Teacher Contract Is Nonrenewed

Following an 11-hour public hearing, Tahoka Middle School math teacher Rebecca Ingle's contract was not renewed by a vote of 5-1 by the Tahoka Independent School District Board of Trustees early Wednesday morning.

The hearing, which was conducted in the Tahoka school cafeteria and open to the public, began at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday and adjourned at 4:30 a.m. Wednesday. Testimony on the case was heard until approximately 3 a.m., concluding with testimony from Mrs. Ingle herself. Following closing arguments, the board retired to executive session at 3:30 a.m. to deliberate, returning to open session at approximately 4:15 a.m.

Trustee Juanell Jones made the motion to nonrenew Mrs. Ingle's contract based on the administration's recommendation, and Brad Hammonds seconded the motion. Voting for the motion were Mrs. Jones, Carmen Chapa, Greg Henley, Hammonds and Joe Calvillo. Voting against the motion was trustee Ginger Henry. Trustee Rex Rash was absent from the hearing proceedings.

The Lynn County Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) is joining in the national observance of Soil and Water Stewardship Week to take place on April 27 through May 4 according to an announcement by Walter Ray Steen, chairman of the district.

The theme of this year's observance is "Backyard Stewardship.

"This focus is especially appropriate as our need for stewardship is vital if we are to maintain the productive capabilities of our basic natural resources of soil and water. Together, we must work for the good of all to utilize, conserve and properly manage those resources in our care. Participation in Soil and Water Stewardship Week activities offers an opportunity to reflect on the nation's renewable resource problems and consider actions to resolve them or reduce their impact, " said Steen.

Lynn County Judge J.F. Brandon signed a proclamation declaring Soil and Water Stewardship Week here, April 27-May 4, in appreciation of the value of the soil and water to the public welfare.

The Lynn County SWCD was organized in 1942 for the purpose of offering farmers, ranchers, and the local community a voluntary conservation technical assistance program through which individuals could seek and request conservation assistance to meet the capabilities and needs of their land.

"Basically it is the district's responsibility to provide technical assistance when requested relative to proper soil use and treatment, erosion control practices, solve drainage problems and assist farmers and ranchers with crop. range and pastureland management," said


Last Chance To Sign-up For Girls Softball

Gymnastic Abilities Take O'Donnell Teen To New Heights At Far Away Places

In Texas, people might think the only thing that tumbles is the tumbling tumbleweed; for Ashli Farmer, however, tumbling has an entirely different meaning... and has opened doors to new experiences and far-off places.

Ashli Farmer, 17-year-old daughter of Matt and Diane Farmer of O'Donnell, began gymnastics when she was three years old. Now a junior at O'Donnell High School, the teen has competed at seven national gymnastic meets and three international meets. Her abilities have taken her from this small town on the South Plains to places such as New Zealand and Japan.

When Ashli was five, she began competing and taking gymnastics from Sherry Mulkey of Levelland, who taught power tumbling. Power tumbling involves events such as floor, (where five tricks are performed on the first pass and ten tricks are performed on the second pass), trampoline, double-mini trampoline, and synchronized trampoline.

There are three levels of power tumbling which include advanced, junior league, and senior league. The junior and senior leagues are for the older competitors. The senior league usually takes seven competitors to the competitions. On the advanced level, 50 gymnasts are chosen from 400 participants attempting to make the competition. The larger meets occur on the national and international levels.

In 1985, when Miss Farmer was six years old, she and her team, the Acro-Spirits, attended her first international competition in Lubbock. Here she won second place in synchronized trampoline.

After Ashli completed second grade, her family moved to El Paso. Her gymnastics interest did not subside though. She remembers the challenges she had to face in gymnastics at El Paso.

"It was harder work because there were so many different events that worked every muscle," Farmer said.

"You had to be in top condition." Following her fifth grade year in El Paso, her family then decided to move back to O'Donnell, where she resumed practicing under her coach, Sherry Mulkey.

When Ashli was 14-years-old, she qualified on the advanced level to her second international competition in Auckland, New Zealand. She qualified for the double-mini trampoline exercise and received 14th place.

Ashli and her United States team traveled by plane for 17 hours in the air before reaching the New Zealand competition. At the competitions the team is required to stay together as a team by rooming together, traveling together, and eating together.

The O'Donnell teen qualified for

her third international competition in Kitami City, Japan which took place between her freshman and sophomore year of high school. She had decided this would be her last meet, to allow her more time to pursue other interests. Here she qualified for the floor and double-mini trampoline events. Ashli won third place in the double-mini trampoline competition and her American teammates received first and second. This competition was the most memorable for Farmer.

"It was neat seeing all American flags and hearing your national anthem," remembers Farmer. "You feel

This kind of success did not occur without hard work and long hours. Farmer recalls practicing in the off season for about five hours per week, during season before nationals about ten hours per week, and before internationals for about 20 hours per week.

Farmer's coach also implemented an eating and exercising program to be followed at the competitor's own will. Around competition time the eating program discouraged sweets and carbonated water. It also encouraged eating three healthy meals a day.

"Whether you followed it or not was your choice and how bad you wanted to win or how well you wanted to do was your choice," Farmer said.

Farmer recalls her coach's feeling about her young gymnasts. "You kits are special; you're not normal kids because you give up

going to birthday parties and give up regular kid activities," remembers She was ready to make sacrifices to obtain her goals as a gymnast. "It took commitment and all of us

were willing to do it," said Farmer.

Diane Farmer also remembers

the sacrifices her daughter endured voluntarily while competing nationally and internationally.

"Before she went to Japan she was so tired of practicing and so worn out, she said, 'Mother, when I get back I'm not tumbling anymore. I want to be a regular kid," Mrs. Farmer

Diane Farmer also remembers the community's support before the very costly competitions. Community members would often have fund raisers to help finance part of her

"The community was very good to help make it where she could go," said Farmer.

Ashli Farmer feels her years involved in gymnastics has helped her present day activities. She is involved in basketball, cross country, track, and cheerleading.

"It really has helped me with athletics and school; it has improved my coordination and endurance through tumbling," Farmer said.

Farmer says she misses competing in gymnastics but has enjoyed all the successes she has obtained, namely her third place medal received at the international competition in Kitami City.

"I worked so hard since I was five to achieve my goal; it was a great feeling when I finally achieved it, she

That's a big accomplishment for anyone, let alone a teenager. With the ability for that kind of commitment, who knows what the future holds for Ashli Farmer?



Owners Getting Horses Tested For Equine Infectious Anemia

Since the first of January, nearly 60,000 equine (horses, donkeys, mules and other related animals) in Texas have tested "clean" for Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA). The widespread testing is due to voluntary compliance with new livestock health regulations intended to control the spread of this incurable equine viral disease, sometimes called "Coggins" or "swamp fever."

"I'm pleased and proud that the industry has supported increased testing for equine involved in trail rides, shows, fairs, rodeos and other competitions," said R.A. "Rob" Brown Jr., chairman and equine representative for the Texas Animal Health Commission (TAHC). "When equine are gathered for events, it's reassuring to know the health status of the animals that are participating, as EIA can be spread by biting flies that transfer droplets of blood from infected equine to clean animals."

"The old saying, 'you can't tell by looking', certainly applies with EIA, because infected equine don't always look sick," said Brown, who served also as president of the American Quarter Horse

"In some animals, the infection can

overworked, stressed or injured, and then they recover. Finally, there is the animal that displays no symptoms, but is an inapparent carrier but still can be instrumental in spreading the infection. All infected animals should be considered dangerous, as they pose a threat to 'clean' equine."

Owners face tough choices if they have an animal infected with EIA. If they choose to keep the animal, TAHC regulations require the animal to be quarantined for life, at least 200 yards from other equine. Moreover, the quarantine extends to all equine under common ownership or management. As of April 1997, only 108 known EIAinfected equine are being held in quarantined and monitored conditions. Brown said most owners make the gutwrenching, but healthier and more responsible choice, to have the animal euthanized, sold to slaughter or provided to a research facility.

Brown said the TAHC will delay enforcement activities at events until after July 1, in the hopes that most equine owners will continue to voluntarily comply with the testing requirement.

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

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"Coggins," an incurable equine viral disease also called Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) which can be transmitted from one horse to another by insects and other means.

There are no vaccines or treatments for this disease. There are very few cases reported in Texas, but by a designated deadline time (either May 5 or June 1) if your horse has not been tested it will not be allowed to leave the farm.

If the state decides to let DPS handle the checking of test papers while you are transporting horses and you don't have them, you could be fined heavily.

You can have your horses tested in Tahoka on Saturday, April 26 at 1:00 p.m. at the Riding Arena on the south end of town. The fee will be \$12-\$15 and a call fee. DVM B. Brock will test



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


