry County Coliseum at Snyder.

Tahoka is now 24-5 for the year and Shallowater, who will play Dist. 6 runner-up McCamey, is 25-5.

Stanton reportedly has lost just one game all year, to Tahoka in a tournament early in the season.

Commissioners **Meet Here**

Lynn County Commissioners met in routine session Monday morning, with all four commissioners present

Coach Toby Villa's Bulldogs. who mostly have been very accurate this season, couldn't hit the basket Tuesday night, and never led in the game. Shallowater led 18-10 after the first quarter and 33-26 at halftime. The Dogs did pull up even at the end of three, 46-46, after Randy Burleson hit a 3-pointer. But Shallowater outscored Tahoka 27-8 in the last quarter, when Lee Rash's two field goals and a shot by Rocky Moore were about all the Dogs could come up with.

Tahoka closed out the regular district play at 9-1 by beating Seagraves 47-35 last Friday.

Tickets for the Stanton-Tahoka game will be sold at the door only in Snyder, and will be \$3 for adults and \$2 for students. Tahoka will be the home team, Coach Villa said.

NOTING THAT former Secretary of Commerce Barbara Franklin recently stated that the U.S. would "have more lawyers than people" by the year 2000, a publication called Remedy says that actually it will be the year 2180 when "lawyers will outnumber people, assuming the annual 4 percent growth rate for lawyers continues, versus .9 percent for the overall population".

The same publication listed 26 jobs rated annually for honesty and ethical standards (I assume by the general public) and found the highest rating went to pharmacists. At the bottom were car salesmen (No. 26), just below No. 25, members of Congress.

It didn't say where lawyers were on that list. Or newspaper people or ministers, for that matter.

IF YOU GO into a hospital to have surgery, says writer Laura Flynn McCarthy, a quicker recovery may depend on having a hospital roommate. She noted this after a study 84 men who had their first heart bypass surgeries at the San Diego Veterans Affairs Medical Center.

Reportedly, those men with roommates who were recovering from bypass surgery left the hospital an average of two days earlier than men in private rooms or with "pre-op" roommates who were having a different procedure.

She says the likely factors are conversation and observation. "We believe that a roommate who has already had the same operation you are about to have, and who can tell and show you what to expect aids recovery," said a San Diego psychology professor.

Ms. McCarthy says if a post-op roommate isn't feasible, you should ask a nurse about speaking with others who have had the same procedure.

Actually, they may have misread the findings. A lot of people probably got better quicker because they couldn't stand the roommate they were given and so they wanted to get out of there as quickly as possible.



The leading causes of blindness and vision impairment are glaucoma, cataracts, diabetic retinopathy and congenital and deteriorating eye

conditions and disease. Services provided free by the Texas society are the glaucoma alert program, preschool vision screening, adult vision screening and programs on eye safety education for industries, homes and sports.

Following a video presentation on the importance of protecting eyes with safety glasses and goggles, the women gave free glaucoma screenings for several Rotarians.





The Holland International Cup, to be held in Amsterdam, Holland in July 1997, is a special competition for girls ages 1?-18 to compete against top volleyball players from other countries. The opportunity to play for the United States team is by nomination only and is based on skills, character and recommendations by recruiters.

The only catch to the opportunity is financial. Although half of the expenses for the Holland trip are paid by Sports Challenge International (organizational sponsors of the event), the athletes are responsible for the other half of their expenses. In this case, Chelsea needs \$1500 for her part. These expenses are met by fundraisers, sponsors and company donations, which she is currently seeking. Her first fundraiser, "Rising Stars 2000" basketball clinic led by her mother, was held here last weekend

Chelsea was nominated to represent the USA by a University of Texas assistant volleyball coach. She was recruited at the National Qualifier Tournament held at the Dallas Convention Center last March, which is a tournament for Club Volleyball

teams across the United States. At age 12 Chelsea was a member

of the Texas Impact Club 14 and

a nomination from coaches and/or recruiters. Then the research process consists of skill level, leadership ability, character and past and present references. Most athletes are nominated by a college level recruiter or coaches that scout tournaments.

After this extensive process, teams are selected to compete in athletic events overseas. SPI works with international athletic federations to organize the "Junior Olympic" competition for the USA athletes. The Holland tournament is based in Haarlem, The Netherlands area, and has evolved into one of SPI's most popular tours because of the friendliness and overwhelming hospitality of the Dutch people.

"The international cultural goodwill associated with this tour is second to none. There will be many athletic goodwill receptions with the Europeans and the customary sightseeing excursions to add to the experience," said SPI representatives.

There are 38 girls who will be representing the USA in Holland in the 12-14 age group. Eight of these players (including Chelsea) are from Texas and Oklahoma, with the rest coming from Missouri, Minnesota, Illinois, Florida, Connecticut, Virginia, Maryland, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Tennessee and California. The Texas/ Oklahoma players will meet in Dallas and practice for three weeks before leaving for Holland. On departure day all USA players will meet in Houston airport before leaving as a group to Amsterdam, Holland.

Chelsea is currently seeking sponsors and donations for her trip. She says she plans to continue playing volleyball in the future and wants to play for Harvard University while majoring in computer graphics.

She is the granddaughter of Janet Porterfield and the late Jim Bob Porterfield, and of Mr. and Mrs. T.C. White, all of Tahoka.




