# Two TISD Teachers Resign; **Nonrenewal Hearing Date Set**

Teacher resignations, and setting a hearing date for a proposed nonrenewal were announced at the Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees meeting Thursday night, among other business including student transfer requests, approving a slate of school calendars, teacher appraisal system selection, auditing firm selection, budget amendments, and rejection of several bids for ag shop renovations. A public hearing will be held Tuesday, April 22 at 6 p.m. in the school cafeteria for the proposed nonrenewal of Tahoka Middle School math teacher Rebecca ingle, who requested that the meeting be open to the public. Superintendent David Hutton told trustees of two resignations effective at the end of this school year. High school math teacher Lana Killough submitted her resignation, and third grade teacher Linda Huffaker also submitted her resignation, as she is retiring from teaching. One other probationary contract was nonrenewed by trustees, that of high school speech/drama teacher Ira White-Kelly, who filled in during the second semester of this school year for a position left vacant by a teacher/coach who resigned after the first semester. The board approved three tentative school calendars, one each for 185, 186, and 187 school days, because the state legislature has not yet set the number of days for the school year. When the number of days has been designated by the state, then the appropriate calendar will be used by the district. Trustees looked at several bids for renovating the bus barn to be used as ag shop facilities, but rejected all bids submitted, the lowest of which was \$190,000.

A \$2,000 stipend was approved for the noon Monday, May 5 to canvass the

votes from the May 3 election, and the next regular monthly meeting was set for May 8.

# **Two Traffic Accidents In** City Investigated

Two traffic accidents were investigated by Tahoka Police Dept. during the last week, with the most recent being a collision of two cars Wednesday morning at the intersection of S. 5th and Ave. J.

Exaggeration, or overstatement, is the American form of humor, as opposed to the British style of understatement ("I say, we folks here on the Titanic may be in for a bit of trouble since we struck that iceberg.")

Still, I continue to marvel at the way most people report the weather. Anytime there is a cloud, some people see a funnel. Anytime there is hail, somebody claims it was a lot worse than it was ("The hail beat my car all to pieces. No, I just happened to pick up this little hammer; I didn't really use it.")

Last week a relative in Lubbock called after he heard on TV that Tahoka had "baseball-size" hail. We assured him that all we saw was pea-size or marble-size. I told him I had some tennis balls, however, that are as big as hailstones.

Later that evening, I saw a warning across the bottom of the screen that said "the storm approaching Lubbock may contain golf-sized hail." Gee. Hail as big as golf clubs? Golf carts? Golf tees?

Once when I worked at The Plainview Daily Herald we had a few snow flakes fall early one spring morning: they all melted as they hit the ground. Later that day, we saw an Associated Press story which said it snowed in Plainview, implying that the ground turned white.
