New Mayor, Two Council Members Sworn In At City Meeting Monday

A new mayor was sworn in at the Tahoka City Council meeting Monday evening, and two council members took the oath of office, including Amy Preston, the first woman ever to serve on a Tahoka City Council. Councilman John Chapa Jr. is serving another two-year term in District 1, and Mrs. Preston will represent District 3.

Former councilman Mike Mensch was sworn in as Mayor of Tahoka, taking over the position from James A. Solomon, who served as mayor here for 12 years, and as a councilman for 8 years prior to that. Solomon was presented with a plaque of appreciation by Mensch and the City Council.

Mensch appointed councilman Jay Dee House as mayor pro-tem. Other council members include Ray Don Box and Rudy Tejeda Jr.

The council voted unanimously to contract with the local office of the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) for repair work at the cityowned T-Bar Airport. The city will pay half of the cost for materials, and TxDOT will pay the other half, as well as provide the labor for sealcoating the runway and apron, restriping the runway, and dirt work at the north end of the airport.

Police Chief Steve Chance gave the council a report on the police department's activities for the month, and monthly bills were approved.

O'Donnell Teen To Compete In International Science Fair

Science is an exacting art which takes a certain type of analytical mindset to appreciate ... or to advance in. One O'Donnell teenager excels in that particular art, and perhaps because as a West Texan he also appreciates the inherent value of the land, his science project which has earned him a chance to compete at the international level (again) involved soil used in covering landfills.

Casey Griffing, son of Bill and Rubeth Griffing of O'Donnell, has been working on a Bio-meditation project that has won him a trip to the international science competition in Louisville, Kentucky.

A 16-year-old junior at O'Donnell High School, Griffing defines Bio-mediation as "taking heavy metals out of the soil and water using things that occur naturally in nature, like blue-green algae and the cocklebur."

The goal of the project is to remove heavy metals from covered-up landfills where the metals are present in water. The metals to be removed are lead, mercury, and cadmium.

Griffing became interested in Bio-mediation after reading an article in an agricultural magazine.

"I read an article in an ag magazine about where they were using ragweed to take heavy metals out of have any ragweed around here so I thought about what plant family ragweed is in and one thing just led to

Griffing has been working on this project for the past two years. This project also awarded him a trip to the international science competition last year as a sophomore.

Griffing says information he gathered last year for the competition ties in well with this year's project.

"They both tie in together real well," said Griffing. "I just continued what I started last year this year as soon as I got back from nationals."

These projects are not a new thing fro Griffing, who has been doing science projects since the third

"I have been doing them all my life," Griffing said. "I've always en-

tered the regional fair in Lubbock." Rubeth Griffing, a chemistry and physical science teacher at O'Donnell, and Dr. Shelly, a chemistry professor at Texas Tech, have helped and advised Casey with his

"Dr. Shelly has showed us some cheaper ways to get these tested; the test for the heavy metals to find out the concentration the plant is absorbing," Griffing said.

The test is performed by adding chemicals to the water which in turn changes the color of the water. The color that the water turns will indicate the concentration and the metals present.

Others have also been helpful with Griffing's project.

"The school and others have been real good about helping us get anything we needed," Griffing said.

The international science competition will be held in Louisville, Kentucky on May 10. At this competition, each finalist must submit a summary, no greater than three quarters of a page long, about his or her project. Each contestant also has a board of pictures and information that is displayed to the judges at the competition. The judges ask the contestants questions to determine the work and time that has been invested into each project. Contestants win scholarships and special awards for their efforts. This year's special award is a trip to the Nobel Peace Prizes.

Griffing plans to be a chemical engineer in the future and plans to attend Texas Tech or Texas A&M. Griffing also plans to continue work on his project in the future.

"Anyway I can continue this I'd like to," Griffing said. "It's really worthwhile."

Griffing is excited about this year's competition and thinks last year's experience will help him.

"I think I'll do a lot better," Griffing said.

Griffing has won awards for his hard work and commitment. He has won The National Biology Teacher's award, and The Texas Water Works award. These awards have encouraged and pressed him to continue to

Griffing is also involved in many other areas. He enjoys roping in his spare time, playing the guitar, football, and 4-H. He also placed fourth in district this year at the UIL science competition

Griffing believes of all that have helped him, his mother has been his greatest asset.

"My mom has been my main motivator through the whole thing. Even at four in the morning when we were still putting my board together." Griffing said with a grin.

Whatever the motivation, the O'Donnell teen has carried the project to a level which scientific judges have deemed worthy enough for international competition...twice. That's quite an accomplishment which few

Voters Make Choices In City, School And Hospital Elections

Lynn County residents marked their choices in their respective city, school and hospital district elections Saturday. Two incumbents and a newcomer were elected to the Lynn County Hospital District Board of Directors in an election which had a good turnout using the new cumulative voting method. Incumbent Billy Tomlinson led the ticket with 476 votes, followed closely by incumbent Virginia Griffing with 469, and Jerry Ford was declared the third candidate to be elected to the board with 372 votes. Three other candidates were vying for the three positions on the board, including Jerry Reno with 330 votes, Maurio Marez with 308, and Heather Vega with

There were a total of 2169 votes cast in the hospital election by 758 voters. There were 87 voters who marked ballots in early voting, and the breakdown by voting boxes on May 3 showed 281 people voting in Tahoka, 193 in O'Donnell, 116 in New Home, and 81 in the Wilson voting box.

In the four city elections in Lynn County, New Home had the only mayoral race, with two candidates seeking the position. Don Sharp won by 29 votes over Jimmie Kieth, with Sharp getting 65 votes and Kieth 36.

For New Home City Council, Kyle Johnston led the ticket with 70 votes and incumbent LeRoy Nettles was re-elected to the council with 58 votes. Darrell Fletcher also ran for the council, with 44 votes.

Wilson City Council had three positions to fill from a slate of four candidates. Incumbent Victor Steinhauser led the ticket with 45 llowed by a close race with vent Oscar Ortega getting 34 votes and David Cook with 33. The other candidate, Mark Holeman, was close behind with 31 votes.

In O'Donnell, three positions were filled on the City Council from a slate of four candidates, with incumbent Max Mendieta leading the ticket with 190 votes, followed by B.P. "Phil" Bairrington with 158 votes and incumbent Brian Snellgrove with 125 votes to win the election. Also running was Rex Little, with 84 votes.

The Tahoka City Council election was canceled because all candidates were running unopposed. In the City Council meeting held Monday evening, Mike Mensch was declared mayor, incumbent John Chapa Jr. was declared re-elected to District 1. and Amy Preston was declared councilwoman for District 3. She is the first woman ever to be elected to the Tahoka City Council.

There were contested races in all four school elections in the county. Four candidates vied for two seats on the Tahoka School Board, with Ty Askew leading the ticket with 230 votes and incumbent Greg Henley also getting re-elected with 183 votes. Also running for the trustee positions were Cheryl Krey with 168 votes and David Graves, 101. Wilson had three candidates

seeking two seats on the Wilson I.S.D. Board. Vannessa Stewart led all candidates with 88 votes, and incumbent Keith Wied was re-elected to the board with 58 votes. Write-in candidate Rick Yowell made a decent showing, with 36 votes. In New Home, five candidates

were on the ballot for two seats on the school board. Winning the election were candidates Michael Rodriguez with 64 votes and David Gandy with 63 votes. Incumbent David Foerster followed close behind with 58 votes, Marinda Tyler had 45 votes, and Melita Cramblet had 29 votes.

O'Donnell I.S.D. Board of Trustees had two seats to fill from a slate of four candidates. Nelson D. Hogg led the ticket with 279 votes, and also elected was Renn Dorman with 144 votes. Close behind was Wayne Barton with 134 votes, and Willie Lucra had 46 votes.





Dollars For Scholars: Top Ten Steps For College Financial Aid Listed

Getting into the college of your choice may be at the top of this year's holiday wish list, but finding the money to pay for it is probably not far behind. According to Lydia M. Marshall, executive vice president of Sallie Mae, the nation's largest source of funds for higher education, the best approach for finding the best financial aid package has a familiar seasonal ring to it: "Start early. Compare products. And shop around."

Ms. Marshall offers a list of top Ten Financial Aid Tips when shopping for college financial aid:

1. Obtain a FAFSA: The Free Application for Federal Student Aid is the first step toward applying for financial assistance. You can get one from your high school guidance counselor or local library, or call the U.S. Department of Education at 1-800-4FED-AID. The FAFSA will help determine the type (e.g. grants, workstudy, federal loans) and amount of aid you will be eligible for. With so much aid available and so many factors involved in considering aid costs, don't assume you won't qualify.

2. Get Organized: Even if you have not decided which college to attend, you should begin preparing to tackle the multi-page FAFSA. At the same time, find out the admission and financial aid deadlines at the colleges you are considering. It's also a good idea to start organizing the personal financial information (i.e., assets and 1996 income) that is required on the FAFSA. Read the information provided by the colleges carefully. Some colleges require additional applications for financial aid.

3. Apply Early: Many students and families are surprised to learn that some student aid is often awarded on a first-come, first-served basis. Submit your FAFSA as soon after the new year as possible.

4. Research Scholarship Availability: The reference section of your local library has volumes listing literally thousands of grants and scholarships based on academic merit or particular talents or interests. Also, look into civic and community groups, foundations, corporations or labor unions who may offer scholarships.

5. Start Surfing: The Internet is an excellent source of information about scholarships and financial aid. Sallie Mae's Web site, for example (http://www.salliemae.com), has more than 350 pages of information on federal and private student aid programs. Among its many features are eight interactive calculators that can help compute your Expected Family Contribution, monthly loan payments, monthly savings goals and more. There's also an interactive database of lenders that offer the best repayment plans and money-saving borrower benefits nationally available on education loans. But a word of caution about the Internet: watch out for unscrupulous companies that charge a fee for otherwise free information or that "guarantee" you a scholarship.

6. Explore Federal Loan Programs: One in two college students today relies on loans to fund their education. The Federal Family Education Loan program administers three low-interest loan programs: (1) Perkins Loans, need-based loans with a 5% interest rate (available at most four-year colleges); (2) federal Stafford Loans, the most popular student loan with an 8.25% interest rate; and (3) PLUS Loans, the loans for parents of undergraduate students that currently carry an 8.72% interest rate.

7. Compare Lenders: While the federal government has established uniform interest rates and terms for the Stafford loan program, many private lenders offer borrowers an array of discount programs that considerably reduce borrowing costs. Students who borrow from lenders that partner with Sallie Mae, for example, have the interest rate on their loans reduced by 2 percent after the first 48 payments are made on time. Following the first 24 on-time payments, a borrower's account will be credited with an amount equal to the loan origination fee (3%), less \$250. There is also a 0.25% reduction if the payments are made electronically. A borrower with \$20,000 in student loans would save a total of \$2,137 (at current rates) by taking advantage of these discount programs.

8. Look Into Private Loan Programs: Because federal loan programs have strict borrowing limits (\$2,625 for most freshmen, for instance), more and more families are turning to private loan programs. For some, a home equity loan with its potential tax advantages is the best option. Many others, however, are opting for private supplemental loans, such as Sallie Mae's Signature Education Loan Program. This allows students to borrow the total cost of education, less other aid they are eligible to receive. In addition to allowing borrowers to apply for their Stafford and private loans at one time, the Signature Education Loan Pro-



ATTENTION HORSE OWNERS

All horses in Lynn County should be tested for "Coggins," an incurable equine viral disease also called Equine Infectious Anemia (EIA) which can be transmitted from one horse to another by insects and other means.

There are no vaccines or treatments for this disease. There are very few cases reported in Texas, but by a designated deadline time (July 1) if your horse has not been tested it will not be allowed to leave the farm.

If the state decides to let DPS handle the checking of test papers while you are transporting horses and you don't have them, you could be fined heavily.

All 4-H Horse Club members' horses **MUST** be tested for Coggins to participate.

You can have your horses tested in Tahoka on Saturday, May 10 at 1:30 p.m. at the Riding Arena on the south end of town. The fee will be \$14. DVM B. Brock will test.

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
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

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
