It was a history-making win for Tahoka Tuesday night, when the Tahoka High School Varsity Boys basketball team claimed a spot in the Regional Basketball Tournament for the first time ever. Coach Toby Villa's quick and speedy Bulldogs overcame the taller Coahoma Bulldogs 53-44 to claim the Class 2A Area Championship title in Snyder, and will take on Idalou in the first round of regional playoffs Friday night.

The Dogs will play at 8 p.m. in Abilene Christian University's Moody Coliseum Friday night, against the Idalou Wildcats, who beat Clarendon 71-54 in Area. Should Tahoka win that game, the Dogs will be in the regional finals at 1 p.m. Saturday against the winner of the Stratford-Shallowater game. The Shallowater Mustangs, who were District Co-Champions with Tahoka, won their area playoff game just as the buzzer sounded in overtime play, 67-65 over Jim Ned. Shallowater will play Stratford at 6 p.m. Friday night, just prior to Tahoka's game.

According to records dating back 30 years, this is the first time for a Tahoka team to advance to the regional playoffs. Last year the Bulldogs made it to the area playoffs before losing a close game to Stratford, and the 1976-77 Bulldogs were district and bi-district champions but lost in the area playoffs. The Dogs have only had seven playoff appearances in the 30 seasons priorto this year.

Tahoka's Rocky Moore led scoring in Tuesday night's Area win with 18 points, and Adrian Graves contributed another 9, the same as Monty Hale, who also had 10 rebounds, and Randy Burleson scored 8. Lee Rash added 5 points, Brad Long tossed in 2, and Matt Chancy contributed an important 2 points just before halftime to widen the lead against Coahoma by 3.

Tahoka trailed by six points (1-7) early in the first quarter against Coahoma, but an offensive effort

pushed the Dogs to a 10-8 lead with two minutes remaining, before ending the quarter at a 12-12 tie. The Dogs pulled ahead to 19-14 early in the second period, but two 3-pointers from Coahoma gave them the edge with four minutes remaining. For the next four minutes until halftime, both teams scrambled for the lead, with Tahoka's Monty Hale and Rocky Moore tossing in 4 and 5 points respectively (including a 3-pointer from Moore), and another 2 points by Matt Chancy contributing for a 30-27 halftime lead.

Coach Villa's Blue Dogs were never behind after that, owing largely to some great defensive play by the team, who hounded Coahoma's bigger Bulldogs mercilessly with lots of energy, keeping them down to 8 and 9 points in the last two quarters respectively. Moore added 11 of his 18 points during the second half and the Blue Dogs scored 11 and 12 points in the third and fourth periods to claim the championship trophy.

"Everybody's really excited - I don't think Tahoka has ever qualified for the regional tournament," said Coach Villa. "I'm very proud of the team." he added.

The Bulldogs had another gree game at bi-district, one of Tahoka's finest performances on a basketball court in years last Thursday in Snyder as the Bulldogs played a super game. to beat Stanton 78-69 for the Bi-District title.

Randy Burleson led Tahoka scoring with 23 points, and had plenty of good help as Coach Toby Villa's team fell behind 0-4 at the start, then came back to lead 13-9 after the first period. Stanton came back to take the lead at 17-15 with 6 minutes left in the second, but Burleson had 12 points in that quarter, six times hitting 2pointers to give Tahoka the lead as the two teams played it close.

Shots by Brad Pebsworth, Monty Hale and Lee Rash in the second quarter helped give Tahoka a halftime lead of 32-29 over the favored Buffaloes, who were ranked fifth in

the state in Class AA boys basketball. Tahoka led throughout the last

half, but Stanton kept it very close up to the last 1:19, when the Buffs, trailing at that point by 70-69, hit a goal which didn't count because of a charging foul. After that, Tahoka pulled away on free throws as Stanton keep fouling in the last 50 seconds trying

to get the ball back. In the last 50 seconds, Rash hit four free tosses and Rocky Moore put in four more.

Leo McAlister led all scorers with 26 points for Stanton, which wound up the season at 28-3, with two of those losses being to Tahoka. The Bulldogs also got 21 points from Rash, 16 from Moore and 9 from Hale. Moore had two 3-point shots; Rash and Burleson had one each. Each team had 22 personal fouls.

Two Candidates File For Elections

Only two names have been added to the candidate list this week for city and school elections throughout Lynn County. B.P. Bairrington filed for a seat on the O'Donnell City Council, and Ty Askew filed for a seat on the Tahoka School Board. No other candidates have filed in any of the other city or school elections in the county since last week. Candidates have until March 19 to file for the election at respective city and school offices.

Elections for city, school, and hospital boards will be held May 3. Filing for Lynn County Hospital District Board of Directors will be conducted at a later date.



Tahoka Elementary, Middle School Recognized

Texas Commissioner of Education Mike Moses notified Tahoka ISD recently that Tahoka Elementary and Middle Schools are among 664 campuses statewide that have received recognition as a Title I commended school. Schools on the list have been identified based on the academic performance of their participating Title I

There are 4856 Title I campuses in Texas and 209 in Region XVII. Of the 209 Region XVII eligible campuses, 41 received Commended sta-

To attain the status of Commended School for the 1996-97 school year, the campuses had to have 70 percent or more of the participating Title I students pass the reading and mathematics sections of the TAAS tests in the 1995-96 school

Title I students are identified as students in Kindergarten through Grade 8 who are considered at risk of dropping out of school or from families that are considered economically disadvantaged by the federal govern-

To realize the significance of Tahoka ISD's recognition, Lubbock ISD which has 48 campuses with Title I students, had only three that received the recognized status. Both eligible campuses at Tahoka ISD received recognition.







CRP Sign-Up Begins Soon

Program (CRP) sign-up period will be from Monday, March 3 through Friday, March 28. All contracts that expired prior to 1997, contracts that expire on September 30, 1997, or any land not under contract may be bid if the land meets the eligibility criteria.

The new Conservation Reserve Program is designed to target the most environmentally sensitive land. The primary goals of CRP are erosion reduction, water quality improvement, and wildlife habitat enhance-ment. All eligible offers will be ranked using an Environmental Benefits Index (EBI). The index is used to evaluate all offers based on the potential environmental benefits. The criteria that will be used to determine the EBI ranking include: wildlife benefits, erosion control; water quality, air quality, and cost. Producers who bid their land into the Conservation Reserve Program will sign a lease with the United States Department of Agriculture if their bid is accepted.

Participants must establish a cover on the land that is accepted into CRP. They receive cost-share assistance for establishing the cover, as few days of the sign-up to schedule well as, an annual rental payment for taking the land out of production. After the cover has been established,

The 15th Conservation Reserve the producer must maintain the cover for the life of the contract. CRP payments will include an incentive for performing any required mainte-

> Acres that are accepted into the new CRP program must benefit the nation more from the land being retired than keeping the land in agricultural production. Owners who are interested in bidding their land into the Conservation Reserve Program, or have any questions about CRP, please contact the local Natural Resources Conservation Service at 998-4507, or come by the local office at 1647 Avenue J in Tahoka. Information is also available at the Farm Services Agency located at 1601 South 2nd in Tahoka, or call 998-

Producers, who know they are going to bid land into CRP, are encouraged to contact the local Farm Service Agency as soon as possible for an appointment. Appointments should be scheduled early in the signup to ensure all documentation can be completed.

If producers wait until the last an appointment, it may not be possible to get all documentation completed before the deadline.
