Today (Thursday) was the last day of classes for Tahoka I.S.D. students.




With ribbon cutting ceremonies scheduled for the end of June, volunteer workers are needed to complete landscaping at the new Life Enrichment Center in Tahoka.

KNOTHOLES in the Woodwork, or Other Things from Tuesday's newspaper: Story on the front page of Section C reports that night temperatures in Phoenix are staying around 80 degrees because of all the concrete and asphalt associated with the large metropolitan area. The city used to cool off at night in the summer to around 50 or 60 degrees, but the cement retains too much heat. It was noted that the daytime temperatures don't get any higher than they used to because air flows carry away the urban-generated heat. 
Parenting Group Sets Last Meeting



Rotary News

The Tahoka Rotary Club met Thursday, May 22, at the First United Methodist Church. May program chairman Wilton Payne was in charge of the annual Farmer's Day program, where the Rotarians invite a farmer to a special agricultural program and club meeting. Payne introduced Carmon E. McCain, Information/Education Director of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1.

McCain explained to the club about precipitation enhancement, or cloud seeding, which is an attempt to encourage clouds to generate more rainfall than they would otherwise by introducing seeding agents, such as silver iodide. The silver iodide provides additional condensation nuclei which can allow more cloud moisture to be converted to large raindrops than can survive the fall through the dry subcloud layer and reach the ground as meaningful rainfall.

The seeding program provides a meteorologist who will select appropriate clouds for seeding using a doppler weather radar display, standard meteorologist analysis and forecasting procedures, surface weather observations, and pilot reports. Based on this information, the meteorologist will direct aircraft equipped to dispense silver iodide at cloud-top levels.

The Water District considers precipitation enhancement a tool to enhance the surface and ground water resources of the area. Any additional rainfall generated as a result of this program would help reduce ground water pumpage and increase natural recharge. This combination will extend the life of the Ogallala Aquifer within the Water District.

McCain showed a video of an actual seeding procedure, which had positive results. He answered several questions from the farmers and Rotarians present. Lynn County is in the Water Conservation District, and will be in the rain enhancement program.

Counts Asks Con


Weevil Legislation State Representative David Counts (D-Knox City) ask for the support of rislation which would seek to continue the Boll Weevil Eradication program by members of the House Agriculture and, Livestock Committee. Counts testified before the committee and presented a notebook containing hundreds of letters of support he had received from farmers around the district.

The current legislation being con-sidered in the House would seek to correct the problems noted by the Supreme Court in their ruling which rendered the program unconstitutional. Counts noted that the Court clearly indicated the changes that are needed in order to continue the program.

"This program is crucial to District 70," state Counts. "I have had numerous calls and letters from folks urging the quick passage of this legislation so that we can get the program up and moving again."

Counts told the committee that he has heard from farmers and business leaders in the district who are already seeing the early signs of continued boll weevil problems this year. "Time is of the essence," stated the Knox City lawmaker. "We are working to put together the best piece of legislation we can to help our farmers before it's too late."

Counts noted that he has kept in close contact with Congressman Charles Stenholm (D-Stamford) to see that federal money will remain available. "Charlie has been working hard in Washington to



Counts stated that while the bill was of paramount interest to those in the farming community, its effects are felt throughout the district. "Some people think this is just an issue for farmers," said Counts. "In this district, where approximately 75-80 percent of our economy is based directly or indirectly on agriculture production, the reality is that this issue affects us all."
