## Tahoka City Council Sets 67.5-Cent Tax Rate

Tahoka City Council members approved the 1997-98 budget (including a \$2 increase in basic water rates) and a 5-cent property tax increase at their regular monthly meeting held Monday night. Several citizens also attended the council meeting, expressing opinions about several issues concerning the city

Council members unanimously approved the 1997-98 city budget, which will be funded by an increased tax rate of 67.5 cents per \$100 of property value. The 5-cent tax increase was also approved unanimously by the four council members present at the meeting. The new budget showed a General Fund total income of \$557,326, and General Fund total expenses at \$556,580, leaving a surplus of \$746.

Also approved in the budget was a \$2 increase in basic water rates in the city, raising minimum residential rates to \$15.25.

Tahoka citizens Phillip and Dana Barnett addressed the council, stating their opinion that city traffic signs were in disrepair, failed to meet height requirements, or were blocked from view by tree limbs, and also stated that more stop signs were needed at several intersections. They presented a petition signed by approximately 200 citizens stating their concerns, targeting the area in a two-block area around the school.

Grady Herrin, Manuel Lechuga, and Ron and Ellen Fant also attended the meeting as concerned citizens. Lechuga told the council that the city should tear down dilapidated buildings in the city, and Mrs. Fant voiced

her concerns over the general appearance of the town and lack of community pride.

The council took no official action, but gave assurance that these issues were being addressed. City Administrator Jerry Webster said that during recent months city officials had already discussed the need for, and in fact already ordered, several hundred dollars worth of new traffic signs to replace the dilapidated signs.

"Any new traffic regulation signs (where there is no previous sign) must be approved by city ordinance," Webster said, noting that he and the police chief had already spoken about the need for new signs at several intersections, and the council was considering those needs.

City Attorney Cal Huffaker addressed the issue of dilapidated buildings, saying that the city was aware of the problem and is continuing research in that area.

In other business, no action was taken after discussion of three bids for roof repair at City Hall, with Webster citing differences in roofing materials as a concern. The council will seek more quotes for the repair job to consider at another meeting.

John Williams, General Manager of the Canadian River Municipal Water Authority, met with the council to discuss the Lake Meredith Salinity Control Project, but council members held off signing a contract until all cities involved in the contract gave approval. Williams told the council to hold off until all the cities agreed on the contract because some changes might still be made. He expected, however, that the contract should be ready for approval in

Council members awarded Joe Hays as auditor for the city for the year ending September 30, 1997. Monthly bills were approved, and Police Chief Steve Chance reported on his department's activities for the

Presiding at the meeting was Mayor Mike Mensch, and councilmen present included Jay Dee House, Ray Box, John Chapa Jr. and Rudy Tejeda Jr. Councilwoman Amy Preston was absent from the meeting.

## Eagles Stun Bulldogs 16-6

The O'Donnell Eagles soared in their season football opener at home Friday night, flying over and around the Tahoka Bulldogs 16-6.

Tatum Bessire, a speedy 145pound junior running back, delighted the hometown fans and dazed the startled Bulldogs with 148 yards rushing, including a 38-yard touchdown run in the second period. And the Eagle defense, led by such big linemen as Cody Dorman (6-5, 253) and Eric Cruz and Patrick Wells and a whole bunch of other folks, had no problems stopping the anemic Tahoka

O'Donnell came out fired up and eager to play, and Tahoka lost the ball on a fumble on the opening kickoff. This pretty well set the tone for the Bulldogs offense, as they lost four fumbles and had three passes intercepted in the game. Cruz kicked a 30yard field goal for the Eagles on their

first possession. In the second quarter QB Manny Gutierrez passed 38 yards to Felix Perez for an O'Donnell touchdown to make it 9-0 after a failed extra point try. Later in the quarter, after Tahoka lost the ball trying to make a first down on 4th and 3 from their own 36, Bessire raced 38 for another touchdown. Cruz kicked the point and it was 16-0 at halftime.

Tahoka reached the O'Donnell 16 on a 15-yard run by Auggie Cantu late in the first quarter, but lost the

The Eagles didn't score in the second half as the Tahoka defense stiffened a bit, and FB Steve Wiseman of the Bulldogs scored on a 1-yard push in the third quarter, the final score of the game, as a try for two points failed. Tahoka had another opportunity after linebacker Gary Chapa intercepted an O'Donnell pass and returned to the Eagles 34, but QB Brady Raindl's pass just after that play was intercepted by O'Donnell. Raindl, a sophomore making his first start at quarterback, completed 5 of 17 passes for 75 yards, and had three intercepted.


Tahoka had just 71 yards rushing, with Cantu making about 50 of that. The Eagles had 16 first downs to



## **Tax Rates Approved By City Councils**

Property tax rates were set by Wilson, New Home and Tahoka city councils during the past week, with O'Donnell already approving a 3cent tax hike last month, to 89 cents per \$100 of property value.

New Home City Council unanimously approved a 1-1/2 cent tax increase, from 45 cents to 46.685 cents per \$100 of property value, during their regular meeting held last Thursday evening. The council also increased the cut-off water rate from \$5 to \$25, and city permit fees from \$10 to \$25.

Wilson City Council voted unanimously to leave their tax rate as is for another year, at 98 cents per \$100 of property value, at their meeting held Monday night.

Tahoka City Council approved a 5-cent tax hike at their monthly meeting held Monday night, from 62.284 cents per \$100 of property value to 67.5 cents. The unanimous decision followed a public hearing held previously at which no citizens attended.





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#### **County Approves** 2-Cent Tax Hike On Property Values

Lynn County Commissioners adopted a property tax rate of 59.471 cents per \$100 of property value and also approved the 1998 county budget in regular session Monday morning. All four commissioners unanimously approved the tax hike, which is a 2-cent increase above last year's tax rate of 57.349 cents.

In other business, monthly bills and official reports were approved as presented, and permission was given for the county attorney's office to change copy machines.

Commissioners discussed the need for setting speed limits on certain county roads, but took no action. deciding that further research was needed on the issue.

#### Area Residents Invited To Walk Fridays At School


Beginning Friday, Sept. 12 Tahoka Elementary would like to invite community members to come and walk or jog with students during P.E. classes.

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
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

SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 4, 1997

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 1** ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 36 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow a person to hold the position of municipal judge in more than one municipality.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to allow a person who holds the office of municipal court judge to hold at the same time more than one civil office for which the person receives compensation.

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 2** ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 43 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to limit the maximum annual increase in homestead appraisals for each year since the most recent tax appraisal. The amendment would also permit the legislature to allow the governing body of a school district to elect to apply the law providing for the transfer of the age-65and-older school property tax freeze to the person's new homestead, if the move to the new residence homestead occurred before the law took effect

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the Legislature to limit increases in the appraised value of residence homesteads for ad valorem taxation and to permit a school district to calculate the school property tax freeze applicable to the residence homestead of an elderly person or the surviving spouse of an elderly person in accordance with the law authorizing the transfer of the school property tax freeze to a different homestead regardless of whether that law was in effect at the time the person established the person's homestead.'

#### PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 45 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to authorize counties, cities, towns, and other local taxing entities to grant exemptions or other forms of ad valorem tax relief on property on which approved water conservation initiatives have been implemented.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to authorize the legislature to permit a taxing unit to grant an exemption or other relief from ad valorem taxes on property on which a water conserva-

#### tion initiative has been implemented." PROPOSITION NO. 4 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 104 proposes an

amendment to update the Texas Constitution by deleting duplicate numbering in its provisions and removing certain of its obsolete portions.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment eliminating duplicate numbering in and certain obsolete provisions of the Texas Constitution

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 5** ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 19 proposes an amendment to allow the Supreme Court of Texas to hold sessions at any location in this state. Currently, the court is limited to holding sessions only at Austin, the seat of state government.

The proposed amendment will appear

on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the supreme court to sit to

ON THE BALLOT Senate Joint Resolution 39 proposes a constitutional amendment to repeal the current provision which provides that the board of the Texas Growth Fund may not invest money in a business unless the business has disclosed to the board whether it has any direct financial investment in or with South Africa or Namibia.

The proposed amendment will appear

on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing the Texas growth fund to continue to invest in businesses without requiring those businesses to disclose investments in South Africa or Namibia."

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 7**

ON THE BALLOT Senate Joint Resolution 17 proposes a constitutional amendment to create the Texas Water Development Fund II as a fund separate and distinct from the Texas Water Development Fund. The amendment would authorize the Texas Water Development Board to administer the fund and issue general obligation bonds for purposes of the fund under guidelines set

The amendment would also allow the Board to use loan repayments coming into the fund after the end of the fiscal year to make bond debt service payments, and would provide certain conditions for the flow of funds for repayment of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment relating to the authorization to the Texas Water Development Board to transfer existing bond authorizations for water

supply, water quality, flood control, or state participation from one category of use to another category to maximize the use of existing funds and relating to more efficient operation of the bond

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 8** ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 31 proposes a constitutional amendment which would authorize home equity lending, in which a loan could be secured by a lien against the borrower's homestead. The amendment would also establish several provisions providing for consumer protection in the home equity lending process.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The amendment to the Texas Constitution expanding the types of liens for home equity loans that a lender, with the homeowner's consent, may place against a homestead."

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 9** ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 96 proposes a constitutional amendment that would authorize the legislature to authorize a property tax of five cents for each \$100 valuation in rural fire prevention districts which are located in Harris County. The constitution currently authorizes a property tax of three cents for each \$100 valuation in rural fire prevention districts regardless of what county they are in.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to au thorize the legislature to authorize an ad valorem tax rate in rural fire prevention districts located in Harris County of five cents on each \$100 of taxable value of property.

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 10** ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 33 proposes a constitutional amendment to permanently dedicate monies from the Texas Crime Victims' Compensation Fund (and its auxiliary fund) so that they are used only for assisting victims of crime and not for any other purpose. If an episode of mass violence occurred, however, money from the funds could be used to assist victims of the mass violence if all other sources of authorized emergency assistance were depleted first.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment designating the purposes for which money in the compensation to victims of crime fund and the compensation to victims of crime auxiliary fund may

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 11** ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 59 proposes a constitutional amendment to prohibit the Legislature from authorizing additional state debt payable from the general rev-enue fund if the resulting annual debt ser-vice (the amount needed each year to make payments) would exceed five percent of the annual general revenue avail-

able over the last three fiscal years, ex cluding revenues constitutionally dedicated for purposes other than payment of

The term "additional state debt" does not include bonds that, although backed by the full faith and credit of the state, are reasonably expected to be paid from revenue sources other than the general rev-

The proposed amendment will appear

"The constitutional amendment limiting the amount of state debt payable from the general revenue fund.

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 12** ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 55 proposes a constitutional amendment to provide that if the Texas Supreme Court does not act on a motion for a rehearing within 180 days of the motion's filing, the motion is denied.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to establish a deadline for supreme court action on a motion for rehearing."

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 13**

ON THE BALLOT House Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish the Texas Tomorrow trust fund dedicated exclusively to the prepayment of tuition and fees for higher education. The amendment would guarantee that if there is not enough money during any fiscal year to pay the appropriate tuition and required fees, the needed money will be appropriated out of the first available money coming into the state treasury each fiscal year.

The proposed amendment will appear

on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to encourage persons to plan and save for young Texans' college education, to extend the full faith and credit of the state to protect the Texas tomorrow fund of the prepaid higher education tuition program, and to establish the Texas tomorrow fund as a constitutionally protected trust fund."

#### **PROPOSITION NO. 14** ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 83 proposes a constitutional amendment to allow the legislature to set the official qualifications
