

The National Cotton Council of America awarded Gene Beck, general manager of New Home Co-op Gin, as Cotton Ginner of the Year recently, presenting him with a 1996-97 Horace Hayden Memorial Trophy at the annual convention held in Orlando, Fla.

efficient and faithful cotton ginning service" and in recognition of his leadership in the cotton industry.

Beck, who has been manager at the New Home Co-op Gin since March 1995, has been involved in the cotton ginning industry since 1966. He was named Texas Cotton Ginners Association Ginner of the Year in 1993 and was president of the Texas Cotton Ginners Association in 1991-92. He has served on numerous boards, including serving as President of the Plains Ginners Assn. and Plains Co-op Managers Assn. He was a director on the boards of the Texas Agricultural Cooperative Council, the National Cotton Ginners, and Producers Exchange Insurance, as well as ginner delegate to the National Cotton Council from 1992 to 1995. He represents Lynn County as a Businessman Director for Plains Cotton Growers, as well as being active in local 4-H and FFA programs.

Beck was one of five nominees for the national Cotton Ginner of the Year award, nominated to represent the Texas area, and says he feels very honored to receive the award.

"They only give one award, but it takes a lot of good people to run a gin - all the employees deserve it," said Beck. The gin employs about 35 people during the ginning season, and seven year-round.

Although not a native Texan (he was raised in California), Beck says he enjoys living in Texas. "The cotton people of Texas, and especially West Texas, have been very good to me and have given me lots of opportunities, and have made this [award] possible," he added.

A man in Wilson was shot with



Lynn County Sheriff's Department Implements Drug/Crime Programs

probably noticed an increased number of patrol cars on the highway since Jan. 1. This increase is due to a drug/crime interdiction program which was recently implemented by the Lynn County Sheriff's Department. The program adds to area patrol and benefits the county in several ways, according to Sheriff Charlie

"Any property which is seized or confiscated by the officer is converted into equipment and supplies for the Sheriff's Department. This will enable us to do a better job at less cost to the tax payer, "said the Sher-

Since the program was implemented in the middle of January. there have been eight drug arrests, four D.W.I.'s, five driving with license suspended, four public intoxication, four warrants served, and eight illegal aliens apprehended.

While working the interdiction program the officers are able to check for outstanding felony warrants, D.W.I.'s, and many other offenses which would go undetected. These violations affect the public in many ways, including loss of life, loss of property, and monetary loss, Smith explained.

"Lynn county residents will also notice high visibility patrol cars depicting the Lynn County Sheriff Department emblems and logo. This





Under a contract with the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB), the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 has \$1million available for loan to area producers at 5.05 percent interest for the purchase of agricultural water conservation equipment.

Farmers in Bailey, Cochran, Hale, Lubbock, Lynn, and Parmer Counties, as well as the portions of Armstrong, Castro, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Floyd, Hockley, Lamb, Potter, and Randall Counties within the High Plains Water District service area are eligible to apply for an agricultural water conservation equipment loan from the District.

Irrigation systems approved for loans under the program are Low Energy Precision Application (LEPA) center pivot sprinklers; low pressure drip irrigation systems; low

pressure center pivot sprinkler systems with drop lines no more than four feet from the ground; surge valves; soil moisture monitoring devices used to schedule the timing and/or amount of irrigation water applied; and furrow dikers to hold irrigation water or precipitation in place until it can soak into the soil.

Contractor services for land leveling or shaping land slope to improve irrigation application efficiencies are also eligible for funding under the loan program.

January Was Colder, Drier

Weather across the South Plains during the month of January was slightly colder and drier than normal, according to the National Weather Service's Lubbock office.

Temperatures averaged 0.9 degrees below normal and ranged from 3.3 degrees below normal at Plainview to 0.8 above normal at Jayton.

Maximum temperatures averaged 2.7 degrees below normal and ranged from 5.9 degrees below normal at Friona to 0.1 degree above normal at Paducah. The highest temperature reported during the month was 86 at Paducah on Jan. 3. Average maximum temperature in Tahoka was 51.4 degrees.

Minimum temperatures averaged 0.9 degrees above normal and ranged from 1.4 below normal at Plainview to 2.2 above normal at Jayton. The lowest temperature reported during the month was 2 degrees above zero at several stations on the South Plains. Average minimum temperature in Tahoka was 25.6 degrees.

Precipitation averaged 0.12 inch below normal and ranged from 0.53 below normal at Jayton to 0.43 above normal at Friona. Tahoka had .57 inch of precipitation in January.


