1997 Cotton Crop Off To Good Start

The 1997 cotton crop in Lynn County is off to a much better start in terms of available moisture as compared to the 1996 crop. Over 14 inches of rain have been received in 1997 compared to only 3.65 inches in 1996.

Along with the rain, there have been cooler temperatures which have slowed emergence and the development of cotton.

"We are about 80-90 heat units behind this year as compared to the average," said Bryan Reynolds, Lynn County Agricultural Extension

Agent. "All significant acreage has been planted at least once this year. Some producers have had to replant cotton that did not emerge due to the cold temperatures or received hail or wind damage," he added.

The boll weevil is a hot topic among area producers and will continue to be throughout the season. Pheromone traps placed out on April 1 have caught 316 weevils through June 6. In 1996, only four weevils were caught during the same time frame. And in 1995, 321 weevils were caught.

"Obviously, we are extremely high this year compared to last, due to several factors. One is the fact that even though we had colder temperatures this past winter, we had snow to go along with them and it provided insulation to the weevils in overwintered habitat. Also, we saw rains last September that allowed for some regrowth and gave the weevils an extra food supply as they were preparing for diapause. The enhanced diapause control program was cut short due to lack of funding, thus fewer applications were made on fewer acres than the year before," Reynolds explained.

"Producers should consider controlling weevils this season because we have such an abundance of moisture available at this time for the crop and could see excellent yields if things go right," Reynolds said.

Early season insecticide applications may help control weevil damage to squares, and producers should base these treatments on the "Trap Index System" for individual fields. Information is available at the Extension Office on management of the boll weevil.

The future of the eradication of the boll weevil will be put back in the hands of producers as they will have the opportunity to again vote on whether to initiate eradication on the Southern High Plains. The State Legislature approved measures to revive the boll weevil eradication plans for Texas and has given the Texas Department of Agriculture the authority to oversee the program. Producers should receive ballots later this summer to vote on initiating eradication, to approve the assessment rate and elect a producer on the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation Board.

A public hearing is scheduled for June 19 at 10:30 a.m. at the Community Center in Lamesa to take public comments on the upcoming referendum.

Tahoka All-Stars Claim National Runner-Up Title

For the first time in history, a Tahoka All-Star Little Dribblers team played in the finals of the National Little Dribblers Tournament, claiming the title of National Runners-Up in Plainview Saturday evening in the American Majors division.

Tahoka All-Star Little Dribblers 11-12-year old girls team won five of seven games in four days, making the 150-mile round trip daily to Plainview last Wednesday through Saturday. Coached by Debbie Harris and Carmen Chapa, the Tahoka team lost their first round game by one point to Martins Mill, then won the next five games (including another match with Martins Mill and coming out victorious this time) working their way through the double elimination losers bracket, to face Littlefield in the national finals - the same team Tahoka faced in the regional Little Dribblers final in Dalhart several weeks ago.

In the regional finals, Tahoka bested Littlefield by four points, but Littlefield won by a 7-point margin in the national finals, 32-25. The Tahoka girls got behind early in the game, trailing 15-3 at the end of the first quarter, and 17-6 at the half. Going into the fourth period, Tahoka still trailed 26-12, but were able to score 13 points to Littlefield's 6 in the final period, closing the gap to 7 points before the final buzzer.

In trophy ceremonies following

the game, the Tahoka team received individual National Little Dribblers American Major Runners-Up trophies. The team is comprised of Kammie Williams, Damesha Harris, Marissa Chapa, Ashanti Hood, Victoria Charo, Lana Jones, Kirsten Tillman, Amy Garcia, Johanna Alvarado, Kyndel Byrd, Emily Gill, and Jennifer Cantrell.

Tahoka played their first game early Wednesday afternoon, losing a close game 31-30 to Martins Mill. The loss put Tahoka in the bottom of the double elimination bracket, where they had to win five consecutive games to get to the finals. Littlefield, who had no losses in the tournament, had only to win three games to get to the finals through the winning bracket.

In the second round game Thursday afternoon, Tahoka won easily over Fairfield, 40-28, and moved on to their next victory over Cenla, a team from Louisiana, by 27-19. On Friday, Tahoka won their fourth game that afternoon, 20-16 over Martins Mill, the team who had knocked them out of the winners bracket in first-round competition. Martins Mill had lost their second game in the winners bracket to face Tahoka again, and the loss to Tahoka finished their tournament play.

A Friday night game against Lovington, N.M. gave the Tahoka Little Dribblers their fourth win of the tournament, a close win of 24-23.

Saturday morning at 9:15 Tahoka faced Kountz in the semi-final round, at Wayland Baptist University's gym. The Tahoka team actually won this game twice, as the score at the end of the fourth period was 23-21, but a foul was called on Tahoka just as time ran out, giving Kountz two free throws and an opportunity to tie the game and go into overtime. Kountz, who had six girls on the team who were national champions in last year's junior division, popped both baskets to tie the game at 23-23 and force the game into a two-minute overtime. The Tahoka team, however, held it together and scored another 5 points to Kountz's 2 to win the semi-final round, 28-25.

There were 13 teams in the American Majors division, from Texas, New Mexico and Louisiana. Over 900 girls participated in the National tournament in the juniors, majors, and seniors divisions, divided into National and American divisions.

Opening ceremonies were conducted Wednesday night at the Plainview High School football field, where each team carried banners and marched in front of the crowd. Highlights of the evening included a crowd-pleasing parachuting presentation, where five parachutists jumped from an airplane overhead to land on the field, and Texas Tech Lady Raiders Basketball Coach Marsha Sharp was featured speaker.

Law Enforcement Officers Investigate Traffic Accidents

City police investigated two traffic accidents in Tahoka, and DPS officers reported two one-vehicle rollovers in the county this week.

Texas DPS officers investigated a one-vehicle rollover on Saturday at 2:45 p.m. involving Reginald Moore Jr., 18, of Tahoka. Moore was driving a 1994 Geo Tracker when it rolled 4.4 miles southeast of Tahoka on County Road 25. He was taken by private vehicle to Lynn County Hospital with reportedly minor injuries.

DPS also investigated another one-vehicle rollover early Sunday, at 12:05 a.m. involving a 30-year-old Slaton man (name not available) and a 1964 Chevrolet Pickup. The incident occurred at F.M. 400, 2.3 miles northeast of Wilson. The man reportedly suffered minor injuries.

In Tahoka, city police were called to the scene of an accident on U.S. 380 at the railroad tracks, where a 1989 Nissan Sentra hit a guardrail. Alton Ray Steel, 46, of Post and a passenger, Patricia Taylor, 31, of Post, were treated and released at Lynn County Hospital following the accident which occurred at 10 p.m. Monday. According to the report, the driver, who was westbound on US 380, said he veered to avoid a dog crossing the road and hit the guardrail at the railroad tracks.

On Tuesday morning, officers investigated an accident in a private parking lot near the 800 block of Ave. M involving a 1987 Olds Cutlass driven by Pearla Payton, 49, of Tahoka, and an unoccupied 1991

Nissan owned by Johnny and Diana Riojas of Lubbock. The Cutlass reportedly struck the parked Nissan, but no damage estimate was given. According to the accident report, however, the Nissan was driven from the scene by the owner after the incident.

Other reports to police this week included a pack of cigarettes stolen from a convenience store, and police confiscated alcohol from a 19-year-old Lubbock youth who was stopped on a traffic violation.

Monday, a resident reported damage to his front lawn after unknown persons drove a vehicle across the lawn at 2321 N. Main. Damage was estimated at \$50. Another resident called officers Monday to report damage to his fence at 1829 Ave. O by someone kicking in the boards. Two juvenile males, ages 14 and 15, were referred to the juvenile probation office in the incident.

Officers also investigated a case of assault of a family member on Monday, where a woman told officers she had been beaten by her common-law spouse.

A Tahoka woman reported damage to her vehicle, a 1989 Mercury Cougar, after she struck a manhole cover which was reportedly sticking up in the street in the 900 block of Ave. E on Tuesday.

ROTARY NEWS

The Tahoka Rotary Club met on Thursday, June 5, at the First United Methodist Church. The program was presented by Rotarian Clint Gardner on the Texas Agricultural Extensions Service's "DON'T BAG IT" plan.

With the help of a slide presentation, Gardner explained the plan consists of three parts: the Mowing Plan, the Watering Plan, and the Fertilizing Plan. The rule of thumb for mowing home lawns is not to remove more than one-third of the leaf surface at any one time. With this mowing schedule, you no longer need to bag your grass clippings, and leaving them on the lawn will return valuable nutrients to the soil.

When watering, remember that lawns require one inch of water every five to six days. The best time to water is early morning.

The rate of fertilizer application, the frequency of application, and the ratio of nutrients in the fertilizer and the source of nitrogen all have a great deal to do with how fast the lawn grows. The best way to find out which analysis of fertilizer is ideal for your lawn, how much of that fertilizer your lawn needs, and when the fertilizer should be applied is to test the soil with a kit available at the County Extension Office.

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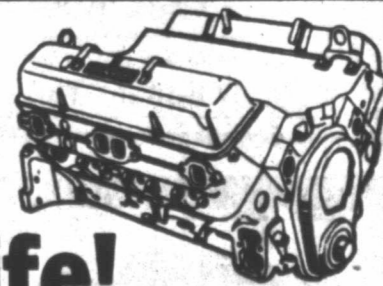

Farm Bill Shifts All Crop Insurance Sales From USDA To Private Agents

Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman recently announced that crop insurance will be available exclusively through crop insurance agents, beginning in the 1998 crop year. Previously, the catastrophic level of crop insurance (CAT) was available through both local USDA Farm Service Agency offices and crop insurance agents in 36 states.

Glickman said this decision was made after carefully reviewing the number of crop insurance agents in each state to ensure that an adequate sales force is in place to provide all farmers with CAT coverage. The 1996 Farm Bill requires USDA to transfer the sales of CAT coverage entirely to the private sector if a sufficient number of agents are available in each state to provide this service.

"While the sales and servicing of policies will be done by the private sector," Glickman said, "this change will not weaken the existing safety net for producers. I am determined that everyone will have access to crop insurance - large farmers and small farmers alike, especially those with limited resources, minorities and producers in all areas of the country."

"Before making this decision, private company representatives gave me their commitment to reach out to all America's farmers and to assure that the highest level of risk management service is extended to everyone," Glickman said. "I look forward to this partnership. I also intend to exercise appropriate oversight over the companies to ensure compliance with their commitment."

USDA will continue to subsidize all policies, establish policy terms and conditions, set rates, and guarantee funds for the payment of approved claims.

The transfer begins with 1998 fall planted crops. Policyholders will receive a letter informing them of this change in about one month. However, producers are to continue to go to the local FSA office for service on 1997 policies. This includes reporting 1997 planted acreage and production as well as any losses.

Although a producer's policy will be randomly transferred from USDA to an insurance company, pro-

ducers may select another agent or insurance company if they do so before the sales closing date for the insured crop.

To ensure that all producers are served, insurance companies are required to insure all eligible crops, and provide all levels of coverage in the states in which they operate. Further, participating companies must insure all qualified applicants.

Waiver of administrative fees for producers who qualify as limited resource farmers is required by the Risk Management Agency and is available through private companies. Private agents are prepared to assist those qualifying producers with certification of their status.

A listing of local crop insurance agents is available in all FSA county offices.

Weather Service Announces May Weather Summary

The National Weather Service in Lubbock recently released the South Plains temperature and precipitation summary for May.

The weather across the South Plains during the month of May was cooler and wetter than normal.

Temperatures averaged 2.5 degrees below normal and ranged from 4.3 degrees below normal at Jayton to .07 degree below normal at Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge.

Maximum temperatures averaged 4.1 degrees below normal and ranged from 6.4 degrees below normal at Spur to 2.3 degrees below normal at Muleshoe Wildlife Refuge. The highest temperature reported during the month was 99 degrees at Big Spring on May 18.

Minimum temperatures averaged .08 degree below normal and ranged from 2.8 degrees below normal at Jayton to 1.6 degrees above normal at Morton. The lowest temperature reported during the month was 32 degrees at Dimmitt on May 4.

Precipitation averaged .26 inch above normal and ranged from 1.27 inches below normal at Post to 3.16 inches above normal at Tulia.

Tahoka's monthly average temperature was 66.4 degrees and total precipitation was 3.11 inches.

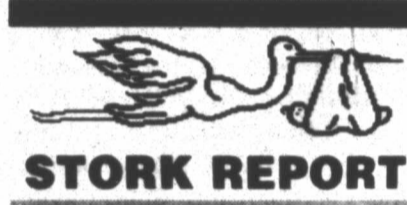
Sharrock and his wife, Linda, will be moving to Tahoka with their children, Britt, 13, and Allison, 7.

Man Has Narrow Escape From High Water Near Wells

Bill McKenzie of Wells had a harrowing experience and came very near being drowned following the heavy rain Friday, The News is informed.

Accompanied by his children, Mr. McKenzie went to a place he farms south of Wells Baptist Church to see how much rain he had gotten there.

About a mile and a half south of the church, he ran into high water rushing into a lake and his pickup slipped sideways and stalled in the road.

When he got out of the vehicle to check on his predicament, the force of the rushing water against the pickup was so great as to throw him down and he was washed under the machine. For a time that must have seemed like ages, he fought to get out before he drowned. In the pickup, the children began crying and yelling.

Getting free, he went to Dick Franklin's for a pickup to free his vehicle.

It's true that there's a possibility of a grown man getting drowned in the middle of the road right here in Lynn county. June 9, 1961

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Service News

Marine Lance Corporal Christopher R. Montez, son of Pedro and Minnie Honesto of Rt. 5, Tahoka, recently returned to Camp Lejeune, N.C. after completing a six-month deployment to the Mediterranean Sea while serving with the 26th Marine Expeditionary Unit.

Montez is one of nearly 3,500 Marines and Sailors aboard the ships of the USS Nassau Amphibious Ready Group, which included the amphibious transport dock USS Nashville and the dock landing ship USS Pensacola led by the amphibious assault ship USS Nassau.

Early during the deployment, Montez helped in the evacuation of civilians from Albania. Helicopters from Montez's unit transported evacuees from more than 15 nations after the U.S. State Department decided that the civil unrest situation in the Eastern European country had worsened.

A few weeks later, elements from the 26th MEU aboard the USS Nassau arrived at Simba Station prepared for possible non-combatant evacuation operations off the coast of Zaire. Montez's unit also secured the U.S. embassy compound in the country.

During the deployment, Montez visited France, Italy and Spain. While in port, Marines from Montez's unit participated in community relations projects and delivered humanitarian supplies provided by Operation Handclasp.

Montez's unit is an expeditionary intervention force with the ability to rapidly organize for combat operations in virtually any environment, providing a fast combat build-up against positions ashore or clearing the way for follow-on forces.

The 1994 graduate of O'Donnell High School joined the Marine Corps in August 1994.
